# 21ST AUGUST, SUNDAY CONTROL CONTROL FIGHT CANCER TOGETHER.

"Your are braver than you believe; stronger than you seem; smarter than you think and twice as awesome as you had ever imagined " -- this is a quote that seems most appropriate when we think of our RIP Rtn Jennifer Jones. (We have borrowed the story of the traumatic period she endured from rotary.org)

In 2009, when RIP Rtn Jennifer Jones was diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 42, her days turned to chemotherapy and radiation. She got the diagnosis in the fall, and she had been asked to speak at the International Assembly, the training for incoming District Governors-Elect, in January 2010. Then RI President-Elect Ray Klinginsmith encouraged her to come if she was able. In consultation with her oncologist, she decided to attend. "The Sunday before, I lost all of my hair," she says. "I showed up at the event in a wig."

Some technical issues interrupted her speech, but it still made an impact, most of all on her. "At one of the lowest points in my life, someone didn't count me out," she says, tearing up. "It was just such a message that I needed at that point in time. That I had value, that I could contribute and participate. He gave me hope at a time when you think that maybe hope isn't what you're going to get."

RIP Rtn Jennifer Jones went through eight rounds of chemo and 21 rounds of radiation. Her employees stepped up to keep her business running as she stepped back. That too proved pivotal. When her health improved and she prepared to re-engage with her work, she looked at what her team had accomplished. "I sat back and thought about it," she says. "If I go back in as I was, I'm going to rob them of the leadership growth they would have had." She decided to pass the day-to-day operations of the company to her team so she could pursue Rotary almost full time.

"I wouldn't orchestrate having cancer again," she says, "but I can definitely say I wouldn't be sitting here where I am today if all of these things hadn't happened."

It was this motivational story of exemplary strength and courage and the fact that she is a true representative of sucessful, brave and brilliant women in this world, that inspired RI District 3011 to organise an All Women's Cycle Rally to spread awareness about all types of Cancer including Breast Cancer and Cervical Cancer. The event underpins Rotary's commitment to serve the underprivileged and it addresses the Focus Area of Disease Prevention and Treatment. The main purpose of the Rally was to Spread Awareness about Cancer. by organising a Cycle Rally for Women on 21 August 2022. The Rally, that was organised by RI District 3011 under the leadership of District Governor Rtn Ashok Kantoor, Assistant Governor Rtn Narender Kumar Lamba, Public Image Chair Rtn Sarika Yadav, and Dr Gauri Kapoor, the MD of Rajiv Gandhi Cancer Hospital, was a unique concept and the first of its kind undertaken by RI District 3011.









Honour was DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor, who dedicated the event to breakfast followed the exciting event. #### DISTRICT MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT SEMINAR

Saturday 27th August 2022, PHD House, New Delhi.

Meeting was called to order by DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor, who extended a very warm welcome to the Chief Guest, PDG Rtn Gurjeet Singh Sekhon, Guest of Honour Mr. Daman Baweja, District Membership Chair PDG Rtn Rajesh Batra, Membership Advisor PDG Rtn Vinay Bhatia, PDG Rtn N Subramanian, PDG Rtn Sanjiv Rai Mehra, PDG Rtn Damanjit Singh, PDG Rtn Suresh Bhasin, DGE Rtn Jeetender Gupta and Dr. Deepti Gupta all other Rotarians and Guests. He said the Membership Development Seminar is very important for success of Rotary. Unless there is Membership Growth, the organisation cannot grow. The Growth in Membership and Retention of Members are both very important.

A Video Clip of R I President Rtn Jennifer Jones on Membership Growth was played for the information of the audience in which she had emphasised on the Importance of Membership Development and Membership Engagement. She also stressed on Clubs to conduct Exit Surveys and Interviews to know why members leave Rotary. Imagine the impact that new members can make to Rotary since they can offer opportunities for doing Service Projects for the welfare of communities to provide comfort and care to people of vulnerable sections of society.

DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor reiterated that we should Increase Membership in our Clubs of people in the age group of around 40 to 50 years. We should also increase Membership of Women in our Clubs. We should invite non-members to Club Projects to enable them to know what Rotary is doing which may possibly attract them to join Rotary.

I am sure with the District Membership Team led by PDG Rtn Rajesh Batra, we will certainly achieve our goal of Membership Growth.

