


Welcome to October - the Rotary designated month of Economic and Community Development.

THE VISIONARY LADY WITH A PASSION

Mr S. Narayanaswami Iyer, the Principal of Maharaja's College at Pudukkottai of Madras Presidency—now a town in Tamil Nadu—had been ostracized by his family for the crime of marrying Chandrammal, a Devadasi lady. On 30th of July 1886, the couple was blessed with a girl whom they christened Muthulakshmi.

She started attending the local school, which she had to leave on attaining puberty. But study continued at home.

After the Matriculation examination she applied for admission in Maharaja's College - a not welcome by local population because of her gender and background. But the enlightened Maharaja of Pudukottai ignored these objections, admitted her to the college, and gave her scholarship. Now she dreamt of becoming a doctor.

In 1907 she joined Madras Medical College, passing out in 1912 with several gold medals and prizes to

her credit, and became the first lady House Surgeon in the Government Hospital for Women and Children in Madras.

It was during her work in this hospital that she developed close friendship with Sarojini Naidu and began to attend women's meetings. Here were ladies whose concerns about women's right touched a chord in her heart — she could easily correlate with her personal experience of the society treating her maternal family in her childhood. She also met and was influenced by Annie Besant and Mahatma Gandhi who persuaded her to devote herself to uplifting women and children.

She went to England for higher studies, came back and started medical practice. In the meantime, in 1914 she had married Dr Sundara Reddy with the provison that he promised to "always respect me as an equal and never cross my wishes", became well-known as Dr Muthulakshmi Reddy, and had a rewarding medical practice.

In 1917 Annie Besant formed the Women's Indian Association, and Dr Reddy became one of the founding members along with Kamaladevi Chattopadhyay, Herabai Tata, Begum Hasrat Mohani and others, with an aim to liberate women from the deplorable condition they suffered in socio-economic and political matters.

In the year 1926, she attended the Paris International Congress of Women as a delegate, and in the next year gave up her practice in response to a request from the Women's Indian Association (WTA) to enter the Madras Legislative Council — becoming the first woman to be a member of any legislature in India — and subsequently elected as the first woman Deputy President of the Council.

But in 1930 she resigned from the Legislature in protest against the imprisonment of Mahatma Gandhi after the Salt March.

During her legislature days with persistent efforts she brought in the Anti-Polygamy Bill for the suppression of brothels and immoral trafficking of women and children which was passed in 1930. Her efforts led also to the establishment of a home for those rescued from brothels.

She fought hard for the removal of the Devadasi system that was widely prevalent in Tamil Nadu at that time. In support of the resolution, she met with and interviewed several hundred Devadasis across the Madras Presidency. The resolution became dormant after her resignation from the Council in 1930, but the Madras Devadasi (Prevention of Dedication) Bill was eventually passed in December 1947.

In the midst of the Devadasi debate in 1930 Dr. Reddy was approached by 3 girls from Namakkal, running away from being dedicated as Devadasis. She housed them while simultaneously attempting to put them into hostels and schools, failing miserably. This led her to establish the Avvai Home & Orphanage in 1931 to shelter, protect and educate the orphan girls, deserted women-irrespective of caste, creed or social status.



Of the three initial girls, one ultimately became a Teacher, another a Doctor and the third a Staff Nurse. The Home in Adyar, Chennai now also houses an English medium HS School and a Teachers' Training Institute.

She led the agitation for the municipal and legislative franchise for women, set up a scholarship for non-dominant caste girls and opened hostels for Muslim girls, and introduced a scheme of free education for girls up to class eight.

As the only lady member of the Hartog Education Committee of 1929, she travelled extensively across the country to study the progress of women's education and suggested many improvements.

Her resignation from the Legislature in 1930 only freed her to devote more time to social causes. She continued as editor of Stree Dharma, an official organ of the Women's India Association from 1931 to 1940, became President of All-India Women's Conference and also edited Roshini, an important journal of AIWC, and was the Chairman of the All-Asian Conference of Women till 1935. At the age of 68, Muthulakshmi became

the first Chairperson of the State Social Welfare Board and brought about many improvements and additions to the Children's Aid Society.

But the concerns for health and hygiene never left her.

As a legislator she initiated measures for the betterment of medical facilities for slum dwellers and was actively involved in the construction of women's toilets, and recommended systematic medical inspection of students in all schools and colleges run by municipalities as well as other local bodies. The government also accepted proposal to open up a children's section in all maternity hospitals. Then she passed a resolution to set up separate hospitals for women and children, and the children's hospital in India, the Prince of Wales hospital for sick children", now renamed the Kasturba Gandhi Hospital Women and Children at Triplicane, Chennai is a monument to that effort.

During her address at the Golden Jubilee celebration of the Madras Medical College in 1935 she

expressed her desire to start a hospital for cancer patients. The Women's Indian Association started a Cancer Relief Fund, and the foundation stone for Adyar Cancer Institute was laid by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru in 1952. The second such institute in India, the pioneer being Tata Memorial Hospital in Mumbai. The hospital, which started functioning on 18 June 1954, is currently a world-renowned institution and offers treatment to approximately 80,000 cancer patients a year.

She continued to fight for her cause till the end of her days and never let anything stand in her way. Even at the age of 80, she was energetic and vibrant. Her human preoccupations took her away from politics and she stuck to her mission and Gandhian ways.

She was awarded the Padma Bhushan in 1956 by the Government of India in recognition of her meritorious services to the nation, and on 30 July 2019, Google showed a Doodle celebrating what would have been her 133rd birthday.

Our regards to the great activist and social reformer.



When I joined my Rotary club, our efforts focused on India's rural communities, where people were living without toilets, getting their drinking water from the same pond they bathed in, and sending their children to outdoor classrooms set up under a tree. The nearest health care provider often was miles away — and the services were inadequate. But after Rotary clubs carried out some service projects, the villages had toilets. clean drinking water, a classroom for early learning, and a nearby health care center.

The spark that Rotary kindled within me forced me to look beyond myself and embrace humanity. It

made service a way of life and led me to a guiding principle I still stand by: Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on Earth.

If you feel the need to reignite the spark of service in yourself or your club, October — Community Economic Development Month — is a great time to do so. When we work to improve the lives of people in underserved communities — through, for example, projects that provide vocational training and access to financial resources — we help build and sustain local economic growth.

The need is great. According to the United Nations, 9 percent of the world's population — that's 700 million people, a majority of them in sub-Saharan Africa — live on less than \$1.90 a day. By supporting strong community development as well as entrepreneurs, we can help improve conditions for people in that region and others.
