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First Lady Message

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
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India is celebrating its 75 years of independence 'azadi ka amritmahotsav'. Government's call for 15th August 'har ghar tiranga' was religiously followed by every citizen, and in Rotary almost every Club celebrated the occasion with great enthusiasm and fervour. India from the pains of partition, followed by many wars with neighbours and from an underdeveloped Nation has emerged as the 5th largest economy of the world is nothing less than a miracle. As a Rotarian let us serve the community and help the downtrodden, needy and deprived with our best abilities and work towards making our country a developed Nation.

First fortnight of August District Pulse Program was very successful as more than 50% Clubs organized Blood Donation Camps throughout District and we able to collect more than 2500 units of blood. It is indeed a huge number and we will able to save many precious lives through this MAHADAAN. Second project was about eye and body donation. Many clubs have conducted awareness campaign in and outside Rotary. More than a million visually impaired population are waiting for corneal transplant, and approximately 50,000 new cases are being reported every year. Our hyperactive action can bridge this gap to some extent.

It is said that nearly 1.2 million joined Rotary in last 10 years and almost same number has left. Were we able to retain all those members we would has been just doubled today. August being Membership and extensions month, we gave a call to all Club leaders first to give attention towards retention instead of new members induction as we had enormous and haphazard growth in term of membership previous year. Nearly ten new members orientation programs were conducted in the different Zones of our District and many more shall follow. Despite our earnest efforts we had to lose many members but still happy to share that we had a substantial growth of net membership. First Satellite club of this year has come up at Saharanpur sponsored by Saharanpur Greater. Many more in other parts of District are in pipeline. Few Rotaract, Interact and RCC Clubs have been chartered in this month.

After eradicating polio, the eradication of illiteracy is and should be our primary focus for action in our country and of course in our District as well. Let us work to make our schools Happy School preferably where we have adopted a village. The second and most important work to do in literacy, is to bring back the school dropouts as after pandemic nearly 20 million out of 250 million have permanently stopped coming to schools. As September is literacy month let us bring these dropouts back to school and fulfill our Nations dream to make India 100% literate.

29th September is marked as World Heart Day and Clubs are appealed to observe 2nd fortnight to do the activities like Medical Camps, talk in Clubs by experts, organize walk or cycle rallies or any other awareness camps where community at large can be benefited.

Imaginer Club Leaders we are left with less then 10 months to turn our dreams into reality.

# REMINISCING YESTER-YEARS

Everybody has a story to tell from the past. The brain takes a series of snapshots and these snapshots become frozen in time-making memories. My earliest memories are those of my school, Loreto Convent School in Shimla............. During the long winter vacations, we would go to Nana-Nani's house in Ambala. Theirs was a household bustling with activity 24\*7. The outhouses had cows, buffaloes and there was a beautiful vegetable garden, supply of fresh milk and vegetables were there in abundance. Pet dogs were well lovedand treated as members of the family. But as a young girl myfavourite past time was a large collection of Women and Home magazines, well stacked up in the living room cupboard, my best time was spent going through these.

In Ambala, there were close-knit circle of family and friends who loved to play golf. Most of them were active Rotarians. Little did I know that one day I too would become a part of one such family. My husband Rtn. Rakesh Mittal's grandfather, Rtn. H.K.Das was a charter member of Rotary Club of Ambala, one of the oldest clubs in present day District 3080. He was the District Governor of District 308 in the year 1967-68. At that time District 308 extended from Lahore in the West to Allahabad in the East, Srinagar in the North and Bhopal in Central India.

We lived in Chandigarh and my involvement with Rotary began when my husband, A Merchant Mariner, became a Rotarian. Like any other young couple, we threw ourselves with full enthusiasm and dedication to Club projects like tree plantation, blood donation camps, empowering the girl child and women, holding Eye Camps in collaboration with overseas clubs. Some of my best moments of Rotary were to hear Yash Mama address an audience. Yes! You guessed it right. I am talking about PRID Yashpal Das or YP or Yash as he was fondly called by all.

Once when I asked Manju Mami the secret of his oratory skills. It did have a lot to do with his schooling. He was an alumni of Lawrence School, Sanawar. Most importantly she informed me, it was because of his perseverance and preparation to achieve perfection in whatever he did. He would wake up in the wee hours of the morning and get ready with the content of what he had to speak and make his talks powerful and poignant.

A few exude so much charm and charisma that Yash Mama did. He lived and breathed Rotary. His energy and enthusiasm were palpable. Intellect combined with vision propelled him on to become the Director of Rotary International for the year 2011 - 13. He also chaired the executive committee of the Board of Directors of Rotary International. In the year 2013, the infamous cloud burst of Kedarnath resulted in a major flash floods, causing widespread destruction in Uttarakhand and led to heavy losses to human life, infrastructure and animals. Yash Mama through Rotary undertook the responsibility of reconstruction and rebuilding of 32 Schools across Uttarakhand.

The wretched Covid-19 did not deter him from visiting the Rotary Cancer Hospital in Ambala. He who had never experienced a day's illness in his life, finally succumbed to this deadly virus. The light went out of our lives but it will continue to illuminate the path of so many of us whose lives he touched. He is sorely missed!