PDG Rtn Rajesh Batra, Membership Chair said, Membership Attraction is the responsibility of all members whole year round and not only in August. You all are the assets of Rotary, he said. He thanked everyone for the excellent Rotary Activities and Projects that they have been doing through Rotary.

He said the Exit Survey should be done before the members leave Rotary to know why they are leaving. New members should be properly looked after at the Club Meetings, Club Projects and Fellowship Programmes. Many of us do not propose a new member. In a survey by Rotary International, it was observed that only 8% members of Rotary had proposed new members. We can propose members in our own Club or even in another Club. Rotary is a People's Organisation. It is the responsibility of each and every Club and all members to increase Membership in Rotary. Rotary gives you much more than what you have given to Rotary. We need young people in Rotary. All Clubs need to do SWOT Analysis.

We had a total of 1.2 million members in Rotary Worldwide as on 1st

July 2022. India h a d 1 6 5 1 7 7 members with 4475 Rotary Clubs. Today as on 24th August we in India have 171,851 members with 4521 Clubs. We are Number Two in the World both in Membership, as a I s o in Contributions to



TRF. In Membership the Top Five Countries are: USA, India, Japan, Korea and Germany. Three Asian Nations are in top five. We are number two in the world in Women Membership in Rotary with 25,524 Women Rotarians from India.

In our own District 3011, we have 119 Rotary Clubs with a total membership of 4,532 Rotarians as on 16th August 2022 with Rotary Club of Rohtak Scholars having the highest number of 250 members followed by Rotary Club of Rohtak with 116 members, Rotary Club of Gurgaon with 100 members, Rotary Club of Delhi South End with 96 members and Rotary Club of Delhi Rajdhani with 87 members.

Two more Clubs were chartered in the interim period and there were 121 Clubs with 4,521 members as on 17th August. However, one more Club, RCD Resources has been chartered recently in the interim period with number going upto 122 Clubs. Rotary Club of Gurgaon Green has been chartered this morning and the number of Clubs as on today (27th August) has gone upto 123 Clubs.

PDG Rtn Gurjeet Singh Sekhon, Chief Guest and Keynote Speaker speaking on strengthening existing Membership said that District 3011 is one of the leading and finest Districts in India. Rotary has suffered in Membership Growth since members do not follow proper guidelines and procedures and protocols.

R.I. District 3011 has 6 Clubs with less than 10 members which is a very sad state of affairs. There are 42 Clubs with less than 20 members which is also very deplorable.

He said we should try to know why members leave Rotary Clubs. Do an Exit survey. It is observed that 40% members leave Rotary in their very first year of Rotary membership. The reasons could vary from lack of Rotary knowledge or poor orientation and no proper or poor induction.

We should assign a mentor to new members. We should treat our Club as our family and let us look outside and know what the community wants from Rotary Membership. We should reinvent our













Club Meetings. We should have more flexibility and diversity. We should listen more and speak less. We should implement recommendations and act on same. We should engage and involve our Club members. Be a leader and be ready to accept criticism. We should recognise and appreciate members for their work and participation. Genuine Nurturing of Members is the only option to retain their membership.

Mr Daman Baweja from RISAO Speaking on Resources on Membership Development said Membership Development, Retention, Extention and Assimilation are all very important for Membership Growth in any Club.

It has been noted that 67.96% members of our District 3011 are not yet registered on my rotary. Only 32.04% are registered on my rotary which is less than one-third membership of the District. He requested all Clubs to register with rotary.org.

New Members, he said, should be welcomed at the Club with Orientation Guide, New Members Kit and Rotary Membership Certificate. All these tools are available online on my rotary. Learning Centre is the tool for all information on Rotary Membership. You should do a Club Health Check Up periodically and go through the report to know your Club's weaknesses and strengths.

If you have less members, you can start a Satellite Club with 8 members and became a regular Rotary Club, when your membership increases to more than 20.

You should have clarity on financial aspects of the Club and inform the prospective members the financial obligations. Be transparent on Club flexibility options. You should have Leadership Development Goals and develop future leaderships in the Club and improve Membership Retention.

Develop an Action Plan to be a successful Club. Connect with each other for doing good work. Encourage Members to get involved in Club Activities and Projects. Do Exit Survey. Recognise and Appreciate Members for their dedication and engagement.

Membership Growth should be Club's priority. Rotary is today more inclined to diverse activities. Young members bring perspectives. Rotary is about Membership and Fellowship. So we should celebrate Rotary.

