The new architects of Peace: Bridging compassion and code

In an era defined by fragmenting borders and digital discord, Rotary International is reimagining one of its oldest pillars. Peacebuilding today extends beyond handshakes and diplomacy. It now includes harnessing the analytical strength of Artificial Intelligence to build what is often called “Positive Peace” that is proactive rather than reactive.

With the 2026 launch of the Rotary Peace Center at Symbiosis International University, the focus has expanded towards responsible technological engagement. Rotary Peace Fellows are increasingly exploring AI-driven predictive tools to identify potential “resource flashpoints”. These are regions where challenges like water scarcity or food insecurity may escalate into conflict. Early identification allows timely humanitarian response, often months before tensions intensify.

As one Rotary Peace Fellow shared in 2026, the shift is clear. The work is no longer limited to resolving conflict after it occurs. It is about anticipating and preventing it. AI does not replace empathy. Instead, it offers a clearer map of emerging crises so that human compassion can be directed where it is needed most.

At the same time, this evolving approach calls for careful responsibility. A human-in-the-loop model remains essential to address concerns such as algorithmic bias and the spread of misinformation, both of which contribute to growing polarization. Rotary’s “Tech for Peace” initiative reflects this awareness by equipping young leaders with the skills to use technology constructively and to transform digital spaces into platforms for dialogue.

By bringing together the precision of technology with the strength of human connection, Rotary continues to build pathways toward sustainable peace. In today’s context, peace is not only an aspiration. It is something that can be thoughtfully designed, nurtured, and sustained through both innovation and empathy.



HISTORY OF MODERN TRANSFUSION MEDICINE

In ancient literature, there are descriptions of blood oozing and death of suffering humanity owing to that. Everybody gets a panic whenever sees a person bleeding profusely in front of him. The intelligent people of ancient time were ignorant about the reverse idea of saving life of someone dying for want of blood by transfusing it after collecting it from some other healthy volunteer. A lot of technological advances was necessary, in this field, at that time.

In 1542, about 469 years back, when Pope Innocent VIII was dying, he was administered blood collected from 3 young persons. The idea was to treat Pope's senility or to return back his youth. Unfortunately, all four persons died. That was the first description of blood transfusion rather mismatched blood transfusion, in human civilization. In 1615, Livavius, was able to establish a system by which blood can be transfused from vein to vein to such a person who is "exhausted in strength, weak, enervated, scarcely breathing". In 1628, Harvey established blood circulation system in human body. In 1665, Lower, experimented blood transfusion among laboratory animals. In 1667, Jean-Baptiste-Denis, transfused blood to a human being by collecting it from a lamb. In 1704, one experiment was held, in which blood transfused to a dying person by collecting it from a calf; once, twice. After second transfusion, patient developed an unnatural feeling "a plentiful sweat .. and ..great pain in his kidney." This famous description, till today, we are unable to find out the cause of this unnatural feeling. The mysterious equation between the life saving blood transfusion system and life threatening blood transfusion reaction is still unresolved. France abandoned blood transfusion after the death of that particular patient of Mr Denis.

After that, about 180-185 years back, Blundell transfused blood from human volunteers to dying patients. In some cases, his attempts were very successful, he was able to give a fresh lease of life; but in other cases, his patients died. He was unable to explain the cause of death due to blood transfusion.

In 1901, Landsteiner, first invented 'ABO blood group system' and also able to explain scientifically the side effects of blood transfusion like 'haemolysis' and 'incompatibility'. Later, he received the Nobel prize for his discovery. He is the 'father of modern transfusion medicine'. In 1907 Hektoen improved blood safety by introducing cross-match technique. In 1914, a spectacular event happened, in the form of discovery of 'sodium citrate' by A. Hustin and L. Agote. Blood collection, blood preservation and blood transfusion to ailing humanity was made possible with this discovery. After 2 years, Rous and Turner, proved by experiment that 'glucose' can increase the life span of red blood corpuscles of stored blood. J. Loutit and P. Mollison in 1943, discovered Acid Citrate Dextrose (ACD) which can preserve blood upto 21 days. Nowadays, we use CPDA (Citrate Phosphate Dextrose Adenine) solution which can preserve blood upto 35 days. Again, we can add SAGM (Saline Adenine Glucose Mannitol) solution which can preserve red blood cells upto 42 days.

In 1921, blood donation programme started officially. In 15th March, 1937, first blood bank started in Chicago city in Cook County Hospital under the supervision of Dr. Bernard Fantus. A lot of blood banks were built up around 1940. At that time, there was direct transfusion, patient and donor both used to lie down side by side during transfusion or donation like sometimes we see in Hindi movies. An outbreak of Syphilis happened due to direct transfusion among recipients and later on, this test became mandatory in collected blood for transfusion.

In 1940, Landsteiner and Weiner discovered 'Rh typing' in blood. This discovery explained transfusion reaction of some patients as well as "Haemolytic disease of the newborn" and their remedy was also made possible later on. After that a lot of blood group antigen system were discovered by several scientists.



Altogether, there are 30 blood group systems, 308 blood group antigens and 1140 blood group alleles till date. We all know that necessity is the mother of inventions. IIInd world war (1939 – 1945) opened many closed doors of transfusion medicine. Blood component preparation from whole blood became possible. Everybody accepted the importance of transfusion medicine as a branch of medical science. Blood and its components became extremely useful life saving drug for wounded soldiers. At that time blood transfusion facility was limited among soldiers.

Around 1940, common people also became the beneficiary of transfusion medicine. Later on, we observed haemophiliac patients are cured with fresh plasma (at present we supply it as cryo) transfusion; new born babies who are jaundiced cured with 'exchange transfusion'.

In 1960-1965 with the advancement of time, plastic polyvinyl blood collection bags containing citrate phosphate dextrose adenine (CPDA) were introduced into the market. We were able to collect and store blood in this container in hygienic way and blood component preparation was also made easy. Rational use of blood / Component therapy is the cornerstone of modern blood banking. In modern transfusion medicine, the importance lies on separation of blood into different components and use of blood components according to its necessity. This will benefit us in various ways. Firstly, there is less chance of transfusion reaction among recipients. Secondly, one unit of blood can be divided into more than one components and can be transfused to more than one patients according to their necessity and thus wastage is prevented. Thirdly, plasma, which is a component of blood can be stored up to one year where ordinarily we cannot store blood more than 35 days.

In 1965, Hepatitis B virus discovered and in 1968 the test for this virus in stored blood started.

Similarly, in 1981, AIDS, in 1983 HIV recognised and in 1985 the test for HIV virus started. HCV test became mandatory in 1990 after it was identified 1989 .

Now, one technique 'Apheresis' developed in which we can collect a particular component of blood as much a patient requires from a donor with the help of a machine and return back the rest to donor. Hence, more than one unit of blood component can be collected from a single donor. This facility is also available in blood banks of Kolkata. Another technique 'intra operative blood salvage' is there in which blood loss in surgical procedure of a patient can be collected and stored and transfused back to patient.

The newer techniques and inventions in the field of transfusion medicine is enriching this branch of medicine day by day. We hope that the progress of modern transfusion medicine will gain momentum in the years to come and it is dedicated to the betterment of ailing humanity.

Minutes of the Regular Meeting

Meeting No.: 354 Date: 31.10.2025 Venue: Online Time: 8:45 P.M. – 9:30 P.M.

An online meeting was held to review forthcoming district events and discuss ongoing and proposed community service programmes.

Key Points:
