# MESSAGE

**Rtn. JENNIFER JONES** President 2022-23 Rotary International

In August, I was proud to visit Pakistan and highlight Rotary's top goal, eradicating polio. It was also a tremendous opportunity to spotlight female health workers who are playing a critical role in protecting children from this vaccine-preventable disease.

This month, as we celebrate World Polio Day, we are shining a spotlight on our more than 30year effort to lead the first global polio eradication campaign and our success in forming partnerships capable of completing this massive goal. We all know that this is one of the most ambitious global health initiatives in history and that we've reduced polio cases by more than 99.9 percent worldwide.

Pakistan is one of only two countries in the world where wild poliovirus remains endemic. (The other is neighboring Afghanistan.) I was able to witness and take part in vaccination campaigns in Pakistan, and soon after I left, a monumental nationwide immunization campaign took place, focused on 43 million children under the age of 5. I saw the incredible work of Rotary members on the ground. More than 60 percent of vaccinators in Pakistan are women, and they are doing a remarkable job building trust and convincing mothers to vaccinate their children.

Seeing it all firsthand, I know that the will exists across the Rotary world to end polio, and I'm confident that we have the strategy. The Pakistani media has been very supportive of our efforts as well, and this is making a difference. This month, a new global pledging moment at the World Health Summit in Berlin promises to pull together more resources to fund these time-sensitive eradication efforts. Now it is up to us to do our part and raise \$50 million this year to earn the full 2-to-1 match from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

There's great cause for optimism on the polio front — but also some staggering new events that have further raised the stakes. Over the past few months, new polio outbreaks have occurred in Israel, the United Kingdom and, most recently, in the New York City area. These stories are frightening, but in every case, the response is clear — vaccines work, and if polio is spreading, we need to make sure the most at-risk people have kept their vaccinations up to date.

Most importantly, we need to eradicate this virus now. If polio exists anywhere, it can spread everywhere. What I saw in Pakistan convinced me that we can and must finish the job, but it will only happen if we remain committed to a strategy that's working and back it with all necessary resources.

Through our commitment, generosity, and sheer determination, we will #EndPolio.

We also released the District Directory on this significantly important occasion.

It all started with pious and religious thoughts around the 'navratras' which was like an extension of our endeavour to attain peace and conflict resolution and ended with the festival of lights –Diwali, which augured the beginning of renewed vigour and the will to pursue our targets and achieving our goals.

I am really happy to see the large numbers of attendance at every event that has been conducted in the District so far. Seminars that cover relevant topics like the recent one on Literacy are important for us because they impart knowledge and they also reinforce our commitment to delivering an outstanding learning experience and help us in transforming lives and economies. The information delivered in these sessions also act as a base for the development of strategic plans, business engagement activity and diversified projects.

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Second of October is the birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, whose dream was a Leprosy Free India. World Polio Day falls on 24th October which this year coincided with Diwali festival celebrations. To commemorate Mahatma Gandhi on his Anniversary and to celebrate the world polio day, Rotary International District 3011 conducted a Mega End Polio and Leprosy Cycle Rally to spread awareness about Leprosy and Polio. The rally of about 21 kms, with 10 pit-stops being manned by various Rotary Clubs, started and culminated at Delhi Public School, RK Puram.

The lead clubs of this rally were Rotary Clubs of Delhi South and Regency Next. The rally was made possible by our association with Delhi Fellowship for Cycling to Serve and Delhi Public School.

It has been over a decade since the last case was detected in 2011 and 8 years to India being declared Polio-free by World Health Organization in 2014. The number of wild polio cases for 2022 as of Sept. 21, 2022 is 27. There were 2 in Afghanistan, 19 in Pakistan, and 6 in Mozambique. Rotary members along with its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) have been at the center of the worldwide effort to eradicate Polio for more than three decades.

Many believe that leprosy is a disease of the past and have no idea of its continued prevalence, spread and the suffering it causes. Leprosy is one of the oldest known, chronic infectious disease, if not treated timely, leads to deformity and disabilities. Globally, there were 1,27,558 new leprosy cases detected in 2020-21, out of which approximately 60 per cent of cases account from India. Ignorance around leprosy has been the biggest challenge in systemic reduction of this disease to insignificant levels. Though Leprosy is curable and becomes non-communicable with just a few doses of MDT, the taboos and myths around the spread and perceived incurability of the disease exacerbates the situation making the plight of the leprosy patients deplorable. Leprosy patients today are not just battling with diagnosis and treatment but fighting for their right to dignified living. Most are living as outcastes in isolation in approximately 750 leprosy colonies in India, where they become a no-name and their existence too is not acknowledged.

