Dear RCMers,



MM Murugappan in conversation with **Rtn.Rahul Saraogi**

He was the most relevant and appropriate Guest speaker to kick start the Rotary year for RCM.

M M Murugappan, fondly known as "Murugu" to all who know him, was the speaker in conversation with our own Rtn.Rahul Saraogi this week.

Introduced by Rtn.Govind Parikh, his accomplishments over the years were so lengthy that it took a few minutes to be recounted. A scion of one of the most well-known Industrialist groups in India, it was a pleasure and a privilege to have him amongst us.

He came across as simple, soft-spoken and succinct , a rare combination of qualities, which only enhanced his stature in all aspects.

The opening remarks from MM were as humble, stating how honored he was to have been invited to RCM as a speaker and sought blessings of the elders, Rtn. Goenka & Rtn.Sankaranarayanan who were present.

Rtn.Sarogi started off by asking him the genesis of the AMM foundation, the philanthropic arm of the group and its functioning. AMM foundation celebrated its centenary recently, making it one of the most celebrated social service organizations in the country, with few equals. MM explained how his grandfather who was the ninth child, migrated to Burma and built a successful business, the outcome of hard work and acumen. His bent of mind was always to give back to the society and his motto was to " Make Lives Better" which is the Mission goal of the group till date.

With this objective, he set up a



Charity hospital in their village, Pallathur in Sivaganga District,which stands to date. It serves the local community in every which way with up to 500 out patients a day and even facilitates transportation of the sick and elderly from the local bus stands and railway station.

Three generations later, this approach to serving the society stands firm in the minds of each family member and as the most important aspect of their "Giving Back" & "Making Lives Better". It started with Healthcare, continued into other aspects such as Education (A key focus area), Environment and even Sports. Over time, this has been institutionalized, with building relationships and forming partnerships in PPP mode, with Governmental assistance to make it inclusive and effective. The entire process has continued with identifying the needs of the society and fulfilling them. Every member of the family partakes in this

voluntarily with no impositions and they are allowed to do what appeals to them.

The most important of the education aspect is that it ensures that the teaching and the training are directed in a way that the beneficiaries become employable!

The methodology adopted for education is with adherence to the government policies as regards curriculum and regulations, and enhancing the quality around the same. This requires constant monitoring and tweaks to ensure the best of results and benefits to the stakeholders.

Rtn.Saraogi was quite brilliant as an anchor. He was the Christiane Amanpour of RCM today. The questions and follow ups were meaningful and pertinent and confined to areas which we as RCM, should work on.

Responding to the question as to 'What Rotary can do in conjunction with Business', MM said that with



the talent and skill levels of the RCM ers, we should constantly be looking to improve on what we do. He gave an example of installing Dialysis machines. We should backward integrate and educate the society on preventing kidney ailments rather than curing related illnesses, he said.

Rtn.Dr.Sangeetha raised a point on the differently abled in our country and as to whether enough is being done, to which there was an emphatic " NO" from MM. He was of the opinion that we must strive to do more, which is a pointer to RCM's focus area to work on. He also mentioned that in one of their companies in Pune, an entire assembly line is manned by quadriplegics.

One wonders what they haven't thought about, to "Make lives better"!

Post the event, I sat with him for a few minutes. He was generous with his time and gracious in his attitude. In all this, I had completely forgotten my earlier interaction with him. I am kicking myself for it! He

I recall the humility and grace of the gesture. It was my blessing to be a part of that!

One question of mine was of particular relevance.

What is Dare house to you?

" DARE HOUSE" is a part of the legacy of the group, Chennai, TN and India. It was built in the 1930s and houses the group. It is being preserved as a Heritage center. There was a glint of pride and a sense of satisfaction in MM's eyes when Dare House was mentioned.

One can go on. And write more. But my Editor has me on leash. I will therefore stop here.

To sum up, there could not have been a better choice to start the year off. Many thanks to Rtn.Govind Ji, Programs Committee , President and The Board to make this happen.

The Rotary Club of Madras launched its flagship HPVAX: Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) Vaccine awareness and vaccination program for cervical cancer prevention on the 6th of July 2024 at Shrine Vailankanni Senior Secondary School, T. Nagar. This initiative was carried out in partnership with Cancer Institute Adayar, whose Associate Professor Dr. Jayashree Natarajan was the Key Speaker at the event. The event was hosted by our own Rtn. Manasa Pillai, principal of the school, and her team.

The program was attended by DG NS Saravanan with his gracious spouse and several members of the district team, including Rtns. Ravi Varma, Ajitha

Balan, Ghanesh, and Srinivasan. A special thanks to Rtn. Srinivasan for his AV support (LED Wall), which was given free of charge for this noble cause.

Several of our club members, including PP AKS Dr. Vijayabharathi Rangarajan, IPP Ravi Sundaresan, PP Jayshree Sridhar, PP George Cherian,


speeches from President Rtn. Chella Krishna, special guest of honor Dr. Vijayabharathi Rangarajan, and District Governor NS Saravanan, all of whom emphasized the importance of safeguarding the futures of young girls and women by protecting them from cervical cancer through HPV vaccination.

