Health and Literacy initiative at a school by RCSLMK on Saturday, August 20, 2022



RCSLMK, on Saturday, August 20, 2022, had its second scheduled Eye Screening and Dental Checkup of students in another school in association with Women's Indian Chamber of Commerce and Industry (WICCI) West Bengal Child care council.

The second Dental checkup and Eye Screening was held at Siddhartha Nagar Vidyasagar Uchcho Bidyalay, Siddhartha Nagar, Kestopur, Kolkata 700102 on Saturday, August 20, 2022 from 11.30 hours onward.



Rtn Rajesh Chirimar's effective coordination with the School and concerned Social Activists could let 125 students and teachers stay back to assure accomplishment of student-centered projects that included eye screening, dental health awareness, and. distribution of Chocolates and pens.

Planned activities started immediately after initial briefing and explaining the modality of work.



In absence of specialists in dentistry, Dr Ajit Majumder, club member and ophthalmologist, inspected oral health of students, while supervising Eye Screening by optometrists from Titan Eye. Dr Ajit Majumder explained necessity of dental and eye care and related hygiene.



On reaching the school campus, WICCI WB CCC Secretary Payal Goenka, RCSLMK members that included President Archana, Secretary Kusum, Dr Ajit Majumder and Rajecsh Chirimer were greeted by school representatives.





During Eye Screening 25 students were found with low vision.



The next program of Eye Screening, Health Checkup and educational supports shall be held at Dashadrone Free Primary School, about 2 kilometers from Chinar Park Crossing of Rajarhat. on Saturday, August 27, 2022 from 11.30 hours onward. Target number of students would be about 150. Crayons and drawing books shall be distributed among the students aged 5 to 8 years.



The fourth program of Cataract Screening, Health Checkup and educational supports shall be held at Bidyadhari Vidyalaya Duttabad EA Block Bidhannagar. Opposite to DA 49, Salt Lake, near Metro Rail Pillar no 50. on Saturday, September 3, 2022 from 11.00 hours onward. Target number of students, in age group of 5 to 11 years, would be about 150.

Simple ideas for creating international connections

If you think there's not much your local Rotary club can do to foster international relations, think again. I have some ideas for you that are relatively simple and can help establish positive relations not just among individuals but entire countries.

My club is located in downtown Lincoln, Nebraska, home of the University of Nebraska. In fact, we have four universities and colleges in Lincoln. Each semester and often during the summer, these institutions host international scholars and students. Typically, people visiting or studying at a local institution are very interested in connecting with people in the community.

Our club is involved in "incidental international relations" in several ways. For example, each fall after the academic year begins, we work with representatives at the campuses in our area and invite international students to participate in a picnic. We cook hot dogs and hamburgers, baked beans and corn on the cob, organize a few activities and games and just enjoy a fun Sunday afternoon at a local park in Lincoln.

One activity is to give each student an ear of corn still in the husk and ask them to prepare it to be boiled for the meal. After all, we ARE known as the "Cornhusker" state. Our members often make friends with some of the students and those friendships last even after the international students have returned home. We've shared some videos of picnics on our Youtube channel.

Another activity has been to invite international students to visit our club meetings. Recently, the University of Nebraska has hosted a number of African leaders as part of the U.S. State Department's Mandela Washington Fellows project. Each year, our club invites the 25 Mandela Fellows to join us for a meeting, and we spread them out at different tables to mingle with our members. Without a doubt, lasting friendships are made which result in ongoing communications between young African leaders and Rotarians willing to offer an idea or suggestion.

Like clubs around the world, our club and District 5650 participate in Rotary Youth Exchange programs. These exchanges have resulted in life-long family like relationships not only for the visiting students, but for the host families on both ends. It's not at all unusual for us to have visitors to our club from young men and women who were exchange students, returning to visit their Rotary families.

Bob Rauner, who helps coordinate District 5650 Rotary Youth Exchange noted, "One of the best ways to world peace is building international relationships, and Rotary Youth Exchange builds lifelong relationships between countries. It's amazing how connected former Rotary Youth Exchange students become. The Rotary Youth Exchange students develop an extensive network of connections with students from around the world during their exchanges."

It's my hope these simple ideas have sparked a thought in your mind. After all, peace is one of the cornerstones of our mission. If you use one of these ideas, or come up with your own. I'd love to hear about it below.

statement Rotary recent polio on detections in U.S., Europe



The recent detection of vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 case in New York, USA, and isolates in several environmental

samples collected in London are stark reminders that as long polio exists anywhere, it is a threat everywhere.

