He addressed the assembled participants and informed that for the last 9 months, no polio cases were reported from Pakistan and Afghanistan and this Polio awareness program by Rotary should continue to eradicate this virus completely from our planet. DG Rtn Prabir Chatterjee and Rotary District Polio Chair Uttam Ganguly also addressed the gathering. The rally in which 78 cars and 24 bikes, spread over 5 routes covering different parts of Kolkata, Salt Lake and Howrah was flagged off by the RI President. ### SPECIAL FEATURE ARTICLE-II

**Project: Climate Wall**

Project 'Climate wall' is an initiative that reinforces the commitment of U.S.-India, and the Living Waters Museum in association with the Rotaract Club of Jadavpur to address climate action through innovative ideas. Our main goal is to encourage young minds to promote awareness on climate action in Sundarbans and engage in the execution of developing a mangrove shield to build community resilience.

The Sundarbans, located in the low-lying islands in the Bay of Bengal spread over 1 million ha, are the world's largest single contiguous mangrove swamp, a RAMASAR site and a UNESCO world heritage site inscribed by both India and Bangladesh. They are home to a wide range of fauna including the Bengal tiger, the Ganges dolphin, river terrapin, the estuarine crocodile and the Indian python, which are classified as critically endangered, alongside over 260 bird species and around 64 plant species that can withstand the saline estuarine conditions. (Rahman 2017) (UNESCO 1997) (Nature Environment and Wildlife Society n.d.)

Sundarbans, which is primarily habitat to several types of mangroves, make it a very environmentally sensitive site.

There is much research that proves the contribution of these mangroves in resisting the impacts of several natural and human induced hazards, not only in the delta region but also in the inner cities like Kolkata. (Thakur 2019) Unfortunately, these mangroves are now exposed to the threats of uncontrolled encroachment, illegal human activities and the impacts of climate change. As a result, the communities living in these areas are also exposed to the myriad of threats due to the rapid decline of these mangroves. While the state has undertaken many initiatives to replant mangroves on the edges of the rivers, especially on the inhabited islands, different natural and institutional vulnerabilities mean that huge stretches along the river bank still lie bare.

Traditional communities around the Sundarbans have always

possessed the knowledge to protect themselves from different hazards. However, with changing times and urbanization, communities have gone through changes in their lifestyle over the last few decades. Such changes largely involved the extraction of different natural attributes to a point that it led to the depletion of the surrounding environment. According to information from local respondents, approximately 40 percent of the mangrove cover in the Sundarbans has disappeared in the last two decades. It is only in recent times after having been exposed to deadly cyclones such as, Aila in 2009 and Amphan in 2020, and with increasing salinity of the surrounding areas due to rise in seawater levels (World Bank 2017) etc. that communities have realized the need to bring back an ecological balance.

The cyclone acted as a catalyst to compel the communities to be concerned about their surrounding environment and start protecting it. This led to growing awareness among certain communities in the Sundarbans who feel the need to go back to traditional practices of local re-vegetation to develop natural embankments along the river, reduce salinity in the lands and replenish freshwater reserves. However due to the lack of funding the process has not taken up much shape yet but it is important to mobilise this juncture to keep this initiative alive and help develop resilience among these communities for future disasters. With the help of very humble local fundraisers, the communities have

been able to achieve partial success, but they do require more encouragement and support to keep this going and inspire neighboring communities to take it up as well. Hence, these communities are not only in need of financial assistance but capacity building especially among the youth to look at this from a more sustainable point of view.

Project 'Climate Wall' will aim to engage young students, and their mothers to understand their surrounding environment and its challenges, and to address them with the help of local knowledge on planting techniques and plant varieties. The project will look at developing awareness among school students through local knowledge expressed through local arts. The students will be further encouraged along with their mothers to develop a mangrove seed reserve in their homes, which once developed into a sapling will be planted in the riverside as a live "climate wall" in the Hingalganj and Sandeshkhali blocks of Sundarbans, 24 Parganas (North), West Bengal.

Sunderbans having recently experienced the impacts of a super severe cyclone, the communities feel the need to be

independent and develop resiliency using local resources and available traditional knowledge. Sunderbans consists of a number of mangroves namely - Sundari (Heritiera fomes), Bain (Avicennia officinalis/Avicennia alba/Avicennia marina), Kakra (Bruquiera gymnorrhiza), Garjan (Rhizophora mucronata), Poshur (Xylocarpus mekongensis), Dhundhul (Xylocarpus granatum), Gol (Nypa fruticans), Keora (Sonneratia apetala), Garan (Ceriops decandra) and Geoa (Excoecaria agallocha).

Information from the local respondents suggest that Sundari plants which prove to be the best for the muddy river banks are

> lacking in the Bengal Delta. They suggest Sundori, Dhundhul and Poshur for major river banks, Kaloban and Kakra for the minor river banks. Other than these local knowledges also suggest replacing the existing Acacia and Eucalyptus plants along the internal roads with Keora trees not only because the former is not good for the health of the soil which communities also use for

agriculture. This project will help involve experts and validate the same and help children of the locality have a more holistic understanding of the trees around them and their contribution to the larger ecosystem. Additionally, the urban children who do not have much exposure to such a setup will be able to physically interact with the site, engage with rural children allowing peer-learning and help them develop urban narratives on this aspect of climate action.

Unlike other top-down approaches of post-disaster recovery organized by the government, this project will actually look at involving the community by first getting their perspective on the need to do this and encourage them in taking ownership of building resilience themselves, which will in a way be a step forward towards developing local economy and upholding the position of women and children. The larger idea behind this drive is to look at a sustainable future by young leaders, the future of the country where communities are self-sufficient in protecting not only the environment and themselves but also benefiting from the same through economic incentives.

The project also aims to involve local musicians and artists who will primarily look at creative and innovative ways by which they can work with the children to raise awareness using the local culture of performing and visual arts, not only to revive them and provide economic opportunities for local artists but also attract an audience beyond the

general stakeholders, that typically take interest in such projects. Activities such as composing songs in the local 'Bhatiyali' genre, painting workshops in the local schools of artforms etc will be initiated so that children have a more interesting take on the subject rather then it being an academic experience. This will be particularly inspirational for young minds too, for the awareness is primarily aimed towards them as the future custodians of their culture and stewards of their local environment.

- That there would be a meet of AG, ZS, Presidents, Secretaries of District 'Aalingan' on 8th October, where Rotary Club of Calcutta Jadavpur would co host with a cost of Rs. 6000.
- That Rotaract Club of Jadavpur was to organize a competition to give award to the Best Dhaki, RCCJ contributed Rs. 5000 on that account.
- That the Club donated Rs. 5000 for Midnapur Flood to District (RID 3291).
- That a sum of Rs. 1500 was given to Rotaract Club of Adi Bhowanipur as host of Rotaract Ghoroa Puja Award.
