Arindam Sil – Filmmaker, Actor Producer – Speaks on Being a Rotarian and latest trends in Cinema on 4/8/23

DISCOVERING THE NEW NARRATIVES IN THE OLD MOVIE FORMS

Having no lineage of the entertainment media, Arindam was all set to pursue his doctoral program at an American university after graduating from St Xavier's College, Kolkata and completing his M.B.A. from IISWBM, Kolkata. But quite timely he decided to nurture himself as an actor which he quite successfully did. During this period of 34 years in his chosen profession, Arindam has passionately pursued his career as an Actor, Producer, Executive Producer, Line Producer and finally one of the most accepted, followed and loved Director of the Bengali Filmdom.

Starting off as an actor on stage and television, the observant thespian was motivated to tell stories in his own unique way. After twenty-five years of being a well acclaimed actor, an indomitable want to tell stories had propelled him into being a director. He is now a creator who cradles the spirit of a performer.

In 2007, as an actor on stage, he had toured and performed in twelve cities of United States. He has acted in over ten thousand episodes in numerous Bengali Television serials. He was also

a favourite actor of accomplished directors and has worked with Anjan Dutt, Prabhat Roy, Rabiranjan Moitra, Sandip Ray, Koushik Ganguly and the like.

Arindam Sil has directed eleven films till date with back to back blockbuster hits which include Har Har Byomkesh, Ebar Shabor, Durga Sohay, Dhananjay, Mitin Mashi to name a few. In 2009, Arindam Sil founded his production company Nothing Beyond Cinema marking his start as a producer.

Presently, besides being a Director, Producer, and an occasional actor, Arindam Sil is the Chairperson of Film, Media, Entertainment Committee of the Bengal Chamber of Commerce and Industry and also the Chairperson of the Entertainment Committee of Indian Chamber of Commerce. He is the chartered president of Rotary Club of Kolkata, Urbana. He is also a passionate conservationist and a social activist.

Actor and director Arindam Sil is elemental to the entire community of story tellers and story makers. Being a maestro of bringing literary texts alive on screen to finely knitting originals, Arindam Sil's narrative is exemplary in the world of motion pictures. He has also been a very successful line producer and executive producer to films like Kahaani, Detective Byomkesh Bakshi, Teen, Meri Pyaari Bindu, Gunday and many other films. Arindam Sil's intuitive genius is priceless for the representation of the human condition and sensibility on the silver screen.

Arindam is happily married to Shukla Das, she is a Director Admin & HR at Institution of Engineers in India. They are blessed with daughter Sonika Sil, she is an Associate Director of International Educational Software development firm, based at Bangalore.

Consider Becoming a Rotarian....Today

Potential club members are everywhere. But to get them to join Rotary, clubs must use creativity and imagination, says Past RI President Cliff Dochterman.

"Rotary International leaders keep emphasizing membership growth and extension because Rotary's very survival depends on it," says Dochterman, a member of the Rotary Club of Moraga, California, USA, and author of he ABCs of Rotary, a resource for new members. "If Rotary is to grow, we all must take action."

Dochterman believes clubs can thrive by seeking new

members, retaining current ones, and sponsoring new clubs in the community. He offers the following tips:

Seeking new members

Clubs must have a specific plan in place, says Dochterman.

- Use a team approach. Teams should have several members who meet with qualified business and professional leaders to discuss the benefits of joining Rotary.
- Set aside one club meeting per month to be a "visitor day," to which all club members would invite a friend or prospective member.
- Seek out natural prospects, including Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotaractors, and Group Study Exchange (GSE) team members.

Retaining current members

"Keeping current club members is just as important as bringing in new ones. The key is to adapt and change," says Dochterman.

Make sure club meetings, service activities, and social events are interesting, fun, and worthwhile.

- Initiate more hands-on projects so club members will feel that they're making a difference.
- Eliminate 100 percent attendance requirements.
- Be alert to the symptoms that lead to resignation. Club leaders should be considerate to members' personal problems.

Sponsoring a new club

"Don't think about cloning your existing club. The new century of Rotary requires and permits a new vision of fellowship and service," says Dochterman. "It's time to think about sponsoring a new kind of Rotary club." For example:

- A club composed entirely of executives and professionals under the age of 40. The nucleus could be former Rotaractors, GSE team members, and Foundation program alumni.
- A club in an ethnic or minority section of the community, with members who share common economic and cultural interests.
- A club that meets in a shopping mall, airport, high-rise office building, golf course, or other non-traditional but convenient location.

At the 2023 Rotary International Convention in Melbourne, I asked all Rotary members to become champions in our effort to illuminate mental health needs near and

far. This includes helping one another feel more supported, advocating for mental health services, and building bridges with experts in the field to expand access to treatment.

It's an important task and a big ask. But it's also something that should feel familiar to every Rotary member — because everything we do is in the spirit of caring, giving, friendship, and compassion, and has been from the beginning of our organization.

We've grown into an amazing global network of 1.4 million interconnected community leaders — leaders who share a deep commitment to doing good in the world. But what makes Rotary powerful isn't just what we do for the communities we serve. We also support and empower each other, by creating a safe space for our members to bring their whole, authentic selves. We show each other comfort and care.

These connections are deeply meaningful. The U.S. surgeon general recently declared loneliness a public health epidemic. Dr.Vivek Murthy said, "We must prioritize building social connection the same way we have prioritized other critical public health issues such as tobacco, obesity, and substance use disorders." I am proud of what Rotary has done across generations to build those kinds of social connections

— and this magazine focused on loneliness and what Rotary can do about it in its January 2023 issue.

Our worldwide community and our foundational value prioritizing Service Above Self makes Rotary a powerful global advocate for mental health. A recently published study by Ohio State University found performing acts of kindness was the only one of three mental health interventions tested that helped people feel more connected to others. Study coauthor David Cregg said, "Performing acts of kindness seems to be one of the best ways to promote those connections."

This research suggests what we've known all along — that doing good helps transform not just the communities we serve, but it also transforms us. As we put a greater focus on mental health, let's not think of this effort as something new to Rotary, but rather as something we can do better and as a result have a greater impact on ourselves and the people we serve.

We are not starting this effort from scratch. The Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives has been focused on these kinds of issues for several years — and we will be looking to members of that group for leadership as we continue to build awareness.

Mental health care fits comfortably within several of our areas of focus. As of May, there are 41 global grant-supported projects with a mental health focus. Many of them have tremendous promise, and we will be highlighting them in the months ahead.

So let's work together to erase the stigma associated with emotional well-being, raise awareness of mental health needs, and improve access to preventive and interventional mental health services.

Together, we will Create Hope in the World.

Rotary started with the vision of one man — Paul Harris. The Chicago attorney formed the Rotary Club of Chicago on 23 February 1905, so professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Over time, Rotary's reach and vision gradually extended to humanitarian service. Members have a long track record of addressing challenges in their communities and around the world.

Our ongoing commitment: That commitment endures today through an organization that remains truly international. Only

16 years after being founded, Rotary had clubs on six continents. Our members now span the globe, working to solve some of our world's most challenging problems. We're not afraid to dream big and set bold goals. We began our fight against polio in 1979 with a project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines. Today, polio remains endemic in only two countries — down from 125 in 1988.

Whatever Rotary may mean to us, to the world it will be known by the results it achieves.


