AUTISM CENTRE INAUGURATION:

Saturday, 18th November, 2023 turned out to be the day of fulfilment of a dream! A dream to provide the latest, advanced training facilities to special children with autism.

PRID Ashok Mahajan, DG Milind Kulkarni, Club President Govind Khetan in the august presence of Father Prem and Father Arul of 'Matru Milan Vikas Kendra' (centre venue) formally inaugurated the Centre.

RCTH Past President Dr Raju and his gracious wife Dr Seetha infused energy by contributing the major chunk of this 1.4 cr budgeted project.

A brief about the Centre:

The centre is a ray of hope, a state-of-the-art training facility for advanced education and therapies for children with autism disorder. It will also cater to the needs of parents and teachers of such children.

The centre has the following therapies and treatment methods:

- Occupation Therapy
- Sensory Integration
- Physiotherapy

- Speech Therapy
- Music therapy
- Yoga therapy

Sand therapy

The project is divided into five categories to give a one stop solution to the beneficiaries:

- 1. Early Intervention Centre
 - a) physical development related to children's bodies and brains
 - b) cognitive development that is, children's thinking and learning
 - c) behavioural development related to children's behaviour and how it's affected by physical and cognitive development
 - d) social and emotional development related to children's ability to form relationships and cope with emotions
- 2. Autism school
- 3. Teacher Training Facility
- 4. Vocational Setup.

Beneficiaries:

Special children with autism spectrum disorder residing in Navi Mumbai, Thane and Mumbai along with adjoining areas and at large, from the state of Maharashtra will get benefitted from the Centre.

It will be one of a kind, with school and therapies together with modern infrastructure. A maximum of 100 students (for school)and 1000 children (for therapies) will be benefitted from the centre. Around 2000 Parents, Teachers and Shadow teachers will also benefit from this facility.

















The Fountainhead - Ayn Rand

Role models are usually people living or dead, famous or otherwise. Mine is fictitious – straight out a novel. They say an adolescent crush never survives adolescence. Wrong. My crush and I continue to hold hands as we navigate the maze of life. Years ago, Ayn Rand's poster boy resonated with my young and still evolving psyche, and now holds permanent residence in my persona. Howard Roark created a stir and grabbed the attention of the entire world. Howard Roark – you can love him, you can hate him, but you cannot ignore him.

"The Fountainhead," written by Ayn Rand and published in 1943, is a philosophical novel that explores the themes of individualism, integrity, and the pursuit of personal excellence. Set against the backdrop of the architectural world in the early 20th century, the novel follows the life of Howard Roark, an innovative and uncompromising architect who refuses to conform to societal expectations.

At its core, "The Fountainhead" champions individualism and the idea that true greatness comes from staying true to one's principles and convictions. Roark, the protagonist, is an embodiment of this philosophy. He is an architect with a vision, driven by a deep commitment to his own artistic ideals. Unlike his contemporaries who succumb to societal pressures and compromise their artistic integrity for popularity and acceptance, Roark remains steadfast in his pursuit of architectural innovation.



Project EmpowHer - Human Papillomavirus (HPV) Vaccination:

Cervical cancer remains a formidable health challenge, especially in India, where it ranks as the second most common cancer among women. In response to this pressing issue, Triumph Foundation, renowned for its successful medico-social initiatives, proudly presents 'EmpowHer – Because She Matters' – a multi-year project designed to tackle cervical cancer through comprehensive screening and prevention measures. Rotary Club of Thane Hills has secured initial CSR support of more than Rs 1.5 crore from the Aditya Birla Group, facilitated by the commendable efforts of PRID Ashok Mahajan.



The Urgency of Addressing Cervical Cancer in India:

Every eight minutes, a woman succumbs to cervical cancer in India, emphasizing the critical need for proactive intervention. With 1.24 lakh new cases diagnosed annually, and 77,000 lives lost, cervical cancer takes a devastating toll on Indian women. Disturbingly, 51.15 crore women aged 15 years and above are at risk.



The Causative Factor:

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) is responsible for a staggering 99.7% of cervical cancers. Particularly prevalent among sexually active individuals, adolescents and young adults aged 15-25 face the highest risk. HPV is not limited to cervical cancer; it can also lead to oral, penile, vaginal, vulval, and anal cancers. Moreover, low socio-economic status is associated with increased incidence and mortality from cervical cancer.



EmpowHer's Vision:

The solution lies in education, awareness, screening, and HPV vaccination. Vaccination against HPV has been proven to prevent over 83% of cervical cancers. The World Health Organization (WHO) advocates for at least 90% of girls to be fully vaccinated with the HPV vaccine by age 15. Project EmpowHer is aligned with this global strategy, ensuring that new cases do not surge by the estimated 54% from 2020 to 2040.



