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Austrian Rotary member Anton Zeilinger wins Nobel Prize in physics


Anton Zeilinger, member of the Rotary Club of Wien-West in Austria won the 2022 Nobel Prize in physics.

Anton Zeilinger, a member of the Rotary Club of Wien-West in Austria, was among three physicists who were announced as the winners of the Nobel Prize in physics on 4 October for their experiments in quantum mechanics. Their research laid the groundwork for rapidly developing new applications in computing and cryptography.

Zeilinger, a professor at the University of Vienna, shared the award with French physicist Alain Aspect and U.S. physicist John F. Clauser. Their experiments explored quantum entanglement, a phenomenon that occurs when two particles behave as a single unit, even when separated. The three scientists will share the prize of nearly US\$900,000.

"I'm still kind of shocked, but it's a very positive shock," Zeilinger told reporters in Stockholm, Sweden, shortly after learning that he won. "I was actually very surprised to get the call."

He also acknowledged the contributions of more than 100 students who had worked for him over the years. He advised young people, "Do what you find interesting, and don't care too much about possible applications."




The Nobel Prizes are announced every October and November by committees in Sweden and Norway for ground-breaking contributions in chemistry, economic sciences, literature, peace work, physics, and physiology or medicine. In December, Zeilinger and the other laureates will accept their award in Stockholm.

Zeilinger has been a Rotary member since 2001.

Rotary Youth Exchange Seminar

The District Rotary Youth Exchange Committee organized a Rotary Youth Exchange Seminar on 30th October 2022 at Sai Sabhagrah Shankar Nagar, Nagpur. The seminar was hosted by Rotary Club Nagpur Elite in association with the Rotary Club of Nagpur, Rotary Club of Nagpur West, and Rotary Club of Nagpur Ishanya.

DG Anand was the chief guests of this Rotary Youth Exchange Seminar.Rtn Mamta Jaiswal is District RYE Chair and was coordinator for the program. The program was also graced by PDG Kishor Kedia and DGN Rajinder Khurana. DG Anand in his address shared idea behind this wonderful program. He informed young audience and their parents that this is an excellent program by Rotary aimed at unlocking true potential to develop lifelong leadership skills, learn new language and culture, built lasting friendship and become a global citizen. Rotex committee and their members shared their experience on the exchange they had with different countries.

DGN Rajinder Khurana shared nuts and bolts of the program. The tenure of short term and long term exchange and cut off dates for applying this program. The first and foremost concern that parents have is about safety of their wards. He dispelled all the apprehensions on the safety part. He informed how the hosts are selected. How Rotary members screen the background of hosts and only when they are absolutely sure about the host, are they allowed host kids. Both in bound and out bound students are briefed about their roles and responsibilities. He shared information on financial aspect, which countries are open for exchange etc.

PDG Kishor Kedia shared his personal experience of youth exchange. He persuaded his daughters, relatives and neighbours to take up this program. All of them had great time. Apart from



expanding the world view, the kids had long lasting family friendship with host.

In bound students presented well-choreographed musical and dance performance much to the amazement of audience.

Rtn Tarun Patel chaired the panel discussion with past outbound participants of both long term and short term exchange. They shared their experience. All of them had fond memories of the program and are still in touch with their host.

Due to COVID this program was suspended for two years and now that its open for all eligible youngsters, It's an opportunity of a lifetime for students of classes 9th, 10th, and 11th i.e. 15-18 years. The seminar was attended by large number of students and parents to understand more about the exchange program and to meet current/former exchange students. In the seminar, a special session on New Generation Service Exchange was organised for students aged between 19-30 years.




Her strengths are her analytical approach, appreciable communication and presentable skills and believes in being realistic. Her husband is Mr. Ashok Mokha a renowned architect of

Nagpur ... Our Orange City

Jama Masjid, Mominpur, Nagpur



Mominpura is known as the Chandni Chowk of Nagpur. And rightly so, we can shop to our hearts content, haggle till the shopkeepers down their shutters, and after the extremely strenuous job of shopping, binge on the most lip-smacking street food one can find in the city.

