Peace on earth begins with peace of mind



It was the opening months of the COVID-19 lockdown, and students at Douglas Ewart High School in Newton Stewart, Scotland, were having trouble coping. "They came to us and said they were really struggling with their feelings and their thoughts during the pandemic," recalls Jean Best. "They wanted to devise a toolkit so that all the youngsters at the school could help themselves."

In 2014, at the <u>Rotary International Convention</u> in Sydney, Australia, she and her husband, Keith, had inaugurated a new program called the <u>Peace Advocate Project</u>. The couple wanted to ensure that young people in their community and around the world would be prepared to serve as ambassadors for peace. Working with peace fellows from the <u>Rotary Peace Center</u> at the University of Bradford in England, they

designed a program that would help them accomplish just that.

For her efforts, Best was honoured in November 2017designated Rotary People of Action: Champions of Peace.

Working closely with the Bests, and repurposing what they had learned from their Peace Advocate sessions, the students began to assemble their toolkit.Best singles out a short video produced by a 16-year-old student. "It was all about the power of the mind and how the mind works," she says. "This was the piece that most helped students realize how they were reacting to the pandemic.

As things began to return to normal, Best assembled the posts and created a new online facet of the Peace Advocate Project. "The students wanted it to be known as a self-care program... 'If we can get into the habit of taking care of ourselves,' they reasoned, 'then we can start to help other people.' Which is great, because the Peace Advocate Project is all about helping young people empower themselves."

As the project re-established itself in schools in the UK, the pandemic shift to Zoom helped the project expand its reach to other countries, including Australia, Japan, and Mexico.

Best is especially proud of a new online program that linked two schools in Scotland with two schools in Kenya. "We trained all the youngsters at the same time," she says. "The students in each of the schools could see one another as they worked through the activities. It was all about building bridges between the two countries."

As the world emerged from its COVID cocoon, Best and her husband continued to expand their project. This year alone they added three new programs, including one that helped secondary school parents learn how to communicate with their children. It was particularly impactful when introduced to Ukrainian parents who had resettled in the UK with their children. "We went through all our peace advocacy techniques on listening and how to get conversations going, and it worked really well," says Best. "Afterward, one mother came up to us in tears. She said, 'I can't thank you enough. I'd lost my son, and because of this, I got him back,' because now they could hold calm, meaningful, and sustainable conversations."

Best continues to introduce her refined approach to thoughtful listening, fruitful conversations, and conflict resolution to other Rotary members for their use in and outside of Rotary. Jane Cooper, the 2024-25 governor of England's District 1210, praises the work done in her region. "Jean and Keith worked with our district officers and members, and the feedback was excellent," says Cooper.

In the end, Best stresses "This is a program delivered by young people for young people," she says. "We strongly believe that once youngsters have been trained in peace advocacy, they will continue to use those skills in the years ahead."

MINUTES OF MEETING

Minutes of the 2702nd Regular Meeting of Rotary Club of Behala held at Malik Guest House at 6:30 pm on 07.08.2025

- Club President Rtn. Sanghamitra Duttagupta called the 2702nd meeting to order.
- National Anthem was led by Rtn. Manika Karmakar.
- On 15th August 79th Independence Day will be celebrated at Free to be kids. Free to be Kids invited Rotary club of Behala members to their main campus at Joka. The duration of the programmewill be 9 30 am to 11 30 am.5 Singer sewing machines were delivered to the Joka office of Free to be kids, to be donated by Rotary Club of Behala to 5 beneficiaries on the same day. The programme will be followed by lunch.
- 20 students would be given each a scholarship of Rs 5,000/-, amounting to Rs.1 lakh, at Chandanpiri from Gouri Gupta Trust donated by Past President Rtn. Anirudha Gupta. There is an appeal for one wheelchair from RCC at Chandanpiri. One wheelchair will cost 4,500/-Nayan Giri of Chandanpiri Ashram was grievously injured and nearly 1 lakh spent on his treatment at the hospital. He still requires funds for the follow up treatment and there is an appeal to RC Behala to give support.
- 50 mosquito nets would be distributed among the villagers of Krishnarampur village at the adult literacy centre. District has organized the mosquito nets distribution project. The clubs can procure these by making a payment of 3,500/-
- Past President Rtn. Anirudha Gupta will visit Rotary Club of Top of the Lake, Mooresville, North Carolina, USA on Thursday 11th September. He would highlight areas of focus, mainly with the RCCs, which include clean water, sanitation, adult education and health. After attending the regular RCM Rtn. Anirudha Gupta will meet their board members in charge of their service projects and external funding.
- The Breast Cancer Awareness seminar will be organized on 20th September at Rotary Sadan. Venue charges, tea and snacks, token of appreciation to be given to the guest speaker and the Chief Guest and other logistics would amount to an approximate budget of 50,000/. It was decided that Rotary club of Behala as the lead club can request other clubs to join as host clubs and co-host clubs. Host club-5000/-, Co-host club -2000/- For this joint project flyers will be made and circulated.
- The members were informed that booking of the CCFC Club for the Charter Day celebrations on 24th
 August is confirmed. The members were requested to come with their spouses. The food menu was
 posted in the official group. Since Mr. Sanjoy Sengupta would be inducted as a new member District
