JAB WE MET - RTN. DR. MANGUIRISH SALKAR

My Conversation with Rtn Dr. Manguirish Salkar

Rtn. Dr. Raghuvir alias Manguirish Salkar very affectionately nicknamed as "Masa" by our Club members. Masa is a modest

"Masa" by our Club members. Masa is a modest person with potentially high profile capabilities. He executes club responsibilities with professional

precision and is one of the most reliable task master of the Club. With Manguirish on the Throne of the Club the members expectations are at an all time high for the incoming year. It was a pleasure to talk to him to know the finer and unknown facets of his life. Hope you enjoy reading this as a part of my series "Jab We Met".



Manguirish can you tell us a little about your family background?

I was born on 20th July 1964 to Shanta and Kalyan Salkar. My father worked in the Education Department and retired as an Assistant Director, my mother was largely a home maker working for some years as a teacher in the Progress High School. I have a sister Smita Kare presently settled in Margao. During our childhood we stayed in the Ghanekar Chawl which existed opposite the Pharmacy college. The Chawl extended from this side of the road right back to the Biryani Taj restaurant opposite the Thakur Petrol pump. There were at least eight families who stayed in the chawl with us. Hemant Ramani's family, the Modi family,the Agshikars, Karapurkar, Shirsat's and the Taj restaurant behind. Those were relatively huge houses with a small courtyard for each family and a common backyard with a well which still exists. The Chawl was later demolished to construct this present day Ramakant Apartments building. I have my office in the flat that we own here now. There were also a few initial years of my life that we spent in Margao too. I

was probably 3 to 5 years old then and too young to have any memories of my days in Margao.

Masa can you share some childhood memories with us?

Well, as you know very well people who have seen the 70's have actually seen a golden era. With hardly any electronic gadgets we had only human relationships to bank on . I have treasured memories of our cricket matches on the footpath or even the road opposite the pharmacy college . The vehicular traffic being minimal during those days we could have our test matches on the road virtually uninterrupted by traffic. For us Panaji was smarter without being a SMART CITY. The Pharmacy College Annual Day function was one huge event with its musical shows and movie screenings . Being neighbours we had the privilege to experience and enjoy the event.

When the Ghanekar Chawl was demolished for redevelopment we shifted to the House built by my father in Porvorim. Porvorim too was a reasonably barren land in the 70's. We would walk into the hills to savour the wild "chunna", "kanna" and the "kajus" during the summer. We would somehow find a strip around the house for our evening cricket games. It would be a long walk to get to the main road near the O Coquiero junction. The junction was our point to get into any transport system.

Where was your Schooling and education done from?

I did my initial schooling upto 4th from the Mustifund School near the Mahalaxmi Temple and from the 4th to my SSC was in the Progress High School. During those days a few other schools like the Peoples High School, Don Bosco and a School called Mahatmes besides others too existed.

I passed my SSC in 1979 and joined the Dhempe College of Arts and Science Miramar.

In 1981 got admission in the Goa College of Engineering, Farmagudi in pursuit of a B.E Degree.

I have a lot of good memories from my Farmagudi days too .We would stay in the College Hostel through the week . The Rs 3/- Rice plate in "Bappas Zopdi" and the Wednesday feast at the Hostel mess with the odd outing venturing into the "Hill Breeze" Restaurant at Farmagudi are some things I still remember. There are a lot of other mischievous activities we did too but I prefer not to share them here. I graduated from GEC in 1985.

After GEC Graduation what?

Post my Graduation I worked in a private firm as a site engineer to get the basic practical knowledge before getting into business as an RCC Consultant. The first building I designed was 'Sindhu' on the Atmaram Borkar Road for the Borkar family which had Shri Pradeep Bhandari as the Architect. I later decided to pursue post graduation and joined the Pune College of Engineering . While in Pune I resided with my uncle and then shared a flat with my friend Amol Prabhu at the Deccan Gymkhana. In 1986. While I was doing my Masters I would do a little part time teaching to students at the Kusro Wadia Diploma College in Surveying, Quantity Surveying. I completed my M.E Structures in 1987 and briefly took up a job at the Kirloskars.

Masa you have done your Masters in USA, tell us a little about your days in USA.

Well Viru, post my M.E I went on to pursue my next goal in the USA. I joined the Utah State University for my Doctorate in Structures got a transfer the next year to the University of Maine from where I finally completed my Doctorate.

Initially I stayed in a shared Hostel accommodation. There would be 3 to 4 rooms in an Apartment with each room being shared by two persons. The campus which housed us had several such hostel buildings. This is where I learnt that I had the ability to cook reasonably well. I also learnt to consume what I cooked without any complaints whatsoever. The college bus would take us out to the market area for our weekly grocery shopping.

