Nigerian physician Dr.Tunji Funsho named one of TIME's most influential people in the world .He is the first Rotary member to receive this honour for the organisation's work to eradicate polio ,having played an essential role in ensuring Africa's certification as wild polio free in August 2020 .As the leader of Rotary's Nigeria national polio plus committee, Funsho has worked to create awareness about the importance of polio immunisation, served as a vocal leader and advocate for Rotary's fight to end Polio.

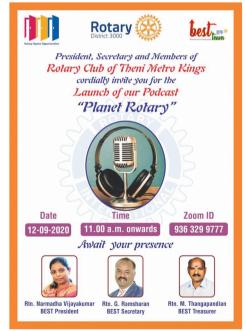






Club News:

Club Projects:

RO Plant was given to government school in Baalacombai ,on 8th September 2020 where around 150 students study in the rural school and 12 teachers and support staff work there .The school does not have proper drinking water facilities and our club provided the same .

A blood donation camp was organised by Vikram Blood Bank in association with our club. Around 35 units of blood was collected and the event took place on 17th September 2020 .









Scholarship of Rs.6000 was given to Ms.Sujitha, on 19th September 2020 who lost her father due to illness and whose mother works as a house help. She is enrolled in Nadar Saraswathi girls higher secondary school ,Theni and has taken the biology maths group in 11th grade.

Joint speaker meets hosted by the club :

Joint speaker meet organised by the club on September 11th 2020. Our club hosted a virtual training program for teachers on jolly phonics along with Rotary club of Karur Angels in which around 80 teachers from seven schools in Theni, Madurai and Karur districts participated. Ms.Sashi Natarajan from Camrose Primary School, London, UK was the trainer. We provided digital certificates to all participants.



On September 18th 2020, our club hosted a virtual training session for teachers on storytelling and puppetry along with Rotary club of Madurai Malligai in which around 120 teachers from 15 schools in Theni and Madurai districts participated. Ms.Janaki Sabesh, actor and storyteller gave the opening remarks. Ms.Dharanya trained the teachers on Kamishibai, a Japanese form of theatre art. The digital certificates were provided to all participants.



On 20th September 2020 being the eve of World Alzheimer's Day, our club jointly with Rotary club of Madurai Gems hosted an awareness meet on Alzheimer's. Eight clubs from Rotary International district 3000 cohosted the event virtually with around 70 participants. Dr.Raja-senior consultant and geriatric physician gave a lot of insight.





Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) was organised and hosted by three clubs in Rotary International district 3000 Rotary



club of Dindigul, Kodaikanal and Theni metro kings involved seven schools and around 120 students participated. Dr. C. Sailendra Babu IPS was the chief guest. These students were trained on decision-making and confidence building through public speaking. The digital certificates and e-learning materials were given to all participating students.

An awareness meet on the needs of children with disabilities in inclusive schools was organised on 30th September 2020. Eleven other clubs from the district 3000 cohosted this event virtually and around 200 participants from various regions- heads of schools ,special educators and psychology students were benefited. An oath by all 12 participating clubs were taken in which each club will adopt a special school and continue to provide assistance in the smooth running of the same.





RYLA* - Rotary Youth Leadership Award

What is RYLA ?

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive training program that brings together youth and young adults, ages 12 - 30 years to further develop character and leadership skills and learn about Rotary.

This exciting program engages Rotary clubs and Districts around the world.

RYLA originated in the year 1959 in Queensland, Australia.

RYLA was created as a festival highlighting local youth, organized in honour of a royal visit by Princess Victoria.

RYLA has since become an opportunity to help the next generation of leaders define themselves and expand their skills.

Rotary International (RI) officially adopted RYLA in 1971.

OBJECTIVES OF RYLA

To demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth.

To encourage and assist young people by providing them with a valuable training experience.

To foster continued and stronger Leadership of youth by youth.

To recognise the many young people who are rendering service to their communities as youth leaders.

RYLA - Structure

The first step towards starting a RYLA is determining the organization of the program.

RYLA can be done at the Club level, District level, Multi District level and International level.

CLUB LEVEL RYLA

The Club President will appoint a RYLA committe to carry out the event, promoting event participation, recommending the budget and site selection.

