Social Activist Sobhan Mukherjee, also known as the Padman of Bengal, spoke on Human and Child trafficking. Bishakha Laskar, Secretary of the Durbar Mahila Samanwaya Committee spoke on recognition of sex work as a legitimate profession.

23<sup>rd</sup> November conducted Thalassemia and Cervical Cancer Awareness Programme at Udayan in Barrackpore. It is a Home for the children of Leprosy affected people. Dr.Susmita Banerjee addressed more than 200 children of the age group of 9 to 15 years.

#### **RCCSW IN ACTION**

##### **Project: From Shadows to Safety – The Journey of Trafficked Girls**

(Sensitisation and Inclusion of Sex Workers, and the Rescue & Rehabilitation of Trafficked Girl Children from Red-Light Areas)

Date: 22/11/2025

Venue: Calcutta Rowing Club

Audience consisted of: RCCSW members, Rotarians from other Rotary Clubs and Non-Rotarians

##### **Project Details:**

The session began with a brief introduction of the day's agenda, and the thought behind RCCSW's initiative was shared with the audience.

The guest speaker for the evening was Smt. Bisakha Laskar, Secretary, Durbar Mahila Samanwaya Committee—an organisation of sex workers advocating for their rights and equality. She was felicitated by Dr. Rtn. Sushmita Mitra.

Smt. Laskar spoke about how actively Durbar advocates for reforms in laws and policies that restrict the human rights of sex workers, and how the organisation has been working towards their inclusion in mainstream society since 1992.

She also elaborated on the processes of rescue, counselling, and rehabilitation of trafficked girl children from red-light areas. Special emphasis was placed on counselling sex workers about their rights, boundaries, and the potential hazards associated with sex work.

RCCSW leadership and members expressed their intention to join hands with Durbar and Smt. Laskar for meaningful collaborations in future projects.
