His campaigns aim to disseminate vital information about thalassemia to students, teachers, and the broader community.

Beyond practicing, Dr. Homchaudhuri actively engages with government entities, NGOs, and civil bodies to garner support and drive the thalassemia prevention campaign. His leadership has significantly contributed to raisingawareness and combating this preventable disease. Additionally, Dr. Homchaudhuri is involved in a vital project to provide clean water to the water-scarce village of Dhaska in Purulia District. This initiative includes pond excavation, community development, and income-generation projects.

Elected as the District Governor for 2025-26, Dr. Homchaudhuri's relentless pursuit of humanitarian causes is supported by his accomplished spouse, Dr. Bandana Hom Chaudhuri, a distinguished pediatrician, and their children. What is Valuation:

Valuation is the analytical method for assessing the current market worth of an asset or a company. Valuation provides an assessment of the existing or anticipated worth of an Asset or a Company. A valuation is conducted for multiple purposes, such as: determining the value of an asset; evaluating the costs of creating, acquiring, altering, or completing an asset; estimating the financial extent of harm to an asset; and forecasting the financial income potential of an asset. In some instances, the task may have additional roles, such as forming conclusions and suggestions or presenting alternatives (and their impacts) for the client's choices

There are two types of assets which are being valued - 1) Tangible Assets and 2) Intangible Assets.

1) Tangible Assets - Tangible assets are physical items that possess a concrete existence and can be touched or seen visually. They possess a specific financial worth and are essential for a company's functioning and fiscal security. Tangible assets can be categorized as either fixed asset, such as structures, land, and machinery, or as a current asset, such as cash. Other examples of assets are company vehicles, IT equipment, investments, payments, and on-hand stocks.

Tangible assets are categorized based on their intended use and liquidity:

- Fixed Assets (Non-Current Assets): These refer to long-term resources utilized in operations and are not meant for quick sale.
 They are anticipated to offer value for several years and generally decrease in value as time passes. Examples consist of structures, equipment, real estate, automobiles, and furnishings.
- Current Assets: These are assets that can be transformed into cash over a business cycle, typically within one year. They are
 crucial for financing continuous operations and ensuring liquidity. Examples consist of cash, stock, receivables, and advance
 payments.
- 2) Intangible Assets Intangible assets are non-material resources that hold value and are essential for a company's sustained growth and competitive edge. They contrast with physical assets, like structures and equipment, in that they are not visible, touchable, or graspable

Intangible assets are categorized into two main types:

- Identifiable Intangible Assets: These assets can be separated from the company and bought, sold, or transferred independently. Examples include: Intellectual Property (IP), Licenses and Franchises, Software and Data.
- Unidentifiable Intangible Assets: These assets cannot be separated or sold independently from the business. The most common example is Goodwill.

Difference between Tangible and intangible Assets:

Tangible Assets	Intangible Asset
Relatively easy to value based on market prices or replacement cost. Their value is reduced through depreciation over their useful life	 Valuation can be subjective and challenging, influenced by factors like future earnings potential and brand recognition. They are amortized over their useful life, with the exception of those with indefinite lives which are tested for impairment.
 Possess physical form and can be observed and measured 	Lack physical presence and exist in legal or intellectual realms
 It is relatively difficult to convert tangible assets to cash, compared to intangible assets. 	 It is relatively easy to convert intangible assets to cash, compared to tangible assets.
 Provide direct utility in operations, enabling businesses to generate revenue. 	Offer intangible benefits like brand recognition and competitive advantages.
 It is easier to liquidate and sell a tangible asset in the market since they have a physical presence. 	It is harder to liquidate and sell an intangible asset in the market since they do not have a physical presence
Examples : Real Estate, Machinery, Inventory, Cash, Vehicles etc.	Examples : Patents, Trademarks, Copyrights, Brand recognition, Goodwill etc.

In our conclusion of today's article, we can say that Tangible assets provide the physical resources and infrastructure necessary for operations, whereas intangible assets enhance competitive advantage, foster innovation, and create long-term value through their distinct benefits and legal protections. Each serves a different role in a business, and investors assess them differently. They possess particular advantages that render them advantageous for any business over time. Globally, all organizations need both intangible and tangible resources to maintain business activities. In our next Article we will discuss about Valuation of Real Estate Assets.

