

James L. Lacy

Past Rotary International President, 1998-99

James L. Lacy served as President of Rotary International in 1998-99. The Rotary motto for his year was "Follow Your Rotary Dream". Jim's dream was to generate a program that would improve the lot of children in the world – "to help a child in need. "We must champion the causes of children. We may be moved to tears, but we must also be moved to action." During his year as President, Rotary International generated twenty million dollars for Children's Opportunity Grants around the world. Lacy joined the Cookeville Rotary Club in 1964. He was president of the club, led a GSE team to England in 1977 and he was district governor in 1980-81. Of course he is always accompanied by his charming and resourceful wife Claudine.

In 2005 the James & Claudine Lacy Fund was established in the Putnam County school system by the Cookeville club. Funds are contributed for use by the school district to provide clothes, shoes, and other necessities to students. The fund was established to recognize Jim's service as RI president and his worldwide program of improving the lot of the world's children. For many years, Jim also raised millions of dollars annually for Polio eradication by working with the US Congress for Polio funding for the CDC.

Jim Lacy would have turned 93.

Richard D King

Past Rotary International President, 2001-2002

Richard D. King was a past president of Rotary International, and the senior partner in the California firm King, King & King. He earned undergraduate and law degrees from the University of California at Berkeley where he was a member of the California Club and the Order of the Golden Bear. He taught law at Brigham Young University. He was a distinguished military graduate of the University of California and served as captain in the U.S. Military Intelligence. He received an Honorary Doctorate in Law from Hanyang University, Seoul,

A Rotarian from 1968, he was a member of the Rotary Club of Niles-Fremont, California USA. He served as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation, director and as chairman of the executive committee of Rotary International's board of directors. Mr. King received the Rotary Citation for Meritorious Service and the Distinguished Service Award for his support of humanitarian and educational programs of the Rotary Foundation. He was a recipient of the Polio Plus Pioneer Award.

One of Rotary's most popular speakers, King addressed Rotary International Conventions, Assemblies, Institutes, Seminars, Conferences and Rotary Clubs in every state in the USA and some 100 countries.

King leaves behind his partner Cherie Kay King and two sons.

Presidential Message October 2023



The World Health Organization designates 10 October as World Mental Health Day, and with Rotary placing a special focus on mental health this year, I would like to help answer the question posed to me most often when I travel to meet members: How can my club get started?

There are some wonderful examples of Rotary members taking action already. In the

Philippines, the Rotary Club of Tiaong-Hiyas held a 12-week health challenge for mothers in the community to promote some baseline health screenings and coaching on a healthier lifestyle.

By the end of the challenge, the mothers had a special bond and decided to form a Rotary Community Corps called llaw ng Tahanan ("one who lights up the home") with the goal of involving more mothers in health education and wellness support — and later youth services, teen pregnancy prevention, and help with unhealthy substance use. Almost a year later, the RCC is preparing to open its own health center where mothers can come for peer-to-peer support.

Another strong example is in Colorado. In the fall of 2021, a small group of stakeholders from the Rotary Club of Highlands Ranch formed the Rotary Clubs of Colorado Endowed Fellowship for Pediatric Mental Health, which enhances the ability of Children's Hospital Colorado to recruit and train pediatric psychiatry providers and allows the hospital network to make additional appointments. This increases access to mental health care for children and decreases provider shortages.

Since then, the project has brought on new supporters and is now fully funded with a \$500,000 endowment. Investment income from this endowment will support a fellow — a psychologist or psychiatrist — at Children's Hospital. A new fellow will be named every one to two years, beginning spring of 2024. Over time this will create a cohort to bolster the mental health workforce, treating kids from all 64 Colorado counties and neighboring states.

There are many more great mental health project stories on Rotary Showcase, and I invite you to share your experiences as you begin your own projects. Also, please reach out to mindhealth@rotary.org with any thoughts or ideas you would like to share about mental health in the Rotary world.

