

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Rotary Club of Madras (RCM) Minutes of the 6th Weekly Meeting Held on 06.08.24

at Hyatt Regency, Teynampet, Chennai

Call to Order and Invocation:

The meeting commenced at 01:30 PM. Sergeant at Arms, Rtn. Jayanth Hemdev, collared the President.

President Rtn. Chella Krishna called the 6th weekly meeting to order.

Rtn. N. Shanmuganathan's focus on economics, financial systems, and monetary policy was highlighted, along with his book, "RIP USD, 1971 to 2020X".

Address by Chief Guest:

Chief Guest Rtn. N. Shanmuganathan addressed the Rotarians, explaining the fragile foundations of the US Dollar and predicting that the collapse of its purchasing power is imminent. The talk was followed by a Q&A session.

Closing:

President Chella Krishna thanked the Chief Guest and presented a memento and the "Timeless Legacy" book.

Rtn. Rajesh Mani delivered the Vote of Thanks. The meeting was adjourned by the President.

Dire Predictions

he speaker this week was Shanmuganathan N. (aka Shan) who has recently written a book on the economy titled "RIP U\$D 1971-202X and the Way Forward ".

It was interesting being taken through the different schools of economics from the far left (Marxism) through to the far right which according to the speaker - led to liberty and prosperity. He delved into something called Austrian Capitalism where the Government has a restricted role concerning itself only with protection of private property and enforcement of legal contracts.

We then shifted gear to monetary transactions. The US Constitution was cited here: "No State shall make anything but gold and silver coin, a tender in payment of debts." The barter system was discussed in a manner reminiscent of the popular board game "The Settlers of Catan". Wheat is the most solid commodity to stock long-lasting and everyone needs it at some point. He delved into its flaws, and the consequent gradual shift to paper money.

The quote that was quite telling was the one by Barry Eichengreen, author of "Exorbitant Privilege: The Rise and Fall of the Dollar and Future of the International Monetary System" in which he is quoted as saying "It costs only a few cents for the Bureau of Engraving and Printing to produce a \$100 bill, but other countries had to pony up \$100 of actual goods to obtain one."



The predictions grew more dire as the talk went on, essentially setting out that because we no longer link money to gold reserves - as was meant to be the case at the start. Gold is durable, divisible, and a solid measure to set currency against. The fact that the US and most Governments now print money when they feel it necessary, it means that boom-bust cycles are inevitable and the current bubble is much bigger than 2008. And every bubble will at some point - burst. The US is, according to him, an empire on the verge of complete collapse / decimation.

The National Debt in the US is 35 trillion Dollars and set to get worse. As compared to this, India did better in terms of growth under Congress than the BJP. (He made it clear that he was not a fan of either party.) Our problems he said, were selfcreated - we need to balance our books/budget and learn to live within our means. As for what we should be investing in: Agricultural land apparently!

There were some telling quotes included; George Washington had said in 1787: "Paper money has had the effect in your state that it will ever have, to ruin commerce, oppress the honest, and open the door to every species of fraud and injustice." James Madison: "Paper money is unjust. It is unconstitutional for it affects the rights of property as much as taking away equal value in land."

A series of questions followed - which our speaker answered patiently, to do

with what will replace the Dollar would it be BRICS - and can it really be so, that governments can just print money on a whim (yes is the answer apparently). The talk was heavy on content and worrying in its predictions. One hopes that somehow, he has got it all wrong. Still, John Adams, the father of Economics, had had this to say: "All the perplexities, confusion and distress in America arise not from defects in their Constitution or Confederation, not from want of honour or virtue, so much as from the downright ignorance of the nature of coin, credit, and circulation."

During the Vote of Thanks, Rtn.Rajesh Mani commented that those who had left before the Q&A must be on their way to following this top tip and off hunting for a good plot to purchase!

Save A Little Heart' Global Grant Project

The background

Congenital heart defects or CHD (i.e., birth defects of the heart) are the most common major birth defects seen in newborns world-over, with 1 out of 120 babies born having a heart defect. Of these, 25% are life threatening or critical and need to be treated urgently. CHD has become a major cause of infant mortality in our country (death in babies less than a year of age). Treatment of CHD therefore has become a healthcare priority to reduce the infant mortality ratio (IMR) in our nation.

What RCM wanted to achieve

With 1 out of 120 babies being born with CHD, the scale of the problem is indeed mind-boggling. Although the government and public sector hospitals are making attempts to tackle the issue, there is a paucity of expertise and resources, which results in the untimely demise of several babies for want of treatment, purely due to lack of access to quality healthcare.

At Rotary Club of Madras, we hoped to add our might to this effort to combat congenital heart defects in newborns and children, by part funding their treatment at a tertiary care facility. As part of this process, we also wanted to raise awareness amongst our members and partner organizations, to build a sustained focus on this critical area of newborn care.

How did we go about it

Most babies presenting with CHD belong to the lower socioeconomic strata, and their families would ordinarily not be able to afford the treatment for most heart defects. However, there are some

centers in Tamilnadu that undertake treatment of these children by raising funds from philanthropic organizations and individuals. We partnered with the pediatric cardiac program based at Apollo Children's Hospital (ACH), Chennai, which is one such program which provides state of the art care to patients from all over Tamilnadu and India, irrespective of their socio-economic status.