DISTRICT LEVEL RYLA

The district governor is responsible within the District for RYLA. The governor appoints a District RYLA chair to communicate and promote RYLA to the clubs and to observe a district committee that organized district level RYLA.

MULTI DISTRICT RYLA

The program is jointly organized by more than one district. Each District Governor must obtain advance approval of two thirds of the clubs in the district. Informations regarding this to be intimated to the RI General Secretary.

INTERNATIONAL RYLA

The RI sponsered International RYLA held immediately before the RI convention focuses on developing advanced leadership skills.

International RYLA participants ages limit between 18 - 30 years and be sponsered by their local rotary club or district.

Local rotary clubs or districts delegate from those attending their local RYLA or other outstanding Rotary Youth Program participants.

Guest Column:

'Now our voices can be heard too! ~ Podcasts a way to the future.'

Decades before the advent of television, 'radio pottis' had a central place in our hearts and homes. The unforgettable 'Namashkar, yeh aakashwanihai' signalled 'entertainment time' in most households, where family members would huddle together before a brown box with big dials, waiting to hear news from across the world. Much before our romance for visuals began, we have been intrigued and mystified by the power of the voice.



An example of how someone's voice could enthrall us would be that of the late legendary singer S.P. Balasubhramanyam, who had the power to bring about an array of emotions in just one song. He could laugh, cry and evoke feelings so intense that any layman listening to his songs would instantly be attracted to listen to the song again and again. What makes the voice more powerful is the window of imagination it creates for the listener.

As we graduated from medium to medium, our love for radio remains intact. In my experience as a radio jockey, I have noticed that the fandom that a radio jockey has is as great as that of a movie star. And it is all in the voice. Not honey dipped, not melodious but like that of your best friend on the other side of the phone. One needs education to be able to read newspapers, know-how of technology to access the internet or a television, but absolutely nothing but a pair of headphones and a phone to access radio. This ice-breaking ease has made it a hit among the masses.

HAM radios were dubbed amateur radios, because non-professionals could make use of it to share thoughts about things they liked with like minded HAM operators. Now, just picture podcasts here. A much upgraded version of a ham radio, available at the comfort of your smartphone.

I remember my first podcast episode. It was commissioned for a friend and when I asked her how I could record without a studio set-up, all she said was 'just record it on your phone in a quiet room'. Little did I know that this episode would later spark interest in me creating my own podcast space where I can freely talk about things passionate and close to me. Thus was born 'The Lazy Parent podcast' where since 2019, I have been talking about parenting, living mindfully and enjoying the finer details in life.

I believe podcasts are the way forward not just for our generation, but for the generations before and after ours. Schools taking up the podcast space shows that there is more space to explore and a lot more to conquer by their students. NGOs running podcast channels to propagate their ideas and ideals, elders sharing anecdotes from a time we can only imagine or youngsters sharing ideas that will change the world as we see it are just small examples of what one can achieve with podcasts.

The beauty of podcasts is its global availability, as opposed to radios that are bandwidth specific. This means that I could be sitting in Theni talking about the 'Merkuthodarchimalai' and its beauty, while someone sitting in Toronto could be listening to my podcast, reliving the beauty of the landscape from their childhood. Another interesting factor is that regional podcasts have a greater preference as they are more relatable and have a deeper connect with the listeners. In fact, my favourite podcast find of the year would be a retelling of Kalki's Ponniyin Selvan, where the narrator Kavitha recreates the grand palaces and dozens plus characters over 234 episodes with just her voice and nothing else. If this isn't victory, what is?

Finally, as I have been doing for the past few years, I urge my esteemed reader to try out podcasts! Yes, it's absolutely fun filled an experience and even the most introverted people find their comfort zones in podcasts. Go on, download an app, try to record something that you feel passionate about and see a completely different personality blossom right at the click of a button!

Annettes column

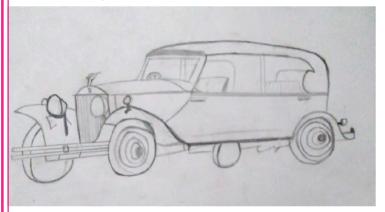
Welcome all, I am G.R. Tejaaswin studying in class 9 in Velemmal School, Theni. This article is about why I like cars a lot more than anything.
