
RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) is important to Rotary because it helps build the next generation of leaders and demonstrates Rotary's respect for youth.

Arvind Datar in the 'Dock'

The RCM had the honour of being addressed by senior advocate Arvind P. Datar - a legendary figure in the Indian legal fraternity. Having schooled in Mumbai, he completed his law degree from Madras Law College and was designated as a Senior Advocate by the Madras High Court in 2000. He has argued landmark cases, including the Vodafone matter, the Sabarimala case, and the SEBI-Sahara case.

A strong influence on his career has been his role model, the late Mr. Nani Palkhivala. As a tribute, Datar authored "Essays & Reminiscences on Nani Palkhivala" and "The Courtroom Genius." He has also written several books on taxation and constitutional law. Datar's contributions have earned him recognition as one of India's top seven lawyers, as featured in the prestigious book "Legal Eagles: Lawyers of India".

Excerpts from Arvind P. Datar in conversation with Rtn. V.P. Raman

How come you didn't want to follow your father's footsteps and enter the Indian Merchant Navy?

Growing up, I was inspired by my father's stories and wanted to join the Indian Merchant Navy. I dreamed of becoming a captain and starting my own shipping company, DISCO - Datar International Shipping Co. However, fate had other plans for me and in Grade 11, I was disqualified from applying for the exam on grounds of health.

I then prepared for the IIT exam but faced another challenge when I developed a severe intestinal twist. After recovering, I decided to pursue a BSc Honors degree in Physics and Mathematics in Bombay. It was there that I attended Nani Palkhivala's lectures and decided to pursue law.

I returned to Madras, determined to complement my law degree with Cost Accounting to become a tax lawyer. In hindsight, my ill health turned out to be a blessing in disguise.

You have almost "delusional positivity" & your first client after you enrolled at the Bar was yourself. Tell us about it .

Well yes, it was after a Moot Court Competition which we won as students but for which I was not reimbursed my travel expenses. So, I waited patiently until I cleared all my exams and received my Good Conduct Certificate without which I can't practice - and then sued the Madras Law College on my first day of entering the Bar for a travel expense reimbursement of Rs 674. I'm proud to say I won my first case.

A meticulous planner by nature, how did you chart your course onto becoming a good tax lawyer?

I started with a year's foundation in Civil Law before specializing over another 3 years. And then began my practice at just Rs 1,400, declining a lucrative offer as a Cost Accountant. My wife's support was invaluable during this time. At 18, I had decided to be financially independent from my father, earning money mostly through writing articles and teaching. With a passion for both law and cars, my goal was to own a Mercedes Benz, but I eventually bought my first car at 34, after having two children.

What made you choose Excise and diverge from the path of your role model Mr. Nani Palkhivala?

I was driven by the inspiration of management gurus Peter F. Drucker and Jim Slater, I applied the Zulu Principle and carved a niche in indirect tax, a relatively uncharted territory at the time, avoiding competition with established giants. I then went on to publishing my first book in Excise and Law. This marked a turning point in my career, my practice quadrupled and there was no looking back.

Why did you divert from Excise and write on the Constitution of India?

After my book on Excise, I went onto Company Law, where I edited the Ramaiya's Guide to the Companies Act -so I was constantly working on two branches - Excise and Company Law. The Constitution was always at the back of my mind.

Your obsession for time management - where did that come from?

I owe a lot to Peter F. Drucker, his first book "Managing for Results" Chapter - "Know thy time" set me thinking and I resolved that time is the most irreplaceable resource - time gone is time gone. I had no option but to marshal my time.

You have time for some hobbies now?

As a lawyer, I've had my share of adventures outside the courtroom. My wife and I travel annually, and recently drove from Delhi to Atal Tunnel, replicating Nazir Hoosein's 1981 rally route. The experience was surreal – emerging from the tunnel, China lay to our right and Pakistan to our left.

And , inspired by Arunima Sinha's Mount Everest feat, I trekked to Everest Base Camp at 66, completing it with 90 days of training. For my 70th birthday, I wanted to tackle Annapurna, but my family vetoed it due to safety concerns.

One last thing on your personal front - your obsession with seeing courthouses - tell us about it.

Yes, I love seeing Courthouses and how they function in different parts of the country on my travels and even on my honeymoon to the Bird Sanctuary in Bharatpur, I took my wife to see the District Court there! Have seen several courthouses over India during my vacations with family, in Goa, Ceylon, Boston & Washington except in Tokyo where my wife Himani put her foot down!



