

No Food Waste Campaign



n October 8th, the IB1 Interact Club students organized a food drive to promote awareness about food waste and support those in need. They created posters displayed on the notice board and in classrooms, engaging students from Grade 6 to IB2 about the importance of not wasting food. The drive was planned 10 days in advance and on the event day, all students brought an extra packed lunch, identical to their own and to donate to those in need.


Students were instructed to bring vegetarian food that would remain fresh until 2 PM, carefully packed in foil boxes. The donated food was then sorted and arranged in cardboard boxes. An NGO called No Food Waste, joined the initiative and gave an insightful talk to the students, explaining how they started and their process of food distribution.

The NGO collected the food in a van and distributed it to needy individuals, including children near government hospitals and the homeless. This food drive helped students understand the challenges homeless people face in getting daily meals, the importance of avoiding food waste, and the value of caring for others through donations.

HPV Vaccination Camp: A Step Towards Cervical Cancer Elimination

n November 9, 2024, RCM hosted an HPV vaccination camp at Adyar Cancer Institute in which the children of Sarada Vidyalaya Group of Schools in T Nagar - Burkitt Road got vaccinated. The vaccination drive began with a mix of curiosity and apprehension among parents and students. As the camp progressed, initial hesitation gave way to enthusiasm, with 60 students receiving vaccinations. Among the 60 children, 55 received their first dose and 5 got their second.

Children arrived fearful, but left with smiling faces, asking if they could still enjoy their favorite foods. Later, Dr. Jayashree, Gynaecologic Oncologist at Adyar Cancer Institute (W.I.A.) took a moment to congratulate them, emphasizing the significance of this milestone in the fight against cervical cancer.

With continuous efforts in awareness for the school teachers and parents and with the tremendous support by Adyar Cancer Institute for the vaccinations; together, we are making strides towards eliminating cervical cancer!

Rotary Nostalgia

ROTARY CLUB OF MADRAS

1937 - 1943 - Part 1

Pre-War & War

aving had a fine start since its inception, the Rotary Club of Madras perhaps grew reflective in the latter half of the 1930s, for this seems to be a relatively quiet period in the annals of the Club's history. This statement, of course, certainly does not indicate a period of inactivity; rather, it would appear that action was subdued. Of course, there was much that was happening in the world that would have contributed to all of this.

The membership of the Club comprised predominantly what was then classified as the Boxwallah - the British merchant, a term which is a throwback to the era when itinerant salesmen visited locations upcountry with their wares in boxes. The companies had since become big and many were into what were loosely termed industry then - chiefly extracting raw material from India, sending it for processing importing the finished goods to sell in the local market at enormous profit. A few, maybe a handful, were into manufacturing in India itself.

This cosy world was buffeted in the 1930s by several blows – the freedom struggle and the boycott of foreign goods, the Great Depression, labour strife which was rearing its head in an organised manner for the first time, and finally the looming clouds of war. But that did not prevent the Club members from making a mark in their own way.

As Rotarian F.E. James continued to contribute towards International Service at Rotary, other Madras Rotarians followed suit in exploring Rotary beyond the confines of their city and country. Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau, to the delight of Rotary International, called upon its offices in Chicago. This was one of the prominent medical men of Madras, and his Rama Rau Poly Clinic on Poonamallee High Road was a landmark.

In 1938, Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau of Madras visited Rotary International's headquarters in Chicago, where he met Paul Harris and other Rotary leaders. His tour, captured in a photo-story in The Rotarian, gave readers a rare behind-the-scenes look at Rotary's global operations. The visit shows Rotary's commitment to service and the First Object of Rotary: "the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service."

By the end of the First World War, x-ray and radiology had arrived in India, pioneered by Captain Barnard after whom the Institute of Radiology is named even today in the General Hospital. Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau was one of the people who saw the potential in radiology very early on. He set up the Madras Institute of Radiology on his premises. He was also the General Secretary of the Indian Radiological Association and the editor of its quarterly journal. The Government would recognise his services with the title of 'Rao Bahadur.' Many years later, the American College of Radiology would elect him in an honorary fellow, Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau was a frequent contributor international journals on radiology and indeed, a regular at many of the international conventions and conferences. It is quite likely that it was in connection with one of these events that he travelled to the US in 1938. He must have made a striking figure with his suit, tie and turban.