To develop understanding among the changemakers of tomorrow, the goal of this rally was to create awareness among them from an early age, prevent prejudice and spread awareness regarding both these diseases.

At about 6 am on Sunday,2nd October, the cyclists, almost 350 of them started arriving at the Delhi Public School, RK Puram which was beautifully decorated with posters of Polio and Leprosy Awareness. They registered their names, collected their T-shits with messaging on Polio and Leprosy awareness. There was a riot of colours where The DPS teachers in their colourful Saris and other attires, School children in their uniforms and Rotarians and families in their Sunday-Best, manned various stalls for registration, refreshments, ushering the participants and resolving their various queries.

Then started the warm up exercises with organized Zumba dancing, led by three young professionals,where many Rotarians and their family members also joined in to the beats of foot-tapping music. The cyclists were briefed about the rules, the route and other issues by President Delhi Fellowship of Cycling to Serve, Assistant Governor Rtn NK Lamba. At the start point manned by Clubs under AG Rtn Ashcharya Khanna, the rally was flagged-off with great fanfare by DG Rtn Ashck Kantoor.

The second pit-stop was the Leprosy Colony at RK Puram where enthusiastic Rotarians and Partners and other clubs of the Zone, along with Leprosy affected colony residents, welcomed the cyclists with smiles, water, 'nimbupani', fruits, etc. Ten such pit-stops were manned across the route by the Rotarians and their families to greet the cyclists, to reenergize them and to spread awareness about Polio and Leprosy!

When asked "How was the Josh", the cyclists shouted "High" and moved on to cycle for these great causes.

The rally culminated at the Delhi Public School RK Puram where the Cyclists were welcomed with Dhol and music, fruits and refreshment. The Cyclists had smiles on their faces and were proud to spread awareness about these two diseases, even though it meant waking up early on a Sunday morning!

The closing ceremony, conducted by Rtn Pradeep Bahri the District Leprosy Mission Chair, had the District Governor, the Vice Chairman NDMC, Director of Education, eminent guests like Principal Delhi Public School RK Puram, Ms Padma Srinivasan along with teachers and children of the school, whole heatedly supported the Rally. Other dignitaries present were Ms Ritu Choudhary, State Leprosy Officer, PDG RtnDeepak Kapur Rotary's National Polio Plus Chair and District Advisor Leprosy, EPNC PDG Dr. N Subramanian, District Advisor Polio, Assistant Governor Rtn. N.K.Lamba, Rtn Pradeep Bahri, District Leprosy Mission Chair and representatives from our various partners like LEPRA and ACRE.





Speaking at the event, RI District 3011 Governor, Rtn Ashok Kantoor said, "As a part of this initiative, Rotary members in today's Rally are contributing about Rs. 20 Lakhs to support our fight against Polio across the world. Rotary has been a key driving force, working for polio elimination across the world. Rotary's global network, infrastructure and learnings from polio can be utilized for leprosy control and elimination. We have realized that there is a lot of misinformation regarding leprosy, particularly with respect to its perceived incurability, which results in the exclusion of patients from organized society, making their plight even more deplorable. It is of immense importance that the right information reaches the public. To develop this understanding among the changemakers of tomorrow, create awareness among them from an early age and prevent prejudice our endeavor today was to spread awareness regarding both these diseases".

Addressing the participants, PDG Rtn Deepak Kapur, Chairman Rotary International's National PolioPlus Committee, said, "The re-emergence of polio in these places highlights the importance of vaccination as the only form of protection against Polio and many other diseases. It draws attention to the work needed to encourage people to get vaccinated at a time when vaccination rates are dropping in some communities. And it reinforces the fact that Polio anywhere is a threat globally, which underscores the importance of the End Polio Now campaign.

