









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#### From the Editor's desk

#### **Dear Fellow Rotarian,**

World Polio Day, 24th October, was created by Rotary International to commemorate the birthday of Jonas Salk who led the first team to develop a polio vaccine.

Salk tested his experimental injectable, inactivated polio-virus vaccine on



himself and his family in 1953, and a year later on 1.6 million children in Canada, Finland and the USA. The results were announced on 12 April 1955, and Salk's inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) was licensed on the same day. Six years later a "live" oral polio vaccine (OPV) was developed which became the vaccine of choice for immunization programmes across the globe.

In 1979 Rotary International initiated a multi-year project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines to take on the disease, and in 1985 Polio Plus was launched to eradicate polio. A truly ambitious project, it has been called the first and largest internationally coordinated private sector support of a public health initiative.

Rotary International and the World Health Organization launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in 1988. National governments and CDC came together for the cause. The efforts were remarkable. From raising of funds, managing logistics, supply chains, people to outreach. In 1995 health workers and volunteers immunized a record 165 million children in China and India in 1 week. In 2010 India was removed from the list of polio endemic countries.

When PolioPlus was formed in 1985, polio paralyzed more than 1,000 children every single day across 125 polio-endemic countries. Because #VaccinesWork, today just two countries, Afghanistan and Pakistan remain polio-endemic. It is crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

As long as a single child remains infected, children in all countries are at risk of contracting polio. Failure to eradicate polio from these last remaining strongholds could result in a global resurgence of the disease. If we finish the job, polio will become the second human disease, after smallpox, to be wiped from the face of the earth.

Thanks to these efforts, more than 20 million people are able to walk today who would otherwise have been paralysed. An estimated 1.5 million childhood deaths have been prevented through the systematic administration of vitamin A during polio immunization activities.

The story of successful vaccination campaigns is not just one of creating facilities, raising funds and bringing together hundreds of people to administer the vaccines. Besides this, vaccine hesitancy also needs to be understood and addressed. In the age of social media the fast and free spread of misinformation is an additional challenge. Awareness campaigns that simplify the science, reiterate the benefits, build trust and clear doubts are an important part of vaccination programs.

I am proud to be part of a Rotary that has spearheaded this amazing campaign overcome challenges and brought us to a nearly polio free world. We are hopefully on the last lap to victory.






## INTIES
