



A Classy Narrative on a Difficult Subject

e is currently a Director of WASH-RAG (Water, Sanitation Hygiene-Rotary Action Group), the most crucial of RI's services to society. He is recognized as a pioneer & foremost expert in this area. Rtn. PP. S.N. Srikanth continues his untiring unenviable drive in this transformation all over the world. PP Srikanth excels at this. This was termed to be an inspiring session and so it was. But he was not speaking on WASH RAG. He was talking about people and their behaviour.

the environment. PP. Srikanth talked about the behavioural changes that are imperative to make the world a better place.

He opined that the most difficult thing was to challenge the ideas that people hold dear and have been habituated to. Behaviour can be defined as how someone acts to make something happen. It is also a product of individual and collective action.

Why is Behavioural Change required?


He said the most obvious of generally perceived factors, like education, risk awareness, etc., are not necessarily the catalysts of behavioural change. The populace is too fond of their beliefs to jettison them outright. I must add my own two bits here. We are also creatures of habit. Our habits are so ingrained in us that it is difficult for us to change.

So, what can help us to change? He says, there are several approaches. perceived threatis а susceptibility to perceived а problem. As an example, during COVID-19, the younger population thought they were beyond it. That influenced their behaviour. One needs to highlight tangible & personal benefits rather than intangible & societal ones arising from the change to bring it about. Also, the facileness of the change is a major factor. Anything overtly difficult must be avoided.

There are also other constructs. One of them is self-efficacy. Are you capable of effecting the change? The other is cues to action. For example, having a heart attack. That is internal and brings about an automatic lifestyle change for self-preservation. Or external cues that the Government or society forces on you through collective action.

He quoted the example of how the US spent 12 billion dollars to develop the vaccine for COVID-19 and ended up with a bill of 49 billion dollars instead of developing simple, efficient face masks, where hardly a pittance was spent.

Washing hands and social distancing were not on anyone's radar during COVID-19, at least in







India. All of the population, or the majority, ignored it, as it was impossible to achieve, especially here. These were barriers to change. Hand sanitizers were a better solution on a smaller scale.

Another approach is called Social Cause Marketing. It is the marriage of behavioural science & commercial marketing. Government Policy is the 5th P of marketing.

He quoted Bangladesh's family planning program from the 70s as an example. The message was that birth control leads to better quality of life by reducing pressure on resources through a smaller population. So, contraceptives were issued to men. However, there was no effect, as men did not believe in the concept. The program was a failure.

The Government changed the policy to appeal to women with contraceptives. Emphasizing less physical strain, a better life, and more resources. And the flip did the trick. It was the right track, and the appeal to comply was directed at the right audience. Benefits were changed from intangible to tangible. The right target and messaging achieved the objective.

Another practical experience of our faulty messaging was the sanitation project undertaken with 100 houses, 600 people, and one defunct toilet. As a result, the open defecation was rampant.

The Government's message is simple, don't do it in the open! If you don't your health will be better! We are spending too much on public infrastructure. This did not appeal to people! Despite toilets being built, there was no perceptive change in behaviour simply because the target audience did not correlate sanitation to better health.

Instead, it was the women who valued their time that were the answer. The safety of women and time-

saving were the messages that finally worked. The convenience for the elderly was another.

He concluded his speech with that. As the headline suggests, it was a classy and well-articulated delivery on a complex subject. It took me nearly four hours to analyse the narrative and present it in a clear and coherent manner, at least, I hope so.

Rtn. PP. Srikanth is a fine human and an erudite one. It is a pleasure to be able to write about his service to our club, RI and to society overall. The man walks the talk. His continuing effort to contribute to the well-being of fellow citizens is an act to follow. It is people like him, who make the world a better place to live in. And I, on behalf of all of RCM and RI, thank PP Srikanth for his continued efforts and for being a part of the Rotary ecosystem to guide & lead the way!

RCMPL 2 THE BATTLE FOR GLORY BEGINS







der the blazing summer sun, RCMPL 2 kicked off with an electric atmosphere, as Rotarians came together not just for a game, but for a celebration of fellowship and passion. The tournament, now in its second season, has grown into more than just a competition, the motive is to make all district players come together, compete and have fun through the spirit of the competition.

The inauguration was led by RCMPL Chairman Rtn. Shivkumar Eashwaran. welcomina **RCM** President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna, District Governor Rtn. N.S. Saravanan. Past President Rtn. S. Ravi, team owners, players and fellow Rotarians. Reflecting on last year's success, he acknowledged the learnings and improvements made. while expressing appreciation for the dedicated efforts of everyone who brought this year's tournament to life.

Taking the stage, President Rtn. G. Chella Krishna spoke of his pride in witnessing the event take shape, highlighting its role as both a fundraiser and a unifying force within District 3234. He applauded the organizing team for their dedication and vision, highlighting how RCMPL is more than just a game, it is a catalyst for impactful projects that will make a lasting difference.