About 170 people were in attendance and heard from Dr. Jayashree Natarajan of Cancer Institute as she spoke about the urgent need for HPV vaccination, its benefits, and the need for action without further procrastination in order to eliminate all HPV-related cervical cancer. Parents of around 65 children in the right age group were present and participated actively in a Q&A session after the awareness talk, where several doubts were clarified and myths regarding HPV vaccination debunked. We are happy to note that 22 girls have signed up immediately for the free vaccination at Cancer Institute following the awareness program, and we hope that the rest will follow soon. Varadarajan, Mr. Siva, and other office staff for their support. Also, special thanks to Rtn. Sunita Suresh for her fantastic media coverage to point the spotlight on this very important public health issue whose time we believe has finally come.

Rotary Club of Madras Inaugurated WASH Project

at Sri Ramakrishna Math National School, Chennai.

Background

Water and Sanitation has always been a core area of focus for the Rotary Club of Madras and over the years we have constructed nearly 2000 toilets in several parts of Tamilnadu including Amarambedu, Panchalai, Kandigai, Periyapuliyur, Keemalur, Paiyanoor, Kannakottai, Pandur and more recently in Nemmeli, Alathur, Siruthavoor,

Arunkundram and Thinnanur additionally providing access to clean drinking water in several of these areas. This year, President Chella Krishna continues the legacy of his predecessors by undertaking his maiden WASH project at the Sri Ramakrishna Math

National School in Kondithope. This primary school in Mint area caters to boys and girls up to the age of 10 years with classes from kindergarten to class V. These children are from underprivileged families in the surrounding area and rely on the school not only for education but also nutritious meals which are provided free of cost. The school is bordered by a 'slum' dwelling and many of these children live in this dwelling under quite harsh socioeconomic conditions. The school stands as a bright ray of hope for these children with its clean surroundings and environment of learning and piety.

It shows them a different life, a life full of possibilities...



Objective

In the first phase, RCM will construct toilets and a noon meal centre for the school, at a cost of over Rs. 61 lakhs, benefitting over 500 students and staff members. These facilities will be rebuilt for the first time since the school's inauguration in 1978. The project will be executed by Mr. G. Mathivanan of Mathi Engineers and Builders. For Phase 2, RCM

> has planned to construct a stage and five classrooms in the school.

Relevance of the Project

Children are the future of our nation and the world, and it is our responsibility as a society to provide them with a clean,

hygienic environment to learn, succeed and go forth into the world as young adults with social responsibility. RCM aims to do its part in this mission to provide a safe, healthy environment for these young minds to flourish.



Project Inauguration

On July 3, 2024, at 9 AM, the Rotary Club of Madras commenced the first project of the new Rotary year with a groundbreaking ceremony for the WASH Project at the Sri Ramakrishna Math National School, Chennai - 46. In the first phase, RCM will construct toilets and a noon meal center for the school, at a cost of over Rs. 61 lakhs,





benefiting over 500 students and staff members.

The Chief Guest, Rtn. N.S. Saravanan, District Governor 3234, along with other district officials Rtn. Ganesh and Rtn. Harisharan, were joined by President Rtn. Chella Krishna G.; Rtn. Following the pooja, Swami Shashishikananda, the school's Secretary, thanked RCM for their efforts and hoped for more collaborations in the future. The event ended with light refreshments.

Rtn. PP. Capt. Dr. B. Biswakumar was conferred the Lifetime Achievement Award by District 3233.

In many ways it was perhaps appropriate that GG Armstrong's name led all the rest, as Charter President. He was then the Chairman of the Madras Port Trust, one of the most important Government appointments of the time. Later knighted and therefore Sir Godfrey Armstrong, he was a veteran of what we would today refer to as logistics. Having begun his career in the Madras and Southern Mahratta Railway Co he specialised in the traffic or commercial side of the operations as opposed to technology, which was open essentially to engineers. In 1904, (later Sir) Francis Spring moved from the railways to head the Madras Port Trust, a position he occupied till 1919. That paved the way for several

railwaymen, especially those with experience in traffic

handling also to make the shift. Armstrong was one of these and he became the Traffic Manager of the Port. In

1928, he became Chairman of the Port Trust, a position he held till 1944. His tenure of 16 years remains a record till date. Armstrong's time as Chairman coincided with the greatest trade boom that Madras witnessed, owing to it being the only harbour on the eastern front that was not bombed by the Axis Forces. When he handed over the reins, the Port was handling a record 2.5 million tonnes of cargo. On his retirement, a dredger was commissioned in his name at the Madras Port, and it remained in operation till the 1980s!

It is interesting to see that Armstrong

consented to being the President of the Rotary Club of Madras just within a year of taking

over as Chairman of the Port Trust. It speaks volumes about his self-confidence and also of Davidson's convincing powers!


