

TRANSFORMING COMMUNITIES:

The vital role of women in Rotary's mission



HEN Rtn Stephanie A Urchick, of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, U.S began her journey as the President of Rotary International (RI) in July 2024, she had the distinction of being the second woman to be at the RI's helm of affairs in a span of three years. A member of Rotary since 1991, Urchick is well travelled and is active on numerous community boards and committees. Over the years as Rotary grew, its women power too picked up in numbers serving as a barometer to the world of the famed gender equality that exists within the organisation.

In 2022, when Rtn Jennifer Jones began her term as the first female President of RI (2022-2023), her election marked a historic milestone showing the commitment of Rotary to gender equality.

From struggling to be a part in the yesteryears, to being an integral part of the organisation's operations across the world, the women in Rotary contribute in various leadership roles and service initiatives from local community projects to global humanitarian efforts.

Pan to District 3141 where DG Rtn Chetan Desai has women power in sizeable numbers as part of his team. Given his commitment to strengthening gender equality within Rotary, it is no surprise that there are 62 women Presidents across 62 Clubs in the District.

In decades since RI opened its doors for women to be active participants, they have essayed leadership roles and showcased their potential and capability.


Despite women being a big part of Rotary now, it was not always so. Until May 4, 1987, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Rotary Clubs in the U.S. "may not exclude women from the membership on the basis of gender" it was an uphill battle for women to be a part of the Rotary, as members. By 1990, a



year after RI opened its doors wide for women, their numbers stood at 20,000 (see box).

Newsletter, The Rotarian, when writing on the Silver Jubilee Celebrations of Rotary (1905-1930), gave sizeable space to the impact of women in Rotary. "The change was long overdue in the opinion of many male U.S. Rotarians, but it stirred feelings ranging from sadness to rage for others, who viewed it as death knell to the masculine camaraderie they had enjoyed for more than eight decades", wrote The Rotarian.


Though women have been involved











in Rotary for several decades, their participation was officially allowed starting in 1989. Since then, numerous women Rotarians have served on the RI BOD bringing their expertise in business, education, health and public service to guide the organisation's strategic direction. Women Rotarians have played a crucial role in the global effort to end polio with several serving as ambassadors and volunteers for the Rotary's PolioPlus program.

A sizeable number of women

Rotarians are a part of Rotary's Peace Fellowship programs, which train leaders in conflict resolution and peace building.

Many women-led Rotary projects focus on addressing the specific needs of women and children in local communities, including awareness about domestic violence, access to health care, clean water and sanitation. Entrepreneurship and economic empowerment, environmental initiatives, mentorship and encouragement, advocacy for

gender equality etc., are some of the major areas impacted by the work of women Rotarians.

Incumbent District Secretary (3141), Rtn Sunita Sainani confesses that Rotary has given her the confidence to work with top leaders since 2003, when her journey here began.

. Every member in Rotary is an expert in their field and each one contributes to make a positive impact. I am proud and honoured to be a Rotarian." She has been a Rotarian since 2003.

Narrating her journey as Rotarian from 2007, Shruti Dharamsi (President, Rotary Club of Mumbai Ghatkopar West) says that each role she has essayed has been a stepping stone enriching her both professionally and personally.

Whatever their influences may be and whatever changes they may bring about, women Rotarians are here to stay. In the concluding paragraph of the article on women,

TIMELINE OF HISTORICAL MILESTONES & LEADERSHIP FIRSTS FOR WOMEN IN ROTARY

1950: An enactment to delete the word "male" from the Standard Rotary Club Constitution is proposed by a Rotary Club of India for the Council of Legislation Meeting at the Rotary Convention in 1950.

1964: The Council on Legislation Agenda contains an enactment proposed by a Rotary Club in Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) to permit the admission of women into Rotary Clubs. Delegates voted for it to be withdrawn.



references to members as "male persons".

1983-1986: In a lawsuit filed by the Rotary Club of Duarte, the California Supreme Court in 1983, rules in favour of RI upholding gender-based qualification for membership in the Rotary Clubs of California.

In 1986, the California Court of Appeals reverses the order of the Lower Court, preventing the enforcement in California.

1987: On May 4, the U.S. Supreme Court rules that the Rotary Clubs in the U.S. may not exclude women from the membership on the basis of gender. RI issues a policy statement that qualified women can be admitted as members into any Rotary Club in the United States.

The Rotary Club of Marin Sunrise (formerly Larkspur Landing), on May 28, 1987. becomes the first Club after the ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court to have women as Charter members.