A Visitor from Madras

At the offices of Rotary International, Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau was warmly welcomed by Secretary Perry, from whose office he enjoyed the beautiful view - the building stood at a prime location, overlooking the winding Chicago River. While President Duperrey was not available, Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau had the honour of meeting Founder and President Emeritus Paul Harris. He was given an insider's tour of the departments housed in the offices and the work



they did - he met First Assistant Secretary Philip C. Lovejoy and the efficient staff who kept the Secretariat's programs smoothly running; he was introduced to the polyglot Service Clubs to department, which undertook the massive task of coordinating with the roughly 4,400 Rotary clubs present in the world at that time; he also made the acquaintance of Leland D. Case, Editor of The Rotarian. Satisfyingly, Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau was able to also take a peek at documents which chronicled the history of the Rotary Club of Madras itself.

The visit was made a matter of record in the February 1938 issue of The Rotarian as a charming photo story.

From the article:

To the Secretariat of Rotary International in Chicago come thousands of Rotarians each year.... Even from such faraway places as the Fiji Islands. When Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau of Madras, India called recently, a candid camera man was present... and you need not be told the request he made. Rotarian Rau assented, and here are the photographs then made, supplemented by others - all arranged in sequence to give you a picture-story of what awaits you when you drop in at "35 East Wacker Drive."

The story must have captivated many readers who got to vicariously tour the Chicago offices through Rtn. Dr. P. Rama Rau's experience, for the magazine soon published an interesting letter it received on the matter. The article reportedly brought the gentleman such pleasure that he was prompted to recall the happy memories from his own visit. The letter, given below, captures the joy Dr Rama Rau must have felt during his tour.

Our Readers Open Forum

The highlight of the Dr. Rama Rau's visit was a glimpse into the Rotary Club of Madras' own history, preserved in the very archives of the global organization. As Dr. Rama Rau stood overlooking the winding Chicago River, he was not just a visitor from Madras, but a symbol of the growing, global reach of Rotary—a journey from local service to international recognition. The visit was immortalized in The Rotarian magazine, forever etching Madras' contribution to Rotary's legacy.

helped to describe Rotarian Dr Rama Rau's visit to Rotary's Secretariat in Chicago for it reminded me of my trip not long ago.

I stepped into the elevator at 35 East Wacker Drive and said, 'Ninth Floor, please.' When I reached this floor, a very nice young lady greeted me, and when I told her what I desired, she asked me to register. She then asked me to have a chair and she would have someone show me around. In a very short time out came Rotarian Amos Ayres, of the Secretariat. The next person I met was Paul Harris, the Founder of Rotary. It was a real treat and honour to meet this fine man. Then we went to the office of the President and met Maurice Duperrey, our President from Paris, France; then to the office

of that well-known man of Rotary, Secretary Chelsey R Perry. I also met some of the Directors, as they were meeting in Chicago. On and on we went, meeting the heads of the various departments and seeing the Rotary in operation serving Clubs and Rotarians all over the world. To meet Rotary's Founder, President and Secretary within the short time I spent at the Secretariat was something to write home about.

The thing which impressed me was this: At headquarters of Rotary International they certainly practice the First Object of Rotary - "the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.

In 1938, Madras Rtn. F.E James, who was the District Governor of RI District 89, that had the whole of undivided India as its geographical area, was again named the Acting Governor of District 89 when the serving District Governor, Sir Pheroze Sethna, his successor, passed away unexpectedly. The November 1938 edition of The Rotarian makes a mention of the event:

Governor - Past District Governor FE James of Madras, India has been designated Acting Governor of District 89 (Afghanistan, Burma, Ceylon and India) and will serve until Rotary's Board of Directors fill the vacancy left by the death of Sir Pheroze Sethna. The Honorable Sir Pheroze Sethna was serving his second consecutive term as Governor...

Back home, the Committee was actively working to fulfil its aim of service to society with the Madras Rotarians launching new projects that aided various communities. The Committee maintained a focus on social causes in the city as well-for instance, the Club continued to work closely with the local bodies to crack down on antisocial behaviour, even reporting cases of drunken driving.