#### EYE DONATION – CHALLENGES AND SOLUTIONS

There is gross deficiency of eye donation in India. On an average the need for corneas for sight restoring surgeries is one lakh per year, only 40-50,000 transplants are performed every year. 50,000 new cases are added each year to the long list of blind people waiting to be cured. According to the Eye Bank Association of India, the number of eyes collected in 2010 is 41,549. And more important is the fact that of this total, only a little more than 10,000 meet all the criteria of medical standards as per the requirement for quality control of eye banks. Although there are enough qualified surgeons and plenty of potential patients corneal transplantation is rather scarce for want of donor eyes. Nearly 10 million people die in India, every year. Sadly the corneal donation does not exceed more than a few thousand. The reasons for the very low number of eye donation in India are manifold.

- Lack of awareness among the general public Improper development of infrastructure
- Absence of motivation even among trained personnel Social and religious taboos.

**Eye banks** retrieve and store eyes for cornea transplants and research. The first eye bank was founded in 1944. Currently, in the United States, eye banks provide tissue for about 46,000 cornea transplants each year.

#### LABORATORY PROCESSING

A sample of the donor's blood is also collected to test for infectious diseases such as HIV, hepatitis B, hepatitis C, human cytomegalovirus, syphilis, and sometimes others. The blood type is also tested, although corneas do not receive any blood supply and match typing is not necessary for transplantation. Causes of corneal blindness include a wide variety of infections and inflammatory eye diseases, congenital disease and traditional eye medicine or home remedies, which often harm the eye rather than relieve the pain or improve eyesight. If the person was a voluntary donor or the relatives of the dead are consenting for donation, after the declaration of death. The eyes should be protected in the body by the time arrangement is made for enucleation, by taking following steps;

- Closing both eyelids gently and putting a paper tape over them. Putting the antibiotic eye drops in both eyes
- Wet ice pack wrapped in a gauge piece or gloves are applied over the closed eye lids, care should be taken that eye balls are not frozen.
- Whole body can be preserved in ice packs but eye ball should not be frozen. Keep the donor head elevated.

In order to enhance the eye donations; the younger age group should be encouraged and motivated to pledge eyes, as this is the group that is more willing to provide their eyes and can contribute to high quality grade of cornea. Hospital corneal retrieval program can be the main source of eye donations, the program can overcome the difficult topography and climatic conditions that limits the home based retrieval of corneas. Dispelling the myths and beliefs in old and rural population, involving NGOs and encouraging electronic media participation can go a long way in improving the eye donations. To motivate the donation of relatives of deceased, one should convey following information

• This is an act of immortality even after death of on individual. • A single person can give sight to two living people. • It just takes 20-30 minutes to complete the procedure and is an act of novelty. • The eyes can be removed in a medico legal case after the post mortem. • Since there are less **voluntary donations** in India so the hospital retrieval system not only could be an effective source of eyes but it provides better quality of (higher grade) eyes also, as eyes can be examined before enucleation.

In aiming to eliminate corneal blindness, a multi-pronged strategy needs to be developed. In a country with limited resources and a vast population, optimization of available facilities and prioritization of healthcare commitments need to be proportioned rationally. Control of preventable causes requires extensive public support and community participation. It falls in the realm of public health. Curable or treatable blindness requires a spectrum of care, including medication, optical rehabilitation and corneal transplantation. Overall, continued assessment of the burden of corneal blindness with periodic review of trends is required to effectively plan preventive, promotive and rehabilitative blindness control strategies.

Famous English author Joseph Addison said:

"What's sculpture is to a block of marble, education is to a human soul"

Education brings about all round development of an individual. It can help one realise full potential as human being. Literacy is the first step towards education and only a literate India can become educated India. Literacy has been associated with socio-economic development and for self-reliance of the individual.

About 80 per cent of the population lives in villages that have the largest concentration of illiterate people. These areas also have maximum gender differentials. Social organisations like Rotary International aim to maximize the efforts taken by government to bring about changes in society.

Rotary India Literacy Mission (RILM) endeavours to promote female literacy. Under different economic conditions, and under the influence of specific historical, cultural, legal and religious factors, gender bias and marginalization of women can be seen from their exclusion from certain jobs and occupations. Women belonging to lower classes, lower castes, illiterate, and the poorest region have been marginalized more than their better off counterparts. In our Indian Society traditionally, women manage the house business, day to day economic affairs, and control the family budget. In this sense, a woman if equipped with basic education would be able to manage the home budget more efficiently which finally affect their economic growth and overall development of the family and the country as well. They can participate and contribute to the democratic process and take benefit of various government schemes as well which would finally raise the graph of national development. To overcome the situation where women need to be empowered it is most important that they should be literate first. Woman empowerment would automatically lead to Girl empowerment. Rotary India Literacy Mission is committed to equip children to the best of their ability for securing a meaningful place in society.

