


Dear RCMers,

Overview of the 4-Way Test Event:

- Special thanks were extended to Rtn. PP. P.V. Mohan Raman for organizing a workshop to train interactors on filmmaking techniques.
- Appreciation for Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar for arranging Speaker, 'Wide Angle' Ravishankar to conduct the workshop.
- Recognition of Rtn. Balaji Chinni and the Youth Service Team for coordinating with interactor clubs and ensuring participation.
- Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti was acknowledged for suggesting the title change from the 4-way Test to Living the 4-Way Test.
- Rtn. Anand Rengaswamy was thanked for arranging hotel facilities for the workshop.
- The club has 29 Interact clubs, only 14 clubs participated in the event, highlighting the need for increased engagement in future editions.

Walk The Talk Living the 4-way Test

The 33rd weekly RCM meeting featured the winners of the annual V.P. Raman Award for creative filmmaking, based on the concept of the Rotary Four-Way Test. This award, organized by the Rotary Youth Services, was instituted and sponsored by our Rtn. PP. P.V. Mohan Raman in honour of his late father, Rtn. V.P. Raman.

This year, Rtn. PP. Jayshree Sridhar came up with the bright idea of a workshop on filmmaking for the students from the participating schools and she arranged a brilliant speaker, "Wide Angle" Ravishankar. Rtn. Balaji Chinni helped with sending the invites to the Interact club members 14 out of 29 Interact clubs participated.

The concept of "Living the 4-Way Test" was introduced by Rtn. Sanjay Rao Chaganti. The event was held at Hotel Maris and organized by Rtn. Anand Rengaswamy. Snapshots and videos of the workshop, as well as fun and interactive sessions, captured the rapt attention.

PP. Rtn. P.V. Mohan Raman appreciated the films made by the participants and felt that the standard was remarkably creative. So, he generously added to the prize money to encourage and generate more interest to continue this endeavour.

His daughter Ms. Vidyullekha Raman, a well-known film actor, addressed us on behalf of her family. She spoke from her heart and shared she did not know her grandfather as he had passed on early in her life, but hoped her grandfather was watching over her in this joyous moment. She reminisced about her childhood, recalling how she rarely went out during summer vacations due to her father's commitments. As a result, she joined a theatre workshop and quickly became drawn to it.

Contrary to popular belief, her path to a career in the film industry was not easy despite her father being in the same industry. Her first job was backstage, running a myriad of errands and she missed being in front of the audience.

Luckily, she caught the attention of a senior director, who noticed her talent and offered her an audition for a role in the movie. With a great deal of encouragement from her dad, she set off. Sadly, the audition was not a success. She shared that she stumbled, stuttered,



fumbled and broke down! However, her dad advised her not to give up but to call for a second chance.

So, she squashed her embarrassment and tried again. And this time, it was a massive success. The directors saw all of 20 seconds and immediately signed her on!

Despite her first job being off-track, she persisted and achieved success, now with 80 films her story demonstrated her persistent attitude, which she encouraged the youth to adopt: never give up and give it your best shot.

She presented the awards with great happiness and encouraged the participants who were not awarded to keep trying, hoping they might one day become film directors.

Created by school students, the three short films beautifully captured the concepts of the Four-Way Test. Through their storytelling and filmmaking skills, they wove engaging narratives and enacted compelling short stories that captivated the audience and left them impressed.

Day 2

It was one of those days where the day felt long, but the hours slipped away in a blink. We kicked off at 4 AM, assembling in the dining area—sleepy-eyed yet buzzing with excitement for our visit to the Hoollongapar Gibbon Sanctuary.

No sooner had we began our walk than we spotted a charming gibbon family lounging in the treetops, while another gibbon indulged in an all-you-can-eat berry buffet.

Our guides enthusiastically pointed out the towering hollong tree, the pink-leafed Nagod tree and lush ferns. We marvelled at towering worm hills, fluttering moths, dazzling butterflies and an impressive lineup of birds, from the dapper common hill myna—sporting what looked like a yellow necktie—to the majestic kalij pheasant. We even spotted a Malayan giant squirrel, who deftly balanced on the branches high above.

Signs of elephants were everywhere—giant piles of dung (nature's landmines) and broken branches marked their recent presence. Halfway through the trek, we were treated to a stunning acrobatic display by another male gibbon, swinging effortlessly through the canopy.

After this exhilarating jungle jaunt, we were whisked away to a tea estate, where a feast awaited us—poori bhaji, idli, pumpkin fritters, eggs, porridge, mishti doi with fruits and, of course, the finest Assam tea. Fully fed and feeling content, we left with packets of tea leaves as our delicious souvenirs.