1972: As more women reach higher positions in their professions, more Clubs begin lobbying for women members. A Rotary Club in U.S proposes admitting women into Rotary at the Council on Legislation meeting in 1972.

1977: Three separate proposals to admit women into the membership are submitted to the Council on Legislation at the Rotary Convention in 1977. A Rotary Club in Brazil makes a different proposal to admit women as honorary members.

The Rotary Club of Duarte, California, UAS, admits members in violation of the RI Constitution and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. Due to this violation. the membership of the Club in Rotary International is terminated in March 1978.

1980: The RI BOD and Rotary Clubs in India, Sweden, Switzerland and the US propose an enactment to remove from the RI, Club Constitutions and Bylaws all



We're all Rotarians

A woman Rotarian-a contradiction in terms A woman Rotarian—a contradiction in terms as short a time ago as June 1987. That was the date of a Rotary International Board policy statement, in response to a U.S. Supreme Court decision, to the effect that any Ro-tary club in any U.S. state could admit qualified women into membership.

The change was long overdue in the opinion of many

male U.S. Rotarians, but it stirred feelings ranging from sadness to rage for others, who viewed it as a death knell to the masculine camaraderie they had enjoyed

for more than eight decades.

In November 1988, the Board recognized that Candian law has a similar effect on membership. The membership rule was changed and clubs in Canada were allowed to admit women. Then, in January 1989, the R.I. Council on Legislation voted to permit Rotary club membership to women worldwide—at the option of membership to wo the individual club.

Now that women members are a fact of Rotary club life—some 20,000 strong in 30 countries—what has been the effect? Have women destroyed the old clubby ocen the effect; Have women destroyed the sid clubby atmosphere? Have they turned club meetings into baby showers and Tupperware parties? Have they trivialized programs and interfered with tradition? Have they upstaged the time-honored role of wives of Rotarians?

Or-have women refreshed the atmosphere, letting in the sunlight of fresh ideas? Have they brought new warmth and kindness and a gentler tone to club meet ings? Have they introduced new programs and projects and added vivacity to ongoing ones? Have they worked harmoniously with club members and spouses in club

In preparing this special feature, your editors went back to some of the people who have spoken out to us strongly on the subject of women in Rotary in the past, either pro or con, and we asked if their fears—or their

either pro or con, and we asked if their fears—or their optimism—have been borne out.

"Well, I've mellowed a bit," confessed a past district governor in California, U.S.A., who had been an outspoken opponent. "Now that I see the caliber of women who are coming into the clubs—including my own fine daughter-in-law, for example—I guess it was a better idea than I thought."

"No. I'm still opposed," says a long-time Rotarian in eastern Canada. "We have a couple of women members, but they don't seem to do anything."
"I don't enjoy my club as much any more," says a past president in the U.S. Midwest, once among his club's most active members. "It just doesn't seem the same. I can't tell you exactly why... but it's different.

same. I can't tell you exactly why . . . but it's different. I make up in clubs that don't have any women when I can—but they're getting harder to find."

"We are attracting real community leaders," says a









Legislations votes to eliminate the requirement in the RI Constitution that membership in the Rotary Clubs be limited to men. Women are welcomed into the Rotary Clubs across the world.

1990: By June 1990, there are about 20,000 female Rotarians worldwide. The newsletter, Rotarian, runs a feature on women in Rotary.

1985: Eight women become District Governors - the first elected to this role include Mimi Altman, Gilda Chirafisi, Janet W Holland, Reba F Lowrien, Virginia B Nordby, Donna J Rapp, Anne Robertson and Olive P Scott.

2005: Carolyn E Jones begins her term as the first woman appointed as trustee of the Rotary Foundation.

2008: Catherine Nover-Riveau begins her term as the first women elected to the RI BOD

2012: Elizabeth S Demaray begins her term as RI Treasurer, the first woman to serve in this position.

2013: Anne L Matthews begins her term to serve as the first woman RI Vice President.

2019: Brenda Marie Cressey begins her term to serve as the first woman Vice Chair of the Rotary Foundation. In April-June 2019, she serves as the Chair of the Foundation, making her the first woman to serve in this role.

2022: Jennifer Jones begins her term as the first female president of RI.

Sylvia Whitlock, of the Rotary Club of Duarte in California, become the first female president of a Rotary Club.

