From Chalkboards to Change-Makers **Rethinking Rural Education**

n a sun-baked afternoon in a small village in Maharashtra, ten-year-old Meera sat at a chipped wooden desk in her government school. The ceiling fan hung motionless in the heat. When her teacher, Mrs. Patil, handed her a storybook meant for a second grader, Meera's eyes scanned the page hesitantly. She paused at every other word, sounding them out under her breath.

She was in Grade 5. But she could not read a Grade 2 text fluently. More than half her classmates faced the same challenge.

This is not an isolated case. It is the quiet crisis of rural education in India.

The Rural School Reality

India's literacy journey since Independence is a testament to progress—from a mere 18% literacy rate in 1951 to 77.7% in the 2011 Census. But in rural India, where over 65% of the country's 15 lakh schools are located, the ground reality is far from the celebratory headlines.

Classrooms here are often multi-grade: children from different levels learning together because there is only one teacher. Nearly 30% of rural schools still lack functional toilets for girls, pushing many to drop out. About 27% have no electricity, and 35% lack internet access—making digital learning during emergencies like the COVID-19 lockdowns almost impossible.

The Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) has for years underlined a harsh truth: more than 50% of Grade 5 students in rural India cannot read a Grade 2-level text or solve basic math problems.

It is not merely a learning gap. It is a learning crisis.



The Teacher's Struggle

Teachers are the backbone of the system—but they are also among its most overburdened members. Across the country, nearly 18% of government schools have vacant teaching posts, especially in remote and tribal areas. Teachers are often drafted into non-teaching duties: supervising elections, conducting census surveys, and filling out endless administrative paperwork.

In Mrs. Patil's school, lesson planning is squeezed between taking attendance, overseeing the midday meal scheme, and tracking student records. Teacher-student ratios often exceed the Right to Education norm of 30:1. In-service training is sporadic at best.

And yet, despite the odds, there • Distributing learning kits, books, are teachers like Mrs. Patil-committed, patient, determined to see their students succeed.

Rotary's Role: From Infrastructure to Inspiration

Rotary International has long recognised literacy as a cornerstone for peace, equality, and social progress. Through its Basic Education and Literacy focus area, Rotary clubs across India have been championing change at the grassroots:

- Building and renovating classrooms.
- Equipping schools with e-learning tools and digital libraries.
- Training teachers in interactive, child-centric methods.

- and bicycles.
- Adopting and reviving underperforming schools.

These are not short-term fixes they are long-term commitments with community engagement at their heart.

LEARN: A Model for Transformation

One standout initiative is the LEARN Project—Learning Enrichment and Resource Networkspearheaded by Rtn. Leena Shah with creative guidance from Swaroop Sampat, a trained educator and child-wellness advocate. (ref: Page no 6 & 7)

LEARN focuses on equipping teachers with tools to make learning interactive, joyful, and emotionally enriching. Storytelling, play-based learning, and the cultivation of emotional intelligence are central to its approach.

In just one year, 250 teachers from both government and non-government schools were trained under LEARN, with the potential to impact nearly one lakh children.

When Training Translates to Change

After attending a LEARN workshop, Mrs. Patil returned to her classroom armed with new methods and renewed energy. Instead of beginning the day with rote recitation, she started with a story. Math became a game. Reading turned into a group activity where older students helped younger

Three months later, Meera was reading to her younger brother at home-still stumbling on some words, but not giving up.

Small victories, multiplied across hundreds of villages, are how literacy spreads its roots.

More Than Letters and Numbers.

Literacy is not just about decoding words—it is about dignity, choice, and opportunity. In rural India, where systemic gaps run deep, Rotary's work is not merely educational; it is nation-building.

When teachers are empowered, children thrive.

When schools are strengthened, communities rise.

And when literacy is embraced as a right-not a privilege-nations are transformed.

The chalk dust must keep flying. Because each time a child like Meera reads without fear, India writes a brighter page in its future.



Depending on how you figure it, Ann Parker, a member of Rotary Club of Iowa City, is a 9th-generation Rotarian with four Rotarians on one side of the family and five on the other! Her parents, Shack and Wilma, are past presidents of Rotary Club of Attica-Williamsport, Indiana. Both were assistant governors of District 7230 at the same time; later Wilma served in the same role in District 6560.

