We in Rotary try to serve community in many ways. But the most important and consistent among the service avenues is medical service avenue. Every year we have medical camps of various natures by almost all Rotary clubs.

December is the designated "Disease prevention and treatment" month for Rotary year to stress the importance of the activity. It's obvious that in medical avenue of serving humanity, disease prevention is priority.

We know there are so many diseases that have been eradicated through medical intervention of vaccination in modern times. Most recent one being eradication of polio from earth that was initiated by Rotary. Polio was eradicated from our country in 2011. India was no. 1 polio affected country in the world with more than one lakh children turning physically handicapped for life per year. Now the number is zero and we are proud to be associated with the gigantic efforts. PP Dr. Suhas was the spearhead in the efforts in our district. He refused being district governor so that he could concentrate on the efforts of polio eradication. That's the kind of dedication we have had.

Every year we conduct or participate in camps for screening and prevention of medical problems. Only recently we had medical camps for rag pickers who are most exposed to diseases because of their nature of work. This week we had medical camp related to eye health for school children and their parents. The statistics show how useful such camps are. We also have so far completed twelve free cataract surgeries for the needy. Another big efforts we are starting is in the field of autism. This preventive efforts will go a long way in the improvement of quality of lives of autistic children and their parents. We will learn more in coming months about the details of the project.

It has been nothing short of riding a tsunami wave for 27 years now. My first ever posting with Flt. Lt. S. Sanjay was in the National Defence Academy, where he was posted as a Divisional Officer of



Lima squadron. His best buddies, Sherry Peters (Maratha light infantry) and Tarwinder Singh Sobti (a fellow pilot) had come to Pune station to receive us. They had been guests at our Mumbai wedding reception and were miffed that the we had not catered for either non-veg fare or alcohol. They muttered some obscenities at Tam Brahms in general and riled, chided, ribbed and roasted me and my clan all through our military 'jonga' ride to the academy. I had usually been the bully in college and this was 'karma' getting back at me with a vengeance. I was like a deer in headlights till I chanced upon two beautiful 20- something damsels waving out to me...... Sharon and Sugeet elbowed their hubbies for ragging me thus and ushered me into our temporary accommodation in the Bachelor's Mess, NDA.


If ever there was such a thing called Paradise.. this would have been IT. The front door led to the sprawling ground where the cadets were busy practising show jumping for the PASSING OUT PARADE. The balcony overlooked the famous NDA swimming pool which had moulded many a officer. Sanjay took me out in his modest BAJAJ scooter to call on his superiors, his peers and his friends. I was stuffed like a thanksgiving turkey, day in and day out.... Pampered, spoilt rotten by decorated gallant soldiers in uniforms and their poised and graceful better halves. The DEFENCE FORCES sure know a thing or two about hosting and partying.

The formidable SUDAN BLOCK, the towering SCIENCE block, the endless rows of tables in the CADET'S MESS, the squeaky clean battalions of the academy..... and of course, the ALPHA

SQUADRON (fondly referred to as the 'APACHE KINGDOM'), my hubby's home through his teenage years in the academy. He had been an outstanding student of the academy and I was proud of my choice.... AN OFFICER AND A GENTLEMAN. It was here that I witnessed the magical PASSING OUT PARADE amidst the SURYAKIRANS aerobatics and the on-point flypasts of the Jaguars, MIG-29'S and the newly inducted SUKHOI-30s..... c'est la vie, indeed!!!!!!

As I slowly grew into the defence life, it was time for the FIS (FLIGHT INSTRUCTOR'S SCHOOL) in Tambaram, Chennai. you could call it the TOP GUN ACADEMY of the IAF. The best young pilots from all over the IAF were handpicked and groomed in this school. there were around 30 of them from every imaginable squadron, each better than the other, striving for perfection. The skies thundered when the sleek metallic birds broke the sound barrier, right above our heads. The ladies were all either newlyweds or young mothers....All friendly, chatty and oh so pretty..... and yup, I was the unabashed tomboy who stood out. We were like one big girlie sorority, sharing recipes and swapping gossip while our hubbies competed in the skies above.

The North East beckoned and we were airborne to Guwahati, with my miniscule 6 month old in my arms. The air was insanely pure and the stars sparkled like huge Swarosky diamonds in the diadem of the night sky. Shooting stars teased and a rare comet left its trail for weeks in the unpolluted skies. The LADIES CLUB outings were in the launches over the mighty BRAHMAPUTRA, with full armed security (considering the ULFA militancy that ran amok in Assam) I felt vaguely important with jawans escorting me A silly thought. The sun rose quickly to pierce your pupils, the day passed



languorously and meandered through the chores. The silty, muddy Brahmaputra made its murky way to our taps and my UDCT chemistry came to my help. The water had to be loaded with alum and the supernatant water had to be used for washing, cleaning and bathing. Though it was hard on the pockets, the baby was bathed in Bisleri aqua....