It also highlights the importance of vaccination as the only form of protection against polio and other vaccine-preventable diseases and the work that needs to be done in our communities to encourage the uptake of vaccines. Also, as the world gets closer to zero wild poliovirus cases, it is increasingly important to track all forms of the virus wherever they may appear, including in polio-free regions.

The U.S. is still considered low risk for paralytic outbreaks of polio due to the high level of vaccine coverage across the population. If a child has received the entire course of vaccines, the risk of becoming paralyzed by polio is negligible. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 92.6% of children aged 24 months are fully vaccinated against polio, slightly below the 95% World Health Organization target.

The best things countries can do to protect themselves from polio until the disease is eradicated from the world are to: maintain high vaccination coverage and robust disease surveillance and be ready to respond in the event of an outbreak to minimize the risk and consequences of polio re-introduction or re-emergence anywhere.

The world currently has a unique opportunity to stop virus transmission for good. Still, all parties, including donors and country governments, must re-commit to polio eradication by fully supporting the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) 2022-2026 strategy. This focuses on adopting an emergency posture while generating greater accountability and ownership from country governments to eradicate wild polio and end variant poliovirus (cVDPV) outbreaks.

Rotary, a global service organization with over 1.4 million members, has been at the center of the worldwide effort to eradicate polio for over three decades. Every year, through our funding partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Rotary commits \$150 million to the global effort to eradicate polio. We have contributed more than \$2.6 billion and countless volunteer hours to end polio forever. Together with our partners, we engage communities everywhere to encourage high vaccination rates, immunizing over 400 million children annually. More than 20 million people are walking today who otherwise would have been paralyzed because of our efforts and those of our partners in the GPEI.

The time for urgent action is now. A new vaccine has been deployed – novel oral polio vaccine 2 (nOPV2) – which is more genetically stable to stop outbreaks of circulating vaccinederived poliovirus effectively. With sustained political and financial commitments, the GPEI is confident that we can achieve a world in which no child is paralyzed by polio again.

Aug. 23, 2022 With ten commemorative signs posted throughout Evanston this week, the city proudly marks its 68th year as home to Rotary International World Headquarters, where a diverse global team of 700+ professionals support the work of Rotary's 46,000 clubs worldwide to strengthen communities and improve lives.

"Rotary has been an economic anchor for decades, not only as one of our largest employers, but surprising to some, one of the largest property taxpayers in our city," said Paul Zalmezak, City of Evanston's Economic Development Manager. "Rotary's reach goes beyond corporate staff shopping and dining at local businesses. With its global membership, Rotary contributes over \$1 million to our local economy with more than 2,000 international visits annually. We are proud to house an organization that is transforming communities and positively impacting lives around the world."

The commemorative signs are located on the east side of the Sheridan Road curve and the intersections at Dempster and McCormick; Sheridan and Lake; Sheridan and Ridge; Howard and Ridge; Howard and Chicago; Golf and McCormick; Golf and Crawford; and near the Metra and CTA hubs at Davis and Church. "We are honored to have our world headquarters recognized by the City of Evanston," said John Hewko, Rotary International CEO. "We hope these signs will make it easier for people to find us and engage those who may be curious about our organization. Evanston has been a great place to call home and our visitors are always impressed with its stunning lake views and small-town atmosphere."

On display in the lobby of One Rotary Center, located at 1560 Sherman Ave., are exhibits that are open to the public from 9 am to 5 pm, Mon-Fri. and 8 am - 12 pm Saturday, except on major US holidays, that showcase Rotary's causes, including promoting peace, fighting disease, providing safe water and sanitation, supporting education, saving mothers and children, growing local economies, and protecting the environment. Rotary's top priority is the global eradication of polio. Rotary launched its polio immunization program, PolioPlus, in 1985 and in 1988 became a leading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

One Rotary Center is open to tours by appointment and conference rooms offering fully-equipped, state of the art spaces and capabilities for a wide variety of safe, COVID-compliant gatherings and meetings, events, seminars, panel discussions, corporate gatherings and more are available.

About Rotary: Rotary brings together a global network of volunteer leaders dedicated to tackling the world's most pressing humanitarian challenges. Rotary connects 1.4 million members of more than 46,000 Rotary clubs in over 200 countries and geographical areas. Their work improves lives at both the local and international levels, from helping those in need in their own communities to working toward a polio-free world.

For 117 years, Rotary members have been addressing challenges around the world. It started with the vision of one man: Paul Harris.