EPNC (Zone 4) PDG Rtn Dr. N. Subramanian addressed the audience and said "Rotary World President Rtn Jennifer Jones recently committed an additional USD 150 million to polio initiatives in New York. In this background, the cycle rally to draw our focus to polio and leprosy eradication and to commemorate World Polio Day, which has over 350 cyclists riding nearly 21 kms through several parts of the city, is ample evidence of our commitment to polio eradication. It is heartening to see USD 25,000 being collected within an hour with commitment for much larger contributions from several members at the event "

Shri Satish Upadhaya, Vice Chairman NDMC said, "I laud the work being done by the Rotary in fighting Polio and now in creating awareness around leprosy. Only with this knowledge will the ostracization of patients end, allowing them to live a life of dignity and security. The work being done by Rotary and its partners in knowledge dissemination is vital and is aligned with the Governments mission of eliminating Leprosy from India by 2030. I am sure that going forward, this program will continue to grow and positively impact Leprosy patients, their families and the larger community." He pledged NDMC's commitment to join hands with Rotary in their battle against Leprosy.

Congratulating the district, Director of Education Himanshu Gupta, "It's a privilege and an honour to be a part of this Rally today, and I congratulate Rotary for tackling these issues of national importance."

The event ended by handing over the Finisher Plaques to all the cyclist and mementos to the dignitaries and partners of Rotary, who are helping us in this noble cause of eradication Polio and Leprosy. The District is also grateful to the hosts of the mega event -Rotary Club of Delhi South and Rotary Club of Delhi Regency Next, the Presidents of the two host clubs -Rtn Lalit Sawhney and Rtn Sagar Suri, District Leprosy Mission Chair Rtn Pradeep Bahri and AG Rtn N.K. Lamba for organizing one of the best cycle rallies the District has ever seen.













































The District Literacy Seminar, organised and hosted by Rotary Club of New Delhi was held on Saturday 29th October, 2022 at India Habitat Centre, New Delhi in the august presence of Chief Guest, Dr. Pankaj Arora Dean Education, University of Delhi and Guest of Honour, PRID Rtn Kamal Sanghvi, who had come all the way from Kolkata to address members of our District on the most important subject of Literacy, which is very close to his heart.

MoC, Rtn Ruchi Rai extended a very warm and cordial welcome to all present. DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor called the Literacy Seminar meeting to order and in his opening address welcomed each one present at this very important District Seminar on Literacy. He said this year the District has appointed PDG Rtn Ramesh Chander as DEI Chair for three years and he will be taking forward the implementation of plans on this very important subject. DLCC Rtn Pran Mehta and his District Literacy Team have planned a very fruitful and informative programme for this Seminar for the benefit of all present at the event.

PDG Rtn Ramesh Chander, DEI Chair talking about Diversity, Equity and Inclusivity said, DEI is absolutely a new concept and subject in the District. In Rotary, there is diversity in membership all over the world. R I Board had constituted a Diversity Task Force to create and form DEI policy to celebrate Diversity in Rotary. DEI is now going to be a part of R I Bylaws. Rotary encompasses all religions, race, gender and ethnicity. All individuals should be respected equally in Rotary. Diversity also helps in effective communication and cohesiveness of members. There is a need to value each and every person individually. Diversity is a fact and inclusivity is a behaviour. Inclusivity promotes a sense of belonging. He said that we should encourage our Club members to speak and we should create an atmosphere where all are welcomed. Equity is being fair and impartial. Equity means every one has access to everything. Experience of fairness is critically important in DEI.

PDG Rtn Sanjay Khanna speaking on Glimpses of Progress So Far in Literacy programmes said that in 2013, Rotarians started uplifting the standard of education in Municipal Schools, when they met the Director of Education, Delhi, in that year. He appreciated Rtn Pran Mehta's passionate commitment to the Literacy programme and education, specially of children coming from underprivileged segments of society. He said the District Literacy Team, which is a very well coordinated team, are all working very meticulously. So far the District has already adopted 115 Municipal Primary Schools by 67 Rotary Clubs in R.I District 3011. More Clubs are in the pipeline and are likely to adopt more schools in coming months. Vocational activities are also being taught to children of Municipal Primary Schools, like dancing, yoga and innovative creativities.

Rtn Pran Mehta, DLCC started with a film showcasing what all has been done so far in the last 4 months towards Literacy promotion programmes. He also added that we can do our best for these young children who are the foundation of our tomorrow's leadership. The government is doing a lot for them but clearly need our support in many areas to give them a better future. There are many children who are found with Vitamin D deficiency. Children should be exposed to Sunlight between 10.30 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. for one hour during summer months. He also informed about various institutions, organisations, NGOs which are collaborating with Rotary in Literacy promotion programmes and also health and nutrition issues of children. He further informed that Reliance group of Companies will provide 1,000 uniforms for girl students of Municipal Primary Schools and a company in Japan will provide 200 sets of High quality TVs with smart Boards at cost price.