Work took you frequently to the Supreme Court but there was one big tax matter that gave you prominence. It diversified your practice.

It was on the issue of retrospective taxation for the Vodafone Case. I was in The Hague for 18 days for the International Treaty of Arbitration against the Republic of India . It was my misfortunate to argue against India but we succeeded and got damages of \$1.1 billion USD.

Onto the famous Sahara case all the senior senior advocates were blocked by Sahara by paying them a retainer. So how did the case come to you?

It was sheer luck and I got the Sahara case through a SEBI lawyer who saw me argue for Daiichi Sankyo. I represented SEBI independently, starting in 2010. Sahara had raised ₹25,000 crores from three crore people, disguising a public offering as a private placement. I successfully argued that it was a public offering, but refunds remain incomplete.

Apart from this crown jewel, can you talk about Decriminalisation of Homosexuality ?

Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code stated that carnal intercourse against the order of nature is punishable with imprisonment, and the law contemplated sex between same sex partners being against the order of nature. But medical research in the UK proved that of any given population, 3% could have same sex orientation and that it was not unnatural. (The Wolfenden Report.) And along with representation from the LGBTQ community and research from across the world that same sex relationships are not of a "criminal" nature, the Supreme Court decriminalised it.

We are in the 75th year of the Indian Constitution. Can you tell us what is special about it?

The Preamble is a marvellous document and everyone should read it. Professor Tom Ginsburg studied the constitution of 180 countries and concluded that the average lifespan of a constitution worldwide is approximately 16 years. The USA's is 200 and India's is 75 – and it is a indeed a matter of pride that for a country with our size and great diversity, the Constitution has survived so long, and that describes the greatness of our Constitution.

Justice, Equality, Liberty & Fraternity – all these are the cornerstones of any democracy and I am certain that we will go on to celebrate 100 years of our Constitution.

Rotary Club of Madras Minutes of the 29th Weekly Meeting and Republic Day Celebration

held on 26-01-2025, at Selaiyur, Chennai

Call to Order

The meeting commenced at 10.30 AM.

Sergeant at Arms, Rtn. M. Srinivasan collared President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna, who then called the 29th weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Madras to order and requested all members to rise for a silent invocation.

Welcome Address:

President G. Chella Krishna welcomed all Rotarians and emphasized the historical significance of Selaiyur for the Rotary Club of Madras. He highlighted that Selaiyur has been a key centre for boys' improvement and vocational training since the mid-1980s. He acknowledged the contributions of the Director of Vocational Services Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti, Chairperson Rtn. Rajib Kumar Hota and other members, including Ann. Deepthi Prasanna, wife of Rtn. Prasanna Rajagopalan for their commitment to elevating the perception and impact of the centre.

President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna referenced the book Zero to One by Peter Thiel, emphasizing the challenge of taking well-established projects to the next level. He commended Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti and Rtn. Rajib Kumar Hota's efforts in bringing renewed focus to the Selaiyur centre, particularly through the organization of the Republic Day function. He expressed hope that increased member engagement would lead to greater contributions and benefits for the community.

Rtn Rajesh Mani made the following announcements:

He expressed gratitude to all members for attending in large numbers and encouraged everyone to stay for the lunch.

The next weekly meeting will be on the 4th of February at the Hyatt Regency, Teynampet. The speaker for the upcoming meeting will be announced shortly.

The club's golf tournament will take place on the 31st of January. Rotarians are encouraged to participate. A putting competition for non-golfers, Members are invited to take part.

Special thanks were extended to Rtn. Shanno Ravi, Club Services Director, for handling logistics and to Rtn. Ravi Shankar for arranging the catered food.

Rtn. Rajesh Mani then handed over the proceedings to PDG Benjamin R. Cherian.

Rtn. PDG. Benjamin R. Cherian:

He provided historical insights into the establishment of Boys Town in Gummidipoondi in 1988.

Explained how the club acquired land and received funding from the International Children Trust and the European Economic Community.

Highlighted the contribution of Richard Gardener from the Rotary Club of Fareham Meon in funding the initial infrastructure. Shared the challenges faced in acquiring the Selaiyur land and the legal battles resolved in 1997, securing 23.5 grounds of land for the club.