Marriage Anniversary on 10th August

Minutes of the 2528 Regular Meeting and Installation Ceremony of Rotary Club of Ballygunge, held on 24 July 2025, at Eastern Metropolitan Club Sapphire Room, Kolkata

- 1. President Joydeep Mookerjee called the 2528th RWM to order.
- 2. The President requested all to rise for the National Anthem, and the same was sung in chorus by the members present.
- 3. The President thanked all members of the club for their active participation in the Installation Ceremony, held on 10th July 2025 and mentioned that the event was an astounding success.
- 4. The President proposed to organise a few projects on Awareness of Thalassemia and Cervical Cancer issues.
- 5. The President sought data from the members and their families for providing medical cards. All members wished to roll out the Medical Card before the Official Club Visit of the District Governor. Details need to be given through the Google Form to be circulated. Members have been given suggestions in order to implement that.
- 6. The President requested one of the Trustees to address the members about the status of the Trust. PP Rtn. Bhomra Chatterji, on behalf of the Trust, conveyed it to the members that through the 'Darpan' app necessary compliances have been done and are likely to be operational soon. A supplementary deed needs to be executed for the purpose of recording a change of address, which will eventually be required for the bank operation. PP Rtn Rinku Das Chowdhury conveyed her concerns about the inoperative Axis Bank Account of the Trust Fund, and she requested the Trustees to expedite the linking of the DARPAN with the said Bank Account. PP Rtn. Bhomra Chatterji assured that this will be solved soon.
- 7. PP Rtn. Amitava Chakraborty proposed a community service project at the Narendrapur Ramakrishna Mission. PP Rtn. Amitava Chakraborty suggested a Health Camp, along with Eye Check-up, distribution of free spectacles and cataract surgery. He reminded the members of the MOU signed with the Ramakrishna Mission, Narendrapur. PP Rtn. Indrani Gupta supported this point and recommended an early action from the club. PP Rtn. Amitava Chakraborty took initiatives and he discussed with Rotary Mahanagar Nethralaya and Ashok Laboratories. PP Rtn Amitava Chakraborty conveyed that RC Mahanagar Nethralaya has agreed to organize the eye camp; while the Medical camp shall be organized in collaboration with Ashok Laboratories. All members present in the meeting thanked PP Rtn Amitava Chakraborty.

Assembly Meeting:

- 1. Amended By Laws have been placed before the members by the President and indicate the changes introduced in the By Laws. The initial drafts were circulated in the Board group and relevant changes were discussed there before the placement of the same. Members present accepted the new ByLaws with the relevant inputs from PP Sanjoy De for a few inclusions.
- 2. The Rotary International invoice for the first SAD payment has been received. The President requested that all members to clear their dues.
- 3. PP Rtn. Sanjay Dey requested to consider the following points in the bylaws:
 - Before each fiscal year starts, the President and the Treasurer jointly prepare an annual budget of estimated income and expenditures. Such a Budget needs to be approved by the Board.
 - The treasurer deposits club funds in the designated bank account of the club for club operations and service projects. In required, then another new account shall be opened and operated as per the required Global Grant purposes and Global Grant Committee requirements.
 - Bills are authorised for payment by the President or Secretary or Treasurer (any two of them) and handed over to the Treasurer for necessary payments.
 - A qualified and independent auditor, being a Chartered Accountant, reviews the financial statements and provides their independent opinion on the same, along with the necessary audit report.
 - Club members will receive the Audit Report along with the Audited Financial Statements during the Annual General Meeting of the Club.
 - The fiscal year is from 1 July to 30 June for the Club accounts.
 - The President and Secretary in office are ex-officio members of the Rotary Club of Ballygunge Charitable Trust but without voting rights at trust meetings, if he is not a trustee at that time.
 - A mid-year financial report shall be presented at the first Club Assembly held after 31 December, including actuals vs budget.
 - The Registered Office Address of the Club shall be mentioned in all financial documents of the Club, and also to be updated in the Bank's Official Records
 - The Bank Account of the Club shall be Operated Jointly by any two of the following: -
 - President
 - Secretary
 - Treasurer
 - In the last week of every Rotary Year, a Joint Board Meeting shall be held and after the said Board Meeting the existing President, Secretary, and Treasurer would hand over all the necessary things to the incoming President, Secretary and Treasurer.
 - In every new Rotary Year, necessary steps would be taken to update the signatories, incoming President, Secretary and Treasurer in the Bank
- 4. All other changes in the Bylaws, as requested by the members present, were accepted and passed.
- 5. The President and PP Rtn. Amitava Chakraborty requested everyone to clear their SAD dues before the OCV of the District Governor.
- 6. PP Rtn. Bhomra Chatterji has been requested to generate the Monthly Report.
- 7. PP Rtn. Susanta Sarkar proposed the name of PP Rtn. Amitava Chakraborty for the forthcoming election to the post of District Governor of RID 3291 for the Rotary Year 2028-2029. This proposal was seconded by the President, Rtn. Dr Joydeep Mookerjee. The proposal was received with enthusiasm and unanimously approved by all members present at the meeting. The assembly of esteemed members, convened in solemn session, did unanimously eulogise and extol Past President Rotarian Amitava Chakraborty for his prodigious and unwavering contributions rendered across manifold capacities and distinguished offices within the august domain of Rotary District 3291. His erudition, steadfast dedication, and sagacious leadership were acknowledged with heartfelt admiration by all present. - 9. The Secretary welcomed the members to join the RM and to participate in important matters concerning the club. No happy announcements were there to be made. Attendance for both meetings stood at 51%
- The Minutes of the last meeting were confirmed.
- 11. The Secretary handed over to the President for further business.
- 12. The President terminated the meeting.