Right at the centre of this very pracheen locality, is the famous Mominpura Badi Masjid

which got a new look and name on **March 6, 1960** when Haji Hafeez Khaleel Ahmed Saheb laid the Sang-e-bunyaad (foundation stone): it then came to be known as the Jama Masjid. It is one of the biggest mosques in Nagpur and Vidarbha region

The construction of this beautiful monument took more than fifty years, with more and more additions being done to the original structure. The mosque has an attractive dome in the centre surrounded by four minarets. There is a beautiful garden too, which gives it an additional charm. It has a capacity of more than 2000. And the huge hall where the namaz is offered has no pillars or columns, an architectural marvel in itself. It's entrance is very

beautifully carved in marble with inscriptions from the Holy O'uran adorning the main door.

Originally it was Built in 1837, and close to it is the Mohammad Ali Sarai and the Muslim Library apart from book shops and numerous eateries surrounding it. Once Nagpur had thousands of looms and it was a hub of textiles. Even today, power looms exist in this part of the city. Tastebud Ticklers Mutton Dhansak

It is a hearty robust dish relished by the Parsi community consisting of mutton or sometimes chicken pieces cooked in a dal or gravy made with three different lentils (dals) served with caramelised brown rice and a side salad of chopped onions tomato chilli coriander and a dash of lime called Kachumbar.

While Dhasak has earned nearly cult like status among devout foodies, it's a staple you'll find in most Parsi households every Sunday for lunch. Typically, this is a meal eaten as a sign of mourning after the 4th day of the passing of a loved one as the family abstains from meat till then. So technically this is not a celebratory meal so you will never find it on a menu at a wedding or to celebrate any happy or festive occasion.



Ingredients:

- 500 grams mutton pieces
- Ginger Garlic paste
- Salt
- 3 Chopped Onions
- 3 Chopped Tomatoes
- 1 Teaspoon Red Chilli Powder
- 2 Teaspoons Turmeric Powder
- 3 4 Teaspoons Dhansak Masala Powder
- 1 Small Brinjal (eggplant/aubergine)
- 1/2 Small Yellow Pumpkin
- 1/2 Cup chopped Methi (Fenugreek) or a teaspoon of the seeds
- 1 Cup Tur Dal
- 1 Cup Moong Dal
- 1 Cup Masoor Dal

For The Rice


- 1 Cup Basmati Rice soaked
- 3-4 Onions sliced
- 3-4 Teaspoons of Sugar
- 2-3 Teaspoons Salt


Method:

• Marinate the mutton pieces in a bit of salt and ginger garlic paste

for a minimum of an hour

• In a pressure cooker, sauté the onions till they turn slightly brown then add in the chopped tomatoes. Add the turmeric powder, chilli powder, dhansak masala powder and some salt along with a cup or so of water so everything mixes well and blends together. Add the marinated mutton and cook in the pressure cooker for 15 minutes





- In the same cooker, add in all your vegetables that is the brinjal, pumpkin, methi leaves and the three dals that have been soaking along with a cup or two of water or till the cooker is filled with water. Add 2-3 teaspoons of salt along with a teaspoon of turmeric and about another teaspoon or two of the dhansak masala
- Mix it all and then pressure cook this for 15-20 mins
- Once cooked and it cools a little open up the cooker and gently with either a potato masher or even an emulsion blender, mash and blend the dal and vegetables till you get a smooth consistency. If the dal is too thick you can keep adding water to thin it out.
- Transfer this cooked dal into your pot and add in the cooked mutton as well. Mix both these two together and the dal will turn into a nice brownish colour. Again, you can keep adjusting the consistency of the dal by adding water to hit as it heats and comes to a boil.
- In a pot add oil and your sliced onions along with 3 teaspoons of sugar. I've only added 3 teaspoons but most recipes ask for 6. Once the onions have caramalised and turn brown along with the sugar add in your soaked rice and water along with a lot of salt and some cardamom powder. Cook the rice for about 7 mins or until it is cooked, drain it and serve. This whole process should give you a brown-coloured rice.
- Serve the rice and dhansak dal and enjoy!
