
#### Dear RCMers,

# MANUFACTURING RACE HAS A NEW TRACK

hen B. Santhanam, Chairman of Saint-Gobain India and Asia-Pacific, says his only regret is being 68 and not 48. Because here's a man who's not lamenting age but opportunity. The kind of once-in-a-generation opportunity that India's manufacturing sector is about to grab or squander.

Santhanam has seen multinationals up close, built one from the inside out and watched global trends swing like a pendulum. "We were seen as an Indian company, even though we were 100% multinational," he notes. But beyond sentiment, he drops hard truths and harder numbers. China? He's not buying the hype or the fear. Construction in China is at 50% of what it was just two years ago. The factory of the world is slowing its shift. Western politicians fear China. Now, Western boardrooms do too. Suddenly, the world's biggest

But this is no victory lap. It's a challenge disquised as an "Mediumopen door. complex manufacturing" in his words. Not the flashysemiconductors or space tech. The real gold lies in ceramics, abrasives, polymers and glass.

who's still standing? India.

capitalists are allergic to their

own supply chains and guess

Profitable? Absolutely.

Mundane? Maybe.

India beats the world on cost structures in these sectors. The world just hasn't woken up to it yet. Forget the Vietnam hype, he says. Land there costs four times more than in Tamil Nadu. Electricity in Shanghai is pricier than in Chennai. And yet, many Indian entrepreneurs still wear victimhood like a

badge. "Stop complaining, start competing,"

is the subtext. Western capital has no Plan B. India is the alternative. But only if we act like it. Infrastructure, housing domestic consumption. India is entering its infrastructure age with concrete ambitions. Global players can't localize fast enough. This is a local game, we're already in the stadium. Time to Santhanam may be stepping back, but words forward-facing. "I wish had twenty more years," he says.

The next twenty won't be kind to the passive. But for those bold enough build.




meaningful way.



#### **The History**

Founded on May 10, 1929 and chartered on July 19, 1929, the Rotary Club of Madras is the third oldest Rotary club in India and the oldest in Southern India, preceded only by the clubs of Calcutta and Bombay. For 31 years, it remained the sole Rotary club in the city of Madras.

#### **Born Into Its Own**

The club is one of only 34 Rotary clubs founded by the late Rtn. James Wheeler Davidson of the Rotary Club of Calgary, Canada, was honored by Paul Harris as the "Marco Polo of Rotary." Unlike many clubs formed with a sponsoring partner, the Rotary Club of Madras is self-manifested, sharing this rare distinction in India only with the Rotary Club of Bombay.

#### **Members From Around the Globe**

Now in its 97th year, the club has 300 members and has seen 97 Presidents take office, one of whom served two consecutive terms (1931–32 and 1932–33) and one year (1946–47) saw two Presidents. At its inception, the 30 charter members included 27 British nationals, two Swiss and one American. Notably, Rtn. Sir F. E. James, the first RI Director from India (1933–34), was a member of RC Madras.

#### The Mother of All South Indian Clubs

The club has produced 19 District Governors and directly sponsored many other Rotary clubs. Every Rotary club in Southern India can trace its origins to RC Madras. It has played a foundational role in Rotary's expansion in the region, which now includes over 2,400 clubs and more than 85,000 Rotarians, accounting for nearly 49% of India's total Rotary membership as of November 2024. The club also supports 27 Interact and 11 Rotaract clubs.

#### The Polio Project and Its Precursor

In 1979, RC Madras partnered with the Rotary Club of Whitby (RID 7070, Canada) to eradicate Red Measles in India—a pioneering project that laid the groundwork for India's Polio Eradication campaign. The national initiative began on May 1,

1987, launched in Madras by then RI President M.A.T. Caparas and Union Health Minister Mrs. Saroj Khaparde, with RI approving a \$2.6 million grant that year.

#### **Together Naturally**

From World War II to the 2004 Tsunami and the 2015 Chennai floods, the club has always risen to the occasion. After the 2004 Tsunami, it executed a \$1.5 million rehabilitation project with RC Bombay and constructed a state-of-the-art school for the affected communities, assisting over 50,000 displaced families.

#### Igniting the Flame of Service

In December 2014, the club launched the Rotary End Polio Flame to celebrate India's Polio-Free status. The flame traveled across 35 countries and was received at the RI Convention in São Paulo and later at RI Headquarters in Evanston in April 2015. This campaign remains one of the most successful PR initiatives in Rotary history, raising millions for the Polio Fund of TRF.

#### A Foundation of Giving

RC Madras has donated over \$5 million to The Rotary Foundation, with seven AKS members and more than 50 Major Donors. Every member has contributed, earning the club the status of a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club. In both 2023–24 and 2024–25, the club donated over \$1 million annually, placing it among the top donors globally. It has received several global and matching grants, including \$680,000 for a Children's Hospital and \$500,000 for a Rehabilitation Centre for polio-affected individuals.

#### **Changing Lives**

In the last decade alone, the club has:

- Built over 2,500 toilets in rural areas and conducted behavioral change campaigns to support Open Defecation-Free villages.
- Set up a Technical Training Centre on 35 acres in Chennai's suburbs (via a \$500,000 global grant), which also houses Boys Town, providing free shelter, education and healthcare to destitute boys aged 11–16 since 1988.
- Rebuilt a library in Rotary Nagar (est. 1944) into a modern
   3-story facility with space for computer and evening classes.
- Empowered women through training centers in Selaiyur and Sembakkam.
- Played a vital role during COVID-19 by supplying cold chain equipment, organizing vaccination camps, and deploying a mobile vaccination unit—which was later converted into a dental van for schoolchildren.

- Revamped numerous government schools, rebuilt classrooms and constructed gender-specific toilets, improving attendance and reducing dropouts.
- Desilted temple tanks and lakes to boost water tables and benefit over 800,000 people through enhanced rainwater harvesting.
- Partnered with ACS Medical College, Hindu Mission Hospital and NADI & TOLIA Centre to establish multiple dialysis centers and donate over 30 dialysis machines. It also donated a mobile mammography unit and a machine worth ₹7.5 million to ACS Hospital for underprivileged women.

#### **Members of Repute**

RC Madras has long attracted prominent personalities from various sectors. Distinguished honorary members include Rtn. C. Rajagopalachari (Rajaji), Rtn. Sir C. P. Ramaswamy Ayyar and Rtn. Dr. M. G. Ramachandran (MGR). The club has hosted highprofile fundraisers like the Merchants and Bankers Golf Tournament (held for 18 consecutive years) and prestigious art

auctions. Member engagement thrives through initiatives like fireside gatherings and outstation trips.

#### **Deserving Validation**

In recognition of its stellar work during the pandemic, the Rotary Club of Madras was appointed as the Nodal Agency by the Government of Tamil Nadu to coordinate statewide COVID-19 vaccination logistics—an acknowledgment of its lasting impact on public health.

#### A Rich Legacy


