The Curtain Rises:

A Governor's Grand Ascension in RID 3233

he hall buzzed with anticipation as four hundred Rotarians filled every seat, their conversations creating a symphony of expectation. Then, without warning, the lights dimmed. A hush fell over the crowd as the massive screen illuminated with what could only be described as pure Kollywood magic – a cinematic montage of someone preparing, dressing, gearing up for something momentous. The music swelled, hearts raced, and then... boom. Darkness.

In that pregnant pause between spectacle and reality, the doors at the far end of the hall burst open. District Governor-elect D Devendran, resplendent in formal attire, stepped into the light alongside First Lady Ann Archana. The crowd erupted. This wasn't just an entrance – it was a statement, a promise of the theatrical year ahead.

The creative genius behind this showstopper was Rtn. Anees Begum and her team, who had orchestrated every beat of this grand entrance with the precision of a Broadway production.

As the newly minted leaders walked toward the stage, a troupe of dancers flanked them, their movements synchronized to thundering music that sent goosebumps racing up spines throughout the auditorium. But the pièce de résistance came when both the DG and First Lady, with theatrical flair that would make any action hero proud, spun the guns around their fingers and fired shots into the air – a symbolic salvo marking the dawn of a great Rotary year.







The energy was infectious. A fusion welcome dance followed, setting a tone that promised this wouldn't be your typical installation ceremony. This was entertainment, inspiration, and tradition rolled into one unforgettable morning program.

Event Chairman Past President Rtn. C Velmurugan took the podium, his voice carrying both pride and gratitude. "It is a great honour to be the event chairman," he declared, his words echoing through the hall. "How wonderful it is to see another governor emerge from our club, following in the footsteps of the iconic Governor ISAK Nazar." The reference to the legendary past governor drew appreciative murmurs from the crowd – a reminder that greatness often breeds greatness.

Immediate Past District Governor Rtn. Mahaveer Bothra stepped forward to deliver opening remarks that carried the weight of transition. His words painted the challenges and opportunities of a newly chartered district, emphasizing the critical importance of strengthening membership in these formative years. "I am grateful to the council of governors for the opportunity to serve as charter governor," he said, his voice carrying both accomplishment and hope. "I wish Devendran a magnificent year ahead as my successor."

The event took on a reflective tone as a comprehensive "year so far" video rolled across the screen. From the early core committee meeting "Kottu Murase" to the comprehensive all-services seminar "Ainthinai", the montage captured months of dedication, growth, and service. It was a visual testament to the foundation upon which the new governor would build.

Then came a moment that perfectly embodied the personal nature of Rotary leadership. District Chief Mentor Rtn. D Vijayakumar approached the podium – not just as a senior Rotarian, but as a brother introducing his sibling to greatness. The introduction was both professional and deeply personal, highlighting not just Devendran's qualifications but the character that had shaped him into leadership.















The collar ceremony itself was a study in tradition meeting innovation. As the governor's collar settled around Devendran's shoulders, the symbolic weight of leadership transferred from past to present. Family members surrounded the new governor for felicitation, followed by garlanding from his home club, Anna Nagar Aadhitya. These moments, captured in countless photographs, reminded everyone that behind every great leader stands a community of support.

The evening expanded beyond individual celebration to encompass the broader Rotary family. District Annettes Council Representative 2025-26 Ant Saindhavi Balaji was installed in the presence of DAC Chairman Rtn. Sukil Tarnas, while Rtn. Venugopal presented NextGen Connect, highlighting Rotary's commitment to engaging younger generations.

The excitement peaked with the introduction of Indravizha, the district conference. District Conference Chairman Rtn. Kathir Ganapathiappan's dedication had already yielded impressive results – over 700 registrations, a testament to effective leadership and community engagement.













A significant milestone came with the launch of "Symphony" – the governor's monthly newsletter subtitled "United Voice of RID 3233." Chairman and Editor Rtn. VS Sashikumar and his team presented this communication tool to Chief Guest Mr. R Srinivasa Naik, Principal Commissioner of GST & Central Excise, symbolizing the district's commitment to transparent, consistent communication.

Recognition followed for Arch Klumph Society members – Rtn A. P. Kanna, PDG S. Muthu Palaniappan, Rtn Veeramani, Rtn Ram N Ramamurthy, Rtn M. Ambalavanan, and Rtn Narender Srisrimal – honouring their exceptional contributions to The Rotary Foundation.

