

The Magic of Rotary is belonging, and it's a feeling that can appear when you least expect it.

Earlier this year, I was in Slovakia serving as a president's representative during a six-week trip through Europe. When I wrote to Katarina Cechova, governor of District 2240 at the time, I mentioned that my grandmother Veronica Zilka grew up in a small village in the area before settling in the U.S.

It wasn't long before Cechova tracked down my grandmother's village, Jakubova Vol'a. She even organized a visit for me, where I received an unforgettable Slovakian welcome.

When I entered the community center of Jakubova Vol'a, a small crowd of people dressed in traditional Slovakian clothing greeted me. They sang with beautiful and powerful Central European voices that reminded me of my grandmother.

A lot of families play cards or games when they get together. When I was young, my father would pick up his accordion and lead my family in song. My grandmother would sing along with her impressive voice.

When I walked into the community center and heard traditional music from my childhood when I saw a woman play the accordion the way my dad played — I suddenly felt like a little girl sitting at my grandmother's house in Monessen, Pennsylvania. I burst into tears of joy at the memories.

But the magic didn't stop there. District Governor Cechova really outdid herself. A local genealogist worked with a videographer to make a short film about my grandmother. We watched the video together in the community center.

When the video ended, I turned around and saw a man standing in the back of the room. I quickly learned that this stranger, Frantisek Zilka, was my second cousin. His grandmother and mine had been sisters. I felt like I had been struck by lightning.

I visited my newfound cousin's home, which happens to be the home where my grandmother was born. There, he shared old photographs I had never seen of my dad, my uncle, and my grandmother.

Since then, I can't stop thinking about my family of Rotary. When I refer to you as my family, I'm not just being kind. I really think of everyone in Rotary as my family. But I never would have imagined that my Rotary family would introduce me to long-lost personal family.

Sitting in that community center listening to traditional Slovakian music from my childhood filled me with joy and a profound sense of belonging. I am so grateful to District Governor Cechova and everyone who helped create that magical experience.

As members of Rotary, we have a unique opportunity to share the same magic with each other and with the world. I encourage you to consider how you can help spread that magic and ensure other members of your club — other members of our Rotary family — feel like they truly belong

Congratulations to us "Rotary Club of New York #6" Chartered 115 years ago!

Please see some historical background below!

On February 23rd, 1905, on Dearborn Street in Chicago the miracle happened – ROTARY was born. The Chicago Club was Club #1. Rotary moved west and San Francisco became Club #2 in 1908; then Oakland was chartered a couple months later as Club #3; followed by Seattle, #4; and Los Angeles, #5. Rotary was on the move.

The idea of forming a Rotary Club in New York came in a message to Elmer DePue in New York, not from Paul Harris but from Clarence J Wetmore, member of the Rotary Club of San Francisco. Elmer was the President of the Eastern Division of the Cresta Blanca Wine Company.

In an effort to start the wheels rolling, Elmer consulted with Daniel Cady of New York who, as a close friend of Paul Harris, agreed to talk with Paul. Paul Harris dispatched Fred Tweed of Chicago to talk with Cady, DePue and Bradford Bullock at a meeting held on August 18, 1909. Six days later on August 24th, 1909 the Rotary Club of New York was formed. There were 15 charter members and Bradford Bullock was elected President. Bradford Bullock served as President for two years. The Honorary member of this Club was Paul Harris, elected at the initial meeting of the New York Rotary on August 24th, 1909.

Since there were no established requirements for weekly meetings, Club #6 held dinner meetings semi-monthly, the second and fourth Thursdays, rotating the meeting to different restaurants and hotels.

At that time, there were three objects: 1) Promotion of the business interests of the members; 2) Advance the best interests of New York, and 3) Spread the spirit of the city pride and loyalty among its citizens.

On September 14th, 1909, the Rotary Club of New York was incorporated under the laws of the State of New York.

The first lapel pin in the history of the Rotary was designed and made by NY Club member, John Frick on October 14th, 1909 and worn by President Bradford Bullock from 1909 to 1911. The pin was presented to the Club and is now on display in the Club office. This was the forerunner of the traditional Rotary pin work today.

The Rotary Foundation supports education through scholarships, donations, and service projects around the world.


Rotary members make amazing things happen, like:

New teaching methods: The SOUNS program in South Africa, Puerto Rico and the United States teaches educators how to improve literacy by teaching children to recognize letters by sounds instead of names.

