



Supporting The Environment COVER STORY

The Rotary Foundation Trustees and Rotary International Board of Directors have both unanimously approved adding a new area of focus:

Supporting the Environment.

More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years. Creating a distinct area of focus to support the environment will give Rotary members even more ways to bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact.



Supporting the environment becomes Rotary's seventh area of focus, which are categories of service activities supported by global grants. It joins peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; and community economic development.

Grant applications for projects will be accepted beginning on 1 July 2021. Gifts and commitments from Rotarians and others will be sought to provide global grant support for the new area of focus.

More information about this new cause will be announced soon.





Editor's Column

By the time one utters 'Deforestation', another chunk of forest the size of a football field is wiped off.

Every two seconds, round-the-clock.



It all started thousands of years ago, with our predecessors – shifting from nomadic to agricultural societies – finding an easy way to get grounds for crops, housing or cattle. But gradually it has become an epidemic, endangering the earth. There's only about half the number of trees on the planet today that there were when humans first evolved. Forests still cover about 30 percent of the world's land area, but they are disappearing at an alarming rate. Between 1990 and 2016, the world lost 1.3 million square kilometers of

forest - an area larger than South Africa. Not surprising, as 15 billion trees are now being cut down every year across the world.

But why the surge?

The log is rather a byproduct, the main reason in majority of cases being mining and drilling, urbanization, cattle ranching, and – farming. Farming for soya and palm oil in particular. Vast areas of Amazon are being razed to have the field for soya, much in demand for cattle feed to cater to the need of hordes of cattle and poultry to meet the insatiable global demand for cheap meat – give us our daily bacon and egg - and for palm oil, an essential component of a lot of food and personal products ranging from lipsticks to shampoo. Very lucrative business indeed.

The result is devastating.

Globally, 13.4 million people are in jobs in the forest sector, and they are in jeopardy. And so are more than half the world's land-based plants and animals, and three-quarters of all birds. We are fast engulfing their habitat; biodiversity is in danger. And this is just the obvious.



The foliage of trees also acts as a canopy, regulating the temperature by blocking the sun's rays during the day and retaining heat at night. The disruption causes extreme temperature variation.

And they are the 'carbon sink' absorbing carbon dioxide and mitigating greenhouse gas emissions produced by human activity. Tropical trees alone are estimated to provide about 23% of the climate mitigation that's needed to offset climate change, according to the World Resources Institute. In fact, deforestation causes eighty percent of Indonesia's carbon dioxide emissions, making the tropical nation the world's third largest emitter of greenhouse gases.

Trees also control level of water in the atmosphere. Deforestation causes less water available over the canopy with reduced rainfalls. A 2019 study showed forest areas converted..(contd)







to agricultural lands have higher soil and air temperatures, akin to drought conditions.

Coupled with it are the problems of soil erosion and flooding. Loss of embrace of tree roots causes the top soil to get eroded and washed away, leaving a parched up barren land and settling in rivers and rivulets, increasing chances of flood in adjoining areas.

The Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations says that deforestation is the second leading cause of climate change. But the mass destruction of trees—deforestation—continues, sacrificing the long-term benefits of standing trees for shortterm gain.

We get drought. We get flood. We get a heated up earth.

Supporting the environment has become Rotary's seventh area of focus, and Rotary India Environment Mission has a plan of planting 30 crore trees by December 2025 – five crores each year.

Let us join hands. Rotary has opened opportunities.

Presidential Message July, 2020 **Holger Knaack** President 2020-21

This does not seem like a time for great optimism, but it has to be. Long before Rotary was founded, the world dealt with great crises that tested humankind's ability to progress and endure. In the age of Rotary, the world has faced many more catastrophes; however, we have survived, and every step of the way, Rotary has helped the world heal.

Every great challenge is an opportunity for renewal and growth. I revealed the theme of Rotary Opens Opportunities at the International Assembly in San Diego just as the COVID-19 crisis was beginning, but these are words that I have believed for many years.

The world needs Rotary now more than ever. It is up to us to make sure that Rotary **Opens Opportunities** for generations to come.










The Kingdom of Bhutan, a small country in south asia. I had the opportunity to visit one of the happiest and cleanest country in the world.
