Vedic Connections Across the World

by Rtn. Udyan Bhatt on Wednesday, 11th January 2023

The meeting started with the national anthem and the president's weekly birthday and anniversary announcements and announcement of elections for the next years board and was followed by introduction of the speaker Rtn. Udyan Bhatt by senior Rtn. Prakash Trivedi.

Rtn. Udyan Bhatt is an architect by profession and specializes in architecture of multiplexes. However, he is fascinated by temple architecture and has tremendous knowledge of temple architecture.

Rtn. Udyan Bhatt introduced the topic for today's session -"Influence of Vedic Culture."

He started the session by connecting to the audience and asking them how many of them had heard stories and ballads from their grand parents because this is what had influenced his fascination towards Vedic culture.

Veda means spiritual knowledge.

The exact origins of the Vedas is debatable but theories put the time period about as long as 5000 years ago. The rig Veda coincided with the Indus valley civilization.

The rig Veda had many elements common with the indo Iranian texts. However, these similarities were not found in other Vedas.

He chanted the Sanskrit quote: "EKAM SAT VIPRA BAHUDHA VADANTI." Which means the truth is one but the path to the truth could be many, and "ASHAYA YE DASHASHTE DASHAHA SARVALOKASYA, ASHA YESHAM DAASI TESHAM DASHAYATE LOKAM." which means People who are servants of desire are servants to the whole world. For those to whom desire is a servant, the whole world is also a servant.

Using the guotes mentioned in these Vedas, he was explaining that how so many things have changed because of technology and have become outdated but the things mentioned in our Vedic books are still relevant today even after 5000 years.

He explained the meaning of Veda and the history of the Vedas and its history which coincided with the Indus valley civilization.

He tried to correlate the common elements of Indo Aryan Culture, Mitanni kingdom and Andronovo culture with the rig Veda.




He also tried to explain how the Vedic culture spread eastwards and westwards in that era giving examples of the ASURAs who moved towards Syria and the commonality of the Indian Iranian culture towards the west of the Indus valley civilization.

He gave us examples of Vedic influences around the world through pictures, scriptures, monuments, language etc. in different countries:

- 1. **IRELAND** monument of Lia fail had resemblance to the Shivling.
- 2. **LITHUANIA** Lithuanian houses had "ASVIENIAI" for good luck which resemble ASHWINI TWINS . There was also a lot of similarity in Sanskrit and Lithuanian language.
- 3. **AZERBAIJAN** There is a town called Nardaran, a lot of Hindus would come here to pay obeisance to the gods. There is also a temple called "ATISI BAGUAN" in SURKANI, It is said Russian CZAR Alexander visited the temple in 1888 and witnesses Hindu prayers and rituals. There can be seen inscriptions in Sanskrit and other Indian languages.
- 4. **RUSSIA** On the western side of Caspian Sea which is believed to be named after Kashyap Muni, is "MAKACHKALA" built in the ancient city of "SAMANDER".
- 5. KAZAKHSTAN The capital city of KAZAKHTAN has a district and a lake called "INDER".















- 6. **IRAN** They have a temple to the peacock god and temple is a spired structure and light a peacock lamp very similar to temples in south India. The sabbath festival celebrated here is similar to festival of Subramanian shastri, popularly known as Kartikeya.
- 7. **IRAQ** They have a temple to the peacock god and temple is a spired structure and light a peacock lamp very similar to temples in south India. The sabbath festival celebrated here is similar to festival of Subramanian shastri, popularly known as Kartikeya.
- 8. AFGHANISTAN also referred to as upaganistan. The capital city of Kandahar is said to have been derived from Gandhari of Mahabharata.
- 9. CAMBODIA It is said name Cambodia is derived from Kamboj referred in Manu smriti as a kshatriya clan.
- 10. **THAILAND** The popular ramakien based on the Buddhist Dasharatha jataka is the Thai version of the Ramayana. So many temples of Ganesa, shiva, brahma can be seen in Thailand.

- 11. **JAPAN** Hidden Ganesa temple in Tokyo called Binayaka ten which resembles lord Ganesa which is considered remover of obstacles which means vignaharta.
- 12. CHINA Statue of Dazizaitian (Mahesvara) at temple of heaven garden in Shantou resembles Shiva in Vedic terms.
- 13. **SOUTH AMERICA** Honduras has a place called La ciudad Blanca which has a temple dedicated to the monkey god which resembles hanuman. The architecture is similar to temples in south India.
- 14. **PERU** In Paraiso near Lima, archaeologists have unearthed a temple which has a fire place like havan kund in vedic texts.

Rtn. Udyan Bhatt explained that vedic culture had a connect with all civilizations across continents. As a culture, we did not believe in recording our history but made ballads of it which has today led to a lot of questioning of it with a lot of them being referred to as mythology instead of history.

Today research shows that the VIMAN described in our texts has one of the perfect shapes for a flying machine.

With this presentation, the speaker is not trying to prove or disprove any theories but is trying to connect the dots of our ancestors to understand the enormity of the achievements of the vedic culture.

After the presentation, forum was opened for a questionand-answer session:

A Rotarian had told that similar connect was described in the bool of an Indian author Devdutt Patnaik which showed similar references in Greece and Turkey.

Another Rotarian asked why was vedic culture not have written history. Speaker Rtn Udyan Bhatt said the reason he believed that our ancestors preferred oral methods to discuss the history rather than written versions because a written version could be interpreted in multiple manners.

Another Rotarian asked why have we lost all our history, the speaker explained that the reason he believes we lost our vedic history might be because of arrogance of the Hindu rulers who dint adopt to cyclical changes in modernization of weapons. The Mughals who invaded India carried weapons of gun powder which were superior to the weapon-based weapons used by our rulers at that time. And the consequent invaders tried to erase our history and imposed their own.

Another Rotarian asked the speaker whether he has also tried to connect the dots with the timelines? The speaker said he has tried to gather as much data as he could and the timeline has not been his preference while gathering data. He has concentrated more on the influence of vedic culture.

President Rtn. Dharmendra thanked Rtn. Udyan Bhatt for such a lovely presentation followed by cote of thanks by president elect Rtn Rajul Doshi and secretariat announcements by Rtn. Kinny Kaul and announcements of upcoming events.

The meeting was adjourned by President Rtn. Dharmendra.