Making schools healthy: Rotarians are providing clean, fresh water to every public school in Lebanon so students can be healthier and get a better education.



Rtn. Sangkoo Yun RI President for 2026-27

Sangkoo Yun, of the Rotary Club of Sae Hanyang, Seoul, Korea, is the selection of the nominating committee to become Rotary International's president for 2026-27. He will be officially declared the president-nominee on 15 September if no other candidates challenge him.

Yun received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the Syracuse University School of Architecture in the U.S. and an honorary doctoral degree from The University of Edinburgh, Scotland. He is the founder and CEO of Dongsuh Corp., which engineers and markets architectural materials, and the president of Youngan Corp., which operates in real estate and financial investment. He is involved in many civic organizations and has a special interest in the preservation of cultural heritage.

A Rotary member since 1987, when he was a charter member of the Rotary Club of Sae Hanyang, Yun has served Rotary International as a director, trustee, committee member and chair, and RI learning facilitator. He served for eight years as co-chair of the Keep Mongolia Green Project, by Korean members of Rotary. His RI committee roles include the Board Administration Committee (2013-15, vice chair 2014-15), the International Assembly Committee (vice chair, 2020-21), and the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee (regional vice chair, 2023-27). He also served on The Rotary Foundation's Executive Committee (2019-22, chair 2020-21) and Programs Committee (2019-22, chair 2020-22).

Yun received The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award in 2021-22. He was appointed an Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II, awarded the Friendship Medal by the president of Mongolia, and recognized for distinguished services by the president and prime minister of Korea. He is a veteran of the Republic of Korea Army and an emeritus elder at Andong Presbyterian Church.

Yun and his spouse, Eunsun, are Rotary Foundation Benefactors, Major Donors, and members of the Arch Klumph Society, the Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society. They have two children.

THE CHANGING FACE OF OUR CITY OVER THE YEARS

The buildings/premises in our city have changed over the years or centuries. We have been witness to some and some heard from older generation & history or part of the Folk lore Some key ones are

Westhill barracks: it was the collectors bungalow in the early 19th century. The last collector to reside in it was Mr.Connoly. After he was assassinated the building campus was converted in to army barracks by the british and later in to an NCC battalion and later Indian Army Regiment took over it

Huzur kacheri: this was the old collectorate at manchira had an heritage building a 19th century model. This was later demolished and sold to LIC in late 1970's and LIC made its campus in manchira

Old Corporation office at Moonalingal near beach road. It was another 19th century model when Calicut was a muinicipality. It was known as municipal office and in early 1990's it was replaced by the present corporation office, this structure has stood the passage of time although not used much for the present

The Commonwealth Weaving Co at Mananchira- the original structure is nearly 200years old. It was real architectural marvel of the bygone era.The factory has closed shop and property is in the process of changing hands and will go down in memory

The calicut or kozhikode railway station campus. It was the best railway station campus in our state. It had several heritage buildings and a railway club. Now it is in the process of becoming in to a hi-tech railway station

Onam is an annual harvest festival celebrated predominantly in Kerala, India. It is a significant cultural event that marks the return of King Mahabali, a mythical figure revered for his benevolence and just rule. The festival spans over ten days, culminating in Thiruvonam, which is considered the most auspicious day.

The cultural significance of Onam lies in its deep-rooted connections to agrarian traditions and Hindu mythology. It symbolizes gratitude towards nature for its bounty and celebrates the spirit of community and togetherness. The festival showcases Kerala's rich heritage through various art forms, traditional music, dance performances, and elaborate feasts.

Onam celebrations are characterized by several rituals and activities:

Pookalam (Floral Decorations): One of the most visually striking aspects of Onam is the creation of Pookalam, intricate floral designs made from various flowers laid out at the entrance of homes. This tradition begins on Atham day and grows more elaborate as the festival progresses.

Onasadya (Feast): The Onasadya is a grand feast served on banana leaves that includes a variety of vegetarian dishes such as rice, curries, pickles, and desserts like Payasam. It reflects the culinary diversity of Kerala and emphasizes communal dining.

Traditional Games and Sports: Various games are played during Onam, including Vallamkali (boat races), which are particularly popular in Kerala's backwaters. These races feature large snake boats manned by teams competing against each other amidst cheers from spectators.

Family Gatherings: Families come together during Onam to celebrate their heritage and strengthen bonds. The festival serves as an occasion for family reunions where members share stories, laughter, and meals.