To break the monotony of the speeches, a mesmerising dance performance was given by children from Sarvam Foundation followed by demonstration of Yoga exercises by little children who are future leaders of our nation.

(Retd) Maj General Rtn Y K Kapoor talking on importance of Sports and Games in Schools, said that we have to encourage team playing and inculcate team spirit. Children enjoy playing different sorts of sport and games and it helps in building their confidence. He also said that we need to give children some incentive to go to school. Parents should give some time to go to the school and participate with children in their fun activities. Rotarians should also find time to go to Municipal Primary Schools sometime and spend some time with the children.

Rtn Arun Gupta, President of Rotary Club of Delhi South East speaking on E-learning said -encouraging E-learning in schools is upgrading the technology in education. RCD South East has provided 300 Tablets to a school in Firozabad which has opened a new horizon in education. The students are now able to attend online classes and gain a lot of information on the Tablets provided by Rotary. The academically weaker students have become bright and active thanks to E-learning with these Tablets.



PRID Rtn Kamal Sanghvi, Guest of Honour, in his highly motivational and inspiring address said, to eradicate illiteracy is not an easy job. He congratulated all those who were present at the Seminar and urged them to make India fully literate. It is time to gear up and take charge, he said, but he added that we can't do anything alone and can only be done through partnerships. He said that Covid has changed our way of working and methodology. Digitalisation was under way but it got fast tracked during Covid. The government has approached Rotary to develop a E-learning program for students during Covid. Thirteen States have already signed Agreements for developing software for education of children. However the biggest gap in eradication of illiteracy is the Adults illiterate population. Twenty five crore people are illiterate in India. We have a huge gap between children illiteracy and adult Literacy that needs to be filled. More the Literacy, more are developments.

With Rs 250 for two books, and 1 hour a day for 25 days, one can make an adult illiterate or functional literate. He urged everyone to do it themselves. He told everyone that they can become a teacher too.

He continued with his inspirational address and said that the children of our country are our Nation Builders. One can't leave everything on the Government. Every President should convert one Government Municipal Primary school into a Happy School. Each Club President is requested to take this as their Club project of creating at least one Happy School. Asha Kiran programme is to provide Girl Child an opportunity to change their own life and also of their family. He wished everyone luck in achieving their mission of eradicating illiteracy and making India totally literate.

Dr. Pankaj Arora, Chief Guest and Dean Education, University of Delhi, explaining the salient features of National Education Policy 2020 said, a new India is being formed in classrooms. He said that we are fortunate that at University level we work with organised sector of students. Public School system came into being in 1980s. He said diversity is the strength of our community. The new National Education Policy 2020 is helping in producing good human beings. Scientific temperament and creative imagination is very important in young children of today.

Rotary's mandate is not different from NEP. Indian knowledge system needs to be presented with scientific dimensions and in accordance with the needs of the 21st Century.



In 1968, the first Education policy came when Computers were introduced in India. 1986 policy was scientific based. Covid has taught us that we can have digital education in online classes. Almost 70% of students enrolled in Delhi University are from outside Delhi and many would be looking at remote learning facilities in these unpredictable times.

Rotary, he said, can play a major role in promoting digital online education, multilingual and developing professional skills with skill enhancement courses. Rotary can provide vocational skills to students. The new NEP is providing autonomy to students, teachers and institutions. Policy is also proposing a new integrated teacher training and education programme. NEP gives importance to early childhood care and education to provide better nutrition, health, education and entertainment in young children. Even Adults and Senior Citizens and elderly people can update their knowledge with current competency.

After this a Panel discussion moderated by Rtn Ravindra Gautam was held with eminent Faculty, comprising of Chief Guest Dr Pankaj Arora, Guest of Honour PRID Rtn Kamal Sanghvi, DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor, PDG Rtn Ramesh Chander, PDG Rtn Sanjay Khanna and DLCC Rtn Pran Mehta.

DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor in his closing remarks said it was a very interesting and informative programme at this Literacy Seminar. He said that the presentations by eminent speakers were highly enriching, enlightening, very informative and it was obviously enjoyed by everyone in the audience, judging by the thunderous applause they received. He also added that he was very happy to see the involvement of Rotaractors in the organising team.

