My Journey and a Walk Down Memory Lane.. The RYLA in 1984...

At the stroke of dawn on September 13th, 1984, just barely out of nineteen, I stood at the threshold of an adventure. The letter inviting me to the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) camp had arrived like a burst of sunlight through my monotonous engineering study routine. Excitement bubbled up as I packed my bag, meticulously following the instructions on what to bring and how to

engagement. It turns out, serving others can be just as thrilling as beating your opponents in a game of sport.

Each day, with a sense of anticipation on what the day would bring, I found myself more captivated. The instructors spoke with passion, instilling in us a sense of purpose. In the evenings, the fireside chats became a gathering point for deep, soulful "profound" (yes, that was the buzzword)



behave. Yet, the gnawing anxiety persisted-my stomach felt like it was hosting a butterfly convention. I was about to spend a few days in a residential camp with strangers-fellow students from various colleges across Bangalore.

Stepping off the autorickshaw and into the courtyard, my heart raced. The air buzzed with the hum of conversations and a scent that could only be described as a mix of exhilaration and yummy food (I was an ever-hungry teenager). My eyes flitted around, taking in the sea of unfamiliar faces. Self-doubt washed over me like a cold shower. Would I fit in, or would I be the lone awkward penguin in a flock of graceful swans?

But the Rotarians were masters at making us feel at home. Santosh Nedungadi, Shailendra Gupta, P. J. Reddy, Raghupathi, and Lalitha welcomed us with such warmth that it felt like they had known us for years. The icebreaker games did their magic, and by the end of the first day, I was already sharing laughs and stories with my fellow happy campers.

Each session was a whirlwind of inspiration, from rousing talks on leadership to engaging interpersonal relationships, communication and team-building exercises. I particularly enjoyed the workshops on service and community

discussions. Picture this: a group of youngsters, who barely knew each other a day ago, debating life's big questions and sharing our deepest dreams, fears and forging connections that felt timeless.

One night, under a starlit sky, I realised something profound: I had found my calling. The camaraderie, the shared sense of growth, the idea that leadership was not about power but service and giving back to the communityit all resonated deeply within many of us.

Forty years later, now a proud Rotarian with the Rotary Club of Bangalore Cantonment, I often reflect on those pivotal few days. It was there I learned that true leadership wasn't about wielding power but about serving others. The lessons from RYLA-service before self, the value of community, and the joy of giving-have shaped my life in profound ways.

With a heart full of gratitude, I thank the Rotary Club of Bangalore Cantonment for embedding these values into my very being. The RYLA camp wasn't just an event; it was the start of a lifelong journey of servant leadership and service, with a dash of humour and a sprinkle of camaraderie and fellowship.
