ROTARY PROJECTS IN INDIA

Recycling floral waste to protect river water

In the temple city of Nashik on the banks of the River Godavari. dried flowers used in weddings and places of worship are now finding a new use thanks to an initiative of RC Nasik Godavari, RID 3030. The club has installed collection drums at various places for people to drop used or unsold flowers from flower markets or flower farms. These flowers are recycled and used to make eco-friendly incense sticks, dyes and as organic vermicompost. Tonnes of used flowers removed from idols and unsold flowers from the market are dumped into the river, polluting it. Pesticides and insecticides used to grow these flowers make the river water highly toxic," says club president Rakesh Singhal. The Saibaba temple gets at least 800kg of flowers daily as obeisance from devotees," says Singhal. The club has employed few women to segregate the collected flowers. "They separate the petals from the flowers which are then sun-dried and powdered, and used to make charcoal-free agarbattis, dhoop and dyes. The stalks and the not-sofresh flowers are collected in composters to make vermin compost."

All the produce from the recycled flowers is sold in the market and the money generated is used to meet the project expenses, including paying the women engaged in this activity, says the club president. "This project also benefits marginalised women, giving them not only a financial benefit but also dignity and respect. At the same time, the environment benefits too," he smiles. The club is all set to scale up this initiative, by including nearby villages soon.

off Hussain Sagar Lake in Hyderabad. The highlight of the rally, staged on Independence Day, was the 150-metre national flag which was carried by volunteers. Placards and banners were also taken to create awareness on hygiene and public health by the marchers.

The Stop India Spitting (SIS) campaign was first started by environmentalist Odette Katrak, cofounder of Beautiful Bengaluru (now known as Beautiful Bharat), a citizenled movement for clean, green and safe city. DG K Prabhakar flagged off the rally with club president P Suresh Gupta coordinating the event with other NGOs. "The SIS will be a multi-year campaign to spread awareness on the dangers of spitting in public places. It seeks inclusion of this hygiene habit as part of the Covid protocol by the GoI," said K Sesha Sai Kumar, former president, RC Jubilee Hills. The rally got a wide coverage in the local media and it was a major PR exercise for the Rotary club. "Several organisations and NGOs have expressed interest to join as partners in this Rotary initiative," added



Mending little hearts, the Sanjeevani way

Vivek Gour is one of the three trustees of the Sri Sathya Sai Health and Education Trust, which runs three dedicated paediatric heart surgery centres in India. Named the Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Centres for Child Heart Care, these are located in Raipur, Chhattisgarh; Palwal, near Faridabad in Haryana; and Navi Mumbai.

Gour, a Rotarian, and a member of RC Gurgaon Harmony Iberis, RID 3011, says this without any swagger, while explaining that a few years before his death, the Sai Baba had asked his devotee C Sreenivas to set up five heartcare hospitals to provide completely free heartcare to children. "Sunil Gavaskar, and I, also his devotees, joined Sreenivas to realise this dream. We have already set up three centres, and will be putting up two more," he adds. All of them have contributed towards setting up these hospitals, which provide totally free medical treatment to children born with congenital heart defects (CHD).

Totally, about ₹150 crore has been invested in the three hospitals, with money coming from "philanthropists, Rotary clubs including global grants, and CSR funds." He estimates that around \$2.5 million has come from Rotary, for

surgery." It is estimated that each year 3 lakh children are born in India with CHD and thanks to the dearth of healthcare facilities, and poverty, 1 in 4 of these children do not see their first birthday. A child with a CHD stays at these hospitals for two weeks, and "her parents can enter without a single paisa in their pocketsget their child diagnosed, treated, operated and leave the hospital with no tension about money for subsequent treatment if required. Often, several procedures are needed to cure the child. And with only three trustees, decisions are made fast."

The best gift I can give him is sponsoring 62 free heart operations to celebrate his birthday. Shekhar was very touched, and he said if Mahesh is doing 62, I will match with another 62 sponsored surgeries."