Fowlds' must have had never thought that when he would be a great-grandfather, fourth-generation Rotarian Craig Horrocks, governor of District 9920 in Oceania, would be proud holding a copy of Harris' 1928 autobiography, The Founder of Rotary, with a warm inscription to Sir George: "To Honorable George, whose devotion to Rotary has been one of the highlights of the movement. Sincerely Yours, Paul, Apr 3 '28."

rvan Arredon, 19-vear-old son of California's Mama Lu Arredondo says, "I began to understand Rotary's impact when I was in the eighth grade. My mom's club didn't have enough money to send two students to Teen Leadership Camp, but with the help of another club, I got to go." He and his brother Zachary Tadian, 30, wanted to join Rotary.

"One of the big challenges of being a fifth-generation Rotarian," says Zachary, "is being a fifth-generation Rotarian. We found that the traditional club didn't work for us. It wasn't engaging enough." So Mom Mama Lu said to them to follow the footsteps of their great-great-grandfather and start a club that could help lead Rotary into the future. They chartered Rotary Club of Greater San Gabriel Valley. However Bryan confesses, "It's not easy, when we go to district events, some other club presidents aren't happy to see someone my age in a leadership role, sitting at the same table with them. But we've got Mama Lu behind us, telling us to keep moving forward. She reminds us that Paul Harris was only 36 when he started Rotary. He said it would have to evolve to stay relevant, and he might be glad to see us as part of that evolution."

Lu's granddaughter, Joy, has her own pin and a dress-up outfit for meetings. 2 years old, will Joy become Rotary's first sixth-generation member?

hope you've had the chance to read the earlier editions of our District Bulletin. I'm sure many of you eagerly flipped through the pages looking for your club's photos, achievements, and stories—and rightly so! It's a proud moment to see your hard work recognized and celebrated.


At the same time, I encourage you to pause and explore the incredible work being done by other clubs across our District. Each story offers inspiration and new ideas. Let's learn from one another and grow together—as one Rotary family.

The installations so far have been enriching experiences, and I'm truly grateful for the love and support you've shown. Your plans have inspired me, and I'm equally motivated by the commitment many of you have shown toward our District Focus Areas. It feels like we've formed a Mutual Inspiration Society—where each of us is working toward the best outcomes for our members and the communities we serve!

During 2022-23, I led my club in organizing a Breast Cancer Screening Camp. What began as a single initiative grew into a district-wide movement—spanning nearly 80 clubs and over 150 camps, screening 60–80 beneficiaries at each camp. That's nearly 9,000 women screened. Of these, 33 showed signs of potential cancer and were guided toward further diagnostics. Eight were diagnosed with early-stage cancer. With the support of the Motwani Charitable Trust, we ensured every one of them received surgery—completely free of cost. Today, all of them are cancer-free.

This experience reinforced the importance of early detection and inspired me to make cancer screening a key focus area this year.

How often have we, as clubs or individuals, been approached by families seeking support for cancer treatment? And the costs involved are huge. Cancer not only affects individuals, but also takes a heavy toll on families—physically, emo-



tionally, and financially. Early detection can save lives and ease that burden.

I urge each of you to get yourself and your family members screened at the earliest. Once that's done, please commit to organizing at least one screening camp this year. At the District level, we are actively working to raise funds, and we'll keep you posted as soon as we have more to share. We are also negotiating good rates for each screening. In the meantime, go ahead and plan your detection camps. This vital project is lead by Rtn Ram Kotak and Dr. Twinkle Sanghavi with their highly enthusiastic team. You'll find their contact details of the District Team in your directory, which I trust you've all received by now. Do reach out to them for any support you may need, anytime.

As you know, our District theme this year is INSPIRE. Each edition of the GML will focus on a letter from this word. This month, we begin with "I" for Involve Every Member.

Involvement is the heartbeat of Rotary.

Every Rotarian—new or seasoned—has something valuable to offer. Let's work to involve every member, not just in meetings and projects, but also in ideation, decision-making, and celebrations. When every voice is heard and every talent is engaged, our clubs become more inclusive, enjoyable, and impactful.

When Education Heals: Life Skills Beyond the Classroom

EARN: Life Skills Through Drama is more than a program — it's a movement. One that quietly but powerfully addresses what textbooks often overlook: emotional safety, self-awareness, and the strength to say no to violence, abuse, or despair. Introduced in Rotary and rooted in a deep understanding of real-life challenges faced by adolescents, LEARN introduces life skills through drama — creating safe spaces where students can express, explore, and evolve.

