
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Dear RCMers,

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The Joy of Giving is his *"joie de vivre!"*

You'll need all ten fingers to count the number of zeros after 1.

That is what Rtn. Ravishankar Dakoju has committed to The Rotary Foundation and he keeps on giving. It's neither for fame nor for vanity and not to be the most important person in Rotary. It's simply because of his "raison d`etre!" That seems to be his purpose in life, as he decided.

He is not loud or voluble. He admits that he does not possess a high IQ. Whatever he lacks in terms of fluency or IQ he makes up for, with his large-heartedness and generosity.

I believe his commitment of 100 crores is just a number to him. The way he expressed himself, I am certain there is more to come from Mr. Dakoju.

He started his speech at the weekly meeting of RCM by talking about his mother-in-law, who he had lost the previous year, at an advanced age, and how his dear wife had taken on the role of a mother in looking after her. The resultant stress of tending to her caused a block in his heart, which needed immediate attention and treatment.

The point he was trying to make was, the uncertainty of life, and how we need to take care of ourselves. His take was that we keep doing things like chasing wealth, which, he advises, should not stop us from paying attention to our well-being.

All the while, he was leading up to his favorite purpose. "Give when you can". Do not postpone commitments to give back to the society. Throughout his speech, wherever he began, he concluded the narrative with "giving." That was the highlight of the entire delivery.

He referred to the term "self-made man." He wondered how anyone could be self-made! He quoted the example of a couple of celebrities and wondered how they are worth hundreds of crores, yet do very little for the society responsible for their success. To him, no one can be self-made without the society and 'Civing back,' is a must. His regard for Rotary and fellow Rotarians is very high, so much so, he considers them a class apart. To

> him, a Rotarian who played a part in the movement will always be special, having spent a portion of their life in service.

announcement, cautioning him that the underworld might get after him and his family, speculating on the enormous wealth he must possess. And he and his family believed that it was within the realm of possibility. It was a real concern for a while.

He says nothing of that sort happened, all to one point.He says "Goodness begets Goodness." You do something good and nothing bad can ever happen to you. Jokingly he says, "Even the underworld dons appreciate that."

There is a general adage that if you give more, you get more. A senior colleague mentioned that to him and he responded by saying, "Rotary is not a business to invest in, to reap returns." However, he says that subsequent to his promise to give, his business growth went up from a normal of 25%, to 400%.

He supports it with a viable reason. Not only does his experience validate the theory of goodness being reciprocated, but he also says people begin to notice you and want to work with you.

He says it's a natural phenomenon you are surrounded by an "aura of goodness," and that spreads. Also, the publicity and word of mouth align with the principle of natural justice.

When asked about the reaction of his wife, family, friends and relatives to his massive commitment, he said that it was mixed. However, he deeply appreciates his spouse Paola Ravishankar for her support and the way she handled it. He voiced his admiration for her calmness and equanimity and also expressed his complete happiness with how his daughters handled it.

As for his friends, I would hazard a guess that their reaction was mixed, some calling it foolish, others green with envy and the rest secretly wishing they were in his place. This is my take, of course!

In terms of his working style, he says he likes to get his hands soiled. He is a foot soldier who marches upfront, so much so that RI gets irritated with his meticulous follow-up. But he is relentless. That is another quality that sets him apart from others.

"Keep what you need and give the rest away," he says. He even quotes an example of a PDG Rtn. Muthu Palaniappan, who took a loan from the bank to become an AKS member. 'Where there's a will there's a way.' That seems to be his life's purpose.

He is an outlier. An exceptional human, very few can be what he is, but we can always try. That in itself is good enough!

— Rotary Nostalgia— The Matter of Attendance

Hundred Percent Attendance Days

Beginning with 1965, the Club began observing 100 percent attendance days each year, only that none of them saw 100 percent attendance. These special days were advertised months in advance in the issues of 'Lighthouse.' In the years that they were observed, care was taken to invite star speakers, and sometimes there were even dinner meets, with the Anne in tow. But the members seem unmoved.

On the first 100 percent attendance day, initially announced for April 6 1965, and later advanced to March 16, the register showed 75 percent of the members present. As if fatigued with their overwhelming presence of that day, attendance tapered off alarmingly in subsequent weeks. And on Charter Night, July 19, even the requisite quorum was not there. A measly 38 members out of a strength of 136 had come. It must have jarred that Rtn. R. Raghavachari from Thanjavur gave a brief talk on how his club achieved 100 per cent attendance.

Hundred percent attendance days were observed until 1975 and then given up. One of the most successful was in 1974 when Rtn. R. Ratnam, as attendance committee chairman, had the meeting hosted by M. A. M. Ramaswami, the scion of the Chettinad family, at the sprawling Chettinad House. The total strength in attendance was 117 out of 176 members. Perhaps the curiosity to see up close, how the uber-rich lived, had exerted a sufficient pull.

In an era where the Club's newsletter, the Lighthouse, was a major source of information, its pages were put to good use to further the cause of attendance. Thus, on May 31, 1966, there was a tract taken from an international periodical and republished:

- ATTENDANCE is the bulwark of Rotary.
- ATTENDANCE measures the height,

breadth, and depth of Rotary in you.

- ATTENDANCE determines the area of your unselfish service.
- ATTENDANCE reveals your interest in your club activities.
- ATTENDANCE demonstrates your desire for making new and retaining old friendships.
- ATTENDANCE spells the story of what Rotary means to you.
- ATTENDANCE is all that the Club President asks of you – a greater Rotary year will result.

Yet another article thundered against the practice of seeking leave of absence: "Yes, a member may ask the Board of Directors for leave of absence or to be excused, but, provided this is granted, what leeway does this give you? Actually, excuse merely protects your an membership since if you were absent from four consecutive meetings, without leave or excuse and without making up you vour attendance, would automatically lose your membership. So please don't assume that you are given attendance credit just because you were given leave of absence."

Dr. V. S. Subramaniam, during his year as President, hoped that the Club would be "able to improve the programme for the coming year, so that we will have better fellowship, better attendance and better Rotary work. The programme is to be well planned and well organised to make it really attractive, and it is not just enough to invite Tom, Dick, and Harry and make him talk to us for 15 mins. In addition to the usual talks to us by some person or other, we must think of other programmes like a musical evening, entertainment, discussions, visits, and picnics. The one or two picnics we have arranged before have really proved to be a great success, and what is more, the fellowship during those picnics was some-thing phenomenal."

Another idea that was tried was the recognition of hundred percenters. This began in 1966 with Lt. Col. N. Vasudeva Rao being congratulated for being one such. The same year, it was decided that recognitions would be given each quarter to the 100 percenters of the previous three months. By the early 1970s, this had become "Feather in the cap" cards for 100 percent attendance during the month! A special lapel badge was to be given to the Rotarian who had been a 100 per center for three consecutive years. This too lost its appeal, and in 1986, we read of how, of the 56 people recognised with the 100 percent badge, only 38 turned up to receive it!


In 1970, Rtn. G. Ram Phadke came up with the idea of dividing the club membership into attendance groups. There was to be a competition between these units as to which was the best when it came to attendance, and the group leader was tasked with getting his flock to come to the meetings. Initial results were encouraging.

"The attendance Committee met regularly every month," recorded the Lighthouse. "By organising group competitions for two quarters, by writing suitable letters to fellow Rotarians whose attendance average fell below 60%, by presenting 100% lapel badges and attractive bottle openers to those members who have put in 100% attendance for a continuous period of three years or more, and by presenting a nice and useful diary for 1970 to all members of our club, the attendance average for the Rotary year has gone up to 72.05%, 2% more than the previous year." But within two enthusiasm quarters, the had evaporated.

"Three months of the Rotary year have run out, and I am very concerned to observe that our attendance is again beginning to fall off," lamented the President.

"We reached an average of 80% in August, but there has been a sudden down-trend in September to 70%. In order to stimulate attendance, we observed a 100% day on September 15, but curiously the attendance for that week, including all make-ups, has been less than 75%. I am afraid our appeal to

The Creative Lure

A skit was staged in 1994, with Rtn. M. K. Raju organising a series of one-acts. The description is of interest: "The play consisted of seven scenes with no specific Hero or Heroine, but with a common villain, M. K. Raju, the task master and the tormentor. The histrionic talents of the Rotarians came into full view, and what a performance each one of them gave! The crux of the play was how the truant Rotarian, who is averse to attending Rotary meetings, is forced to become a 100 percenter by the machinations of such diverse persons as the Office Secretary, Waiter and Spouse. Rtns. S. Ravi Katari, Ram Phadke, Tushar Mehta, M.S. Nagarajan, Gunasekhar, Dr. Venkat Arun Sarathi, Krishna Hande, V.V. Mohindra, Pratap Kumar, Anns Indira Hande, Savithri Nagarajan, Padhmavathy Gunasekhar and Sushila Nataraj were the players. Written & Directed by Rtn. M. K. Raju.

Whatever its efforts, the Club probably realised that it was on a losing wicket on attendance. By 1984, the weekly statistics were given up altogether. And by 2004, even the recognitions and awards ceased, or were at least not taken seriously. This was, of course, not just a trend at the Club but with Rotary overall.

By the new millennium, the Club had gone hi-tech. It introduced biometric readers and later, post the Covid pandemic, face recognition software as well, to record attendance. And there is also the register, as the Club is a society, which has to record as per statute, the signatures of the members who attend
