

WORLD POLIO DAY 24 OCTOBER



Rotary International brings together leaders who step up to take on the world's toughest challenges, locally and globally.

The eradication of polio is one of our longest standing and most significant efforts.

Several reasons why we must support EndPolio:

1. KNOW THE DECADES OLD HISTORY OF ROTARY IN POLIO ERADICATION

1894: The first major documented polio outbreak in the United States occurs in Vermont; 18 deaths and 132 cases of permanent paralysis were reported. Let's Fast Forward by 85 Years...

1979: Rotary International began its fight against polio with a multi-year project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines.

1985: Rotary International launched PolioPlus, the first and largest internationally coordinated private-sector support of a public health initiative, with an initial fundraising target of US\$120 million.

1988: Rotary International and the World Health Organization launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. There were estimated 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries then.

1994: The International Commission for the Certification of Poliomyelitis Eradication announced that polio has been eliminated from the Americas.

1995: Health workers and volunteers immunized 165 million children in China

and India in 1 week. Rotary launched the PolioPlus Partners program, enabling Rotary members in polio-free countries to provide support to fellow members in polioaffected countries for polio eradication activities.

2000: A record 550 million children – almost 10% of the world's population – received the oral polio vaccine. The Western Pacific region, spanning from Australia to China was declared polio-free.

2003: The Rotary Foundation raised \$119 million in a 12-month campaign. Rotary's total contribution to polio eradication exceeded \$500 million. Six countries remained polio-endemic – Afghanistan, Egypt, India, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan.

2004: In Africa, synchronized National Immunization Days in 23 countries target 80 million children, the largest coordinated polio immunization effort on the continent

2006: The number of polio-endemic countries dropped to 4 - Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, Pakistan.



2009: Rotary's overall contribution to the eradication effort neared \$800 million. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation pledged \$355 million and issued Rotary a challenge grant of \$200 million. This announcement was to ensure a combined \$555 million in support of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

2011: Rotary welcomed celebrities and other major public figures into a new public awareness campaign and ambassador program called "This Close" to ending polio. Program ambassadors included Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Desmond Tutu, violinist Itzhak Perlman, co-founder of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation Bill Gates, Grammy Award- winning singers Angelique Kidjo and Ziggy Marley, and environmentalist Dr. Jane Goodall. Rotary's funding for polio eradication exceeded \$1 billion.

2012: India surpassed 1 year without a recorded case of polio and was removed from the list of countries where polio is endemic. Polio remains endemic then in just 3 countries. Rotary surpassed its \$200 Million Challenge fundraising goal more than 5 months earlier than expected.

2014: India goes 3 full years without a new case caused by the wild poliovirus, and the World Health Organization certified the South-East Asia region poliofree. Polio cases were down over 99% since 1988.

2019: Nigeria goes 3 full years without a new case caused by the wild poliovirus.

2020: The World Health Organization certified the African region wild polio-free.

2. THE RESURGENCE FEAR IS ALWAYS THERE

The world observes World Polio Day on 24th October, the birth date of Dr. Jonas Salk, who led the first team to develop a vaccine against poliomyelitis


World Polio Day every year reminds and promotes:

Project Description:

In a world where children face abuse daily, it is our duty to empower them. The Rotary Club of Bombay Mid-City had organised self-defence training for 157 girls from Dharavi Municipal School, equipping them with courage and confidence over five days. Success stories abound: Shaima now stands up to her brother; Naaz feels safe on her way to school; Laxmi speaks her mind fearlessly. This flagship program, led by Women & Child Empowerment Director Ratna Betala, has trained over 6000 girls, helping them not only defend themselves but also overcome fear and build mental strength.

Project Description

The Rotary Club of Mulund distributed 320 new branded T-shirts to senior citizens in areas like Indira Nagar, Vidyapati Nagar, and others. Provided by the District Committee of Baghbaan - Disability to Ability, the initiative, led by President Seema Joshi, brought joy to the elderly, many of whom wore the T-shirts immediately. This project, supported by Savita Govilkar, Ujwala Jiandani, Sudhir Joshi, Ansuyaben Shah, Tara Malde, and Amruta Gandhi, offered a glimpse into the challenging living conditions of the beneficiaries. The gratitude and happiness of the recipients made the effort truly rewarding.

MEDICAL CAMP BY ROTARY CLUB OF MUMBAI MULUND EAST

Project Description

A mega medical camp, co-hosted with the Rotary Club of Bombay Powai, received an excellent response from Nanepada residents. Health services included haemoglobin and blood sugar tests for 138 individuals and eye screenings for 139. On-the-spot spectacles were provided to 80 people, with 24 made to order and 21 cataract cases detected. Additionally, 160 beneficiaries received counselling through the Family Planning Association of India. The camp raised awareness of critical health issues such as anaemia, diabetes, hypertension, oral and breast cancer, cervical cancer, and family planning.

Project Description

Ahead of Swachhta Divas on 2nd October, Rotary Club of Bombay Mid-City launched its "Dekho Bhi, Seekho Bhi" campaign by distributing clipboards made from recycled plastic and pens from recycled paper to students. Recognising that awareness requires constant reinforcement, the initiative aimed to instil sustainable habits in young minds by providing eco-friendly daily-use items. The idea was simple: as students used these items, they would be reminded of their responsibility toward the environment. Two campaigns were already completed in schools, with many more planned for the future.

The camp received an excellent response from the residents of Mhada Colony, helping those in need access vital eye care services and improving their quality of life.

FLAGSHIP INITIATIVE: ONGOING MID-DAY MEAL PROGRAM BY ROTARY CLUB OF LOKHANDWALA KANDIVALI

Project Description

Initiated in 2012 by the charter member and PP Rtn Anu Srrivastava, the mid-day meal program in partnership with the Annamrita Foundation (formerly ISKCON Food Relief Foundation) has significantly expanded its reach. Starting with 220 children receiving meals thrice a week, the project now nourishes 380 children at St. Thomas Malankara School daily.

On 3rd October 2024, the first vibrant day of Navratri, a special touch was added with suji halwa served alongside the usual meal. Heartfelt gratitude to AG Dr Ranjit Bijoor for his presence and to RCLK past presidents and fellow Rotarians for sustaining this impactful initiative annually.

DENTAL CHECK-UP FOR SPECIAL CHILDREN BY ROTARY CLUB OF MUMBAI GHATKOPAR WEST

Project Description

The Rotary Club of Mumbai Ghatkopar West successfully organized a dental check-up camp at Gurukul School for Special Children, benefiting 95 students. Led by Dr Sanjana Rachh, a gold medallist in paediatric dentistry with over six years of experience treating special needs children, the camp focused on raising dental health awareness. Dr Rachh, who works with the Jai Vakeel Foundation and Special Olympics Bharat, and her team presented two educational skits for students and parents. One-on-one checkups were conducted, with each child's dental concerns thoroughly explained to their parents, ensuring ongoing care and awareness.

Pitching for **CSR FUNDS 101**

E are thrilled to see the strong interest among Vibrant Presidents in leveraging CSR as a significant avenue for funding their service projects through CSR India Grants, establishing it as a long-term, sustainable source of funds for all their clubs' needs.

It is clear among Presidents and CSR Directors that, to increase their chances of success, they need to establish a strong connection with decision-makers in the corporate sector when pitching for CSR funds. However, after securing the opportunity for such a pitch, many often struggle with how to deliver an impeccable presentation. Here's your guide to pitching for CSR funds effectively:

UNDERSTAND THE CORPORATE

Study the company's CSR preferences, past CSR spending, current CSR budget, and any volunteering initiatives. This information can typically be found in the corporate balance sheet or online. Being fully prepared with this knowledge before the meeting will greatly enhance your pitch.

PRESENT A STRONG CASE FOR RFI AND YOUR CLUB

Prepare a compelling presentation on Rotary Foundation's background, experience, accolades,



and recognitions. Keep the Rotary introduction PPT handy and carry a printed copy to leave with the corporate team. Include your club's service projects, CSR grant experiences, and other relevant details. This presentation should position your club as the ideal partner for the company's CSR spending.

HIGHLIGHT RELEVANT SERVICE PROJECTS

Share examples of past service projects that align with the company's preferred areas of focus. If your club lacks experience in that area, share the success stories of other clubs with rich experience in that focus area. Use pictures, details, and key learnings to support your case.

USE TESTIMONIALS

One sure way to impress corporates is by sharing testimonials from other companies that have collaborated with your club or projects. Secure written or video testimonials from past corporate partners, including the contact information of the



person giving the testimonial for transparency.

OFFER A PROJECT PORTFOLIO

Prepare a portfolio of projects, focusing on those that align with the company's areas of interest, and offer a few additional options from other focus areas. Present only the most relevant details during the initial meeting and follow up with more specific information on projects where the company expresses greater interest. Open the door for a subsequent meeting to discuss project specifics.

BE PREPARED WITH AN ACTION PLAN

Before concluding the meeting, set a date for the next meeting and outline a brief agenda. Be clear on the deliverables expected from your side in the follow-up meeting and plan accordingly. Bring project domain experts to the next meeting. Provide a clear



timeline for project rollout and carry documented processes and prototypes to ensure they meet the company's requirements.

ESTABLISH A CLUB CSR AND PROJECT TEAM

Form a Club CSR Team and a Club Project Team to manage and sustain the relationship with the corporate. These teams



should have multiple members working together on each project. Schedule the project and delegate responsibilities within the team as needed. Engage as many club members as possible and make the project a shared responsibility of the entire club.

PROVIDE POST-PROJECT UPDATES AND SHOW GRATITUDE

Send quarterly updates to the corporate partner on the project's progress, including data and photos. Regularly express gratitude for their support and contribution to making a difference. This level of communication and appreciation may help secure a long-term CSR partner for your club!

By following these steps, you'll create a compelling pitch that's hard to resist and build long-term, meaningful CSR partnerships.

a new format and last-minute changes to the venue and dates, the event was a phenomenal success.



Statue of Garcia de Orta at the Institute of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, Lisbon

Dorta was the first foreign inhabitant of Bombay? He leased Colaba from the Portuguese. Garcia de Orta was a Portuguese physician, herbalist, and naturalist who worked mainly in Goa and Bombay, which were part of Portuguese India at the time.

He built the first 'pukka' house on the island and named it "Manor House." He lived there during his stay in Bombay. While one of the seven islands, Colaba, was leased to him by the Portuguese Crown, many of the other islands were also leased to wealthy Portuguese families. For example, Trombay and Chembur were granted to Roque Tello de Menezes.

The Manor House was later taken

over by the British and renamed Bombay Castle. The structure was built using stone from the local quarry in Kurla, known as 'Kurla Stone,' which has a yellow hue and is also called 'yellow basalt.' This stone was commonly used during the colonial era and was extensively employed in constructing many iconic colonial buildings in Mumbai, including the Rajabai Clock Tower, the central dome of the museum, and other prominent structures.

The islands came under English control in 1665, and in 1668, the East India Company took possession of the castle. Over the next ten years, they built a defensive structure around the Manor. Two gates of the Manor are still located within INS Angre, a naval station in South Mumbai. A sundial, believed to date back to the Portuguese era, is also present there.

It has been refurbished and reconstructed, and now serves as




the main gate for INS Angre. The two figures on top are Grenadiers, members of one of the oldest regiments of the 'Bombay Army', who were experts in throwing grenades during sieges. The gate still exists, open to the public as the first 'pukka' (permanent) structure of Bombay, now Mumbai.