I remember the cosy cool winters shrouded in blankets with friends. Fires blazing in our 'jugaadoo' make shift open air campfires, barbeques galore, raucous revelry.... while myself and my hubby looked on in amazement at the frenzied excitement that surrounded us. The thunderstorms brought with it power cuts that lasted for days on end. The sun was missing in action, the nappies refused to dry; the iron needed electricity, the fridge bailed on us..... and there was a gurgling baby who was just about teething..... and did I mention, the hubby hardly appeared for a day or two in a month. Imagine walking the baby's pram on the Tarmac, having Dahlias as huge as footballs grow in your garden, the best handpicked Assam tea and watching the mighty IL-76 land and take off.

And then came THE HIMALAYAN EAGLES (the prestigious 25 SQUADRON) the largest birds to ever take off on Indian skies. Only the very best were selected for the same and we made the cut. Chandigarh, the proud, clean, planned city rolled out its plush red carpet for us. The winter veggies, the *revdi*, the *chhole*, the *'malaidaar'* milk, the creamy divine *paneer*, the street food, the gardens, the 'sukhna' lake, the Hot millions pizzas, the rock gardens, the Pinjore gardens and...... finally the ARMY COMMAND HOSPITAL, CHANDIMANDIR, where my second



kiddo was born and delivered by a decorated officer, COL. CHOPRA. The stentorian, olive- green gentleman had me up and going in two days. Doctors were never a problem though. Even a wee little cut would have the topper of AFMC (ARMED FORCES MEDICAL COLLEGE) looking into it and that too, over a cuppa tea and some bikkis.

My bucket list was smiling itself silly when I was flown into the Ladakh valley, by none other than my husband. I fell in awe... more than love, when I saw the man of my dreams perform a 'kisser' landing in the short Leh airstrip. I was bowled over with the sheer skill and practice these exemplary pilots showed when they flew in icy, bad, weather with little or no visibility, only to carry rations for the army stationed at high altitudes. There was NO room for error as hungry men waited for their supplies. The pilots flew three sorties back- to- back each day and collapsed on the bed like a sack of potatoes at the end of it. It was single parenting all the way, by default.

Next came Agra and Nagpur (the MIGHTY JETS- 44 SQUADRON IAF) where the entire house had furniture made out of trunk and boxes. Twelve trunks made a king sized bed and two trunks placed alongside made for a decent sofa. The ladies clubs, the parties, the



official events, the unofficial get togethers, the kiddie parties, the girlie parties, compering, editing, announcing, writing, poetry, walking the ramp, event managing, dramatics, singing, dancing and choreography..... yours truly has done it all. It has shaped me into the person I am today. The MRS. MAHARASHTRA stage was not as imposing as I have faced far more imposing personalities in the audience many a times in my AIR FORCE life.

When Sanjay was deputed to HAL, BANGALORE, I witnessed THE AERO- INDIA show up close and personal. It was a matter of pride for my husband when I flew the simulator of GRIPEN and landed it beautifully. After witnessing my handling of the simulator, my otherwise reticent and hard to please hubby actually complimented me saying that I would make a damn good pilot. (I wish I had recorded that moment for posterity).

I shall have to skip a few postings and stagger to the end.... ALLAHABAD, where Sanjay was posted as the COO (CHIEF OPERATIONS OFFICER). I remember that once we were strolling on the grounds of the airbase, there was a stray chopper that stood hovering for a longer time than expected. When Sanjay got through to the pilot on the walkie, he meekly replied that he did not want to interrupt our conversation and hence was planning to land after we took a detour.

Being the wife of a highly respected and regarded officer makes my heart swell with pride. They was not a dry eye in his retirement party. I was exalted as his wife. I gained so much respect through my better half, it was almost like I was shining in borrowed light... and enjoying every minute of it. When asked as to why Sanjay took VRS after 23 long years..... his reply was, "I joined IAF for flying and I leave it for the same reason." He retired on July 31st only to be picked up by Kingfisher Airlines on the 1st of August.

I shall never forget the day he couldn't hold back his tears while he hung his uniform and flying shoes. The entire AIR FORCE STATION, ALLAHABAD saw us off. The sky blue uniform gave way to the pristine whites.... But the swagger, the aviator glasses, the briefcase, the WINGS and the attitude still speaks of that lanky 16 year old who passed his SSB and walked into the hallowed domains of the NDA only to fly and 'TOUCH THE SKY WITH GLORY'.

'NABHAM SPARSHAM DEEPTAM' to me and all other air force wives out there. We were the chosen few to be wed to such charming, dignified and regal gentlemen.... A rare breed indeed.

The flagship IFRM convention organised on 12th November, 2022 in Navi Mumbai at CIDCO Convention Centre, Vashi proved to be a winner all the way! The objective of the daylong event put up by IFRM Rotary district 3142 was to bring like-minded music lovers together on a common platform and present them with a 'musical bonanza' which they would savour for a long, long time. The audience of over 350, comprising IFRM members from Mumbai,





Pune, Nasik, Ghaziabad, Bengaluru, Jamshedpur, Delhi, Kolkata and other far flung places assembled at this grand venue, waiting with bated breath to enjoy a rendezvous with some famed musical experts. About fifty Hillers also made their presence felt. It was a day when nothing else mattered; it was music and only music everywhere, all the way!

Another heartening feature of this show was that it was made free of cost for senior citizens; this was the CSR aspect of the event.