Vaccination Schedule:

Girls aged 9 to 14 will receive a 2-dose schedule at 0 and 6 months, while women aged 15 to 26 will undergo a 3-dose schedule at 0, 2, and 6 months. This targeted approach maximizes the impact of the vaccination, protecting vulnerable age groups.

Planning and Implementation:

Project EmpowHer is meticulously designed, focusing on targeted planning and execution. The initiative includes identifying schools in lower socio-economic communities for the implementation of the HPV vaccination program. Information and awareness sessions for students, parents, and teachers will emphasize the importance of vaccination and other preventive measures. Ensuring the completion of both vaccine doses is a vital aspect of the follow-up process, contributing to maximum protection against cervical cancer.

Project EmpowHer is not merely a vaccination initiative; it is a movement, empowering young girls with knowledge and tools to safeguard their health. With the generous CSR support from the Aditya Birla Group, facilitated by PRID Ashok Mahajan, EmpowHer is poised to make a substantial impact on the incidence of cervical cancer, marking a significant step towards a healthier, empowered future for Indian women.

SUPERSTITIONS, FALLACIES AND SOME FUN.....



Some decades ago, life in an average Indian household was clothed in superstitions and myths. Blind beliefs were a part and parcel of life, and nobody dared to question the logic or the scientific truth behind them. Now as I reflect, I have a different take on them although I used to scoff at them with disdain then.

The most commonly spelt superstition was that if a black cat crossed our paths, it was a bad omen! This was the first blind belief that would come to any Indian mind those days. (Ironically, in GB and Japan, a black cat is said to bring good luck). As I grew older, I was told by a scholar that black colour represents 'Shani' and when a black cat is crossing your way, Lord Shani might be trying to warn you to not go outside. In case, you continue to go ahead, unheedful of the warning, your work can get delayed or even jinxed.

Those days, a religious slant was employed so that people followed certain practices 'religiously'. This was more out of fear that they incur the wrath of the gods. For instance, ladies were not allowed to cook or perform poojas or visit temples during their periods. If they violated these norms, the goddesses would curse them. Such rules were formulated in order to give complete rest to the females who toiled day and night, doing mundane, heavy duty household chores. The 'fear factor' worked wonders.

A common superstition which did the rounds in olden days forbade a person to sit on a pillow. The warning given was that the person would then become debt ridden. My reasoning for this one is that this was told in order to maintain the shape of the pillow – that the pillow would be fit and firm enough to support our head, not our bottoms!

Some other hilarious beliefs were also prevalent. If one looks into mirror in the night, he/she would become a ghost in the next birth. This would put any theory of birth - death cycle to shame! Here again I feel that this was a way of dissuading young people from self-admiration in front of the mirror in the night so that they sleep soundly, devoid of distractions.

Another rule prevented people from cutting their nails after evening. This may have been framed to prevent the person from getting hurt; one may take cognizance of the fact that there was no electricity in olden days.

"You should not whistle in the night \cdots you are attracting snakes".

"You should not eat raw rice ... it will rain on the day of your wedding ".

"An itchy hand indicates money or fortune coming your way".

"The twitching of the right eye predicts trouble or worry".

The number 13 spells doom to most people. Dates, numbers, colours \cdots there are superstitions woven around almost all these!

Popular Bollywood Director Rajkumar Hirani dealt with the superstitions woven around 'Rahu kaal' and 'Manglik', very effectively in his movies 'Lage Raho Munnabhai 'and 'PK'. These struck an amazing chord with the moviegoers .

Superstitions galore... At each stage of life, these have influenced us quite a bit. As kids, we used to collect peacock feathers and keep them in between the pages of a book and believe (foolishly) that they would grow.

As years went by, in school and college, we would look at the all-black crows and shout .. "one for sorrow, two for joy".

As a student, I feared the all-black crow. If I chanced to see one, I felt strongly that the forthcoming exam would turn disastrous!

Those days, people surrendered to the dictates of these irrational theories meekly! Occasionally, individuals rebelled in a

handful of homes, but the power of these fallacies hardly seemed to fade.

Today, we may claim we have turned 100 percent logical, scientific, and rational. But in the heart of hearts, we certainly do come under the grip of these illogical beliefs, superstitions, and the associated misgivings/ fears.

Many a time, superstitions trigger fear, anxiety, pessimism, and inaction. They should never dictate our actions and take complete control of our life. While dealing with superstitions, one should always keep in mind that "Values should dictate society, not superstitions".

