

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

The RYLA ambassador this year was a young twenty two year old, political science student of St. joseph's college, who has made the hills proud by scaling and summiting Mt. Everest as an NCC cadet in a ten member contingent.

Pratima was a picture of composure and humility, someone who perhaps had matured way beyond her years, in that life-defining moment yet child like and honest, when she shared her story of courage, fortitude and success with the Rylarians, straight from her heart, in a tete-a-tete with Rtn. Sunirmal Chakravarthi.

She gave us an insight on her astounding climb-

"My remarkable journey began with a highly competitive selection process. From 17 lakh NCC cadets across India, only 250 were shortlisted for Delhi, where the focus was not just on physical fitness, but also on mental resilience, intellect, and discipline. After rigorous tests, only 36 cadets were selected, and further training in the harsh conditions of Siachen Glacier narrowed it down to just ten cadets—five boys and five girls—chosen to represent NCC and India for the Mount Everest Expedition.

Being among the shortlisted cadets was a life-changing moment, filled with honor and responsibility. It was not just about climbing a peak, but about carrying the pride of the NCC and the spirit of our nation. The training was relentless—physical workouts, technical mountaineering, survival skills, and mental conditioning in extreme cold and unforgiving terrain.

The journey taught me discipline, leadership it. My journey to the Mount Everest was a life time experience."

This is perhaps just the beginning of a journey that she has embarked on that will bring accolades not just for herself but also to the nation and to the place she belongs to.