A Silent Crisis in Our Schools

Across India, thousands of children drop out of school not because they lack intelligence, but The Beginning: because they lack support. Many are burdened by poverty, trapped in child labour, or scarred by abuse — often at home. They carry invisible schoolbags packed with fear, anxiety, and confusion.



LEARN recognizes a critical truth: education cannot thrive without emotional safety.

In 2007, Rtn. Leena Shah of Rotary Club of Bombay Sea face encountered a powerful idea one that would eventually become her life's mission. She reconnected with a friend, Dr. Swaroop Sampat

Rawal, once a popular actress who had gracefully stepped away from fame to pursue a higher calling: education reform.

Swaroop had groundbreaking, drama-based educational approach teaching children life skills not through rote learning, but through real-life role play. Her viral video, "School Without a Schoolbag," showed children



He had just stepped out of his teens when the 'Legend was born'

The youngest—and the fastest. You might ask: youngest, but how the fastest?

Prabhat swam straits, channels, rough and calm seas across the globe, in freezing and warm waters. He fought off jellyfish, swam through shark zones, and conquered the wildest oceans. And he did it faster than anyone before him.

He earned the prestigious title of "Seven Oceans Champion"—the youngest and the fastest.

Today, at just 25, Prabhat holds three Guinness World Records, the Tenzing Norgay National Adventure Award, and the Shiv Chhatrapati Award—recognitions that salute his record-breaking achievements, remarkable endurance, and unshakable mental toughness.

One of India's most celebrated open water swimmers, this Mumbai-based athlete has shattered multiple world records and continues to inspire a new generation of swimmers with his extraordinary accomplishments and unwavering determination.

Prabhat hails from the Koli fishing community in Trombay, Mumbai. Swimming runs in his DNA.

His father, Raju Koli, a scientific assistant at the Bhabha Atomic Research Centre, became his first coach and mentor. His mother, Shilpa, gave up her own career to support her son's ambitious dreams.

The family's sacrifices were immense. They poured in every rupee—emptying savings, investing Raju's provident fund, and ultimately selling their home to fund Prabhat's international competitions and elite training programs.

Growing up in a traditional Koli neighbourhood, Prabhat was instinctively drawn to the water. As his father often said, he was a "total water baby." Generations of fishermen in his ancestry gave him a natural affinity and deep respect for the sea.

At just 10 years old, Prabhat won his first international medal in an open water swimming event. By 12, he had completed the 81-kilometre India National Open Water Swimming Competition in the Bhagirathi River, West Bengal. These early feats laid the foundation for what would become a groundbreaking career—16+ years, 20+ international tournaments, and a spot in world swimming history.



The Seven Occean:

The Oceans Seven is the swimming world's answer to the Seven Summits of mountaineering—seven of the most dangerous and challenging open water channel swims on Earth. Prabhat began this journey in 2015, attempting the English Channel at just 16. Each swim demanded intense physical conditioning, years of planning, and incredible mental resilience.

complete the Triple Crown of Open Water Swimming, and the first Asian to conquer several elite routes:

- Germany to Switzerland
- Jersey to France
- Cape Town coast, South Africa

His 66 km circumnavigation of Jersey Island in just 10 hours, and his participation in the 20 Bridges Manhattan Swim, only reinforced his stature as a world-class swimmer.

The final swim—the Cook Strait—was the toughest. Facing 30knot winds and relentless waves, he swam through rough seas for nearly nine hours to reach the finish. That moment cemented his place in history as the youngest and fastest swimmer to complete the Oceans Seven. He became just the 22nd person in the world to achieve this feat.



The Occean is unforgiving. The mental fortitude to focus for hours in turbulent, freezing waters has been central to his triumphs. Patience, pain endurance, and psychological conditioning have been as critical as physical fitness.

Prabhat endured multiple jellyfish stings and a dangerous bout of hypothermia just miles from the finish. The Kaiwi Channel in Hawaii—his most dangerous crossing—involved battling extreme currents and unpredictable marine life.

Financial hurdles were equally intense. With no formal ranking system in open water swimming, sponsorships were hard to come by. The family's decision to sell their home reflects the immense personal cost of his journey. To widen support, Prabhat also diversified into ice swimming, attracting new backers and global attention.

