Each one of them, an accomplished business owner in his/her own right, having succeeded in the rough and tumble of commerce overcoming obstacles, the unknown, the uncertainties and the ups and downs of time.

They were smart, articulate, crisp and concise with their answers. It was very apparent why they were successful. Each of them possessed unique qualities that that set them apart. It was a packed afternoon, wherein the RCMers came in large numbers in support of their family.

The discussion was well anchored by Rtn.Vivek Parachur, asking relevant questions to which he got sensible answers. Vivek runs a hi-tech Nutraceutical company on his own and has a very good idea on how businesses are run. He is no stranger to the goings on in the world of business. His curation was pointed, specific and exact. Well done Rtn.Parachur!

Rtn.Hemu Ramaiah is someone who I met when she was 16 years old, when she was fresh out of

school. Little did I imagine then, that decades later,I would be listening to one of the most successful businesswomen in retail, in the country, being interviewed. It was a pleasure to listen to her. She was frank, forthright and precise. Her passion for the path she had chosen to excel at, was very evident. Having grown up in a family with an army background, she felt the absence of books in her early life and fulfilled her dreams. She said that successful entrepreneurs find a vacuum and fill it to their desire. And that is how she met with success with Landmark.

"Entrepreneurship is gender agnostic", was one remark she made during the course of the conversation. Well said Hemu! You are the prime example of a woman succeeding in business!Her strength apparently was her timing. She began when she was 30 and exited at 50. She created "Landmark" in no less than 18 venues and in all major cities in India, which will stand the test of time as a success story in retail. She is truly a rockstar!

We all know who Rtn.Rahul Saraogi is! With his pedigree and

antecedents, he needs no introduction. He is a third generation entrepreneur and an extremely good one at that. He was articulate and clear and knew what he was talking about. He was of the opinion that entrepreneurship was the least appreciated amongst all professions. Engineers are lauded as thought leaders and builders, doctors are termed as demi-gods saving lives and some others as visionaries. An entrepreneur often goes unrecognized, and is at best noticed, when he fails in his endeavor.

Rahul says that the business may fail, but the entrepreneur doesn't!. A true businessman is tough. He is "Teflon coated". According to Rahul, entrepreneurship is a state of mind. An entrepreneur, on a daily basis, has to have his nose to the grind, constantly step outside his zone of comfort and live in a state of uncertainty. Life is never easy for an entrepreneur.

Rtn.Navneet Agarwal completed the quartet. He comes across as a true professional, having passed out of IIT Mumbai and Booth School of Business. He came back from the US to take care of the family



business, which according to him, is a both a boon and a bane. When you inherit a legacy, you have a platform to work with and a support structure. At the same time, you need to contend with what should be and what someone wants it to be.

What he obviously meant was the tremendous adjustment in terms of accommodating old school of thought with one's own propensity to put into effect the process of new learnings from Business School. It needed adjustment, patience and understanding-which probably is Navneet's forte and has stood him in good stead to make him what he is.

Navneet seems to possess a great sense of humor and an affable persona, which seems to have aided him to navigate the process of separation of family and business, which took 5 years. He seems to have put in to good effect, the learnings from Booth School of Business by adapting to emerging businesses and developing automation. Today, his business manufactures 20,000 SKUs in ductile and cast iron!

According to him "Risk Appetite" for an entrepreneur ebbs and wanes. It is like the high and low tide. If one meets with success, the optimism is high and more chances are taken. On the other hand, setbacks bring in caution and a tendency to pull back. One needs to have a balanced approach and work with available resources.

There were many more pearls of wisdom from all four. It is impossible to capture all of them, in the limited space available.
All I can say is that the ones who were lucky enough to be in the audience were given a treat in nuances of entrepreneurship and business.

Perhaps the strangest case to come before the International Service Committee was the case of A. Arul Prakasam in 1971. Prakasam, a resident of Rameshwaram, a coastal town in Tamil Nadu, India, found a plastic bottle on the beach. It contained a message that read: "May the voyages organised by T.F.C. be always as happy as this one, and good luck to the finder of this message." A reward was offered to the finder if he or she published the message in a local newspaper. The newspaper was requested to inform T.F.C. Tours, 402 New Plaza Centre. Johannesburg, South Africa, on publication of the message.

The author of the message was a Mrs. Isobel Clarke, a passenger on board the S.S. Boissevain that had sailed from South Africa. The ship was on its last voyage and, as was customary on such an occasion, the oldest lady passenger on board was asked to throw a bottle containing a message into the sea. On June 8, 1968, ten days into the voyage, Isobel Clarke flung the bottle overboard. The bottle bobbed along until it was found by Prakasam on May 20, 1969.

Prakasam promptly sent the message to The Hindu for publication. The paper, however, declined to go along with the terms of the message.
Undaunted, Prakasam wrote directly to T.F.C. Tours introducing himself as the finder of the bottle.
Mr. J.C. Foggit, Chairman, T.F.C. Tours, informed Isobel Clarke who was delighted with the turn of events. On June 24, 1969, Foggit

replied to Prakasam and enclosed the reward of 300 rand in his letter.

However, the story didn't end there. Prakasam wrote to Isobel Clarke to thank her for the money and concluded his letter with: "Now I am entirely depending upon God first and you next, in view of my parents' and my family's inability. If it is not possible for you to help me at present, please hand over this letter and recommend your philanthropic neighbours to help."

With the reward money, the sum collected for Prakasam in Johannesburg amounted to Rs. 2,090. Members of the Rotary Club of Madras also made contributions. Prakasam was admitted to a good school in Madras and his education was monitored and funded by the Rotary Charitable Trust. Prakasam proved to be a good student who went on to complete his B.A. and B.Ed degrees and joined the Vellaiyan Chettiar High School, Tiruvotriyur, as junior teacher. It was a happy ending to a story of cooperation between clubs in different countries.

It turned out that Prakasam, an eighth standard student, belonged to a poor family of fisherfolk and wanted financial help to study further. T.F.C. Tours publicised Prakasam's story in its newsletter and invited readers to each contribute 50 cents towards an education fund for Prakasam. To their amazement, 60 rand poured

in. In those days, one rand was equal to Rs. 10.50. The chairman of T.F.C. added 100 rand to this amount and contacted the Rotary Club of Johannesburg to take the matter further.

On March 2, 1970, the Rotary
Club of Johannesburg wrote to the
President of the Rotary Club of
Madras requesting help in verifying
Prakasam's story. Rtns. A.K.
Sivaramakrishnan, S. Subramaniam,
and S.M. Diaz enlisted the help of
the Rotary clubs of Nagercoil and
Madurai and followed every lead. As
DIG of Police, Tamil Nadu, Diaz used
his manpower to track down the
boy and discovered that
Prakasam's story was true.

Recently, that is about 6 years ago, we touched base with Prakasam and had invited him over to our meeting and had recognized and honoured him too.

He is now a retired teacher, but still does his bit for the School.

We had an opportunity to meet the lovely children who were recovering post BMT, many of whom had blood or immunity disorders. We learnt that once BMT was successfully carried out, these children would now go on to lead normal lives.

It was awe-inspiring to hear the passion in Dr.Aruna's voice as she laid out plans for improvement and expansion at the Government hospital and we promised to help in any way we could, to further this cause.
