Happy reading and with regards.



His wife Mrs. Neelu Lilani is an Innerwheel Club member and was President of Innerwheel Club of Mulund Hills in 1987-88.


Both celebrated 56 years of togetherness in May 2023.

This has reference to the talk we had on last Sunday about the activities of Rotaary Club of Mulund Hills during my tenure as president. Kindly excuse the delay in sending you this.

I have already sent you today a photo of the ticket issued by the club on 6th Feb 1988 for a Bharata Natyam performance done by Sai Priya Viswanathan in aid of the Club's PolioPlus campaign. We collected a fairly good amount by this project and this was our contribution to Rotary International during that year.

Unfortunately, I could not locate any photographs of this event. The video taken was in a magnetic tape which has got spoilt by now. I hope to send you the profile of Sai Priya Viswanathan tomorrow.

My tenure as president was a long one due to some technical hitch in obtaining the charter. It was for a period of 21 months from Sept 1986 to June 1988. The emphasis on the first year was to concentrate on fellowship. Our club was known for the educational qualification of all the members and their spouses. Visiting speakers in the weekly meetings of our club used to compliment our members for the quality of their attention and participation. For a short period, till we obtained an official place for weekly meetings, such meetings were held in the basement of my bungalow. Later on, we got the youth club at Mulund Colony Bus Terminus as our official meeting venue. We also had the pleasure of hosting a few Ladies' Evenings in my Bungalow.

We held an exhibition of Indoor Plants and demonstration of making of Bonsai (dwarf plants), during the first year, in my premises. We also made a modest contribution to the Rotary Foundation during the first year itself. If I remember well it was something like 100 dollars per member. The club was an active participant in the Polio immunization program of BMC from the very beginning. We had some members well versed in arts and that helped us in arranging a program of painting competition among school children.

I wish you all then success and happiness as the members of Rotary Club of Mulund Hills.

# **MY SCANDINAVIAN EXPERIENCE**

Visiting Finland, Sweden and Norway.

The sweltering Mumbai heat left us with no alternative but to make an exit from the city and to soak into cool and serene climes of Scandinavia.

Well, it was a chance opportunity and we jumped on to it, not realising that it would come out to be a dream tour.

Friends, to give you a glimpse is to re-live the past 10 days.

Well, we started our tour with first visiting Helsinki/ Finland – doing Tram rides and city tours and immediately switched over to Stockholm taking an overnight Cruise over the Baltic Sea. Doing a Cruise is an experience by itself, the largesse, the size, the luxury, the food and the flowing wine overwhelm you. There is shopping to be done and the entertainment never ends.

Extreme rainfall during the monsoons is the new normal in India, but the ensuing floods killing thousands and displacing millions are partly due to reckless development and inefficient water management.

It now seems difficult to imagine that many places in India were facing drought just in May this year. In July, a few bouts of heavy rain changed that to devastating floods, killing many and displacing millions in much of Northern India. Floodwaters damaged property and roads, and destroyed thousands of hectares of summer crops.

If this wasn't enough, there were cloudbursts in the Himalayan states of Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand. Extreme rainfall wreaked havoc in these states, washing away dozens of houses in several villages. Heavy rains over the weekend in Himachal Pradesh poured enormous quantities of water in many parts of the state, causing floods and landslides. The rain in the uplands saw floods spilling over the plains of Punjab, Haryana, Delhi and Uttar Pradesh, where massive relief work is in progress. The headwaters of the Ganga in Uttarakhand are in spate, with the river crossing the danger mark in Haridwar. The water of the Yamuna has risen alarmingly, triggering a flood in the national capital.

This kind of sudden and heavy rainfall is not unexpected. Scientists have long warned that extreme weather events brought on by manmade climate change is inevitable, and such weather extremes have arrived in India. The trend of extraordinary precipitation over shorter periods of time has been well documented.

Although prediction of such extreme weather events is still fraught with uncertainties, a proper assessment of likely future trends would help in setting up infrastructure for disaster preparedness. The study of rainfall data of the southwest monsoon, the study found that there is an increase in the number of extreme monsoon weather events over India over the past half century, although the seasonal mean monsoon rainfall remains stable for the same period.

There is a 10% increase per decade in the level of heavy rainfall activity since the early 1950s, whereas the number of very heavy events has more than doubled, indicating a large increase in disaster potential. These findings are in tune with model projections and some observations that indicate an increase in heavy rain events and a decrease in weak events under global warming scenarios.

Extreme rainfall and flood risk are increasing significantly in the country. The frequency of very heavy rainfall events and risk of floods is likely to increase over India.

Although for some two decades the scientific evidence has been pointing to more such calamities occurring more frequently, such scenarios were mostly ignored by policymakers. As a result, this year's cloudbursts have caught the authorities unprepared.

At a time when extreme rainfall is more likely, experts are saying that the resulting floods, loss of property and human displacement and suffering are made worse by wrong-headed development and poor water management.

For instance, the extensive floods could have been somewhat mitigated had the dam operators in the regions acted wisely. Poor management of dams has worsened the floods instead of mitigating them. In the same period when these regions were getting high rainfall, the dams in these districts started releasing l large quantities of water, which played a major role in creating the flood disaster. The dam operators are likely to turn around and say that but the dams were full and we had no option but to release water. The question remains, why were the dams full when monsoon is just about started and IMD has predicted much higher rainfall in the remaining part of the monsoon compared to the first half.

The opening of sluice gates of reservoirs, such as the Bhakra Dam on the Sutlej River in Himachal Pradesh and the Kota Barrage in the Chambal River valley, caused much of the floods in Northern India. If India has to mitigate the impacts of extreme rainfall, it has to devise ways to manage its dams.

The first step towards a course correction is to recognise the problem. But the government seems to be in denial. The climate in various parts of the world is changing, but the policy makers still are still not proactive in fast changing climatic situation.

It's true that climate scientists are wary of attributing a particular extreme weather event to climate change. However, it is also undeniable that scientific evidence points clearly to an increase in such occurrences due to global warming.

Besides faulty water management, the frenzy of ill thought out development has also worsened the impacts of the intense rainfall. In the western Himalayas, for instance, there has been a massive thrust in building infrastructure that has put enormous pressure on the region's natural environment. Environmentalists and experts have cautioned against the massive road and tunnel-building projects in Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand.

In 2013, heavy rainfall and unprecedented floods had devastated Uttarakhand. At that time, the Union home ministry had blamed deforestation, building of roads that cut through mountains, construction of hydropower projects, and tourism-related construction on floodplains and mountain slopes for worsening the scale of the disaster.

But the lessons of 2013 have remained unheeded. In fact, the government has embarked on the contentious Char Dham highway project to connect four Hindu shrines in the state, though local residents and environmentalists say that it endangers the fragile mountain ecosystem.

In the South, the floods and landslides in Kerala, couple of years back, have again focused attention to warning that cultivation of commercial crops on steep slopes was leading to rapid erosion and increased run-off.

There was a need to control the massive encroachment and deforestation in the catchment of major rivers such as the Godavari, Krishna and Cauvery and also to stop building large dams in the ecologically sensitive area.

The warning and recommendations of the many investigative reports were actively opposed and ignored. The terrible results of that became evident when there was unprecedented rainfall in Kerala some time ago. Scientists said the impacts of the Kerala deluge was made worse by massive deforestation over the years, unrestrained construction, and most of all, stone quarrying that destabilised hill slopes.

This intense rain in the Northern states again could just be one in a string of such events occurring in the future elsewhere in the country as well. Unless there is a change in the way development is carried out in India, the damage from extreme weather events will only be magnified.