Members Contact Information including Email Addresses and Mobile Numbers should be completed and updated regularly and data should be uploaded on Rotary.org at the earliest.

After signing the MoU, Mr Pradeep Multani said Rotary is a fantastic organisation. He said I am a former Rotarian and a former Rotaracter. Rotary has taught me how to deal with people. How to deal with your seniors as also your juniors. We have so many things in common between Rotary and PHD. We are all here because of net working. Rotary is a very purposeful body. Both Rotary and PHD are best organisations. Rotary taught me how to keep relationships. Rotary is our family. Anything we can do together will be a blessing not only for all of us but also for the community at large.

A panel discussion followed which was moderated by District

Membership Chair PDG Rtn Rajesh Batra. Questions were posed by several Presidents and Past Presidents which were satisfyingly answered by the eminent panelists -- PDG Rtn Gurjeet Singh Sekhon, Membership Advisor PDG Rtn Vinay Bhatia, Mr Daman Baweja, and DG Ashok Kantoor.

DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor in his closing remarks said this has been a very successful and an excellent Seminar. The Mantra for Membership Retention is INVOLVE, INVOLVE AND INVOLVE all members especially new members. He assured everyone that we will try our level best to ensure least number of members exit Rotary this year with Minimum Loss and Maximum Growth.

Mementos were presented to Chief Guest PDG Rtn Gurjeet Singh Sekhon and Mr Daman Baweja as a token of appreciation and gratitude.

Rotary Club of Delhi Central were the Main Host of this very important event. The Co-Hosts were RC Delhi Central Next, RC Delhi infinity, RC Faridabad Greater, RC Faridabad Heritage, RC Gurgaon Civil Lines and they were duly appreciated and recognised by DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor

DS Rtn Sanjiv Jawahar proposing Vote of Thanks and expression of gratitude said it was a marvellous Membership Seminar. 



# Rotary Blood Centre - It's all about life

Rotary Clubs in Delhi set up a Voluntary Blood Centre in 2002 at voluntary blood donors, 57, Tughlakabad Institutional Area New Delhi, purely as a public service to provide safe blood to people in life threatening situations. Rotary Blood Centre collects over 25000 Units of Blood from non-remunerative voluntary donors at over 400 Blood Donation Camps organized at Colleges, Corporate Offices, Religious Gatherings and Residential Areas and issues over 30,000 Units of Blood/components every year to those in need. they are the pioneer for Issuing Blood on 'No-Replacement' Basis.

Blood is processed into various components like Red cells, Plasma, Platelets, Cryoprecipitate.and tested for HIV, Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, VDRL and Malaria by the most sensitive kits and state-of-the-art equipments. Few additional tests are done as HBcAb, Antibody screening, Rh Phenotying and NAT for HIV, HBV and HCV, to ensure extra safety of blood. We make extra efforts to provide safe and quality blood to patients. After blood donation each donor gets a Donor Card and a Certificate besides refreshment and a Souvenir. The Card issued is valid for one year. After testing of the blood is over, the test results are sent to every donor individually within 15 days of blood donation.

Quality of processes, products and people are the cornerstones upon which the Rotary Blood Centre, New Delhi is built.

The Blood Centre provides safe and good quality blood components to the patients. It has state-of-the-art-equipment to cater to the requirement of patients who require blood and is open all 365 days.

Rotary Blood Centre also runs Community Based Projects like Anemia Screening and Thalassemia Screening. Besides this, it also provides Free Blood to registered Thalassemic Patients which is part of their treatment.

Thalassemia Transfusion Centre is also coming up soon which is going to be a Day Care Centre where blood will be transfused to these patients at very nominal charges.

A well organised Blood Centre is a vital component of any Health Care Delivery System. An integrated strategy for Blood Safety is required for elimination of transfusion transmitted infections and availability of safe blood to the people. The main components of an integrated strategy include collection of blood only from

screening for all Transfusion Transmissible Infections (TTIs) and then using the blood rationally for patients. To achieve this, they do the following;

1. Promotion of voluntary **Blood Donation.** 

The Centre organises Awareness Programmes for donor information, education, motivation, recruitment and retention of Blood Donors. Voluntary Blood Donors are the



cornerstone of a safe and adequate supply of blood and blood products. The safest blood donors are voluntary, nonremunerated, repeat blood donors from low risk populations

2. Collection and Processing of Blood.

To supply the safest possible blood or blood components to all the needy patients we are collecting blood only from Voluntary Donors mostly in Outdoor Camps organised by Institutions, Factories, Offices, Colleges, Market Place etc.

