PRESIDENT SPEAKS:

After touring Spain for 15 days, starting from Madrid (on 3rd October 2014) to Toledo to Seville to Faro (in Portugal) to Cordoba to Granada to Malaga to Valencia, we arrived at Barcelona on the 16th day. It is a vibrant city, buzzing with people and laughter, a cosmopolitan city—people here speak in English unlike the other parts of Spain. Barcelona offers a lot of places for tourists to visit. The FCB and the various architectural structures of Antony Gaudi are worth visiting. However, what I liked most and enjoyed the most is the walk down La Rambla. It's about a mile walk from Placa de Catalunya down La Rambla, Barcelona's most popular street to the waterfront. The centre of La Rambla is a pedestrian walkway, a cobbled pathway. I was awestruck with the bewildering array of colours, sounds and scents even though the threat of pickpockets is huge. The beggars, in their flamboyant costumes, left an indelible mark on my memory. The magnetic pull of La Rambla, with its inviting cafes and bustling eateries, had been irresistible—from the tantalizing aroma of spicy tapas to the comforting scent of churros bathed in molten chocolate to the famous Spanish drink, Sangria. The shops with their wares displayed in enticing arrays, the melodies of street musicians, the captivating Flamenco dancers and the intriguing living statues, still come alive in my recollections. The people with their infectious energy and warmth seem to be the very lifeblood of the boulevard.

La Rambla is lined with a variety of shops selling everything from souvenirs to high end fashion to Lladro figurines. I couldn't resist myself and ended up carrying an extra suitcase back to India filled with La Ramblas shopping.....and good that the very next day was our flight back home.

More than just a street, La Rambla is a living artery of Barcelona, a place where locals and tourists mingle. It is a place to experience the city's heartbeat, from the historic charm of its past to the energetic pulse of its present.

President Ruma Mitra suggested a Project to celebrate Teachers' Day on 5th September at the Board Meeting on 2nd September. With the help and reference of incoming member Zeena Augustine, President spoke to the Superintendent, Mr. Barry Beals, of Mary Cooper Home for the aged in Khidderpore. She expressed her wish to felicitate the elderly retired teachers of the Home if there were any. She was told there were 22 inmates in the Home of which 7 were retired teachers. A unanimous decision was taken that the 7 teachers would be felicitated with coffee mugs (from Presto) with a Teachers' Day note printed on it and all the inmates would be presented with a gift hamper. Zeena and Rtn Ruma wasted no time and got the gift items ready before the D Day.

On Teachers' Day morning President Ruma Mitra, Hony. Secretary Samir Sur and Zeena Augustine reached the venue with the gifts at 10 A.M. All the inmates of the Home were waiting at the Living room of a beautiful 2 storey sprawling building built in 1930. There was an interactive session for about half an hour. The President addressed all the elderly people. There were ex Principals of schools, ex teachers besides the others. The oldest was Mrs. Chhaya Biswas (97 years), ex Principal of St. Thomas Girls School. The Teachers were felicitated with coffee mugs and a bag full of goodies. All the other elderly members were given goodie bags only. There was a photo session. The inmates requested the members of RCCSW to visit them often and plan health related Projects.

It was really a great experience being in the company of such senior citizens for a while. It was a Project of a very different nature. Some may, some may not stay for the next Teachers' Day but RCCSW achieved in bringing a smile to their lips. The 3 members of RCCSW silently prayed for their health and happiness and left the venue with a mixed feeling of emotion, satisfaction and joy.



Hakeem Babalola selected to be 2026-27 Rotary International president

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The Board, guided by the RI code of policies, conducted a special session to select the organization's leader after the resignation of RI President-elect SangKoo Yun, who decided to step back from his Rotary responsibilities and focus on his recovery from recent cancer treatment.

Babalola began his Rotary journey in 1984 as a Rotaractor. He joined the Rotary Club of Trans Amadi 10 years later. His leadership roles include serving as district governor (2011-12), RI vice president (2019-20), and member of the RI Board (2018-20). He was also an active leader and participant in RI committees such as the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee (2017-23) and the Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee (2013-present, adviser 2016-present).

Babalola received a university degree in engineering in 1988. He worked for 25 years in the oil and gas industry, holding senior positions in Shell PLC. He is the founder of two companies: Riviera Technical Services Ltd., an oil and gas infrastructure delivery company, and Lead and Change Consulting, an executive coaching and organizational performance advisory group.

Babalola's professional affiliations include the Nigerian Society of Engineers, the Institute of Safety Professionals of Nigeria, and the Association of Change Management Professionals. He is a member of Jericho Businessmen Club, an organization in his birth city of Ibadan that provides input to governments on economic and social policy.

Babalola and his wife, Preba, live in the city of Port Harcourt. He supports The Rotary Foundation with a named endowment and as an Arch Klumph Society member. A trustee of ShelterBox UK, he is a recipient of the Africa Centennial Heroes Award, the Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World, the RI Service Above Self Award, and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service.

The president of Rotary International serves a one-year term, presiding over the Board of Directors and providing inspirational leadership for the organization. As the spokesperson for the global network, the president visits clubs around the world to promote Rotary's values and represent the organization at major events. Rotary chooses its president from members who have demonstrated extensive leadership experience within Rotary, including service as a club president, district governor, and member of the Board.

BLACK HOLE OF Kolkata – PP. Rtn. Dr. Sumit Kumar Mitra

In general, we know that Black Hole means- a region of space time where gravity is so strong that nothing—no particles or even electromagnetic radiation such as light—can escape from it. The theory of general relativity predicts that a sufficiently compact mass can deform space time to form a black hole.

The Black Hole of Calcutta, refers to a tiny prison in Fort William , measuring 4.30 × 5.50 metres (14 × 18 feet), in which troops of Siraj ud-Daulah, the Nawab of Bengal, held British prisoners of war on the night of 20 June 1756.

John Zephaniah Holwell, one of the British prisoners and an employee of the East India Company, said that, after the fall of Fort William, the surviving British soldiers, Indian sepoys, and Indian civilians were imprisoned overnight in conditions so cramped that many people died from suffocation and heat exhaustion, and that 123 of 146 prisoners of war imprisoned there, died.

Modern historians believe that 64 prisoners were sent into the Hole, and that 43 died there. The Nawab attacked Calcutta because of the company's failure to stop fortifying the city as a defense against its rivals in anticipation of war (the Seven Years' War, 1756–63).

Following the surrender, Holwell and the other Europeans were placed for the night in the company's local lockup for petty offenders, popularly known as the Black Hole. According to Holwell, 146 people were locked up, and 23 survived.

The Black Hole Monument, the slender White Monolith, standing atop an octagonal base adorned with marble plaques, commemorates the British Officials who died in the BLACK HOLE incident.

The Monument was erected by LORD CURZON, in 1901 at the corner of Dalhousie Square (now B. B. D. Bagh), which is said to be the site of the 'Black Hole. Later, in 1940, the monument was moved to the graveyard of St John's Church, Calcutta, where it remains today.
