"November deepens its hushed radiance..."





The Mirror: Where Respect Begins (Part 1)

When I was young, I thought respect came from titles and trophies — the corner office, the neat house, the polite nod at social functions. Now, I see it differently: respect starts inside and the world simply reflects what you show it.

Think of it like a neighbour's gate. If you leave it open every day, people stroll in; if you close and lock it, visitors knock. Your actions are that gate. Say yes to everything, swallow your "no," and others will learn that your time and feelings are optional. Honour yourself first and others will learn the rules. This does not mean you become anti-social but you have to pick/choose what works for you and what does-not.

A small story: Rajesh, a long-time friend, was the office "fixer." He stayed late, took on others' tasks, never complained. People praised him — but rarely thanked him. Then one season his elderly mother fell ill. Rajesh couldn't keep covering everyone and the gratitude vanished. It hurt him and he learned a lesson many of us do the hard way: kindness without boundaries becomes invisibility.

Self-respect is quieter than bravado. It's keeping promises to yourself — getting enough sleep, saying no when you must, speaking up when something crosses a line. It's not rude; it's clear. It's the calm "I can't do this" said with courtesy, or the gentle "I deserve better" whispered to yourself before you accept less.

People will test you. They always do. Your responses create the pattern they follow. If you tolerate disrespect once, it becomes an option for them again. If you respond with dignity and a boundary, they rethink their behaviour.

So start small. Practice saying, "I'll get back to you," instead of an automatic yes. Put aside five minutes each morning for something that matters to you. Notice how you feel when you honour yourself — lighter, steadier, more likely to be treated as you wish. Respect isn't given; it's grown, quietly, from the inside out.

The ration distribution spread happiness and support those in need. 500 families receiving essential groceries like rice, dal, aata, sugar, salt, and oil brought smiles to many faces.








