Pre-OCV and Club Assembly

26th November, 2025



Our Club's Pre-OCV meeting cum Club Assembly was held on the 26th November at our Sheela Raheja Hall in the presence of AG Ujjwal Andhari. It was open only to our Club members.

President Jayant Sanghvi started by welcoming all members present. Thereafter, presentations of directors started with President Elect Tejas Sura. He presented the composition of committees under his Avenue - Club Service 1 for Membership, Classification, Fellowship, Administrators, Attendance, Awards & Trophies.

He observed that the current membership is 117, up from 115 as on 01/07/2025. He plans to take it up to 120 by the end of the year. His target is also to keep member retention above 91% which has been achieved to date. He further observed that new ideas of musical fellowship, movie night, stand-up comedy, serving alcohol, etc. to increase attendance at Club fellowships, Diwali Fellowship etc. have been implemented. Further, Christmas fellowship, sports and games, hiking, shows at NMACC and Prithvi theatre, etc. are being planned. He also informed members that backup of all Club data on Microsoft OneDrive has been completed. To increase attendance, personal calls and messaging is being used.

Thereafter, Vice President Rtn. Dr. Usha Jayachandran presented her Avenue - Club Service II that includes Club Bulletin - Flying Carpet, Club's Public Image and Social Media Management, managing interface with Rotary India app, managing Club website and managing catering at our meetings. She confirmed that Flying Carpet is being published fortnightly and will continue to include articles on current affairs to increase engagement of members. It will carry articles on senior members as also new members, their profile, interests, etc. She proudly mentioned that the GML too has carried our friendship projects.

She further mentioned our active presence on all social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Linked-in, YouTube, blogs, etc which is helping us connect with not just District 3141 but also with other Rotary Clubs around the world. She added that the followers on Instagram and Facebook have touched 1100 and 2000 respectively. Many of our events have been shown on Facebook Live which has increased our reach and helped members' participation, if they cannot physically attend.

Thereafter, Director Programs Committee Rtn. Rajul Doshi presented her committee. She plans to continue having one speaker meeting and one fellowship meeting every month.

Later, Rtn. Mahesh Kokate made a presentation on his Avenue - Community Service I. He described various

activities carried out in Shruti School such as eco-friendly Ganesh idol making, Ganesh Chaturthi celebrations, Alumni get-together on the World Deaf Day, Diwali dandiya nights, an Educational Trip to the Statue of Unity, etc. He also covered Laymen and Housing Societies Seminars, Bhavishya Yaan projects, and briefly listed forthcoming projects.

Then Rtn. Manish Mehta, Director - Community Service II covered medical projects such as Medical camp held on 21/09/2025, cervical cancer screening and cervical vaccination camps held in July 2025, Organ Donation Awareness Seminar held on 01/09/2025, Eye Check-up camp conducted by R/Ann Dr. Reshma Jhaveri on 09/10/2025 for Rotarians, and the two eye camps conducted, as a part of the District's Rotary Service Week, on 09/10/2025 at the Rotary Service Centre and DJ Sanghvi Medical Centre, Juhu. Another medical camp and blood donation camp are planned in December 2025. He also outlined other forthcoming projects in the medical field.

Rtn Nilesh Samant, Director - Community Service III then covered rural support programs, environment and sports activities. He talked on Tree Plantation in collaboration with Global Vikas Trust in Palghar. Projects in the near future involve a trek to Karnala, cycling at Sanjay Gandhi National Park, as also underarm cricket tournament and picket ball.

In absence of Director - Youth Service PP Rtn. Dr. Samapti Patel, her slides were presented. It listed our 6 Rotaract Clubs and 10 Interact Clubs. Major projects were RYLA, RED District Project, MIPS and MUNA. Pairing of Interact Clubs with Rotaract Clubs were also detailed. Additionsl Rotaract and Interact projects were also detailed.

In absence of Director - Vocational Service Rtn. Shelly Gupta, her slides were presented and plans mentioned.

Rs. 6.7 Lakhs to 7 students were disbursed this year so far towards our Vocational Loan Scholarships.

Director Paresh Dodhiwala presented his Avenue of International Service. So far, \$100 have been contributed by the Club towards TRF whereas our target is \$5,000. He also presented plans getting international speakers, applying for global grants and getting suitable candidates for the Rotary Peace Scholarships.

Thereafter, AG Ujjwal Andhari was introduced by PP Rtn. Shirish Rege. AG Ujjwal, in his feedback and guidance praised the work being carried out by RCBW.

After the conclusion of the Club Assembly, our regular Club meeting was held. It concluded with a Vote of Thanks by PE Rtn. Tejas Sura and Secretarial announcements by Club Secretary Rtn. Dr. Kamal D'Mello.

Disease Prevention and Treatment Month: December

In Rotary we believe that good health care is everyone's right. Yet 400 million people in the world can't afford or don't have access to basic health care.

Disease results in misery, pain, and poverty for millions of people worldwide. That's why treating and preventing disease is so important to us. We lead efforts both large and small. We set up temporary clinics, blood donation centers, and training facilities in underserved communities struggling with outbreaks and health care access. We design and build infrastructure that allows doctors, patients, and governments to work together.

Our members combat diseases like malaria, HIV/AIDS, Alzheimer's, multiple sclerosis, diabetes, and polio. Prevention is important, which is why we also focus on health education and bringing people routine hearing, vision, and dental care. We educate and equip communities to stop the spread of life-threatening diseases. Rotary members have hundreds of health projects underway around the world at any given time.

The Rotary Foundation is changing the world by providing grants for projects and activities around the globe and in your own backyard.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Providing clean water: Rotary has worked with partners to provide more than 80 percent of Ghana's people with clean water to fight Guinea worm disease.

Reducing HIV infection: In Liberia, Rotary members are helping women get tested for HIV early in their pregnancies. They used prenatal care to reduce new HIV infections in children by 95 percent over two years.

Ending polio: Rotary members have played a key role in bringing the world to the brink of **polio eradication**. Their efforts have not only ended polio in 122 countries but also created a system for tackling myriad other health priorities, such as Ebola.

Impacting the lives of mothers and children: Rotary makes high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger.

We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. In 2020, an estimated 5 million children under the age of 5 years died, mostly from preventable and treatable causes. Approximately half of those deaths, 2.4 million, occurred



among newborns (in the first 28 days of life). The leading causes of death in children under 5 years can all be prevented or treated with access to affordable interventions in health and sanitation.

Rotary members train community health workers, provide education, immunizations, birth kits, and mobile health clinics, and work with local ministries of health. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease.

The **Rotary Foundation** reaches mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care.

Community health worker capacity building: Through the Rotary Healthy Communities Challenge, Rotary members are strengthening community health systems and increasing the capacity of community health workers in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Mozambique, Nigeria, and Zambia.

Cervical cancer prevention: In Sri Lanka, Rotary members collaborated with the ministry of health to support policy change an improve cervical cancer screening protocols. They advocated for HPV vaccination which is now part of the national immunization program.

Preventing diseases with vaccines: Rotary members are working to **immunize 100,000 children** across nine remote Pacific Islands by working with the local health system to create sustainable delivery of vaccines.
