and togetherness. On behalf of the editorial team, I extend my warmest wishes for a joyous, safe, and prosperous Diwali to you and your families.

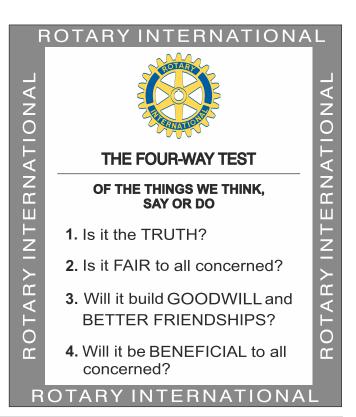

# RULEBOOK WRITTEN: YOUR GUIDE TO THE NEW INCOME TAX NORM Rtn. CY Ramani

This is imaginary tet-a-tete between Hemi and Social media Pundit Dhillubhai.

Though written in an interview Q and A format, the objective is simple, as in to drive home some latest, current and relevant understanding of a selected money related topic.

**D'bhai:** Hi Hemi, so much is often written over social media about the new Income Act 2025. Please share what exactly is it?

**Hemi:** Yes the new Income Tax Act is designed such that it will replace the old mutilated Income Tax Act of 1961.

**D'bhai:** We are informed that it is based on SIMPLE principles.

**Hemi:** True, could be acronym for SIMPLE. It is structured around being

1) Streamlined 2) Integrated 3) Minimised Litigation 4) Practical 5) Learn and adapt 6) Efficient

And we all believe that the tax laws will become more tax payer friendly. At least the Parliament believed so as it was passed sans debate in the recent monsoon session of Parliament

**D'bhai:** what exactly was reduced?

**Hemi:** The number of sections and sub sections are believed to be reduced from 819 to 536. And the chapters are limited to just 23.

**D'bhai:** People at large were always confused with two differences of Year. True?

**Hemi:** Of course, the client always confused (especially paying for the Bill of Fees) (laughs)

Now, there will be a Single Concept 'Tax Year'. It will do away with 'Previous Year' and 'Assessment Year!

**D'bhai:** What according to you are the highlights of the new Act of 2025?

**Hemi:** I would rate them as under:

1) Unnecessary provisions and antiquated one are removed NOW CBDT is empowered for digital-era rule making. 2) Punitive powers are vested to the tax sleuths such that anyone in possession or control of digital documents or information must provide 'reasonable technical and other assistance' so all professionals

especially CA will have to walk the safer path. 3) Now it will be obligatory to share Password

once requested. 4) The plain implication is that the Assessee should share password of his other social media platforms and personal emails.

**D'bhai:** But, it appears quite threatening and intruding in some one's privacy. Is it not?

**Hemi:** I agree, but the law has empowered the Tax officer. And Wait, in case the Password is not shared on demand, then the law also empowers the tax official to "override the access code to any computer system".

**D'bhai:** My goodness, this is quite alarming. Hope it is NOT misused. What other sweeping powers to officials?

**Hemi:** The new tax laws will apply the provisions governing tax demand arrears as a vital tool to recover tax demand and preclude tax evasion.

**D'bhai:** Good to hear that the provisions will safeguard tax revenues.

**Hemi:** Yes, the Huge Cumulative tax arrears will eventually be reduced.

**D'bhai:** And what about all the appeals and litigation pending?

**Hemi:** There would be added hardships, no doubt about it. But obviously, the old tax law will continue to address all the Tax Litigation in hand.

**D'bhai:** And when will the Act be made effective?

Hemi: The Act will be effective from 1st APRIL 2026. And will be applicable to the whole of India.

**D'bhai:** Hope there will be some comparatives to check with old Tax Act.

**Hemi:** There will be 'Utility' for checking the comparative section applicable. Currently, I am informed that the Utility has been just released ,much later.

**D'bhai:** So, we will end here and keep our discussions for later review. The discussion was very insightful.

# DID YOU KNOW? 10 FACTS THAT WILL CHANGE HOW YOU SEE HEALTH INSURANCE Rtn. Rajesh Chheda

It was a good 25 years ago when people were quite comfortable in having a mediclaim policy of about 1 to 2 lakhs of rupees. at the most at higher end it would be a princely ₹5 lakhs. This was the time when a heart bypass would cost about 1 to 1.5 lakhs.