The Chief Guest for the event is District Governor Rtn. N.S. Saravanan. visiting the tournament for the second time, was impressed by its scale and organization. He noted that while last year's edition had already set a high standard and doesn't need any improvement, he praised Shivkumar Eashwaran for organizing this year's to another level. Cricket, he remarked, is more than a sport in India, it is a passion, a religion and a language that brings people together. RCMPL, in his view, is a shining example of this, giving Rotarians a reason to come together, compete and create lasting



memories. With excitement running high and the hues of competition in the air, RCMPL 2 was officially declared open by District Governor Rtn. N.S. Saravanan, this year promising an IPL level season of matches, deepening friendships and a celebration of fellowship like never before.

The **RCM** Premier League matches were held over two days, on February 15 and 16, 2025, at the Sree Ramachandra Medical College Cricket Ground. The opening match was between Chennai Gurus and Uma Eye Champions. Uma Eye Champions won the toss and chose to field first. The match began promptly at 7:51 AM, with Chennai Gurus setting a target of 88/9. In response, Uma Eye Champions chased it down comfortably, scoring 90/2, securing victory by eight wickets. P. Arumugam was named Man of the Match for his outstanding performance.

The second match of the RCM Premier League saw South Super Stars take on India Winners. Winning the toss, South Super Stars opted to bat and got off to a solid start, scoring 51 runs in 4.5 overs, eventually posting 91/4 in 10 overs. India Winn

ers responded aggressively, reaching 50 runs in just 4.2 overs, aided by 15 extras. A strong third-wicket partnership between Gaurav Jain (23 off 13) and Rangarajan (14 off 13) helped them finish at 95/2 in 8.1 overs, securing a comfortable



victory. Rangarajan remained unbeaten on 20, while Anand TG was yet to score as the match concluded.

The third match of the day featured a showdown between Thalaivars and Chennai Gurus. Chennai Gurus won the toss and opted to field first. Thalaivars started steadily, reaching 50 runs in 6.4 overs and finishing their innings at 86/4 in 10 overs, with Satish Ganesan (26 runs) and Srinivasan M (1 run) contributing. Their innings ended at 12:15 PM and the chase began at 12:24 PM. Chennai Gurus responded with a strong start, scoring 52 runs in 5 overs, supported by 3 extras. Despite losing wickets, they successfully chased the target, reaching 88/6 in 8.4 overs, with (11 Rama Gopal runs) and Sivachandran (11 runs) making key

contributions. Chennai Gurus won the match by 4 wickets, securing a hard-fought victory.

In a high-energy match under the scorching sun, Reliance Knight Riders faced off against Go Colors Super Kings. Winning the toss, Go Colors Super Kings opted to field first. Reliance Knight Riders started strong, scoring 51 runs in 5.1 overs, with 17 extras. Their momentum continued, reaching 103 runs in 8.5 overs, supported by 23 extras, and they closed their innings at 118/5 in 10 overs, with Alex contributing 6 runs. In response, Go Colors Super Kings began aggressively, scoring 50 runs in just 4.1 overs, with 9 extras. However, despite their efforts, they could only manage 93/6 in 10 overs, with Prakash Amazon (1 run) and Anantha Padmanabhan J (1 run) at the crease at the end of play. Reliance Knight Riders secured victory by 25 runs, as both teams showcased commendable performances despite the intense heat.

The last match of the day featured Thalaivars taking on Shivsu Warriors. Shivsu Warriors won the toss and chose to field first. Thalaivars started strong, scoring 51 runs in 5.2 overs, with 12 extras. In response, Uma Eye Champions began their chase aggressively, reaching 51 runs in just 3.3 overs, with 6 extras. They continued their dominance, scoring 102 runs in 8 overs, with an additional 14 extras. Rotary Nostalgia-

Did You Know?

N 1956, the community service committee of our club finalized the project of putting up a Picnic Centre for children at Edward Elliot's Beach. A plot of one acre of land was kindly leased to the Rotary Club of Madras by his Grace, the Archbishop of Madras. A hall with sanitation and a well was also constructed for a picnic centre.


For several years, the club's annual children's party was held at the Picnic Centre, which was also rented out to groups interested in sunbathing. As a picnic resort, this centre was very popular with all the institutions in Madras until a few years later, when the property was acquired by the Madras Government for the development of a housing colony. The Picnic Centre was inaugurated by Rotary International President Clifford A. Randall during his visit to Madras on December 6, 1958.

In 1959, the club found that there was an orphanage at Walajabad, run by a group of selfless social workers, taking care of over 600 students in a hostelcum-school arrangement. The club donated a projector and also a couple of sewing machines for the institution.

During Rotary International President Joseph A. Abey's visit to Madras for flood relief, a sum of Rs. 6001 was collected through voluntary contributions from the club members and was presented to the Minister for Revenue, Government of Madras.

The community service committee had also sustained the 'Edwina Mountbatten Memorial Fund' for children's welfare, advancement of nursing and the St. John's Ambulance.