In the second year I shifted to an out of the campus apartment. This Campus had a lot of students from other nationalities besides Indians. I could now also afford a second hand car. The first car I bought was a Japanese brand called Subaro. It was a \$600 car and I probably spent more than that on its maintenance. My Subaro loved more to be in the company of car mechanics than me. I have some very pleasant memories of this campus. We had a huge parking lot which turned into our playground on weekends. You will be surprised to know that our traditional Indian sport "Logorio" was our favourite recreation. I did not have any fixed working hours while doing my research work and at times would be in lab till the wee hours. In fact the man at the Lab teasingly asked me if I would be interested in putting up in a tent outside the lab.

What next?

Post my PHD I took up a job in the Boston Area in a company called PBQD Parsons. It was a big company spread over several parts of the country and in the business of designing bridges. While in the USA I also got married to Sunita in 1992 and our first son Abhishek was born in USA.

What made you come back to Goa?

In 1994 my father was suddenly taken ill. Sadly he passed away while I was in transit flying down to attend to him. This was actually an "Aa Ab Laut Chale" moment of my life where we resolved to return back to Goa for good. Six months later in 1995 we were back in Goa after winding up from USA.

IS THE BANKING SYSTEM HELPING THE RICH

GET RICHER...?

Recently i came across a documentary by DW TV on youtube on the phenomena of the Rich getting Super rich by

manipulating the banking system and was dumbstruck by the revelations. Thought of sharing some insights.

The banking system plays a crucial role in the economy, facilitating transactions, providing loans, and managing investments. However, in recent years, there has been increasing scrutiny over how this system disproportionately benefits the wealthy, enabling the rich to amass even more wealth.

This article explores the mechanisms through which the banking system contributes to the widening wealth gap, focusing on preferential lending practices, investment opportunities, financial services, and the role of central banks.

Preferential Lending Practices

Investment Opportunities

These high-yield investment opportunities are often exclusive to wealthy clients due to high minimum investment requirements and regulatory restrictions designed to protect less sophisticated investors from high-risk products.

Moreover, banks provide wealth management services that include personalized financial advice, tax planning, and estate planning. Wealthy clients can afford to pay for these services, which help them maximize returns and minimize taxes.

This tailored financial guidance enables the rich to make informed investment decisions and exploit opportunities that are not available to the average investor.

Financial Services and Products

Wealthy individuals benefit from a range of specialized financial products and services designed to enhance and protect their wealth. These include offshore banking, trust funds, and sophisticated tax planning strategies.

Offshore banking allows the rich to take advantage of favorable tax regimes in other countries, reducing their tax liabilities and protecting their wealth from political or economic instability in their home country.

Trust funds are another powerful tool for wealth preservation and growth. They allow the wealthy to manage their assets and plan for future generations, often with significant tax advantages. Trusts can be structured to minimize estate taxes and ensure that wealth is passed on to heirs with minimal loss.

The Role of Central Banks

Central banks play a crucial role in the financial system by setting monetary policy, regulating banks, and ensuring financial stability. However, some of their actions can inadvertently benefit the wealthy more than the general population.

One such action is the implementation of lowinterest-rate policies, which central banks use to stimulate economic growth during periods of economic downturn.

Low-interest rates make borrowing cheaper, encouraging investment and spending. While this can benefit the broader economy, it disproportionately helps the wealthy, who have more capital to invest. They can borrow at low rates to finance investments in assets like real estate and stocks, which often yield higher returns. As asset prices rise, the wealthy see their net worth increase, while those with fewer assets do not benefit as much.

Financial Crises and Bailouts

Financial crises often lead to government and central bank interventions to stabilize the banking system and prevent economic collapse. These interventions, such as bailouts and quantitative easing, can have the unintended consequence of benefiting the wealthy. During the 2008 financial crisis, for example, governments around the world injected trillions of dollars into the banking system to prevent widespread bank failures.

While these measures were necessary to prevent a complete economic meltdown, they also resulted in the recovery of asset prices, benefiting those who owned stocks, bonds, and real estate.

The wealthy, who hold a significant portion of these assets, saw their wealth recover and grow, while the broader population, particularly those who lost jobs or homes, faced a slower recovery.

The banking system, through preferential lending practices, exclusive investment opportunities, specialized financial services, and central bank policies, plays a significant role in enabling the rich to get richer. While these mechanisms are often justified by the need to manage risk and ensure financial stability, they contribute to the growing wealth gap by providing the wealthy with tools and opportunities that are not accessible to the average person.

Addressing these disparities requires a multifaceted approach, including regulatory reforms to ensure fair access to credit, investment opportunities, and financial services.

By creating a more inclusive financial system, it is possible to reduce wealth inequality and create a more equitable economic landscape for all