15 years ago, after my father's pacemaker and an annual checkup after the first year cost Rs 250/- it has annually increased and this year, it was Rs. 2500 for the same. grown about 10 times or at 15-16% compounded year on year. So it's an accepted fact that Health cost has spiralled over twice than that of normal inflation.

Likewise, here are the 10 things that come immediately to my mind that one should considerwhile planning for an adequate health insurance cover:

- 1. Consider health inflation and power of compounding that can can work crazily against your expectations.
- 2. Remember that when you retire, your income may stop, but your insurance premium will go on and keep on rising multiple times than what you're paying today.
- 3. Even for 25 years if you never been to the hospital, doesn't mean the next 25 years you'll never go. Probability will rise geometrically.
- 4. When you are in the hospital, see that you have a second family member aware of the details of your health policy as well as you have trusted health advisor by your side, that makes a whole lot of difference.
- 5. Don't buy a health policy because it is cheaper. the fine prints can put you back by lacs of rupees if you think you have saved a few thousands in premium.
- 6. Health insurance is for reimbursement only, so you see that you have adequate add-ons in case of life-threatening critical illnesses that could stop your income flow which is more fatal than the hospitalisation cost.
- 7. You still need to have an emergency Health fund in case of denial of cashless or the denial of a claim not

included in the policy. For example, Parkinsons is not covered in health

insurance. Also, long-term care is not available in India. 8. Don't wait to take it later, if your company is covering you now that will be too late when you may be befriended by lifestyle ailments, ABCD-Asthma, blood pressure, cholesterol, and diabetes.

9.A plethora of options has opened up in cases of treatment of rare ailments and cancers. If required to be treated internationally, coverage available in crores for a few thousand rupees more in premium.

10. Don't walk, but run to your health advisor to have your current plans evaluated and checked. As the saying goes: a stitch in time, saves nine.

You must have witnessed banking where in one would visit the bank branch for a cash withdrawal or for any small requirement. However since the year 1995 wherein we witnessed the first automated teller machine dispensing the cash. Banking is now on your finger tips that is you have netbanking, mobile banking, investments and the biggest of all the UPI payment which can be done online.

With these changes one need not visit a bank branch for your regular banking needs as it is available to you on your mobile. Now certain banks are disbursing loans online and incase of emergency one can get the loan disbursed in flat 10 sec that to on a click of a button. Now compare the same to applying a loan in early 90s wherein you would require a guarantor and processing would take longer time.

The changes you will witness are I am listing only three points which will ease your personal banking further.

#### Rise of AI-Driven Personalization

Banks are no longer just financial institutions—they're becoming tech-driven service providers. Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Machine Learning (ML) are enabling hyper-personalized experiences based on customer behavior, preferences, and transaction history. From personalized investment advice to intelligent chatbots handling routine queries, AI is helping banks streamline operations while improving customer satisfaction. For instance, ICICI Bank's iPal and HDFC Bank's EVA are AI-powered platforms that offer quick, round-the-clock support, reducing dependence on traditional customer service channels.

#### UPI 2.0 and the Surge of Contactless Transactions

Unified Payments Interface (UPI) continues to lead the charge in digital payments in India. In 2025, UPI 2.0 introduces features like overdraft facilities, biometric authentication, and automatic invoice

verification.Contactless and QRbased payments are now mainstream, even in semi-

urban and rural regions. The volume of UPI transactions surpassed 15 billion per month in early 2025, indicating massive adoption and trust in digital payment systems. This trend is pushing banks to upgrade infrastructure and ensure faster, safer processing of digital transactions.

And now the latest change which is happening from the 4th of October 2025. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has announced a major upgrade in the way cheque clearance will work across the country. Starting 4 October 2025, banks will clear cheques within a few hours instead of the current waiting time of one to two working days.

But a word of caution while doing online banking hence below are points needs to be followed.

#### Do's in Online Banking

1.Use Strong Passwords

Use a mix of upper/lowercase letters, numbers, and symbols.

