RI Presidential Message September 2024



The Magic of Rotary is belonging, and it's a feeling that can appear when you least expect it.

Earlier this year, I was in Slovakia serving as a president's representative during a six-week trip through Europe. When I wrote to Katarina Cechova, governor of District 2240 at the time, I mentioned that my grandmother Veronica Zilka grew up in a small village in the area before settling in the U.S.

It wasn't long before Cechova tracked down my grandmother's village, Jakubova Vol'a. She even organized a visit for me, where I received an unforgettable Slovakian welcome. When I entered the community center of Jakubova Vol'a, a small crowd of people dressed in traditional Slovakian clothing greeted me. They sang with beautiful and powerful Central European voices that reminded me of my grandmother.

A lot of families play cards or games when they get together. When I was young, my father would pick up his accordion and lead my family in song. My grandmother would sing along with her impressive voice.

When I walked into the community center and heard traditional music from my childhood — when I saw a woman play the accordion the way my dad played — I suddenly felt like a little girl sitting at my grandmother's house in Monessen, Pennsylvania. I burst into tears of joy at the memories.

But the magic didn't stop there. District Governor Cechova really outdid herself. A local genealogist worked with a videographer to make a short film about my grandmother. We watched the video together in the community center.

When the video ended, I turned around and saw a man standing in the back of the room. I quickly learned that this stranger, Frantisek Zilka, was my second cousin. His grandmother and mine had been sisters. I felt like I had been struck by lightning.

I visited my newfound cousin's home, which happens to be the home where my grandmother was born. There, he shared old photographs I had never seen of my dad, my uncle, and my grandmother.

Since then, I can't stop thinking about my family of Rotary. When I refer to you as my family, I'm not just being kind. I really think of everyone in Rotary as my family. But I never would have imagined that my Rotary family would introduce me to long-lost personal family.

Sitting in that community center listening to traditional Slovakian music from my childhood filled me with joy and a profound sense of belonging. I am so grateful to District Governor Cechova and everyone who helped create that magical experience.

As members of Rotary, we have a unique opportunity to share the same magic with each other and with the world. I encourage you to consider how you can help spread that magic and ensure other members of your club — other members of our Rotary family — feel like they truly belong.

MINUTES OF THE 427th RM

- The 427th RM was held on September 7, 2024, at CG 45 Salt Lake.
- Club President Rtn. Indrajit Das called the meeting to order and invited everyone to stand for the National Anthem.
- The members present confirmed the minutes of the 426th RM. The President welcomed both members and guests.
- The Club President expressed gratitude to all members for the projects completed in August and September thus far. IPP Gour Sundar Sarkar officially announced that the Club Charter of RC Bankura Outer has finally arrived, as reported by DG Dr. Krishnendu Gupta. The President and members cheered for IPP Gour Sundar Sarkar's dedication in the formation of the new club at Bankura and acknowledged the active support from other members of RCCK.
- The Club President then informed the attendees about two completed projects from the current month. On September 1, a tree plantation program was held at Barahnagar, where saplings were collected from the District Environment project, Sabujayan, by President Indrajit Das and IPP Gour Sundar Sarkar. Both President Indrajit and IPP Gour Sundar Sarkar, along with Rtn. Arijit Dutt, participated in the planting.
- Additionally, a Teachers' Day celebration was organized at Nabadwip Brajabasi Sangeet Mahavidyalaya under the banner of Eezzee School, where 14 teachers from various extracurricular disciplines were honoured.
- The Club President also shared information about several upcoming projects and confirmed some of them. Continuing the tradition of previous years, the club will celebrate a Pre-Puja meet, AGOMONI, on October 2.
- The following projects in Bankura are also planned, with dates to be decided:
- An installation ceremony and charter presentation for RC Bankura Outer, with the charter expected to arrive in the coming days, as previously mentioned by IPP.
- The club received an invitation from Sahashpur Bankura for their Durga Puja inauguration, during which RC Calcutta Kankurgachi will organize a medical camp, and RC Bankura Outer will proceed with an environmental project.
- This year, the sustainable literacy project, MEDHABRITTI, will be held at Sahashpur High School, where, during the Puja inauguration, 20 underprivileged, meritorious students will receive Jio Bharat mobile sets to support their online education.
- Four commercial water filter cum coolers will be installed at Indus Hospital and Indus Boys and Girls High Schools, one at each location.
- One solar light for public benefit will be installed at Baikunthapur, Bankura.
- The President invited suggestions from members. In response, a couple of proposals were presented:
- PP Rtn. Kalpana Roy Chowdhury proposed establishing a medical clinic at Ghatakpukur Bodra and suggested a medical camp at the school premises in Bodra village.
- PP Grp Capt. Tapas Kr. Ray proposed organizing a club picnic during winter at a farmhouse in Bodra village, as well as several projects at Ramkrishna Vivekananda Sevashram in Nandanghat, along with a proposed site visit.
- The Club President assured members that all proposals would be noted and officially submitted for approval at the upcoming Board Meeting.
- The President then requested Club Secretary Rtn. Mridula Ray to present the club business. Rtn. Mridula Ray conducted the business efficiently.
- With no further points for discussion, the President concluded the meeting and invited members to join for fellowship.

The 428th Rotary Meeting was held in hybrid mode on September 21, 2024, at CG 45 Salt Lake.

Club President Rtn. Indrajit Das called the meeting to order and invited everyone to stand for the National Anthem.

The members present confirmed the minutes of the 427th meeting, and the President warmly welcomed all members and guests.

The Club President expressed gratitude to all members for the projects completed so far in September, with special thanks to IPP Gour Sarkar for his dedication in establishing the new club at Bankura, along with the active support of other club members. He also provided updates on several upcoming projects.

On September 22, the President will be accompanied by a few members for a series of projects with RCC at Namkhana, Sundarban. The club will distribute sarees, dhotis, and lungis to underprivileged villagers, as well as school bags for students. PP Supriyo Lodh proposed to sponsor the school bags.

Additionally, on October 2, the auspicious day of Mahalaya, the club will celebrate the Pre-Puja family gathering, Agomoni, as in previous years. This event will take place at CG-45. PP Supriyo Lodh proposed the names of PP Gp Capt Tapas Kr Ray and PP Ranjana Mutsuddi to plan and conduct the cultural programs.

The President shared further details about upcoming projects and events in October 2024. He mentioned that on October 5, solar lights will be installed in Baikuntapur village, benefiting the residents.

The most exciting news for the club is that on October 6, Rotary International issued prestigious Club charter for the newly sponsored Rotary Club of Bankura Outer (sponsored by RC Calcutta Kankurgachi) will be handed over to Club President, Rtn. Debopriya Sen (RC Bankura Outer). District Governor of RID 3291, AKS Rtn. Dr. Krishnendu Gupta has graciously consented to be the chief guest of the event and will present the club charter. DMC PDG Ravi Sehgal, PDG Ajay Kr Law, DGN Tapas Bhattacharya, and other district officials will also attend the event.

On October 9, RC Calcutta Kankurgachi will launch its flagship literacy project, MEDHA BRITTI (initiated in 2017-18), by distributing online educational mobile phones produced by Jio Bharat to 20 meritorious students at Sahaspur, Bankura. The possibility of hosting a "Know Your Numbers" medical camp at the same venue was also discussed.

Club Public Image Chair Rtn. Mainak Chakraborty proposed a project titled "Quit Plastic," aimed at environmental conservation. Members responded positively to the proposal, which will be discussed urgently in a future meeting. Club President Elect Rtn.