3. Issue of Blood.

The Processed Blood is issued to patients without taking Replacement Donation and Processing Fee is charged as laid down by State Blood Transfusion council. The blood is issued free of cost to poor patients with BPL card, Thalassemic patients, HIV patients and patients with other blood disorders.

At Rotary Blood Centre, efficiency, effectiveness, timeliness and availability are important dimensions of quality care, performance, and management of services rendered.

It is believed that systems, not people, are the more frequent causes of problems and therefore, integrated, collaborative multidisciplinary approaches to improve processes are encouraged at all levels.







The recent rise in Polio cases in Mozambique, Pakistan, Malawi and Afghanistan are a matter of grave concern. The numbers this year till now are 20 compared to 6 cases last year, 15 of these being in Pakistan. Five cases have been detected in Mozambique. The discovery of dreaded polio virus in sewage sample in the UK and Jerusalem while indicative of strong monitoring and surveillance, the recent case report of Polio in New York after so many years should be viewed with concern about emergence of this disease in other parts of the world and reinforce the need of continuing our commitment to end Polio.

What we started 35 years ago cannot be left unfinished. Our promise of a Polio Free World must be honoured.

Let us look back at some of the significant milestones in our attempt to eradicate polio. In 1979 while reading about the eradication of smallpox on a flight home from Philippines, Past RI President Clem Renauf wondered if it was possible to address a global disease. His discussions with John Sever, District Governor in Maryland USA and Chief of Infectious Diseases at US National Institute of Health led to Initiation of Polio Eradication as a worldwide Rotary Programme under the Health, Hunger and Humanities (3-H) Grant. This was approved by RI Board in 1979 and funds to the tune of seven million dollars were raised to start Polio Immunization Project in Philippines.

In a recent address to Rotary, Dr.Harshvardhan, Former Minister of health and Architect of the Polio Programme in India described the significant role of Rotary at every step of Polio Eradication in a very lucid manner. Rotary's role in initiating a Global Partnership, Involvement of Volunteers in the NID and Contribution of The Rotary Foundation have helped the governments to save over 19 million people who would have otherwise been paralysed and over 1.4 million who would have been dead.

Rotary International in partnership with UNICEF has been a leading partner in Global Polio Eradication Initiative, the First Initiative which envisioned Polio Eradication through Mass Immunization. Rotary contributed over 2 billion dollars (15800 crores) and countless volunteer hours to immunise over 3 billion Children from 120 countries and promoted several governments to contribute over 10 billion dollars (79000 crores) towards Polio Eradication. More than 1 million Rotarians have contributed their time and personal resources towards Polio Eradication. Our Focus Areas have been building awareness, advocacy, fund raising and engagement of volunteers.

Let us understand the value of what Rotary and the global health systems have achieved. Before the availability of the Vaccines, apart from the Atom Bomb, the biggest fear in the US was Polio. In 1952, 3145 people died of Polio and 21269 suffered some kind of paralysis in the US alone.

At the start of Rotary, when it initiated GLOBAL POLIO ERADICATION INITIATIVE in 1988, over 350000 Children in 125 countries became paralysed every year due to Polio. This dropped to 26 cases in 3 countries in 2015.

1938: Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was set up, which later was renamed the MARCH OF DIMES and provided funding for treatment of many

1955: The Salk Vaccine (IPV) Trial involving 1.8 million Children commenced in the USA

1978: Start of Polio Vaccination in India

1988: Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Rotary in partnership with WHO, UNICEF and CDC formed the largest Private Public Partnership in Health.

1988: India committed to the World Health Assembly Resolution on Polio Eradication

1995: National Immunisation Day(NID) and Sub National Immunisation Day which ensured immunisation of over 177 million Children on NID and 77 million Children on SNID. This is perhaps the largest immunisation programme involving over 2.4 million workers.

1997: Acute Flaccid Paralysis (AFP) Surveillance 1999: Wild Polio Virus 2 eliminated from India Jan 2011: Last reported case of Polio in India



Each class is of 32 Trainees and the Centre trains about 500 underprivileged youth every year absolutely free of cost and also provide them an employment opportunity in a recognized and established factory / hotel.