Avoid common or easily guessable passwords (e.g., birthdays, "123456").

Change passwords regularly.

2. Enable Two-Factor Authentication (2FA)

Always activate OTP-based or app-based verification for login and transactions.

3. Access Only Secure Websites

Always check for https:// in the URL and a padlock symbol before entering login details.

Bookmark your bank's official site — avoid typing the URL manually every time.

4. Use Bank's Official App or Website

Download only from trusted sources like Google Play Store or Apple App Store.

Keep the app and your phone's OS updated.



#### 5. Log Out After Use

Always sign out when done, especially on shared or public devices.

6. Monitor Your Transactions Regularly

Check your account statements often to spot any unauthorized activity.

7. Report Suspicious Activity Immediately

Contact your bank immediately if you suspect fraud or unauthorized access.

8. Use Secure Internet Connection

Prefer personal Wi-Fi or mobile data. Use VPN when using public Wi-Fi.

#### **Donts**

1. Don't Share Your Credentials

Never share your password, OTP, CVV, or debit/credit card PIN with anyone — not even bank employees.

2.Don't Click on Suspicious Links

Avoid clicking on links in emails, SMS, or pop-ups claiming to be from your bank — they might be phishing scams.

Public Wi-Fi networks are risky and may be compromised by hackers.

4.Don't Store Sensitive Info on Devices

Avoid saving banking passwords or card info in browsers or unsecured apps.

5.Don't Ignore Security Alerts

Pay attention to login alerts or messages from your bank about account activity.

6.Don't Delay Reporting Fraud

The sooner you report, the better the chances of recovering lost money or blocking further misuse.

7.Don't Use Outdated Software

Using an old browser, app, or operating system can expose you to known security loopholes.

8.Don't Fall for Fake Loan or Cashback Offers

Many scams promise easy loans, cashback, or prize money — if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

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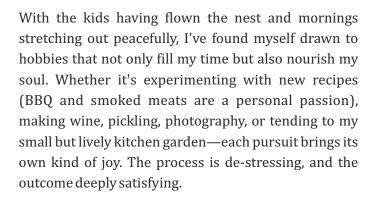
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#### HOBBY TO HABIT: GOING GREEN, GROWING HAPPIER

#### The Khambha Decomposter: Where It All Began

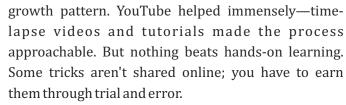
My interest in gardening was sparked by a simple clay contraption—the Khambha decomposter. During a meeting with Samrudh Desai, whose company supplied sanitary pad dispensers to us, he mentioned this innovative composting tool as part of his waste management initiative. I'd watched several videos about it but never took the plunge—until Samrudh's encouragement and a modest price tag of ₹3,000 convinced me.

My better half wasn't thrilled at the idea of garbage fermenting at home, but after a few educational videos, she relented. Thus began my composting experiment. Within three months, I was producing odour-free compost. Instead of discarding it, I decided to start a small terrace garden—ensuring no wet waste left our home.

#### **Growbags and Green Essentials**

As a beginner, growbags seemed ideal—easy to manage and just as easy to wind up if I lost interest. My research led me to Green Essentials in Socorro, a treasure trove for gardening supplies, saplings, manure, and helpful advice.

I began experimenting with different vegetables and fruits, each with its own fascinating



#### Lessons from the Soil

One key lesson: if you're growing fruit, use grafts from reputable nurseries. Seeds may sprout into plants, but fruiting can take years—or never happen at all. Germinating seeds and watching them grow into fruit-bearing plants (like ladyfinger, pumpkin, or chillies) is a joy like no other.

Pest management is another hard-earned lesson. It's heartbreaking to see your lovingly nurtured plants attacked by mealy bugs or fruit flies. Passion fruit, for instance, relies on bees for pollination—rare visitors on my terrace. So I learned to pollinate manually, thanks to online tutorials.

Experience teaches you the right balance of water and manure. One trick I swear by: deprive a lime tree of water for 7–10 days, then drench it—it'll burst into bloom.

