The Medical Health Checkup camp was for General Health checkup, Eye checkup and Dental checkup of the children and was held in the auditorium of St Lawrence

attending to the children and examining them were Dr Prasenjit Majumder, Dr Samiksha Shwetam and Dr Ashok Kumar Singh. The three doctors were called for the camp by Rtn Dr J N Gurtu and Rtn Dr O P Agarwal. The medicines were organized by PP Rtn BK Agarwal. All in all, 97 pupils in total from age 5 years to 13years of the St Lawrence Night School were checked up by all three doctors,

Rtn Dr O P Agarwal personally checked the eyes of many young pupils with his

skill and expertise. The three doctors

Boxes of refreshments sponsored by Rtn Kashmiri Marwah were given to the 3 doctors and also to the 15 teachers headed by Ms Sujata Singh and 1 Service staff of the school who were there to help supervise the pupils and ensure the entire process proceeded smoothly RCCV would like to gratefully acknowledge the cooperation and support of the Director of the Night School at St Lawrence, Father Benny Thomas, for the medical camp to take place. The Medical Check up Camp was very successful, with 97/100 pupils turning up, neatly dressed in their uniforms and accompanied by their parents. The Medical Checkup camp ended at around 5:30 pm.

# PREVENTION OF CERVICAL CANCER



**Late Sumitra Kejriwal**, beloved sister of PP Sunita Agarwala was a member of RC Calcutta Victoria for about 8 years. Her Art Gallery 'Chitrakoot' used to be a venue for many a fund raise and informal fellowships. In early 2022 she was diagnosed with cancer and within a few months succumbed to it.

In her loving memory sister Sunita and her family sponsored a project on 'Prevention of Cervical Cancer through awareness and vaccination'. Two awareness

camps were held - one at RCC Kanthalberia and another at St. John's Diocesan H.S. School. 30 girls were vaccinated at RCC Kanthalberia -- two doses for girls between 9-14 years of age and three doses for some who were over 14 years old. The vaccines were procured by PP B.K. Agarwal and administered on 22nd December 2024, 19th January 2025 and on 19th June 2025. Member Dr. Joyashree Dhar single handedly vaccinated all candidates in the inaugural camp and appraised them about the need for it. 30 girls are now protected.

#### WORDS OF WISDOM



Commanding Large Vessels in High Risk Maritime Zones

On 12th July 2025, at the regular meeting Guest speaker

CAPT. PANKAJ KUMAR, a seafarer, gave an interesting talk on Modern Piracy and War Zone Navigation. Capt. Pankaj Kumar said that maritime piracy was a significant threat in various conflict prone region such as Gulf of Aden, Arabian sea, Red Sea and West Africa. Pirates somehow get information about cargo vessels especially if they were without arms and being soft targets, attack them. High speed boats which can not be detected by radar were used to hijack vessels at high seas. Often the crews were held for ransom and sometimes even killed. He recounted a personal experience while sailing on Red sea. Such encounters were detrimental to the mental condition of the crews whose morale dips. Indian Naval ships were also sometimes under threat. The crew then take shelter inside a "citadel' where they hide for some days with blackout as protection. Generally nothing much can be done if they were taken captive. Now there was an added threat - that of missiles due to Syria Israel conflict. Unlike in the past, technological advances have now created serious problems. Pirates use high speed boats, satellite phones, drones for surveillance, sophisticated communication tools etc. The Naval forces especially Indian Navy however play a pivotal role in protecting merchant ships and seafarers. Their consistent patrolling, armed escort mission, anti piracy intervention have significantly deterred piracy attempts. Captain Kumar through his power point presentation, excerpts from the well known film 'Captain Phillips' (2013) & a video by Hammas brought to the audience a vivid picture of life in high seas in all its aspects. He also shared his own experiences. One must salute the courage and resilience of seafarers who operate under constant threat to keep global trade running. There was a brief question answer session following his talk. Capt. Pankaj Kumar was introduced by Capt. Arnab Sen, thanked by IPP Rajnish Mehta and presented with a memento by PP Dr J N Gurtu.