Back on the boat, post refreshing baths, we indulged in yet another delightful meal, this time peppered with animated conversations with our fellow travellers. But there was no time to laze around; soon, we were off to Majuli Island—a vibrant epicentre of Vaishnav culture and the world's largest river island, steeped in history, tradition and art.

Our Majuli experience began captivating with а dance on performance 'Dashavatara,' followed by a theatrical spectacle from the Ramayana. From there, we visited a satra—a Vaishnavite monastery that serves as a centre for religious, cultural, and artistic traditions—where we witnessed energetic and mesmerizing dances in praise of Lord Vishnu.

Back in the boat, awaiting us was a fully set-up BBQ party on a deserted island where our boat was docked. With music, bonfires and the rhythmic beats of conversation and laughter, the energy soared again. The crew had set up a 'fish a beer bottle' game, where we had to deftly slip in a round hook into the beer bottle to win it.

To top it off, we each set little lamps afloat in containers made from banana tree bark, watching them drift away into the mighty Brahmaputra—our prayers, gratitude, and wishes riding along with them. It was a moment of quiet reflection amid the joyful chaos.

awe-struck by a magnificent tusker, a truly unforgettable sight.

Back on board, a delightful surprise awaited us. Beautifully laid out were traditional Assamese Mekhela Chadors for each of the women and dhoti-kurtas for the men—our ensembles for the muchanticipated Ethnic Night.

Before the grand transformation, we were treated to a quick cooking class by the cruise chef, with our very own Shalini demonstrating how to make Ghevar, the beloved Rajasthani delicacy.

Dressed in our elegant ethnic finery, we reunited to dance the night away, swaying to Assamese rhythms and infectious laughter. Dinner was a lavish Assamese feast, made even more special by soulful melodies from Chandan. As the night wound down, we retired to our cabins with hearts full of joy and bellies happily content.

Out of nowhere, a kind woman appeared, handed me a vessel of water, and invited me to perform an abhishekam on the Shiva lingam. As we left, I couldn't help but think, "I wish I could stay a little longer."

Back on board, after lunch, I joined Ashish and Sumit on the sundeck—a book in hand and eyes on playful dolphins and birds dancing along the river.

At 3 o'clock, we headed to Silghat. The lush, green tea plantations spread before us, a breathtaking sight that filled our hearts. Amidst these serene landscapes, a group of young boys and girls performed the spirited Bihu dance, an experience that will be etched in my memory forever; some of us even joined in, dancing with carefree abandon.



Our adventure continued as we visited one of Assam's largest jute bag manufacturing facilities. From soaking the jute plants and extracting the fibres to compress the gunny bags for packaging, we witnessed it all. The enormous machines and expansive factories were mind-boggling, but what I loved most was watching some smart young girls operate these gigantic machines with remarkable panache.

What a satisfying day it was! We wrapped up our day with a heartfelt



farewell dinner, reminiscing about our wonderful sojourn along the Brahmaputra.

Kaziranga's moniker as the "Serengeti of India" is well-earned. Rhinos, including babies, were all over the place, grazing calmly like cows in a pasture, while we feasted our eyes on the rare sight.

After rewarding our safari elephants with bananas and sugarcane, we retreated to a nearby resort for breakfast, which was followed by a jeep safari, covering a much larger area and revealing Kaziranga's amazing grassland ecosystem.

It was soon pack up time and the crew of the boat lined up to bid us farewell as we boarded our cars to set off for the four hour drive to Guwahati airport.



— Rotary Nostalgia Did You Know?



n 1962, when the country was attacked by China, Rs.11,111 was collected by voluntary contributions from members in an open meeting and presented to the Prime Minister's National Defence Fund.

During 1962-63, the Rotary Club took on hand two ambitious schemes - one, to put up a youth transit hostel in the city for young women, to be named after Nitish Chandra Laharry, the first Asian/ Indian to become President of Rotary International and at the YWCA, the second to set up a Students Aid Society. A sum of Rs.30,000 was collected for the construction of the hostel by staging a Drama and the hostel was handed over to the YMCA for maintenance. There was a slight delay in the construction of this hostel, but the club made up for it by spending additional amounts furnishing the hostel in later years.

The Nitish Laharry block is still there and is very well maintained even today by the YWCA, but we have no news on the Hall constructed for the YMCA. *- Rtn.PP.N.K.Gopinath*

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