#### My Little Eden

Over time, I've grown Kashmiri chillies, brinjal, tomato, guava, pumpkin, ladyfinger, limes, chickoo, and passion fruit. The harvest may be modest, but the joy of spotting a fresh bud in the morning is unmatched.

Sundays are my garden days—pruning, loosening soil, adding manure. My current setup includes five growbags with limes, ladyfinger, chickoo, and passion fruit.



#### A Nod to My Roots

I owe this love for hobbies to my father, who led by example. His passions inspired mine. Gardening is more than a pastime—it's a way to reconnect with nature, reduce waste, and do our bit for the environment.

If you're looking for a hobby that gives back in more ways than one, I'd say: go green. And then greener.

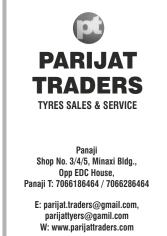

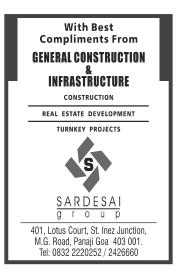

# GST REWIND AND REDEFINED: THE NEW RULES OF THE GAME DECODING THE RECENT GST RATE CHANGES Rtn. CA Gaurav Kenkre

The 56th GST council has recently announced a slew of changes as far rates of goods and services are concerned. Most goods and services have had their rates being reduced from 12% or 18% to 5%. While this may bring a smile to the face of consumer, manufacturers of such goods maybe in for some pain. Take the following example:

Item A requires raw material B and C for manufacturing. Earlier all 3 were taxed at 18% GST. So A would be sold in the market for egs for Rs 100 + Rs 18 GST. The cost of B and C was total Rs 60 (+ Rs 10.8 GST at 18%). The balance 40 is cost of labour and profits. So the manufacturer would finally pay Rs 18 MINUS Rs 10.8 (on purchase) = Rs 7.2 GST to the Government, after factoring in the input credit. After the rate change, Item A has become 5% but B and C continue to be 18%. In such case, GST on sale of A is now only Rs 5, and he has credit of Rs 10.8, so he doesn't have to pay any GST to the government (input credit more than output). However, this input credit keeps piling up and creates a cash flow blockage. THIS structure, i.e. when the GST rate on inputs is more than GST rate on outputs, is known as inverted duty structure. Due to this, several industries are expected to face credit blockage due to recent GST rate changes. So, this GST which has piled up is lost? No. There is a provision to file and claim a refund of such GST under the Inverted Duty Structure refund.

#### Key Eligibility Requirements for such refunds:

- •The input tax rate must genuinely exceed the output tax rate
- ·The final product should not be nil-rated or fully exempt from GST
- •The claim must be filed within the prescribed time limit of two years from the end of the financial year
- •The taxpayer must have filed their GSTR-1 and GSTR-3B returns for the relevant tax period
- ·A trader cannot claim such refund.
- •The refund is available only for input tax credit (ITC) on inputs (goods). on input services like consultancy and

of the inverted duty refund.

Similarly, ITC on capital goods is also excluded from the refund calculation

Businesses must file their inverted duty refund claims using Form GST RFD-01A on the GST portal. The application must be filed monthly for most taxpayers, though those with turnover up to ₹1.5 crore who file quarterly returns can apply quarterly. If the refund amount is above Rs 2 lac. then a CA certificate is needed.

#### The New Provisional Refund Mechanism

Starting November 1, 2025, the GST Council has approved a revolutionary change in processing inverted duty refunds. Businesses will now receive 90% of their refund claims provisionally after automated risk checks, similar to the system already in place for exporters.

The new provisional refund mechanism is expected to provide significant relief to manufacturers, exporters, and MSMEs where working capital gets blocked due to inverted duty structures. This reform enhances cash flow, reduces compliance burden, and strengthens ease of doing business.

#### **Action Points:**

- $1. \ All \ manufacturers \ must \ check \ if \ the \ GST \ rate \ on \ their \\ finished \ goods \ has \ been \ reduced$
- 2. Simultaneously, they must also check if the GST rate on their purchases is higher than that on their finished goods
- 3. Next, check if due to above, you will always have next excess GST input credit
- 4. If yes, and if your goods do not fall in the blocked for refund category, then you can prepare for filing a refund of such excess credit.