The evening's scope expanded internationally with the introduction of LEAD25, a regional Rotary Convention set for Chennai. PDG ISAK Nazar painted an exciting picture of over 10,000 Rotarians from India, Sri Lanka, and Nepal converging at Chennai Trade Centre on August 23-24. This brainchild of RI Directors AKS Muruganandam M and Nagesh promised to bring Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo to deliver the presidential address – a coup for the district and the city.

Chief Guest Mr. Srinivasa Naik, introduced by Rtn. Prashanth, delivered remarks that transcended typical ceremonial speeches. His engaging style brought focus to societal values and Rotary's unique role in creating positive change, reminding everyone why service above self remains relevant in today's world.

As District Executive Secretary Rtn. Balamurugan delivered the vote of thanks, the morning felt complete yet anticipatory. The installation had been more than a ceremony; it was a launchpad for twelve months of service, growth, and community impact. As the formal program concluded by 1:30 PM and guests moved toward the lunch reception, conversations buzzed with excitement about the year ahead.

The curtain had risen on a new act in RID 3233's story, with District Governor D Devendran at centre stage, ready to transform vision into reality.

On a day that also witnessed the launch of Healers Harmony, RID 3233 proved one thing loud and clear – when we unite for good, lives transform.














A Plate Full of Warmth and Purpose

Part 1:

The Wheel Begins to Turn

Madras, 1929. The Beginning of Rotary in South India
Told through the eyes of a fictional interpreter named
Ravi Subramaniam, a 25-year-old clerk with a talent
for languages.

May 10, 1929 - Parry's Corner, Madras Presidency

The fan creaked. The sweat refused to dry. The air, thick with salt and talk of trade, crackled with something unfamiliar. I was sitting outside the conference room of Parry & Co., translating telegrams for a visiting foreigner—a certain Mr. James Wheeler Davidson. My boss, Mr. C.E. Wood, said he was "a man of global consequence."

I had no idea what that meant. But I would find out soon enough.

Mr. Davidson was unlike anyone I had seen before. His suit was too heavy for Madras, his eyes too clear, too searching. He spoke softly, but when he did, even the office fans seemed to hush. Alongside him was his wife,


Lillian, and their daughter Marjory—impossibly fair, eyes scanning the city as if trying to understand its rhythm.

They were here for something called Rotary.

A club? A movement? I wasn't sure. All I knew was that the city's powerhouses—men from Binny & Co., the Bombay Company, South Indian Exporters—had gathered that day. Not to trade. Not to toast. But to listen to a man who talked of *service* as if it were currency.

"Service above self," he said. "A fellowship not bound by empire, but by empathy."

Some blinked. Some scoffed. But he went on.
Rotary, he explained, wasn't just another imperial import. It was a gathering of professionals who pledged to make their communities better—together. A wheel, turning ever outward, connecting cities, countries, and cultures.



Davidson had already planted clubs in Constantinople, Athens, Cairo, and Baghdad. And now, after crossing deserts and oceans, he stood here—on the scorched earth of Madras—asking thirty businessmen to believe in something invisible.

I translated his words into Tamil, hesitantly at first, then with growing certainty. When I said *Namakkum mel*, "above self," something clicked in me. And perhaps in them, too.

By sunset, the first Rotary Club in South India was born. Thirty charter members—all expatriates —stood in a room that smelled of old teak and new ideas. C.G. Armstrong of the Madras Port Trust was named the Charter President. Chance Morton became the first honorary secretary. Fred James from the United Planters' Association—the man who'd become Sir Frederick later—stood tall beside Davidson, smiling faintly.

They didn't know it yet, but that meeting would carry forward a flame first lit in Calcutta, passed through Bombay, and now glowing in the South — in Madras, where tradition met trade, and ideals found eager hearts.

I remember looking at Davidson as he packed his leather case. He caught my gaze and smiled.

"You'll remember this day, Ravi," he said.

I didn't know how to reply. But I nodded — and I did remember. For decades.

Years later, as an old man sipping filter coffee on my Mylapore verandah, I'd read about Rotary's vaccine drives, their schools, their clinics. I'd see young Indians wearing that small golden pin. And I'd think of that warm, crowded room in 1929.

Where a foreigner planted not the first seed, but a seed that would take deep southern root — and a nation was once again invited to water it.