DG presented Mementos to Chief Guest, Dr Pankaj Arora; Guest of Honour PRID Rtn Kamal Sanghvi and Rtn Dr Madhumati Singh, President of Host Club for organising this very successful Seminar.

Rtn Dr Madhumati Singh, President of Rotary Club of New Delhi proposing a Vote of Thanks expressed gratitude to the eminent speakers. DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor made a significant and important announcement that Rotary and Delhi University will work together in making India totally literate. He reiterated that programmes on Literacy done by Clubs will be evaluated at the end of March 2023 and the best three Clubs will be awarded Rs 1 lakh each which they will have to spend in improving the school and turning it into a Happy School.

DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor, on 1st October, inaugurated the second phase of "Ek Prayas- Rotary Skill Centre", an initiative of Rotary Club of Delhi Janak. The club has provided a technical training centre with eco friendly cutlery making machines & woven jute bags machines in a slum area Basti Vikas Kendra in Vikaspuri. The specially abled adults are trained at the Centre to work on these machines & are paid a stipend out of the proceeds from selling these products. It is also giving a job opportunity to the people in nearby slum areas who assist & guide these persons.

Last year the DG participated in the inauguration of the 1st phase of this project in Janakpuri & since then he has been promoting different products made by specially abled persons in the District Events like PETS & SETS.

#### LANDMARK PROJECTS PATH TO HARMONY – SHAURYA PACKAGING UNIT

#### Shaurya Packaging Unit - Skill Development Centre

Rotary Club of Faridabad Greater set up a packaging unit at Shaurya Centre for autistic young adults, Palwal for skill development. Packaging unit has machines to pack pulses grains etc. More information regarding the unit is detailed below.

The Packaging Unit was always a part of the Shaurya Foundation Trust (SFT) but it was not a full-fledged separate work unit. It was an essential part of Bakery, Painting, Stationery, Sous Chef, Holi, Diwali, Rakhi New Year and Christmas sales, million smile drive and many more such events. SFT realized that there was a huge potential and specific skill-set required in the packaging area and it was enhancing the existing skills of the trainees at all levels. SFT then decided, with the help of RCF Greater, to set up a separate unit with specifically designed processes and regular work. As a result the Packaging Unit is now honing the skillset of the trainees for various types of packaging work that covers a multitude of products.

The outcome of this mammoth project is that the Trainees have learnt to use different sorts of packaging machines, to complete deadlines as far as work is concerned, of working for extra hours if it meant completing targets on time, to work a team and support fellow-trainees, following a disciplined work culture, of being per leaders, the value of economic independence, skills to get a job anywhere in the packaging industry and more importantly to have a sense of belonging.

#### Shaurya Café - Vocational Training Center for Intellectually Challenged.

The core belief of the Shaurya Foundation revolves not only towards educating people with special needs but also preparing them to be self-sufficient for their future venture while strengthening them with life skills.

Rotary Club of Faridabad Tulips donated an amount of Rs 328500/- which helped in procuring 3 ACs, 1 deep freezer, 1 double door fridge, 1 display fridge, 1 coffee machine, 1 OTG, 3 Induction Cookers, 1 Griller and 1 Microwave. This helped in setting up a cafe at Palwal center, a great help in setting up a business where their trainees find employment and financial independence. Shaurya Cafe was formally Inaugurated on 9th October by DG Rtn Ashok Kantoor in the presence of PDG Vinay Bhatia, AG Rtn Priyanka Madaan, President Rtn Sonia Luthra, Shaurya Founders Ravi and Rani Gupta.



#### PERMANENT PROJECTS Rotary Divyang Kendra

Rotary Delhi Central Charitable Trust, set up by Rotary Club of Delhi Central has been in the service of humanity since 1983. Our first project was Rotary Central Eye Bank at Sir Ganga Ram Hospital in the year 1983-84 which is still going strong. In the year 1988 Rotary Divyang Kendra (RDK) was established, operating from its own building in Karkardooma Institutional Area, Delhi - 110092. It is an ISO-9001:2015 certified organisation. RDK has so far distributed 36993 Artificial Limbs Orthosis and Prosthesis aids costing crores of rupees, donated by individual philanthropists, Institutions and Corporates. RDK also runs its own State-ofthe-Art Physiotherapy centre to support the rehabilitation and well-being of the public at large. Saksham Divyang is the dream of RDK and members of the Rotary Club of Delhi Central, as Divyangs are unable to employ themselves gainfully because of restricted mobility, lack of accessibility and dependence on others. RDK is well supported by its Club members as being dedicated volunteers from different vocations and a large number them belong to Medical field, associated to various leading medical institutions of the city Your generous contributions and support shall enable RDK to donate the following to the needy and deserving persons from all strata of the society and allow them to live a life of dignity and honour.