An appeal for funds was put out to the members by then President Rtn. Jayshree Sridhar, which resulted in an avalanche of support and the program began as a member funded initiative. This was soon scaled up to a Global Grant to facilitate more pediatric cardiac procedures. Nearly 80 children's surgeries were made possible by the generosity of the members of the Rotary Club of Madras alone, led by the then President Rtn Jayshree Sridhar, who made a personal contribution of 5 lac rupees.

The children we have helped...

We were able to help 142 children in all, 71 of whom were female (equal number of girls and boys). The ages of the children ranged from 9 days to 18 years, with an average age of 4.5 years. The children were predominantly from

Tamilnadu although we also had children from Pondicherry (11), Andra Pradesh (6), Meghalaya (8), West Bengal (2) and as a special dispensation, 5 children from the African continent (4 from Uganda and 1 from Ghana).

In the first phase of the project, a total of 65 patients were enrolled. 40 of these patients underwent keyhole procedures (stenting, ballooning, device procedures) and 25 patients underwent open heart surgeries. In the second phase, we decided that we would support only surgeries, as these were more resource intensive. 77 patients underwent open heart surgery in the second phase of the program. Overall, out of the 142 patients, there were 4 deaths (< 3% mortality rate) which can be an unavoidable albeit unfortunate outcome in pediatric cardiac surgical practice.

Most children who undergo treatment for heart defects during early life go on to lead healthy and productive lives; going to university, finding employment, getting married and having children of their own, thereby contributing to the well-being of their families and society at large. Timely detection and treatment are the key determinants of outcome in these children and funding is often the main roadblock in this process.

We hope that our efforts have helped these children with CHD who are brave and beautiful warriors to journey through life with a radiant smile.

is selected to be 2026-27 Rotary International President



Sangkoo Yun, of the Rotary Club of Sae Hanyang, Seoul, Korea, is the selection of the nominating committee to become Rotary International's president for 2026-27. He will be officially declared the president-nominee on 15 September if no other candidates challenge him.

He is the founder and CEO of Dongsuh Corp., which engineers and markets architectural materials, and the president of Youngan Corp., which operates in real estate and financial investment.

A Rotary member since 1987, when he was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Sae Hanyang, Yun has served Rotary International as a director, trustee, committee member and chair, and RI learning facilitator.

Yun received The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award in 2021-22. He was appointed an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II, awarded the Friendship Medal by the president of Mongolia, and recognized for distinguished services by the President and Prime Minister of Korea.

Yun and his spouse, Eunsun, are Rotary Foundation Benefactors, Major Donors, and members of the Arch Klumph Society, the Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society. They have two children.

Rotary Nostalgia-

RCM and Polio

In its nine decades of existence, the Rotary Club of Madras can look back at many significant achievements. Among these, its contribution to the fight against polio will always rank high. The project came in 1984 as a sequel to the Club's successful execution of the red measles campaign and reached a peak in the 1990s. However, what is interesting is that even in the 1960s, the Club played a key role in rehabilitating a child afflicted with the dreaded disease.

The Club's First Polio Initiative

The Club's newsletter dated March 22, 1966, carried the text of a communication received from the Holy Apostles Convent, St. Thomas' Mount, Madras 16. This concerned Mary Celine, a child of three who was an orphan and afflicted with polio. The Sisters at the convent were struggling to take care of her, especially her medical requirements. The Sisters at the Xavier Hospital in Brisbane, Australia, were willing to take care of the girl provided she was sent over, and this was where Rotary was asked to help. The Club stepped in, and young Celine Mary flew to Australia to a new life.

The Club's Rtn. V. Emberumanar Chetty took care of much of the formalities involved in sending the child to Australia, and she was seen off at the tarmac on April 25, 1966. A photo taken on the occasion was published in April in the Club's bulletin. The child of three travelled alone, with an air hostess being her companion.

A New Life in Brisbane

A month later, we read a communication to the Club from the Mother Superior of the Convent at Brisbane: "I am happy to give you good news of little Mary Celine. She arrived safely at Sydney. From Sydney to Brisbane, she was taken by the Rev. Mother Superior, who happened to be there on the same day. Celine is getting used very slowly to her new environment.

The Specialist has prescribed callipers for both legs because both legs are damaged. Let us hope the treatment will have a good effect on her. We do not know how to express our deepest gratitude to you, to Mr. Padmanabhan, and all the members of the Rotary Club of Madras for being so kind towards this little child."

Donation from Australia


Mary Celine does not appear in the records of the Club thereafter, and we can only hope that she went on to lead a good life. In 1968, we find the Club receiving Rs. 7,500 as a donation from its matched district 611, with the express request that the money be spent on polio vaccination. It was made over with the same mandate to the Voluntary Health Services at Taramani, where the Club's member. Dr. V. S. Subramaniam, was then Secretary. The above were but sporadic instances in which the Club had assisted in the battle against polio. But a scourge of that order needed a far bigger and more sustained campaign.

Incidentally, we did try and get in touch with the Sisters of Xavier's Hospital in Brisbane, and despite giving them all details of how we from the Rotary Club of Madras sent her at our cost there in the 60s, we were stonewalled, and they refused to part with any details about her. The organization's name has now changed to Xavier's Support in Brisbane.

Does it harm the receiver of the message? Is it better avoided?

• Will it build Goodwill and Friendship?

Does my message have any content that is insensitive to anyone's feelings, culture, or religion?

• Is it Beneficial to all?

Does the message even justify being posted? Does it help the receiver or is it just adding to social media traffic?