The spiritual importance of the nine days

"Navaratri is dedicated to the feminine nature of the Divine. Durga, Lakshmi, and symbols of Saraswati are the three dimensions of the feminine. They also represent the three basic qualities of existence – tamas, rajas, and sattva. Tamas means inertia, rajas means activity and passion. Sattva, in a way, is the breaking of boundaries, dissolution, melting and merging. Among the three celestial objects, with which the very making of our bodies is very deeply connected - the earth, the sun, and the moon. Mother Earth is considered tamas, the Sun is rajas, the Moon is sattva,"

Mahalaya is celebrated as Goddess Durga defeated demon Mahishasura. It marks the end of pitripaksha also known as the fortnight of the forefathers. During these 16 days, the Hindus pay homage to their ancestors. This marks the beginning of Durga Puja for the Bengali community.

According to Hindu mythology, Goddess Durga comes to her paternal house, Earth on Mahalaya. As per popular beliefs, Brahma, Vishnu and Mahesh were the creator of Maa Durga to kill and destroy the demon Mahishasur. The demon was very powerful and neither devatas nor human beings were able to kill him. Devatas staged a tough fight but were lost to the powerful and hideous Asura. Devaloka was ruled by Mahishasur. To protect themselves from the demon, devatas and Lord Vishnu worshipped Adi Shakti. Their prayers were heard and Goddes Durga emerged adorned with weapons. For 9 days, she fought ferociously with Mahishasur and on the 10th day, Goddess Durga successfully killed him. This marks the beginning of Navratri and Durga Puja. In the morning of Mahalaya Amavasya, the first ancestors bid adieu and bless Maa Durga to go to earth.



Devi Puja: Honoring the Omnipresent Energy

Devi represents the omnipresent cosmic Energy. The whole Creation is permeated by this Energy. The prosperity that we enjoy in our daily lives is a manifestation of Devi. Minutes of the 2082nd Continuous Meeting of Rotary Club of Calcutta Midtown and 6th of the Year 2021-2022 held on 23rd September, 2021 at Regal room, Punjab Club, Ballygunge at 6.45 pm

- Meeting Called to Order: President Rtn. Neeraj Agarwal called the 2082nd continuous and 6thmeeting for the year 2021-2022 to order.
- National Anthem: Rtn. Madhurr Jhaawar requested all members to Sing National Anthem lead by Rtn. Preeti.
- Welcome by President: President Rtn. Neeraj Agarwal welcomed all, senior and honorary members of the club to the first physical meeting of the year 2021-2022.
- Minutes Confirmation: Confirmation of minutes of the 2081st meetings were proposed by Rtn. S. Ravi and seconded by Rtn Biman Chakraborty.
- Address By the President: President Rtn Neeraj Agarwal was thrilled to see an overwhelming gathering of fellow Rotarians after a long time. He congratulated Rtn. Richa Shah for the wonderful Bulletin 'Midtowner' which had been appreciated by many Rotarians from the club and outside.
- RCC Work: President Rtn Neeraj Agarwal mentioned that National Immunization Day be organised at RCC on 27th September 2021. Information has been exchanged by KMC and letters been sent. The timing for same be from 9am to 4pm. The beautician course at RCC will be started after Pujas. First batch of 20/30 Girls shall take up the course. The tenure of the same be of ³/₄ months. A nominal fees will be charged from each student and certificates be given after the successful completion of course.

- Sponsorship to Medical Student: President Rtn. Neeraj Agarwal further mentioned about the importance of expanding the reach of Rotary for Increasing Impact. He had visited a Center in SODEPUR which provided Medical help to Elderly. Adequate in-house services was provided for their healthcare. Then centre also provides PARA-MEDICAL training to girl students under tie-ups with training institutes for 6 months to 1 year. President suggested we could have one joint medical camp with them. He further mentioned about the visit to Bishnuanand Hospital assisted by Dr. Lalit Agarwal. There was a need of Dialysis Machine. The hospital was found to be running professionally, wherein 3rd floor area was dedicated exclusively for dialysis. Each Patient being charged Rs 1000/- for the dialisis. Rtn. Yogesh had already donated 2 machines through CSR of LaoPala. It was suggested to have this program associated with GLOBAL GRANT. The Club can work jointly with a corporate on the same initiative. Rtn. Sanjay Chowdhary and Rtn. Sanjay Agarwal suggested to bring in sponsorship from other people.
- TREE plantation and Donation Drive: President Rtn. Neeraj Agarwal mentioned that coming week the tree Plantation drive dates will be confirmed and notified to all.