Interview with Rtn. Ritika Anand

Rtn Ritika Anand, Joint Secretary of RC Delhi City, RID 3012, and Vice Principal of St Mark's Senior Secondary Public School, Delhi. She was honoured by the President of India Smt. Draupadi Murmu with the 'National Teacher' Award on 5th Sept 2023, the Teachers' Day. She has also received the CBSE Award for 'Excellence in Teaching'.

An excerpt of our Zoom-Chat:

Atul: Happy Diwali and hearty congratulations on receiving the 'Best Teacher' Award from our Honorable President Smt. Draupadi Murmu.

Ms. Ritika: Thank you!

Atul: Let me introduce my friends, Rtn Shrirang Date, a fellow Rotarian and Editor of our monthly Club Bulletin 'Hill Echoes' and Ann Radhika, a renowned and well-respected teacher and one of the most active Anns from our Club.

Shrirang: Hello Ritika, happy Diwali! **Radhika:** Hello Ritika, happy Diwali!

Ms. Ritika: Hello Shrirang Ji and Radhika Ji, happy Diwali!

Atul: Shrirang is also well-known stage actor, a star of all our Club's skits, he is also a great singer, popular for his acting

and singing talent in the entire District

Ms. Ritika: WOW! That's fantastic!

Atul: Let me begin with - When did you join Rotary? What prompted you to join Rotary?

Ms. Ritika: My husband Rajesh Anand works with RISAO (Rotary International South Asia Office). He has always been talking to me a lot about Rotary, its global presence and the impactful community service projects shouldered successfully by the Rotarians. This impressed and intrigued me immensely.

Also, the fact that our Honorable Prime Minister Sri Narendra Modi appreciates Rotary and its accomplishments, drew me more towards Rotary. I read that popular actor Amir Khan once revealed that he was worried about his son being reticent but after joining the Rotaract Club in his college, the boy started interacting with people. I was in awe of Rotary.

I was an Ann when my husband joined Rotary and stayed there for some years. Two years ago, I turned Rotarian and now I am the Joint-Secretary of my Club. I truly believe in the Rotary 'Four Way Test' and I am glad I joined this organization.



Some of the projects our Rotary Club has undertaken are:

Basti Vikas Kendra: Underprivileged women are trained in tailoring. Sewing machines are provided by 'Singer' as a Global Grant Project.

The club has started a computer institute which provides certificate courses by NIIT to the children from the EWS background.

A Global Grant Project to provide clean toilets, training to children in 14 MCD schools in Delhi.

Our next project is the donation of 370 Tabs to the girl students (who lost their parents due to covid) of Government schools.

Radhika: When did you enter the teaching profession? Please tell us about your journey in this profession?

Interview with Rtn. Ritika Anand

Ms. Ritika: I entered the teaching profession 23 years ago. I started as a TGT··· as a Physics teacher in my school. Initially, my focus was on only teaching – whether my students understood what I taught, whether they were happy in my class, whether they performed well in the exams etc. However, with the passage of team, I realized this wasn't enough; so, I developed new teaching methodologies and like a new swimmer, I learnt new pedagogical approaches. I turned PGT, then supervisor and was thereafter, was given the responsibility of the school Vice Principal.

Shrirang: Maam, I understand that you have been active in theatre, do you incorporate theatre in your classrooms? What made you lean towards theatre for the purpose of effective teaching?

Ms. Ritika: In 2008, I attended a theatre workshop. In this process, I discovered a 'new-me' ··· a new Ritika. I came to terms with the fact that theatre is a very powerful tool to connect and is a great channel for creativity.

In our school, the students perform Shakespearean plays, modified suitably in Indian settings. Classics like Ramayana, Mahabharata, Christmas Carol and the like are dramatized. This kind of informal learning is unparalleled. Besides, the students shed their inhibitions, become free of stage fright and take to the stage comfortably. They also learn to work as a team.

I am proud to say that in our school, almost 40 plays are staged in a given academic year. These may or may not be linked to the syllabus; it is a part of the extra curricular activities. In fact, I would say that all teachers have to undergo training in theatre.

Radhika: In this era of technology, students get all the information at the click of a mouse. As a result, they do not value the efforts of the teachers. How do you think teachers should cope with this issue?

Ms. Ritika: You are so right Radhika Ji, in this technology driven times, the students don't need us. They get all the information in a flash without our help. Therefore, the teachers have to consciously move over from traditional 'chalk and talk' method to innovative ones, to match up to the students. The teachers need to elevate themselves, otherwise they will become redundant. It is a case of the survival of the fittest. New methodologies with contemporary ideas have to be constantly worked and reworked upon.

Atul: Do you have an Interact Club in your school? If so, what are the activities undertaken by the Interact Club?