1988: In November, the RI BOD issues a policy statement recognizing the right of the Rotary Clubs in Canada to admit female members based on the Canadian Law akin to that upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

1989: At its first meeting, after the decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in 1987, the Council On





VIBE-X: Your family has been a beacon of generosity for The **Rotary Foundation. How has** this legacy influenced your philanthropic journey?

TK: My parents instilled in me the values of simplicity. My life journey and Islam's emphasis on zakat as a wealth purifier have been instrumental in building my value system in this area.

VIBE-X:How does philanthropy align with your values?

TK: I come from one of the world's poorest countries and a city of extremes. It's impossible to live in awareness without helping others. Wealth is largely a result of birth and genetics ... it's in our selfinterest to build a fairer society.

VIBE-X:Rotary focuses on key areas such as disease prevention, education, and economic development. Which of these causes resonates most with you, and why?

TK: As a businessman, I seek value from philanthropy. My focus is on mothers and children. I've funded medical care, including paediatric surgeries-200 cardiac and 1,000 orthopaedic. Additionally, I have equipped the KEM ophthalmology department to make it a truly world-class teaching center.

VIBE-X:As a successful business leader and philanthropist, how do you see corporate social

responsibility and personal giving working together to create meaningful change?

TK: CSR, now a legal obligation for Indian corporations, forms 10% of our 2025 philanthropic budget. We would like to increase it to 50% of our global profit.

VIBE-X:How do you decide which causes or initiatives to support, and what factors influence your philanthropic choices?

TK: Maximizing RTS (Return to Society). Identifying niches in society where others are not actively engaged and where the societal return on investment is high.

Currently, we focus on three areas:

- (i) Paediatric orthopedic surgery
- (ii) Maternal and child nutrition
- (iii) Advocacy for women's rights and marginalized communities

VIBE-X:Beyond financial contributions, how can donors actively engage with the projects they support to ensure a greater impact?

TK: Visit the projects, gain a deeper understanding of India, and engage with our children and grandchildren. Commit a day or two every month.

VIBE-X: If you could champion one new initiative within The Rotary Foundation, what would it be and

TK: Paediatric surgeries. These

children will contribute to society for 70 years rather than being a burden to their families.

VIBE-X: As an AKS donor, how do you measure the true impact of your contributions beyond numbers and reports?

- 1. Fostering humility, gratitude, and simplicity within my immediate family.
- 2. Earning a good name in society.
- 3. Seeking the purification of my wealth by the Almighty.

VIBE-X: What message would you like to share with fellow business leaders about the importance of supporting global humanitarian efforts through Rotary?

TK: It is a journey that rewards us far more than we donate ... provided we engage as a family.

VIBE-X: What legacy do you hope to leave through your contributions to The Rotary Foundation and beyond?

TK: To serve as a role model, just as my ancestors were to me.

VIBE-X: What keeps you motivated and inspired to continue your journey of giving, even as the world faces new challenges?

GILBERT HILL:

A Hidden Gem of Mumbai's Heritage

Tucked away in the heart of Andheri East, Gilbert Hill is a geological and historical treasure known to few visitors to Mumbai. This towering 200-foot basalt rock formation, believed to be around 66 million years old, is one of only three such places on Earth, making it an extraordinary natural wonder. What makes Gilbert Hill so special is that it is one of the rarest geological formations, formed when volcanic lava cooled and solidified into these striking vertical columns.

Gilbert Hill was named after Captain Gilbert, a British engineer who conducted surveys in the area during the 19th century. The hill's formation is a result of volcanic eruptions that took place millions of years ago, leaving behind a stunning columnar structure. These formations, though rare, are examples of how nature has


sculpted the earth in its myriad ways

At the summit of Gilbert Hill. visitors can find the ancient temple of Durgadi Mata, which adds a spiritual element to the site. Pilgrims and locals frequently visit the temple, contributing to the cultural significance of the hill,

Despite its historical and geological value, Gilbert Hill has faced challenges in preservation. Urbanization, encroachments, and lack of awareness have threatened the site's integrity, leaving it in need of better conservation efforts. Nonetheless, it remains a peaceful escape offering a panoramic view of Mumbai, alongside an opportunity to witness a rare natural spectacle.

For those interested in history, geology, or simply exploring Mumbai's hidden gems, Gilbert Hill offers an unforgettable experience. As we navigate the demands of modernity, it is crucial to cherish and protect such irreplaceable landmarks that speak to the ancient past and connect us with the planet's natural heritage. Let us all take a moment to appreciate and preserve these treasures in our midst.