Through literacy RILM not only aims to alleviate poverty from society but also wishes to equip children from dispossessed groups with knowledge. To achieve that, RILM have designed a comprehensive program called "T-E-A-C-H", where T stands for Teacher Support, E for E-learning, A for Adult Literacy, C for Child Development and H for Happy Schools. Happy School Program aims to provide/upgrade the infrastructural and co-scholastic facilities in state funded schools, to make them secure, attractive and happy learning places for students and teachers. Since the inception of the TEACH program, RILM have successfully transformed 3,112 government and government-aided schools across the country through Rotary clubs and districts.

Whether we talk about adult literacy or female literacy social organisations like schools and NGO'S have a big role to play. As a part of its future goals RILM plans to employ student volunteers for building a child tracking system and holding awareness workshops with parents to ensure that they send children to school. It also plans to provide gap classes to drop out children so that they get enrolled in their age-appropriate grade. Rotary clubs must come forward and take this program to the masses to make India Literate.

" In such an endeavour Rotary Club Ambala Midtown , under the leadership of President Dr. Kiran Angra has initiated a new project "Chalo school ki aur" for ragpicker children. Rag pickers play an important, but usually unrecognised role in the waste management system of Indian cities. 

I was persuaded to contest for the post of District Governor by my seniors. Such as late PDG H.K.Das, PDG Laxmi Sagar, PDG Mahajan & PDG O.P.Shingla.

I do not know why I was chosen by my seniors to be a District Governor. I think it may be because of my tenure as president of Rotary Club of Ambala. As President I had served with great enthusiasm and some major projects that come to my mind are Rotary Welfare School for Deaf, opening an outlet to give fresh & pure condiments to the society, besides number of other projects such as adopting a village namely Salar Hari.

To serve as a District Governor in a District like R.I. 3080 is a privilege and pleasure. Before serving as a District Governor, Rotarian himself must be acquainted with the District and the Rotarians of the district, for that I visited all the clubs where I was spontaneously greeted. 

When I look back I feel as Rotary Governor, besides service you develop international friends and they shall always remain cherished treasure.

I shall always cherish the memories of my year of service and shall always be grateful to my friends who helped me. In the end the fellowship and friendship achieved during that year shall always be etched in my memory. I thank each and every Rotarian who helped me serve the District. I wish R.I.District 3080 to build a new milestone in the service to community and develop friendship & fellowship.

# DOWN THE MEMORY LANE

PDG Prem P. Bhalla Dist Governor 310 (1978-79)



I was just 40 years old when I was elected governor at Raja Saboo's conference at Talkatora Indoor Stadium, New Delhi. A year and a half later I took over as the district governor.

R.I. President Clem Renouf gave us the theme: **Reach Out**. To strengthen our efforts, I added: let us do it with 'Simplicity and Sincerity'.

To make it possible, I prepared a Weekly Meeting Handbook for presidents and a Membership Record File for club secretaries, and also circulars to make service activities simple and meaningful. Besides the presidents and secretaries, I had a district setup of just 40 senior Rotarians.

On July 1, I took over 60 clubs, added 16 new clubs, and terminated one club. I could have added more clubs, but I followed the simple principle: No new club is worthwhile if it is accepted hesitatingly by Rotarians.

Besides two clubs, I made official visits to all the clubs before the district conference. I would spend one full day with each club. Every month, on the 25th, I would issue a 8-page GML written by me. I succeeded in doing so throughout the year, with a District Report circulated on June 30.

Great emphasis was given to club attendance. Most of the clubs would strive for 100% attendance months by making absentees attend meetings in nearby clubs.

Among service projects most clubs preferred to organize Blood Donation and Eye Relief camps. Almost the whole district was affected by floods in September, and besides immediate relief supplies, the clubs provided follow-up services.

Since the Rotary Cancer Hospital was to be made in the premises of AIIMS, New Delhi, and we had to contribute our share, all Rotarians and their families were encouraged to save money by putting coins in piggy banks provided by a generous Rotarian.

12 Intercity meetings were held in different parts of the district to involve the maximum number. The district conference named: Goodwill Conference, held at Hardwar, attracted over a thousand participants. Clubs participated wholeheartedly in the cultural programme by Rotarians for Rotarians.

I handed over an enthusiastic district to my successor at the FICCI Auditorium, New Delhi, which was filled to capacity with some even sitting on the steps. It was a memorable year. Two of my club presidents and two district chairmen went on to become district governors. Even after 44 years, I have fond memories of one of the greatest years in my life.

# Rotary's two official mottoes

Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, Rotary's official mottoes, can be traced back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911, the second Rotary convention, in Portland, Oregon, USA, approved He Profits Most Who Serves Best as the Rotary motto. The wording was adapted from a speech that Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon delivered to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland gathering also inspired the motto Service Above Self. During an outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Rotary founder Paul Harris, who also was on the trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 Rotary International Convention in Detroit, Michigan, USA, two slogans were formally approved as the official mottoes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council on Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified to They Profit Most Who Serve Best in 2004 and to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best, in 2010.




She had never known when she had been so galled, and sighed with relief when her flight was called. She gathered her belongings and headed to the gate, refusing to look back at the thieving ingrate.