1. New Generation Artificial Limbs - Updated from Jaipur foot to Pylon foot model with the help of donations for its development and further, using Rotary Global Grant, RDK has so far distributed 58 Pylon Foot since its launch in April 2022 - each costing Rs.20,000/-. With the encouraging response received, RDK shall be empowering hundreds of Divyangs annually with the new Generation Artificial Limbs, with a total financial budget of Rs 50 lacs annually.

2. New Generation Crutches - Initiated as a new development using CSR contribution from "Vehant" whereby 150 of them have been distributed since April 2022, each costing Rs.2,100/- per set. With the encouraging feedback received, RDK has decided to distribute 1000 New Generation Crutches, at a cost of about Rs.21 lakhs per annum.

3. Curing Clubfoot Deformities in Children - It was started using Rotary Global Grant, initially for 3 years from 2017-2020 and has now become another ongoing initiative where we are sponsoring 10 children every month for curing the clubfoot deformities in children upto 12 years of age with their treatment costing us anywhere between Rs.7,500/- to Rs.15,000/- per child, depending on the age and complexity of the deformity. Many more children need such support. RDK plans to help such children with an annual budget of Rs.20 lakhs.

4. Polio Reparative Surgeries - There are still many Polio affected persons, where multiple surgeries are required for correcting the deformities of the limbs, each costing about Rs.1.5 Lakhs. Currently we are supporting a few surgeries. RDK with an annual budget of Rs.20 Lakhs for these Reparative Surgeries can do much more for rehabilitating more such needy persons.

5. Gift of Life - Under this initiative RDK sponsors Heart Surgeries of children with an inherent defect (hole) in their heart, each costing about Rs.1.75 Lakhs. At present we are supporting 1-2 surgeries per surgery per month. RDK plans a budget of Rs.25 Lakhs for rehabilitating more such Children.

6. Physiotherapy - State of the art Physiotherapy Centre on the entire 1st floor has been dedicated to this service. Annually more than 12,000 physiotherapy sessions are provided by a dedicated team of Doctors and staff, which costs RDK about Rs.20 Lakhs per annum. 7. Electric Mobility Aid for Wheelchair bound Divyangs - The Kendra is receiving encouraging response for this mobility aid, which costs about Rs.1.25 Lakhs per unit and has huge potential to make the Divyang further saksham in becoming independent by enabling him/her to join the mainstream of Society. RDK has an annual plan for providing 10 such aids costing approximately Rs.15 lakhs.

RDK is well equipped with all amenities, facilities and staff along with 2 Medical Vans, one dedicated for Divyangs and another for 'Gift of Life' project to support its operations in the NCR.





Most of the beneficiaries for any of the above initiatives can be selected from the numerous patients coming to RDK everyday. To ensure proper support and services to the beneficiaries, Donor recipients and others concerned, a Mega Digital Platform - Saksham Divyang, will also be established to provide a holistic connect to all. A webinar related to Divyangs on Care, Career, Health, Motivational and Social Connect etc. by the concerned experts, will be planned once a week. Divyangs would be able to interact with the concerned experts through email or chat.

An individual can now pay towards Annual Fund / Polio Fund through online banking system from their personal bank account via DYNAMIC VIRTUAL ACCOUNT that will be specific to each individual.

- 1. This payment option mitigates the requirement of donor to share PAN/ Rotary ID, UTR details separately by way of email/letter/form:
- 2. Avoids delay due to (a) time taken by courier service in delivering the cheques and (2) time required for cheque clearance which is at the least 2 to 3 days.
- 3. The amount promptly gets credited into remitter's Rotary account
- 4. Auto-generation of receipt by Rotary's financial system in the name of remitters with their PAN number and Rotary ID.

To make contribution through DYNAMIC VIRTUAL ACCOUNT, the remitter needs to have net banking facility (both for login and transaction). Secondly, this facility is limited to Individual remitters where Remitter and Donor is same and can be used only after the remitter has Rotary ID.

To do this, following steps are required to be undertaken after logging to netbanking:




