MESSAGE FROM ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT



As the chill of winter gives way to the warmth of spring, we have an opportunity to rejuvenate our commitments to each other and to the communities we serve.

A shining example is the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland in Ontario, whose members support a program providing hot meals to people facing homelessness and food insecurity. On any given evening, the Soup Shack run by Feed Windsor-Essex serves up to 130 people, offering nourishment and a sense of community and care.

Club member and Past District Governor Aruna Koushik got the club involved after seeing a news segment about the Soup Shack.

Koushik collaborated with club members to quickly approve the purchase of a stove, pots, and pans for its new permanent space. Soon after, club members met with the Soup Shack team, toured the new location, and presented a check for 3,000 Canadian dollars (about US\$2,000) to support its efforts. They also committed to volunteering their time to prepare and serve meals once the facility is operational.

This exemplifies how Rotary members can come together to address community needs, foster engagement, and make a tangible impact. By identifying opportunities for service and mobilizing resources, we not only support those in need but also strengthen our bonds with each other and with the communities we serve.

As we embrace the renewal that spring offers, let's take inspiration from the Windsor-Roseland club. Consider these ways to reinvigorate engagement within your club:

Identify emerging needs: Stay attuned to the evolving challenges in your communities. Engage with local organizations to understand where your club's support can make the most difference.

"MANY A MICKLE MAKES A MUCKLE"



A week before Eid-ul-Fitr, the Rotary e-Club of Kerala Global posted a call to its members in the club WhatsApp group, asking them to sponsor lftar meal kits for a community lftar in the UAE. This event was organized primarily for those who struggle to break their fast with a proper meal, individuals who, despite working tirelessly in labor camps, often can barely support their families back home.

It's easy to get caught up in the image of Dubai's luxury and skyscrapers, but beneath the glitzy exterior, there lies a community of workers who face daily hardships. This is where Rotary stepped in, bringing the spirit of service to the forefront.

What followed was nothing short of extraordinary, a testament to the limitless potential of our collective efforts. Just minutes after the president posted the request in the club's WhatsApp group (and as a member of this group, I witnessed the magic unfold firsthand), one Rotarian immediately pledged to sponsor a few meal kits. By evening, the number had grown to 50. The next day, it had risen to 100, then 200,

and soon, the total number of meals crossed 1,000, all accompanied by essential items for a complete lftar. There were no questions asked, no hesitation, offers flooded in, and the initiative was only halted when the president declared that enough had been collected.

This simple yet powerful act left me reflecting on the true essence of Rotary, the power of collective resources. Often, we focus on the larger figures, the number of new members recruited, the funds we contribute to The Rotary Foundation, or our district's annual dues. But we rarely pause to recognize the profound impact of smaller, incremental contributions from each Rotarian. When combined, these individual efforts create something far greater than the sum of their parts.

Let's take a step back and put things into perspective. Our district alone, with its 160 clubs and nearly 5,217 Rotarians, contributes significantly each year. If we assume that we collectively pay about INR 35,000,000 in Rotary International dues annually, that's already a notable sum. On top of that, our average annual contributions to TRF are INR 17,000,000, with district dues adding another INR 3,500,000. Subscriptions for Rotary News amount to INR 2,100,000. All in all, this brings our district's total contributions to around INR 60,000,000 per year, well accounted for, with receipts for each payment.

However, what often goes unrecorded are the contributions made by individual club members toward various local and international service projects. These funds, though not always documented in the same formal manner, are crucial in sustaining Rotary's global impact. When we factor in the collective efforts across all clubs, it's clear that these individual contributions likely exceed INR 10,000,000 each year. This micro-level mobilization, though invisible at times, is the true backbone of Rotary's success. Now, imagine the scale of this effort globally. With around 540 Rotary districts worldwide, each likely contributing at least this much, the total annual funds flowing into communities across the globe would exceed a staggering INR 500 crore.

As the old saying goes, "Many a mickle makes a muckle", every small contribution, no matter how seemingly insignificant, adds up to a larger, powerful force for change. The combined efforts of Rotarians create an ocean of goodwill that has the potential to transform lives and communities. This concept reminds me of the wise words of the great Sufi philosopher Rumi: "You are not just a drop in the ocean; you are the ocean in one drop." Indeed, a Rotarian is not just a small part of the greater whole; you are the entire world within that single drop.

This is the spirit of Rotary. Each individual contribution may seem small, but when united, they form a vast, unstoppable force for good. Rotarians are the quiet heroes in this journey, each one playing their part, steadily making a difference in the lives of many.

As we reflect on these collective efforts, we owe a debt of gratitude to the visionary founder of Rotary, Paul Harris. His foresight in creating an organization dedicated to service above self has allowed us to come together as a global force for positive change.

Al in E-Commerce: Enhancing Shopping Experiences



Ethical Considerations and Responsible Al Use






FRIENDSHIP TREES: GROWING A LEGACY OF SERVICE



Rotarians have a beautiful tradition of planting trees to symbolize fellowship, friendship, and Rotary's enduring ideals. These "Friendship Trees," as they are often called, become living monuments to the organization's commitment to service and global connection. My own experience with this tradition has been deeply rewarding, creating a living tapestry of memories and inspiring countless acts of service.

The power of Rotary's reach became profoundly clear to me in 1994 when, as a young Rotarian, I helped organize our district's first artificial limb fitment camp. Seeing the joy on the faces of 1,000 recipients as they "walked" home was a life-changing moment. It sparked a desire to connect with those who made this miracle possible. A letter to Rtn John Wilton in England, after a month-long journey by snail mail, led to a visit that felt like a festival, coinciding with Kerala's grand Onam celebration.

John's visit taught me a valuable lesson. I had assumed the funding for the limb camp came from wealthy Rotarians, but he revealed that it was raised by schoolchildren selling lemonade and organizing sponsor walks. This grassroots effort highlighted the true spirit of Rotary. When it was time for John to leave, I asked him and his wife, Liz, to plant a tree to commemorate their visit. They planted a jackfruit sapling, which I named "John."

Today, that mighty 25-year-old tree stands tall, bearing fruit and symbolizing the enduring impact of that initial connection. Through our continued

partnership with the Rotary Jaipur Limb, UK, we have provided over 39,000 artificial limbs in India alone and expanded our reach to five other Rotary districts. We have also provided over 35,000 wheelchairs through a partnership with RID 5240 and the Free Wheelchair Mission, California, a connection that also began with a Friendship Tree

My garden has become a testament to these international collaborations. Twenty-four trees, representing sixteen countries, have been planted by Rotarians from around the world. Each tree has a story. There's the Hollyhock from the UK, brought back after a study trip to learn about children with learning disability, and the flowering tree from Sri Lanka, a reminder of service after the tsunami. There are five trees planted by E Russell Smith of RC Santa Barbara Sunrise, marking the beginning of our work together providing over 35,000 wheelchairs to India, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Iraq, Tongo, Ghana, and Pakistan.

One of the most special moments was when John and Liz returned to Kerala during jackfruit season and were able to taste the fruit from the "John" tree. These trees are more than just plants; they are living reminders of the friendships forged through service. The grandson of the late PDG Gerry Powel, UK,

even traveled to Kerala specifically to see the tree planted by his grandfather. These visits often spark new projects, continuing the cycle of service and connection.

This year, as we celebrate 39 years of partnership with The Rotary Jaipur Limb, UK, with

three artificial limb camps in Dhanbad, Kolkata, and Trichur, I am reminded of the power of these simple acts of planting. These Friendship Trees help me keep alive the memories of my project partners and the valuable transformations Rotarians are making for humanity. They represent the growth of not just trees, but also of friendships, service, and the enduring spirit of Rotary.

MY RECENT TRIP TO CHENNAI AS RIPR IN RI DISTRICT 3233



As I reflect on my most recent experience as the Rotary International President's Representative (RIPR) to District 3233 in Chennai, a rush of gratitude fills my heart. Being entrusted with this honour for the fifth time to a Past District Governor like myself is a privilege beyond measure. As I often say to fellow Rotarians, the RI President cannot be there at every District Conference in a year, even if he or she wishes to do so; instead, they appoint representatives to carry forward their message and spirit.

Standing in that role, I felt the weight of responsibility and the thrill of honour, knowing that the districts bestow upon RIPR the same respect as the RI President during the district conference.

As I said earlier, this was not my first journey in this capacity; I have been fortunate enough to serve as the RI President's Representative to four other Rotary Districts earlier—3282 in Chittagong in 2018, Bangladesh; 2981 in Pondicherry in 2019; 3232 in Chennai in 2019; and 3160 at Hospet in Karnataka in 2022. Each experience—whether traversing the vibrant landscapes of Bangladesh, the warm embrace of Pondicherry, or the bustling heart of Chennai—has etched itself into my soul. I am lucky to have widened my friendship circle beyond all borders. Yet, this recent invitation from the magical RI President Stephanie Urchick to represent her at District 3233 was quite a happy moment and to me, a profound testament to my commitment and leadership over the years.

Arriving in Chennai on March 13th, 2025, with my beloved wife, DGND Dr. Meera John, we were given a warm welcome at the airport by District Governor Mahavir Bothra himself, along with his team, especially our special aides, Past Assistant Governor Rtn Kathirvel Ganapathiappan and his gracious spouse, Rtn Dr. Parkavi Mahalingam. Their warmth and hospitality enveloped us, serving as a gentle reminder of the incredible camaraderie Rotary fosters around the globe. Throughout our stay, they served as exceptional guides, navigating us through the rich tapestry of experiences that awaited us.

The Council of Governors meeting at Grand GRT Chennai on the same day evening stood as a beacon of collaborative spirit and love of past, present, and future District Governors. Here, rotary leaders exchanged ideas, each voice contributing to a chorus of shared growth and innovative practices. I shared my thought process, and we had a very intriguing interactive session with COG members and their spouses. The conference started the next afternoon with great pomp and show. GOVERNOR'S MONTHLY LETTER

SAVE VEMBANADU PROJECT

15 Rotary Clubs in Alleppey Revenue District, joined hands with the District Administration and Alleppey Municipality on a Plastic-free Vembanad Campaign on World Water Day March 22, 2025.

The Vembanad Backwaters (the largest lake in India, by area) is nature's gift to the country and is the abode of many micro-organisms, fish and biodiversity. Many of the people living on the banks of the lake find their livelihood from fishing and clam collection. Such treasures from nature are to be protected and handed over to the next generation.

The lake is getting dirty by accumulation of waste material by improper littering of plastic and other materials. Such waste disposals in the lake destroy the natural habitat. With the expansion of tourism, the quantity of waste also has increased. Such a beautiful lake can be found nowhere else in the world. It has to be protected. If responsible tourism is promoted by eliminating waste, more tourists can be attracted to the area.

Understanding the importance of maintaining a clean Vembanad Lake, about 220 people consisting of Rotarians, Kudumbasree members, Municipality employees, fishermen and other voluntary organizations set out on a cleaning spree in about 100 inland fishing boats and kayaking boats and collected plastic and other waste from different parts of the lake. Another group did the cleaning operation on the lake shore. About 3.6 tons of waste collected in sacks was handed over to the Municipality Authorities for disposal.

The cleaning operation was flagged off by the District Collector Shri Alex Varghese IAS at the Finishing Point of the famous Nehru Trophy Boat Race at the Punnamada Stretch of the Vembanad Lake. The program attended by Municipal Chairperson Smt K K Jayamma, Municipal Councilors, health workers, the local public and Rotary leaders held the public image of Rotary in esteem.

Alleppey District Nodal Officer for Malinya Muktha Nava Keralam and Chief Planner RI District 3211, Rtn PAG C Jayakumar, took leadership for the program along with Assistant Governors and other Rotary Leaders from Alleppey Revenue District.






