
Standardization in textiles sector is crucial for enhancing product quality, increasing market competitiveness and improving consumer trust.

Spotlight - 31st Weekly Meeting

Why India Needs to Bet Big on Sports

"Champions aren't made in gyms. Champions are made from something they have deep inside them; a desire, a dream, a vision." Muhammad Ali.

The RCM was very pleased and applauded our Rotarian Mr. Hemant P. Chordia's initiative to allocate and support young and budding sportspeople in India as part of their CSR initiative through his company, Doodle Blue.

The young Ms. Tripti Chordia spoke with passion and conviction, her commitment to supporting great Indian athletes was evident. She shared some eye-opening statistics with us: Corporate India donates INR 3,000 crore annually as CSR, but only 1.4 % of this is allocated towards sports.

India spends approximately 6 paise per capita on sports, yielding only six medals, whereas China spends 19 paise and secures 90 medals. In other He missed most of his 12th-grade exams due to the National Championships. words, increased investment in sports yields exponential results.

I think sports should be as much a key focus as any other sector as part of the dream to "Make in India and Make India great." With this prologue, we were excited to hear from the professional table tennis player Achanta Sharath Kamal, who has been honoured with the Padma Shri, Khel Ratna and Arjuna Award.

This young man had a regular life in Madras and attended a regular school, yet catapulted to an extraordinary level, winning multiple Commonwealth Games and Asian Games Medals. He became the pride of India as the flag bearer for the Indian contingent at the 2024 Olympics in Paris.

His mantra is "Work hard and work smart with the intensity required to create the escape velocity to raise the bar and break, and go above it." In other words, the competition is with oneself. Therefore, sports are a lot about mental toughness as much as physical fitness and discipline. He believes sports cultivate strategic thinking and mental strength, which spill over into life beyond the playing field.

Today, he heads an institute for budding and successful athletes, hoping that they will not only become great sportspersons but also inspire others to excel and win.

Going down memory lane, Sharath fondly recalled his school days at PSBB, where he was inspired and supported by the charismatic and visionary Dean. He missed nearly all his examinations in the 12th grade due to a scheduling conflict between the National Championships and his exams. While the Principal was worried about whether he would pass, the Dean had a simple logic: "How many kids from this school represent India?" Since he was the only one, she took it upon herself to support him.

She arranged for a teacher to help him catch up, and not only did he excel in sports, but he also cleared his 12th-grade final examinations with an impressive 82%.

This support propelled his passion for sports and pushed him to succeed in a non-mainstream career path.

Sharath recounts his journey by going back in time and describing his most defining moments.

- Paris 2024: Olympics flag bearer with P. V. Sindhu
- Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games: Won three golds and one silver. He had to play six matches a day for four consecutive days, enduring a brutal nine-month preparation

before Diwali 2021. The highs and lows of the competition tested his resilience, but his team of fitness, mental and nutrition coaches, alongside his table tennis coach, helped him maintain peak performance. His understanding of sports science helped him minimize dips in his performance.

• Since 2016: He has been invited for personal meetings with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, whom he lauds for his spirited involvement in sports, including cheerful send-offs and warm receptions for athletes, whether in time of celebration or consolation.

After the Birmingham wins, PM. Modi asked Sharath a few questions:

- His mixed doubles partner was a young person who grew up watching Sharath Kamal as a senior athlete. So, how did he manage the age gap with his much younger mixed doubles partner?
- This was posed to him in chaste Hindi when he lauded him in a lengthy manner (most of which was lost on poor Sharath) and finally, the naughty PM asked what he had whispered in her ears that made her laugh.

Sharath explained that his partner had lost a semifinal match despite playing at her personal best. She was inconsolable before their mixed doubles match. To lift her spirits, he told her, "Treat this match as an opportunity to undo the past loss! And if we lose, we will both cry together." This made her laugh out loud, breaking the tension and helping them perform better.


