HISTORIC MARBLE PALACE



The Mullick family is a famous name in the history of Calcutta and an important part of the mercantile and cultural fabric of the city. Unlike the Tagores, however, they were not zamindars, but gold merchants. The founder of their Great House, the Marble Palace, was Rajendra Mullick, whose father died when he was three. His mother Hiranmoyee Dasee and an English guardian Sir James Weir Hogg brought him up to become one of Calcutta's most famous citizens.

He received the title of Rai Bahadur for his efforts during the 1865-66 Bengal Famine, and was given the title of Rajah by Lord Lytton in 1878 in acknowledgment of his 'charitable disposition and philanthropic deeds', receiving a large diamond ring as a ceremonial gift. His extraordinary Marble Palace embodies his great interest in natural history and both Eastern and Western art and culture.

This Great House is still home to members of the Mullick family who also maintain it as a private museum. It is the most famous of Calcutta's Great Houses, not merely for its accessibility but for the opulent style and eclectic mix of art and treasures it houses. On a visit, Viceroy Lord Minto was so astonished with the ninety varieties of patterned imported marble on the floors, wall panels and tabletops that he called it the Marble Palace, and the title has remained to this day. Rajendra Mullick was just sixteen-year-old in 1835 when he built this Great House, and it took 500 Indian and foreign artisans over five years to complete. Built in European classical style and closely resembling London's Burlington House, the Marble Palace is situated in Muktaram Babu Street. Ornate gates flanked by guards holding tall iron spears go unnoticed by passersby going about their daily business. The enormous white façade of the Marble Palace seems strangely incongruous, with its driveway encircling an elaborate fountain and statues of lions, the Buddha, Jesus and various Hindu gods dotting the overgrown gardens.

The exterior of the palace features elaborate Rococo stucco work, and a portico with six Tuscan columns. It is impressive, with fourteen Corinthian-style columns on the ground floor and a further fourteen on the first floor, each separated by Venetian shutters. The house is topped with an ornately carved pediment.

The gardens of the Marble Palace are Baroque in style and extensive. Ornamental stone seats are placed amongst groups of tall palms and tropical plants. The garden once housed a menagerie of animals and birds, Calcutta's first zoo. The first room the visitor encounters is the elaborate billiard room dotted with statues and enormous carved sidetables. The walls are decorated with ornate stucco mouldings and hung with paintings. Other rooms follow, each as sumptuous as the last. Light filters through the shuttered windows adding to the atmosphere of faded Baroque grandeur. The family's fortunes enabled Rajendra Mullick to indulge in amassing a vast collection of art and artefacts for the palace.

Enormous glass chandeliers hang from the ceiling, their reflection multiplied in the floor-to-ceiling Venetian mirrors. Tables are crowded with Sevres vases, Bohemian goblets and Dresden figurines. Silent French ormolu clocks line the walls alongside swords from Toledo. Among the huge collection of oil paintings are a Rubens: 'The Marriage of St. Catherine' and a Joshua Reynolds 'The Infant Hercules Strangling the Serpent'. Each room is filled with the decorative, the ornamental and the monumental. The blue and white painted courtyard is filled with statues, potted palms and a fountain. The altar is ornate with stucco mouldings, and strangely, Greek and Roman statues happily exist alongside figures from the Hindu scriptures in the thakur dalan.

Despite their wealth or perhaps because of it, the family have maintained a long tradition of caring for the needy. Rajendra's father, Nilmoni Mullick was a philanthropist, who established a kitchen in Chorbagan to feed the poor. Rajendra continued and improved his father's philanthropic interests, and the family also continues this tradition, feeding 300-400 people a day from their private trust fund.

Rajah Rajendra Mullick's many achievements are embodied in the intriguing Marble Palace. Perhaps the most important is the inclusion of a binding clause in the trust deed which prevents any changes or additions to the original building. In this way, today's Mullick family can keep the palace alive by making it available as a museum, showcasing the family's vast collection of artefacts and allowing visitors a glimpse into the home of one of Calcutta's Great Families.
