



GLIMSES OF A VISIT TO EGYPT

When My Brother who lives in Malaysia declared "We and our neighbours in Kuala Lumpur are planning a trip to Turkey & Egypt my daughter Anjalli's ears perked up.



When? she asked my brother. End October he said. Great she said my daughter Arzoo has holidays then so we

will also join you in Egypt Who is we? asked my brother . Entire extended family she said. That is that .What my daughter says, like the king of Siam is final and binding .Thus it will be written and thus it shall be done. End of story.

We boarded the Etihad airline flight to Cairo via Abhu Dhabi on 25th October.

After a a two hour halt at Abu Dhabi airport we were on our way to Egypt.

EXPECTATIONS:

Frankly Egypt was far down the list of places I would have liked to see as on 25th Oct 2024. Greece ,Italy Spain were top of the agenda. In my mind Egypt was the forgotten history of Pharaohs and Cleopatras, tombs and pyramids,

incest and debauchery.

So I had no expectations.

And when we landed at the innocuous looking Cairo International

Airport my suspicions were confirmed. The Cairo IP reminded one of Indian airports of the not so distant past. HAL, Meenambakkam etc. Grossly inadequate for the traffic they were handling, airport staff talking loudly amongst themselves, running hither and thither, as if in so doing the inadequacies of the airport infra would be mitigated. To keep this article short I will write sector wise on what we encountered / **experienced on our visit**

TRANSPORT:

Very nice A/c buses throughout our trip with Ice boxes in which were kept a variety of drinks including beer. The drivers were always polite and courteous and could speak a smattering of English. Generous tipping is expected. People

are friendly but one has to be wary of shop keepers.

The hotel had an aura of bygone grandeur, that era

when the French and Brits would descend in droves to embrace the warm Egyptian air and be treated like Kings and Queens. The rooms were decent and the bathrooms opulently French

The roads and flyovers are quite good . Traffic reasonably

smooth.

After Two nights in Cairo we caught a flight to LUXOR. Airline was ok as airlines go. Nothing

exceptional. Nothing to Complain.

Internal flights are a little iffy -time wise but we were probably unlucky. Our return flight to Cairo from Aswan was delayed by 6 hours (our planned Shopping time in Cairo turned out be a no show)

The Cruise Liner in which we spent four nights from Luxor to Aswan (One Day Stop at Edfu and another stop at Kom Ombo before proceeding to Aswan, in a standard Liner 4 storeys high. It had 60 Double Rooms a dining hall, a lounge with bar, a large deck with bar and swimming pool. Excellent Service. Change of towels twice a day. Super food and cheap good quality Egyptian wine. Omar Khayyam if you will.

We took a balloon flight costing \$100 per person which by all yardsticks is cheap.

From ASWAN we took a bus to Abu Simbel 4hours ride through complete desert. With one stop in a very villagish dhaba. It had toilets. With passengers from about 100 odd buses not a very pleasant experience. But you do get a lot of packaged small eats a variety of Coffees and Teas.

FOOD & HOSPITALITY

Vegetarians will have no issues with food unlike in SE Asia. Plenty of salads and fruit, a variety of breads and cheeses, a

counter full of deserts, one chicken, one fish and one red meat dish with local rice. Par for the course on the liner.

The Egyptian food like Tabouleh, Hummus, Baba Ganoush with some Chicken and a variety of breads was very nice. Local specaility is Koshiary. Otherwise Largely Mediterranean food.





GEOGRAPHY

Mostly desert but must have been very fertile over a very large area once. Still very fertile but in a reduced area. They grow a lot of fruits and vegetables (100 varieties of Mango), bananas, oranges etc. Besides dates of course.

Cairo, Edfu all seem to be caught in a time warp. You will understand what

I am saying when you take a bus ride to Giza. Hundreds of old mournful looking mosques surrounded by cemeteries. Unkempt surroundings, broken walls , plaster peeling off walls or unplastered walls as if



devastated by war, with people appearing and disappearing suddenly out of the ruins. The more recent areas are full of 10,12,15 story apartments with no apparent setbacks or height restrictions, jostling cheek to Jowl in a city of 27 million. Many of even the new buildings are not plastered as if the owner had either run out of money or the climate (with annual 3 cm rainfall) in his opinion didn't warrant plastering. A sort of multistoried continuous slum. Browns and sepias as if the desert would not allow any other colour.

One gets a feeling of being in medieval times when Islam was at its pinnacle. We took a horse drawn carriage

to see the Temple of Edfu. I saw upto carriage number 700.

ECONOMY

Nominal per per capita is slightly higher than india @ \$3500 but PPP is \$ 20,500 80% higher than india signaling a much cheaper cost of living. Inequities are much less pronounced than India.

The Lake Nasser (actually a reservoir) created by the Aswan Dam covers an area of 6000 sq KM and holds

162BCUM of water enough for 20 years for the whole of Egypt including its requirements for Agriculture.

THE SIGHTS

CAIRO:

- 1. The piece de resistance is of course Giza with its Pyramids King Cheops (Khufu) his son Khafra and Pharaoh Menkaure. All built 4500 years ago a marvel of engineering and precision. They had discovered a boat 142' long preserved intact in the pyramid belonging to Khufu 4500 years old, now kept at the Grand Egyptian Museum which was opened its doors to the public a few days after we left Cairo.
- 2. There is a Son et Lumiere in the night at Giza .Not so good.
- 3. The Sphinx
- 4. The Khufu Valley Temple near the Sphinx the funerary complex of Khufu built in polished

Granite with monolithic pieces weighing 10-15- tons carted from Aswan by floods in the river Nile.

5. The Egyptian Museum. A museum of mindboggling artifacts including

6. The Hanging Church

built over the Babylon Fortress. The Copt's and Muslim's favourite place to build over each others foundations.

7. Shopping El-Muiz Street and Khan El-Khalili Bazzar.

LUXOR:

1. THE KARNAK TEMPLE: As as soon as we landed we were taken to the Karnak Temple. The largest temple built in Egypt built over many Millennium.. Some things in the temple are just extraordinary.

The Hypostle Hall with columns 70' high on the Capital of which 30 people can be

accommodated. The Obelisks of Queen Hatshepsut erected around 1490 BC towering close to 100' high a single monolithic Polished granite weighing 340 Tons prepared in Aswan and transported to LUXOR by floods and erected at the temple!!!

Most obelisks in Egypt have been given away to or stolen by Western Powers.


2. VALLEY OF THE KINGS

The Valley where most of the Pharaohs are entombed. Magnificent tombs . As a quick fix for the Pyramids because the mountain towering over these tombs looks like pyramid. All the Pharaohs were buried with all posessions they might need in

the afterlife including all sorts of day to day paraphernalia and copious amounts of Gold

3. OUEEN HATSHEPSUTS PALACE.

A magnificent piece of architecture still under restoration. The only palace with landscaped grounds with plants imported from Somalia . Trust the only Woman Pharaoh to give the edifice a feminine touch.

4. THE LUXOR TEMPLE


I think for the rest of the highlights I will need another article.

But one last observation. Egyptians like Indians probably never had a sense of the greatness of their own History. And Egypt Like India lives simultaneously in many Centuries.

I forgot to write about the Rosetta Stone which was discovered in in 1799 in Rashid (Rosetta)in Egypt written in 196 BC to commemorate the reign of Ptolemy V. It's written in Heiroglyphic, Demotic and Greek. This helped decipher the Heiroglyphics of the Old Pharaohs. The stone is in the British Museum.