Address by Rtn. PP. Ravi Katari:

Rtn. PP. Ravi Katari opened his address with a warm greeting. He reminisced about his visits to Selaiyur over the years and mentioned the role of several key individuals in the establishment of various Rotary-supported projects, including the building in question.

He fondly recalled the dedication of club members like Rtn. PDG. Benjamin R. Cherian and others, whose efforts led to the creation of assets such as the building and Gummidipoondi centre.

He shared an inspiring story of a former student, who was trained as an air-conditioner mechanic through Rotary's programs and later started his own business.

His speech concluded with a tribute to the contributions made by the club, expressing honour at being asked to contribute to such meaningful initiatives. One block in Selaiyur was named after his grandfather, Captain B.S. Chalam and his father Admiral Katari from Indian Navy.

Remarks by President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna:

President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna acknowledged Rtn. PP. Ravi Katari's contributions and highlighted the importance of the legacy created by Rotarians in the community, with a special mention of the building named after the Katari family.

Address by Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar:

Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar reflected on the long history of Rotary's work in the area, recalling the first digital literacy program in Sembakkam in 2012 under Rtn. PP. Rajendran Sabanayagam.

She narrated moving stories from the women of Selaiyur, many of whom had faced challenges like early marriages but were now empowered through Rotary's training programs.

She emphasized the impact of the Tailoring Center and Digital Literacy programs, particularly noting the success stories of women like Usha, who went on to become successful entrepreneurs and Sasikala, who overcame personal tragedies to secure a job through the skills she gained.

She commended the ongoing work, which continues to empower women and expressed gratitude for the support of all Rotarians involved, particularly in the face of challenges like COVID-19.

Address by Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti:

Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti humorously acknowledged the attendance of various people, including those "forced" to attend by friends and family, while highlighting the importance of heart, head and hands in driving Rotary's mission forward.

Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar introduced Mrs. Vimaleshwari, a key strength of the Selaiyur team, for her significant contributions to the success of the programs.

He further emphasized the impact of the community's involvement, expressing his appreciation for the collective efforts that have led to the growth of the initiative.

Acknowledgment of Contributions:

The event featured an acknowledgment of key figures in the Selaiyur projects, with special thanks to Mrs. Vimaleshwari and other staff for their dedication and hard work in managing the computer applications and other educational programs.

The Rotary Club's support for local projects in Selaiyur and Sembakkam, including community halls and child care centres, was highlighted as a major success of the ongoing efforts to uplift the underprivileged community.

Closing Announcements:


- After the meeting, the beneficiaries performed a lively dance.

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Bond Build and Bring Cheer

(At Selaiyur)

he 29th meeting of the Rotary Club of Madras was unique in multiple ways.

The program for the day began with a tour of the center after the guests were ceremonially received by the beneficiaries. The President, Past District Governor, Past President, Rotarians and their spouses, along with the beneficiaries and guests present in large numbers, hoisted the national flag and sang the National anthem.

The meeting held at Selaiyur's Vocational Service Centre was the first of its kind, a significant event where the club proudly empowers 350 women beneficiaries each year. This centre is where many dreams are realized for those in need. On the 26th of January, during the 76th Republic Day celebrations, nearly all members of the board were present and the atmosphere was filled with nostalgia, creating a sense of homecoming.

The celebrations were marked by unprecedented enthusiasm, with 45 RCM members. 75 over beneficiaries and instructors from Swabodhini, along with 15 child instructors and their parents, making up a large gathering of more than 150 guests. This included spouses, beneficiaries from the digital training and tailoring centres, as well as children from Swabodhini, an organization for children with special needs, who attended in colourful fancy dresses. During the event, four decades of history were recalled and brought to life by the founding members, Rtn. PDG. Benjamin R. Cherian, Rtn. PP Ravi Katari and Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar.

Rtn. PDG. Benjamin R. Cherian, while applauding President Rtn. G.

Chella Krishna for organizing the meeting, reminisced about the early days of Boys' Town. He recalled that the initiative began in 1988 in a rented space in the Redhills area before moving to Gummidipoondi. The facility was established on 14 acres of land, generously gifted by Rtn. Markand Desai, located approximately 70 km from the city.

in Selaiyur. This vision became a reality with the support of well-wishers like C.R. Ramdas IAS and Paulraj IAS. It was Rtn. Richard Garner who secured funding from the European Economic Community (EEC) for the purchase of 23.5 grounds of land in Selaiyur. initially contributing £50,000, followed by an additional £25,000. PDG also acknowledged the crucial support of Mohan Parasaran, then Attorney General and Raghavan IPS in facilitating the acquisition and securing of the site.

