President Rtn Rakesh and 'Do Good' Team thought of a unique way to conduct this meeting. Since it coincided with Mysore's DUSERA they invited a Speaker to talk about the above subject in detail.

The speaker was none other than our Annette Malavika, daughter of Rtn. Mahesh.

I must say I was awestruck. Never could I imagine that a girl of her age can go into such indepth research. As our President said, usually no one will choose a subject like that. Amazing is her interest. Asked how she had the inclination towards this rare passion. She smiling answered, This credit, I must give to my father. Whenever we used to go out on a holiday, and I used to come across any temple carvings, stricking paintings or anything unusual, I would ask my father. He would in turn, request our guide to explain thoroughly, even though he demanded more money. So I am indebted to my father for developing this curosity in me.

Malavika completed her Degree in Architecture from the University of Mysore. She holds a Master's Degree in Heritage Management from University of Exeter, UK. She is a Heritage Consultant, with over eight years of experience in Architectural Conservation in India.

In Mysore, her landmark projects are restoration of Jagan Mohan Palace and the Residential Wing of the Mysore Palace.

An extremely talented Annette Malavika, has a poise, stricking body language and vast knowledge. She kept her tone in a very soothing and pleasant manner.

Such well researched was her entire talk, that the audience sat in absolute attention. Malavika started explaining why the DASARA festivties or as they are called the NAVARATRI falls during this part of the year.

The sun shines on the Tropic of Cancer, thus there's a transition in the weather condition. NAVARATRI, is the worshipping of the NINE AVATARAS, of GODDESS DURGA. These avataras are different forms or incarnations of GODDESS DURGA. Each day is a form which fulfills the DIVINE SHAKTI. The point to be noted is that these various embodiments do not exist on their own but are the incarnations of MAA DURGA. Thus they do not have temples of their own. But each one has a power or SHAKTI, which is according to the need of the hour.

In different parts of India, people celebrate in their unique way. Everyone is in a festive mood. The last day culminates in showcasing the tremendous power of the GODDESS, that is the victory of righteousness over evil.

Mysore also celebrates in pomp and show. JUMBO SAVARI denotes the grand finale of Mysore Dasara festival, which takes place on the Vijaydashami day. A majestic procession of beautifully adorned elephants march through the streets. The most attractive one carries the Ambari, which is





the golden howdah and a symbolic representation of GODDESS CHAMUNDESHWARI, accompanied by folk troupes. When the procession ends, the torch -light parade begins. It is believed that the Maharaja doesn't go to witness the touch light parade. During olden days, the king would go to the jungle to hunt for boar. That's why in the painting too, the same is depicted. In between two years, DASARA was not celebrated. Then it became, a public festivity.

People from nearby places enjoy to come and watch the lightning, the grandeur, the flower-show, the Exhibition and the merry making.

As the saying goes, "Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die".

ROTARY NEWS: ROTARY PROJECTS AROUND THE GLOBE

Peru

In the western Amazon, Rotary clubs in the city of Iquitos participated in a seminar in January to learn about the state of the area's schools. Two District 4465 leaders, Doris Alván and Fernando Del Aguila, enlisted a well-known educator in the area, Josefa Ríos Gil, to share with Rotarians what they can do to assist educators. In May, the Rotary Club of Iquitos Amazonas finished one related initiative, a district grant-supported teen empowerment project that taught young people to make earrings sold at eco-lodges near Lake Zungarococha. The club also provided school supplies to primary schools in the area.





United States

Prom is an expensive rite of passage, with purchases of gowns, tuxedos, flowers, meals, and transportation. In New York City, the Rotary Club of North Shore (Staten Island) is helping students through its "Cinderella/Cinderfella" project. The entire 25-member club solicits new and gently used formal attire, some of which is purchased new by Rotarians. In April, students from across the borough are invited to choose from about 200 free dresses and suits, as well as shoes and accessories, so they're ready for prom season. The project was started in 2024 by then-President Suzanne Demetrio and is led by members Stephanie Accardo and Regina Boukhvalova. "We believe no student should miss out due to financial hardship," says Demetrio. "We are giving young people the chance to feel special and confident on one of the biggest nights of their lives."