In January 2025, Prabhat earned India's first medal at the 6th World Ice Swimming Championship in Molveno, Italy.

He secured a bronze in the 250-meter freestyle (age group 25-

In 2024, he became the only Asian selected for Epic Swim Maui, For frigid waters like the North an elite, invitation-only, 20-day,

This groundbreaking event merged athletic endurance with environmental science, supporting the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals and completing the first-ever circumnavigation of Maui by swim. "No Indian has done that in Open Water Swimming," Prabhat said, referring to his 19 international and 20+ national events. His success has transformed the sport's profile in India, drawing attention to open water swimming and inspiring countless young athletes.

Now pursuing an MBA in Sports Business Management, Prabhat is committed to his role as both athlete and ambassador—continuing to compete in ice swimming, advocate for ocean health, and raise the bar for Indian swimming.

The role of a lead club is being elaborated below to dispel doubts. As we are • aware there are totally 15 club • Senior citizens groups, three each in each of the five zones. Each group has a lead club for every activity; some have two lead clubs.All clubs need to keep the flame of RSW alive by announcements at every meeting and also getting the board aligned to the execution of RSW.

The role and responsibility of a lead club:

- The most crucial role is coordination and getting together the clubs in the group
- Meetings of the club presidents/RSW club chairs is important for discussion on total number of projects and role of each club with point of contact club and activity wise.
- · The clubs with greater resources, membership and expertise shall assume the "Big brother "role
- Getting the budget ready and the exact involvement of other clubs in the same
- Get details of project being done by other clubs in the group
- See that two clubs at least could get together for a project
- Participation by clubs could be in the form of expertise, local project logistics, Media, volunteers, sponsorship
- Being the link between the District Project execution team and the club group
- Making a blueprint of the whole group activity for the day

Frequently asked questions:

Why is CYBERCRIME an exception to the lead club rule?

Since almost every Rotary club is associated with a school, a Community, Rotaract or senior citizens group it was felt that this would help spread the awareness amongst a larger population. Since the district has the plan to get the resources through training or the trained, the more the awareness camps the better. Every club is nominating two volunteers to get trained for a simple, easy online session to conduct the CYBERCRIME awareness activity.

Which activity does the whole zone take part in one program?

Happy street is a Zonal activity where all the three groups of a zone come together on Sunday, November 9th to celebrate the victory of Rotary service week through vibrant activities in a street chosen in

Which activity does the whole district take part in one event?

Vocational excellence awards for unsung heroes will be the mega event on Friday, 7th November where all 124 clubs of the district come together. Each club nominates two unsung heroes and from the pool of nominations, 20 awardees will be chosen. Three of them will be from each zone and the remaining five will be based, based on merit alone, exclusive of zone. Besides nomination, clubs could also participate by way of sponsorship in various categories, though not mandatory.



Does a lead club have to undertake the financial responsibility of the entire activity?

The emphasis of a lead club is coordination between all the clubs in the group and being accountable for the group. Finance is a part, but not the sole responsibility of the lead club alone. Two clubs doing a project together can share the financial responsibility of the project cost.

Are these series of ongoing meetings important?

For a collective activity like RSW, it is very important to keep the progress monitored. For a large group to be on the same page it takes a longer time for the participants to get complete clarity. For ex-

On the contrary, it should be viewed as a pleasure and a stimulating exercise in collective activity with hitherto relatively unknown clubs. The club RSW chair and relevant Board of directors should be delegated the responsibility of the RSW week participation. The activity has a specific goal, specific period and special teams and all are in it together. Once the concept is clear and roles understood and game plan is ready, it should ease off all pressures.

What is the role of clubs that are not lead clubs?

- · Joining club/clubs to execute a project activity for the day
- Share volunteers with other clubs
- Help with logistics
- Get resources like sponsors, media, expertise
- Keep home club informed

In a zonal activity like Happy Street, depending on the geographic location and proximity of the street, for the sake of convenience, the clubs could certainly participate in another zone. This can be decided in the group meetings with the information being shared with the Zonal chairs and the project execution teams. Since the activity is limited to 4-5 hours, it is logical to attend the nearest event in Happy Street. For other activities, the clubs try and perform in the zone.



