### **SPEAKER MEETING**

The eminent Speaker on this day was the former Union Health Minister Dr Harshvardhan and the topic was "Global Challenges of Polio and Covid ---An Indian Perspective". RCDC had a record attendance on the day because they considered it their privilege to listen to a man who was described by the Late Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee as 'Dr Swasthya Vardhan'. Dr. Harshvardhan spoke about the instrumental role Rotarians and he played in eradicating Polio in India. He started the campaign in Delhi in 1994 when he was the Health Minister of the Union Territory of Delhi. He was supported by Shri L.K.Advani who encouraged him to start the movement in Delhi and soon it emerged as a nationwide mission. Indeed, the pulse polio drive became the largest mass campaign, with exemplary public-private partnership, for the cause of making India a healthy society. The former Union Health Minister, who not only engineered polio eradication in India, has also handled several outbreaks in the past, such as Dengue, Ebola and Plague. He said he still remembers the wholehearted contribution of the Rotary International in the success of the polio eradication movement. Rotary volunteers came to help the State when they planned and dreamt about polio eradication and successfully administered the



























magical two drops to little babies across 4000 villages across Delhi/NCR in their very first collaborative project. It was this commitment and dedicated perseverance of Rotary and the State that has helped in eradicating Polio from India. However, he cautioned everyone about the cases new in Pakistan and other parts of the world and said that until the dreaded disease was eradicated from all over the world we were not completely safe.

Dr Harshvardhan also spoke about the Government's Covid-19 initiatives and how we were one of the few countries that had successfully controlled it. We were also one of the world leaders in making in the vaccine for the virus and today we are distributing to several other countries in the world.

Dr Harshvardhan was introduced by another very eminent personality --- Rtn Dr K.K.Sethi. The vote of thanks was rendered by PDG Rtn Ranjan Dhingra who spoke about the achievements of Dr Hatshvardhan and the pivotal he played as State Minister and Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare. PDG Rtn Dr.N.Subramanian, whose contribution to eradication of Polio is legendary, spoke about the disease and how imperative it was to eradicate it completely from the face of the earth.



The recent rise in Polio cases in Mozambique, Pakistan, Malawi and Afghanistan are a matter of grave concern. The numbers this year till now are 20 compared to 6 cases last year, 14 of these being in Pakistan. Five cases have been detected in

The discovery of dreaded polio virus in sewage sample in the UK and Jerusalem while indicative of strong monitoring and surveillance, the recent case report of Polio in New York after so many years should be viewed with concern about emergence of this disease in other parts of the world reinforce the need of continuing our commitment to end Polio.

What we started 35 years ago cannot be left unfinished. Our promise of a Polio free world must be honoured.

Let us look back at some of the significant milestones in our attempt to eradicate polio. In 1979 while reading about the eradication of smallpox on a flight home from Philippines, past RI President Clem Renauf wondered if it was possible to address a global disease. His discussions with john Sever, District Governor in Maryland USA and chief of infectious diseases at US National Institute of Health led to initiation of Polio eradication as a worldwide Rotary programme under the Health, Hunger and Humanities (3-H) grant. This was approved by RI board in 1979 and funds to the tune of seven million dollars were raised to start Polio immunization project in Philippines.

In a recent address to Rotary, Dr.Harshvardhan, former minister of health and architect of the Polio programme in India described the significant role of Rotary at every step of Polio eradication in a very lucid manner. Rotary's role in initiating a global partnership, involvement of volunteers in the NID and contribution of The Rotary Foundation have helped the governments to save over 19 million people who would have otherwise been paralysed and over 1.4 million who would have been dead.

Rotary International in partnership with UNICEF has been leading partner in global Polio eradication initiative, the first initiative which envisioned Polio eradication through mass immunization. Rotary contributed over 2 billion dollars (15800 crores) and countless volunteer hours to immunise over 3 billion children from 120 countries and promoted several governments to contribute over 10 billion dollars (79000 crores) towards Polio eradication. More than 1 million Rotarians have contributed their time and personal resources towards Polio eradication. Our focus areas have been building awareness, advocacy, fund raising and engagement of volunteers.

Let us understand the value of what Rotary and the global health systems have achieved. Before the availability of the Vaccines, apart from the Atom Bomb, the biggest fear in the US was Polio. In 1952, 3145 people died of polio and 21269 suffered some kind of paralysis in the US alone.

At the start of the Rotary initiated GLOBAL POLIO ERADICATION INITIATIVE in 1988, over 350000 children in 125 countries became paralysed every year due to Polio. This dropped to 26 cases in 3 countries in 2015.

1938: Foundation for infantile paralysis was set up, which later was renamed the MARCH OF DIMES and provided funding for treatment of many

1955: The Salk vaccine (IPV) trial involving 1.8 million children commenced in the USA

1978: Start of Polio vaccination in India

1988: Global Polio Eradication initiative. Rotary in partnership with WHO, UNICEF and CDC formed the largest Private Public partnership in health.

1988: India committed to the World Health assembly resolution on Polio eradication

1995: National Immunisation Day(NID) and Sub National Immunisation Day which ensured immunisation of over 177 million children on NID and 77 million children on SNID. This is perhaps the largest immunisation programme involving over 2.4 million workers.

1997: Acute Flaccid Paralysis (AFP) Surveillance

1999: Wild Polio Virus 2 eliminated from India

Jan 2011: Last reported case of Polio in India

Feb 2012: India removed from the list of Endemic countries
May 2012: World Health assembly endorsed the Polio
Fradication


March 2014: South East Asia Region of WHO declared Polio

2015: India Joins 125 countries to introduce IPV in Routine immunisation

2015-16: shift from Trivalent (tOPV) to bivalent (bOPV)

2017 onwards: increasing concerns about VDPV numbers being in excess of WPV cases

2022: Substantial increase in global cases to 20 with 14 cases in Pakistan, compared to 2021







### **WELCOME TO 2022-23 ROTARY YEAR!**


Dear Rotary family,