On 10 October, I will host a Facebook Live event when we will recognize World Mental Health Day and further explore how Rotary members can begin this journey. But I would like to leave you with one way every Rotary member can make a difference.

Right now, there is someone you know in the Rotary world — in your club, from a project you've worked on, in a Rotary Fellowship or Rotary Action Group — who could use a little more of your time and attention. Rotary is this great gift of global friendship, and that also means being there

for each other.

Discovering the human connections that bind us is what we do through our membership every day. It's what Rotary has always been about, and we can build on it by helping each other find peace at home.

We need to learn how to ask not just "How are you?" but also "How are you really?" By doing so, Rotary can continue to Create Hope in the World.

Message from TRF Trustee Vice-Chair

Dear District and Club Leaders,

You may be aware that to tide over constraints in making contributions during the Covid pandemic where there were a series of travel restrictions and the normal functioning of the RI South Asia Office was impacted, SAO had come up with an option of "Listed Contributions" where it was envisaged that a club with a registered trust (under the club's control) would receive contributions from its individual members and then send one consolidated cheque to SAO along with a list of members with their respective contribution amounts. Finance at SAO would provide a tax receipt to the club trust, being the remitter, for the cheque amount and use the listed member IDs to credit the individual for the sum indicated against their name.

Since RISAO is now back to normal operations, it was planned to drop this option, moving forward, given several issues this channel gave rise to. However, with feedback from several district leadership I discussed the matter up with SAO and it was decided to extend this channel offering but with the following caveats:

- 1. The last date for accepting a single cheque/draft from a registered club entity (with its PAN number) under the Listed Contribution channel with a list of the club members only would be 31 May of each Rotary Year. Please note that Cheques for Listed Contribution must be received in RISAO Office by 5 PM on 31st May to be considered for processing. Those received after the said date & time will be returned to the sender without any exceptions.
- 2. RISAO often noticed in the past year that the list of members records a US Dollar amount against each member, the total of which often did not match the amount on the cheque. Please ensure that the list of individual contributions accompanying the cheque is reconciled with the cheque amount before dispatch. If this is not reconciled or in case of document deficiency, RISAO will send the Cheque back to the sender for a correct listing.

Dear Club President and Club Treasurer

On behalf of Rotary magazine, I'm writing to inform you of a recent Rotary International Board of Directors decision to adjust the magazine subscription fee, which has remained unchanged since 2001.

The RI Board approved a Rotary magazine subscription fee increase from the current US\$1 per issue to US\$1.50 -- the first increase in 22 years. The new annual fee structure will be as follows:

For the print edition:

US\$18 - USA, Puerto Rico, and U.S. Virgin Islands

US\$24 - Canada (which includes the Rotary Canada quarterly supplement)

US\$36 – all other countries (international shipping included)

For the digital edition:

US\$18 – all countries except Canada

US\$24 - Canada (which includes the Rotary Canada quarterly supplement)

The change, which takes effect on 1 January 2024, will be reflected on your club's January invoice.

Since its inception in 1911, Rotary magazine has been solely supported by subscription fees from our members and advertising revenue. In recent years, rising inflation and frequent disruptions in supply chains have dramatically increased material, labor, and production costs. In addition, the sagging advertising industry has led to a decline in our advertising revenue. These factors have depleted our resources, posing substantial financial challenges as we expand our digital offerings and widen our reach.

This long overdue adjustment will enable the magazine to continue to invest in high quality content, and accelerate our digital transformation through our new Rotary Voices podcast, a reenvisioned Rotary magazine website that further expands our coverage of Rotary stories on a more timely basis, and a revamped digital replica. Moreover, we'll be able to explore more environment-friendly material for our print publications and utilize professional services to maximize our advertising revenue.

Once again, I want to thank you for your continued support of Rotary magazine as we bring inspiring stories of our great organization to more members and beyond.