Leading with Heart: The Rotary and Business Journey of Rtn Vijay Jatia



'n the world of Indian industry, where scale and strategy Loften eclipse sentiment, Vijay Jatia stands apart. As Chairman and Managing Director of Modern India Ltd., he brings over five decades of experience, but what defines him most is not his corporate title—it is the values that underscore his leadership. Through the highs and lows of his career, Vijay Jatia has remained grounded in the belief that people—not processes-are at the heart of sustainable success. "I've gone through multiple business cycles," he reflects. "Those ups and downs were the real learning periods. They shaped who I am.'

Modern India Ltd. today may be a closely held enterprise, but there was a time when the company had thousands of shareholders and was grappling with significant losses. Vijay Jatia recalls this era not with regret, but with resolve. "We could not serve our shareholders well during that time, and that weighed on us. But eventually, we made sure they were treated fairly. That sense of responsibility became part of our ethos." That same sense of fairness extends within the organization. He deliberately avoids the term "employees," instead choosing to call them his team. Many members of this team have remained with the company for decades, a testament to the culture he has nurtured. "If you take care of them, they will take care of you," he says simply.

The inclusive and empathetic environment he has fostered has not gone unnoticed. Modern India Ltd. has been certified as a 'Great Place to Work' three times, based entirely on feedback from the team. Vijay Jatia, too, has earned distinction. For two consecutive years, he has been named among the Top 50 CEOs in the Economic Times' Great People Manager Study—an honour he modestly attributes to his colleagues. "Without my team, I am no one," he says, reiterating a leadership philoso-



phy rooted in humility.

His commitment to industry extends beyond his company. Over the years, Vijay Jatia has been actively involved with institutions such as FICCI and the Indian Merchant Chambers. His journey began even earlier with associations in the Western Regional Chairman and solvent extraction industries, where he served in leadership roles including a two-term presidency at the All IndiaCotton SeedCrushers Association. These experiences, he notes, provided both learning and opportunities to contribute. "When you get involved in such institutions, you grow. You network. And more importantly, you give back."

That spirit of contribution found fuller expression in Rotary. Introduced to the organization by a friend, Vijay Jatia was struck by the scale and sincerity of the work being done. Though it took several months to gain membership in the Rotary Club of Bombay, he eventually joined in 1992. His early involvement was enthusiastic, but pose led to large contributions, to

business commitments later required him to step back. It was only when a vacancy arose—following a president-elect's withdrawal due to health reasons—that he was called back to serve. He accepted, and in 2018-19, he assumed the role of Club President, re-engaging with the Rotary mission with renewed purpose.

Among the many impactful projects led under his stewardship, one that remains particularly close to his heart is the Paediatric Heart Surgery initiative. Launched during his presidency, the project has since provided life-saving surgery to over a thousand children, with ongoing funding secured to continue this work for the foreseeable future. The success of this initiative, like so many others, was built on trust and clarity of vision. Vijay Jatia recounts his initial hesitation about fundraising—until he make it special reframed the act not as asking for money, but as inviting others to do good. "At the most, they'll say no," he reasoned. That clarity of pur-

often from non-Rotarians, who resonated with the transparency and impact of the projects.

His stature within Rotary is underscored by his membership in the prestigious Arch Klumph Society (AKS), representing one of the highest levels of giving to The Rotary Foundation. Yet, even here, he remains modest. "Our family has always believed in giving back," he shares. Their contributions include two schools in Rajasthan and continued support to institutions like Bombay Hospital. An emotional moment that still stays with him occurred when a CISF officer at an airport recognized his son-not for his surname, but because he had studied in one of those family-funded schools. "Good things come back," Vijay Jatia says, his voice laced with quiet pride.

Within the Rotary framework, he also served as a counsellor during the Alpha year—a role with no fixed duties, but one he embraced with full commitment. Whether supporting high TRF collection drives or stepping in for urgent projects, he credits the year's success to strong teamwork, especially with PDG Sandip Agarwala, who initially brought him into leadership roles within the club. For Vijay Jatia, Rotary is distinct

among philanthropic organizations for its lean administrative structure and member-driven passion. Unlike large global charities burdened by heavy overheads, Rotary maximizes the direct impact of every rupee. This efficiency and transparency, combined with deep personal involvement, are what

for him.

professionals considering Rotary, he speaks with characteristic clarity: "Eat, drink, have fun-but also contribute. Devote your time, share your talent, and if possible, give financially too." He calls it the 3T philosophy—Time, Treasure, and Talent. It is a mantra he lives by.