The construction of the technical training centre was supervised by Rotarian Ganesan, a builder by profession, with cement supplied by N . Srinivasan and India Cements around 1996. PDG expressed gratitude to all Rotarians involved in the project, including Rtn. PP. Shankar C. Mangadu, Rtn. PP. N.K. Gopinath, and Rtn. PP. S. Gunashekar, who played key roles in bringing the initiative to life. The centre was designed to provide vocational training in trades such as refrigeration, technical services, plumbing, and more. PDG fondly remembered the building's inauguration, which was led by District Governor Rtn. K.V. Srinivasan, the grandfather of Rtn. Raghu Kailas.

Rtn. PP. Ravi Katari remembered the significant contributions of Rtn. Christopher Deva Prakasham, Rtn. V.K. Chandra Kumar, and Rtn. Kamal Chadha, who dedicated much of their time overseeing the setup of the project. He also mentioned his own contributions, particularly in financing the construction of the first floor, which was named in honour of his father and maternal grandfather.

Rtn. PP Jayshree Sridhar, who became a member of the club in







2010, recalled the inauguration of the Digital Centre, which was established on land provided by the Panchayat at Sembakkam on 02-10-2012 during the presidency of Rajendran Sabanayagam. She emphasized how her focus shifted towards empowering women in Sembakkam, where she had the opportunity to interact with and positively impact the lives of over 300 women from low-income groups through training programs. Jayshree also highlighted the history of the Tailoring Centre, which was started in 1986 by trainer Anusuya, who now serves as the centre's mentor. She proudly shared the success stories of three standout students: Usha, who ran a successful tailoring business; Sasikala, who worked in computer operations; and Mahalakshmi, who found stable employment with a commercial enterprise.

And the Computer Centre, equipped with state-of-the-art systems donated by Rtn. Ravi Ramachandran provides trainees with the tools to thrive in today's digital world.

Most importantly, Selaiyur stands as a proud asset owned outright by RCM—a vision made possible by the foresight and commitment of leaders decades ago.

But Selaiyur is not just about its impressive numbers and certifications - it is fundamentally about heart. The warmth at Selaiyur is impossible to miss. The smiles on the staff's faces, the way they comfortably break into a dance with the Rotarians, and the joy shared between trainees and members. It is a space built on connection, not formality. These bonds weren't built overnight; they've been carefully nurtured, year after year.

The entry of such industry experts provides the much-needed recognition to this program and its beneficiaries. These were striking features of the programs run on the Selaiyur campus. Kudos to Director, Vocational Service, Sanjay Rao Chaganti and his team.

The occupational therapy program for mentally challenged children, run by Swabodhini, was another moving experience during the visit. The singing performance given by one of the children from this program during our meeting stood out. His confidence and enthusiasm, despite his challenges, marked the success of this project.

The scope at Selayiur is tremendous and the passion of our Vocational services team and the staff at Selaiyur is amazing. The attendance of so many of our Rotarians for this meeting at one of our project centers augurs well. There is so much potential for many more things that can be implemented on this sprawling campus. With greater member engagement, the huge space available at the Selaiyur center can be transformed into a project place of great excellence. We have an undervalued stone sitting at Selayiur, which is our own. It is time to convert it to a Jewel.

n January 22, the Rotary Club of Madras, in collaboration with ExNoRa International Foundation and the presence of government officials, conducted the Bhoomi Pooja for the restoration of Kadaperi Lake in Tambaram.

The Bhoomi Pooja was conducted near the lake and attended by Rotarians, local residents, government officials and the media.

This initiative aims to clean and rejuvenate the water body, providing sustainable water resources to around 4,50,000 people in the region. ExNoRa President Mr. S. Senthur Pari welcomed the event with a warm welcome and praised RCM's impactful projects, such as Rotary Nagar, Old Perungalathur Lake and Homes project supporting the Irular & Narikuravar community. Rotarian attendees included President-Elect Rtn. Nikhil Raj, Rtn. Dr Anuradha Ganesan, Rtn. R. Ravishankar, Rtn. PP. P.N. Mohan, and Rtn. Deepak Chander.




We met a few of the organizers of RYLA, little did we know that they would soon become such an integral part of our whole experience.