Despite juggling business interests across multiple sectors, he finds that Rotary enriches his work rather than competes with it. "You just need to manage your time," he explains. "I treat Rotary as an arm of my business. It enhances and complements what I do."

Outside the boardroom and Rotary meetings, Vijay Jatia is a devoted family person, supported by his wife, three sons, daughtersin-law, and grandchildren. "They have stood by me, especially during my Rotary years. Without them, I could not have achieved anything."

A self-described foodie and vegetarian, he enjoys exploring new cuisines and traveling to destinations his family prefers. Yet, whether at home or abroad, in business or service, one principle remains unwavering: do good, sincerely, and wholeheartedly. "If your cause is right and your heart is in the right place, people will support you," he says.



When Nature Speaks Louder Than Us: A Wake-up Call from the Jungles of India





ndia's forests are more than just green landscapes, they are living, breathing ecosystems that regulate our climate, safeguard biodiversity, and nurture ancient wisdom. Among them, the Western Ghats, a UNESCO World Heritage site, stands as one of the world's eight "hottest hotspots" of biological diversity.

Stretching over 1600 km across six Indian states, the Western Ghats are home to over 7,400 species of plants and animals, including many found nowhere else on Earth. These forests are not just rich in flora and fauna-they're oxygen factories, generating up to 40% more oxygen per acre than many other forest regions. The forests also regulate monsoons, store freshwater, and help balance carbon emissions. According to a recent report by the Indian Institute of Science, the Ghats absorb over 60 million tonnes of carbon dioxide annually.

The region is also the cradle of India's ancient spice trade—black pepper, cardamom, cinnamon, cloves, and nutmeg all grow here in abundance. These spices, rooted in forest ecology, support local tribal communities and biodiversity in equal measure.

But while the Southern forests struggle quietly, the Northern hills are screaming.



Let's stop pretending we have time. Let's start listening before nature goes silent.

In Uttarakhand, once called Devbhumi or the Land of the Gods, calamity after calamity has become the new normal. Cloudbursts, flash floods, landslides, and collapsing roads are increasingly common. The 2023 Joshimath land subsidence crisis was not an accident—it was a symptom.

Modernization has come at a cost. Widespread deforestation for highways, hydropower dams, and hotels is disrupting natural drainage systems and weakening the fragile

Himalayan terrain. According to the Forest Survey of India, India lost over 668 sq km of forest cover between 2019 and 2021 alone, much of it in ecologically sensitive zones.

Locals and environmentalists have repeatedly warned: cutting trees, altering river courses, and building blindly in seismic zones will invite disaster. And now, it's

Nature isn't turning violent; we are disrupting its balance. And when step in the right direction, today's nature responds, it doesn't knockit crashes.

The time to act is not tomorrow. It is now.

We must:



- Strengthen the Western Ghats Ecology Expert Panel (WGEEP) recommendations.
- Ban construction in eco-sensitive
- Return to indigenous knowledge systems of coexisting with for-
- Shift to eco-tourism instead of unsustainable hotel chains.
- Empower local forest communities to become guardians of their environment.
- The forests of India, from the thick spice-laden groves of the Western Ghats to the alpine meadows of the Himalayas, are sacred. But they are not invinci-

Rotary India: A Role Beyond Tree Planting

Amid this crisis, civil society must step up. One such force with both scale and credibility is Rotary India. While tree plantation drives are a challenge demands a deeper ecological engagement.

Rotary, with its vast network across rural and urban India, can:

→ Adopt and restore forest patches, especially in buffer zones and de-

- graded lands,
- Support forest-based tribal livelihoods, like honey, herbal products, and sustainable spice farm-
- Fund wildlife corridors to reduce human-animal conflict,
- Promote eco-education among youth, especially through Interact and Rotaract clubs,
- Develop climate-resilient villages, with green infrastructure and low-carbon technology,
- Collaborate with local bodies to restore wetlands, riversides, and urban lakes.
- And most importantly, act as eco-watchdogs, advocating against construction in fragile

In Uttarakhand, for instance, Rotary can work with local communities to promote eco-tourism models, train youth as green guides, and discourage overbuilding in high-risk

This is not just about protecting trees. It's about preserving the equilibrium that sustains life—our air, water, soil, food, and climate.
